# INTRODUCING MORE 3.0

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This chapter provides information about the following:

## STARTING MORE

When you start MORE a new, untitled document is automatically created and displayed. For this document, MORE uses the default settings for Document Options, Print Options, and Rules.

**NOTE:** *To change the default settings MORE uses for new documents, see "Saving Preferences," later in this chapter.*



### To start MORE

- Double-click the MORE icon, or click the MORE icon and choose Open from the Finder's File menu.

## QUITTING MORE

When you quit and return to the Finder, MORE remembers which documents you had open and saves this information in a file named Resume MORE. This file is stored in the same folder as the MORE application. When you are ready to begin working again, you can reopen the documents you last used by double-clicking the Resume MORE icon. Resuming also reopens any dialog windows, libraries, dictionaries, and the help file that were in use when you quit the application.

### To quit MORE

1. Choose Quit from the File menu.

If you have not saved the latest changes to your document, a dialog box asks if you want to save them.

2. To save, click Yes. To quit without saving changes, click No. If you have changed your mind about quitting, click Cancel.

If you click Yes and the document is a new, untitled document, the Save As dialog box appears. To save an untitled document, see “Saving a Document,” later in this chapter.

## RESUMING MORE

If you want to resume working on the documents you had open when you last quit MORE, you can resume MORE instead of starting the application.

### To resume MORE



- Double-click the Resume MORE icon (located in the same folder as the MORE application).

You can also open a Resume file by selecting the Open command from the File menu while in MORE.

The documents that were open when you quit reopen.



*You can save alternate working sets of MORE documents by saving and quitting the application with a set of documents open, then renaming the Resume MORE file.*

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## MORE VIEWS

MORE displays information in three views: as an outline, a bullet chart, or a tree chart. You usually begin all MORE projects by first creating an outline in which you organize information in headlines and subheadlines.



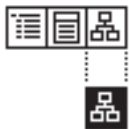
### *Outline view*

Automatically displayed when you first start the application. You can enter information into headlines which may be developed into a report or transformed into a bullet chart presentation or a tree chart by simply changing the view.



### *Bullet Chart view*

Displays each headline as a separate chart title and the subheadlines as bulleted items below the chart title.



### *Tree Chart view*

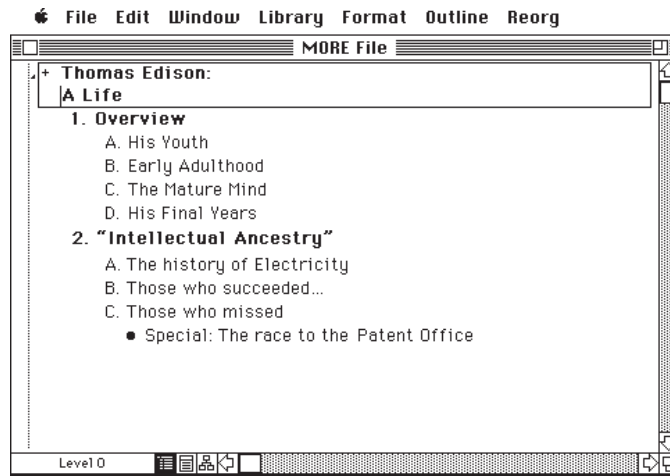
Displays headlines and subheadlines as a tree chart of organizational relationships.

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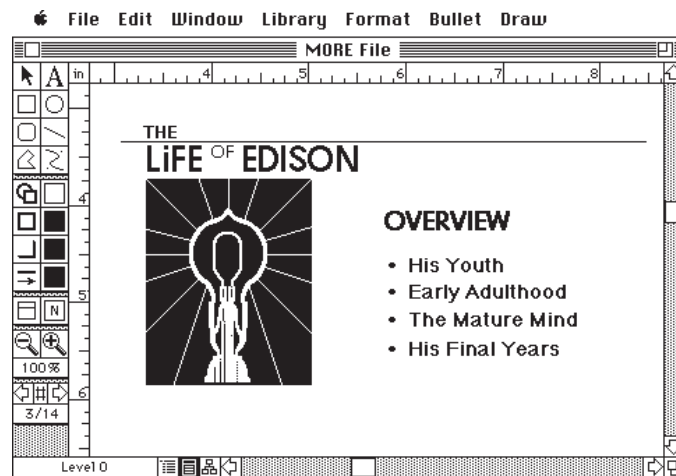
Each view has its own special menus and commands. In addition, the Bullet and Tree Chart views have their own tool palettes for designing and styling chart objects.

You can move between views whenever you want by clicking the View icon (see above) at the bottom of the MORE window. The illustrations on the next page show how the same information appears in Outline, Bullet Chart, and Tree Chart views.

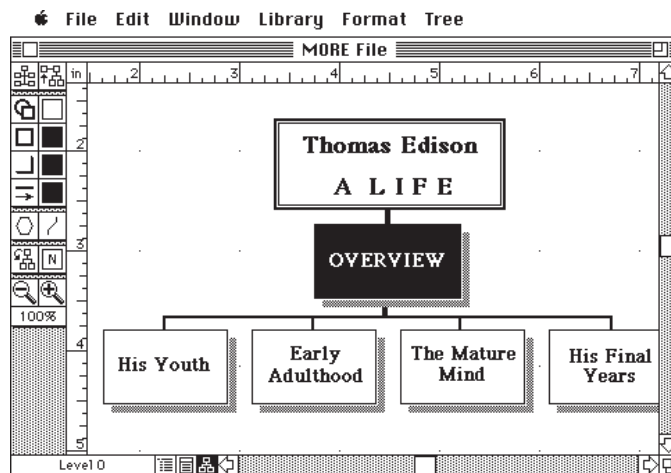
The Outline view

The Tree Chart view



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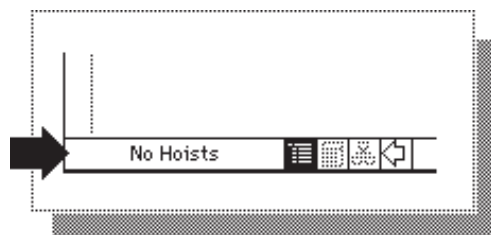
## Using the Status Box

The status box at the lower left corner of the MORE window displays three kinds of information:

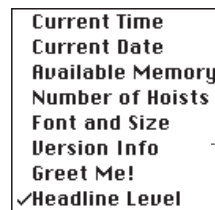
- status messages
- help information for the text ruler and tool palettes
- information you specify, such as the current time

Status messages provide information about certain operations as they are being performed. For example, the message “Copying...” appears when you use the Copy command. Help information appears when you click an item in the text ruler or a tool palette. At all other times, the status box shows the information you have specified to appear in it. You can display the following information:

- current time
- current date
- available memory
- number of hoists that have been performed
- font and size of the selected headline
- current MORE version
- a personalized greeting
- current headline level (title level in Bullet Chart view)
- current chart (Bullet Chart view)

### To change information in the status box

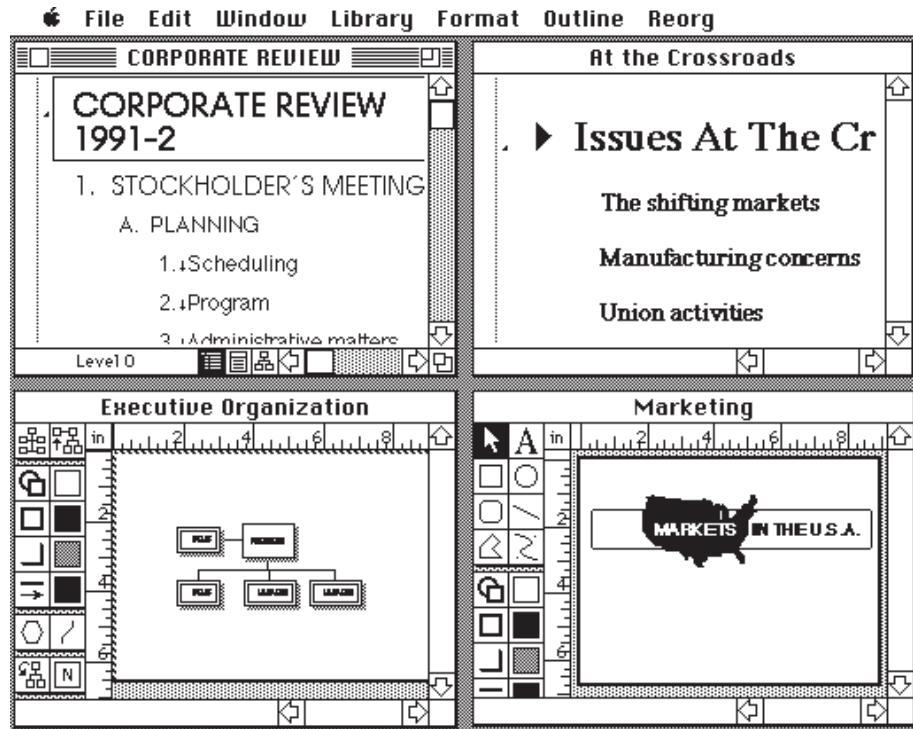
1. Position the pointer over the status box and press the mouse button to display a pop-up menu of choices.
2. Select the type of information you want to appear.

Each view shows the same information unless “Current Chart” is displayed in Bullet Chart view.

## MANAGING WINDOWS

MORE lets you open up to 16 documents at a time. Each document appears in its own window. You can have a different view displayed in each open window, as shown below. MORE provides two commands that make it easy to manage multiple windows: Arrange and Window To Back. These commands are described in the following sections.

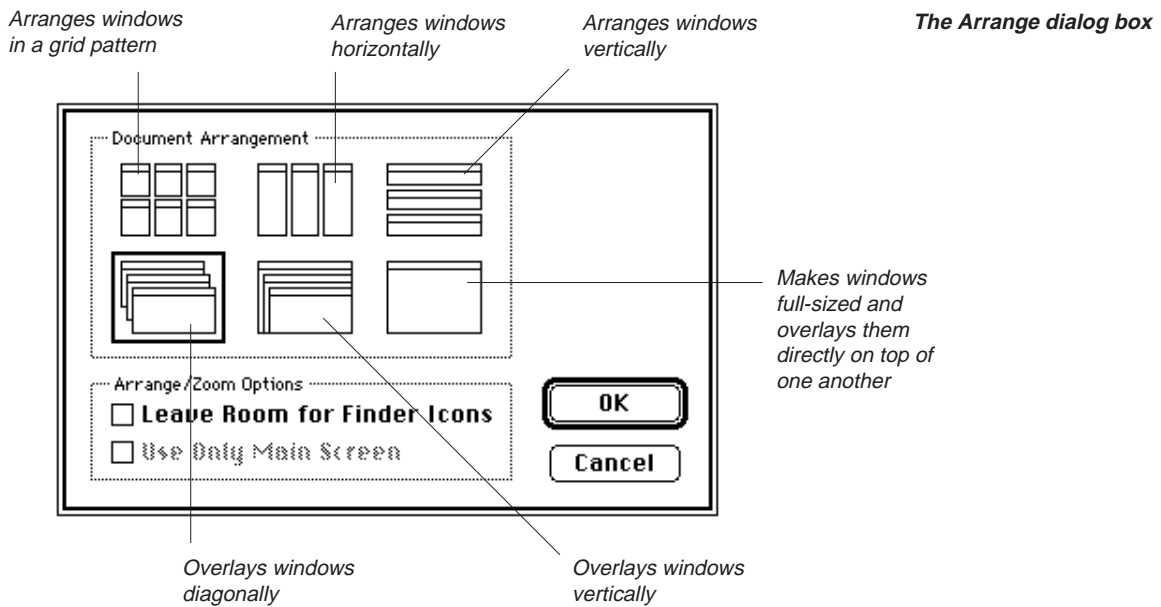
*Four documents

## Arranging Multiple Windows

You'll want to arrange multiple document windows in a way that makes it easy for you to work. For example, you may want all windows to be completely visible—or you may want windows to overlap so that you see the top window but can easily select the others. You can quickly arrange multiple windows by choosing the Arrange command on the Window menu. You can choose from six arrangement patterns.



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*Leave Room for Finder Icons* Reserves space for the Finder icons on the right side of the screen when MORE arranges windows in the pattern you have selected. Deselect this option if you want the entire screen to be used.

---

*Use Only Main Screen* Arranges windows only on the Main monitor when you have multiple monitors. Deselect this option if you want windows arranged across multiple monitors.

---

### To arrange multiple windows

1. Choose Arrange from the Window menu.

The Arrange dialog box appears.

2. Click the icon representing the arrangement you want.

If you want the Finder icons to remain exposed, select the Leave Room for Finder Icons option. If you have multiple monitors and want all windows to be arranged on the main monitor, select the Use Only Main Screen option.

3. To close the dialog box and apply the arrangement you have selected, click OK.

or

Double-click the arrangement icon to apply the window arrangement and close the dialog box without clicking OK.



*To apply the previous arrangement without displaying the Arrange Windows dialog box, hold down the Option key and choose Arrange Again from the Windows menu.*

### Cycling through Multiple Windows

Use the Window to Back command in the Window menu to cycle the next document window to the front when you have multiple windows open. You can choose to leave open dialog windows in the front, or send them to the back.

#### To cycle all MORE windows

- Choose Window to Back from the Window menu, or press **W-0** (zero). MORE sends the topmost window to the rear of the displayed windows.

#### To cycle document windows, leaving other windows in front

- Hold down the Option key and choose Cycle Windows from the Window menu, or press **option-W-0** (zero).

MORE sends the topmost document window to the rear of the displayed windows. Any open windows other than document windows (including Speaker's Notes windows, Search windows, and Spelling windows) cycle to the front and remain there.



---

## Resizing Windows

You can resize a MORE window by activating the window and dragging the size box in the bottom-right corner of the window. MORE also provides two commands, Zoom In and Zoom Out, that allow you to toggle the active window's size between the size you define with the size box and a window that entirely fills your display screen.

### To expand a window to full size

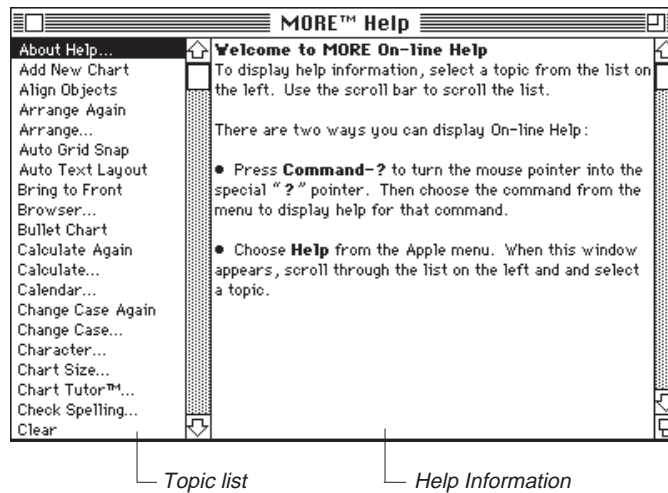
- Activate the window you want to size and choose Zoom In from the Window menu  
or
- Click the zoom box in the top-right corner of the window's title bar.  
MORE expands the window to fill the display screen where the window appears.

**NOTE:** *Zooming uses the Arrange/Zoom Options specified in the Arrange dialog box. These options, Leave Room for Finder Icons and Use Only Main Screen are discussed in "Arranging Multiple Windows" earlier in this chapter.*

## GETTING HELP

MORE provides on-line help for commands, dialog boxes, tool palettes, and the text ruler. Command help is displayed in the Help window. While you're learning MORE, you may want to leave the Help window open as you work in your document. To resume working in your document, click the document window to make it active; when you need help, click the Help window. You can also move or resize the Help window.

*The Help window*



### To get help about a command

Use one of these two methods to get help about a command:



1. Press **W-?**.

The pointer changes to a question mark, as shown in the margin.

2. Choose the menu command about which you want help.

To choose the command, drag in the pull-down menu as you normally would to execute the command.

The Help window appears, as shown in the previous illustration. The command is automatically highlighted in the command list box and help information appears in the information box. You can scroll additional information into view using the scroll bar.

or

- 
1. Choose Help from the Apple menu.  
The Help window appears, as shown before.

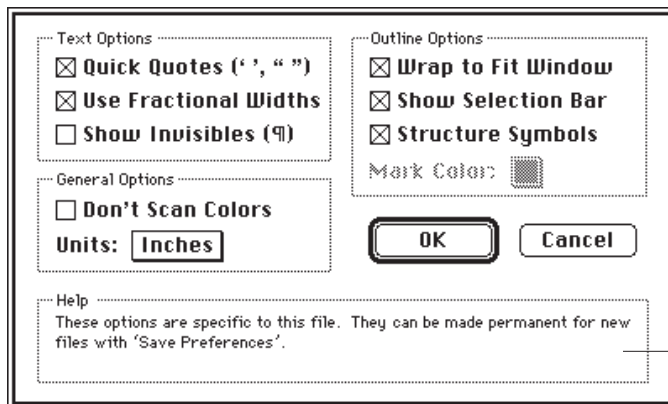
2. Select the command in the topic list box.

You can scroll the list using the scroll bar. When you select the command, the help information appears in the information box. You can scroll additional information into view using the scroll bar.

3. Click the close box to close the Help window.

## Using Dialog Help

To get help about a dialog box, the Use Dialog Help option must be turned on in the Program Options dialog box. To turn this option on, choose Program Options from the File menu. Click the Use Dialog Help option, and click OK. When the option is active, you can view help information about an item in a dialog box by clicking the item. Help information appears at the bottom of the dialog box, as shown in the following illustration.

### To get help on the tool palettes or the text ruler

1. Press **W-?** to change the pointer to a question mark.
2. Click the Tool Palette or Text Ruler.  
A dialog box displays information about the palette tools or text ruler icons.
3. To return to your document, click anywhere on the screen.

**NOTE:** When a palette tool or text ruler icon is clicked, the status box displays its name. The status box is located next to the view icons at the lower left corner of the window.

## MANAGING MORE DOCUMENTS

The File menu contains commands for managing your MORE documents. This includes opening, closing, saving, deleting, and printing them. You can also revert to the last saved version of a document if you are unhappy with the changes you have made.

### Opening New Documents

When you open a new document, MORE opens a numbered, untitled document in a new document window. You may open up to 16 documents at the same time. The Outline view is automatically displayed and the Home headline is selected. You name an untitled document the first time you save it (see “Saving a Document,” later in this chapter).

#### To open a new document

- Choose New from the File menu.

If the command is not active, you already have the maximum number of documents open. Close a document and choose New again.

A new, untitled document appears.

### Opening Existing Documents

When you open an existing MORE document, it is displayed exactly as it appeared when it was last closed.

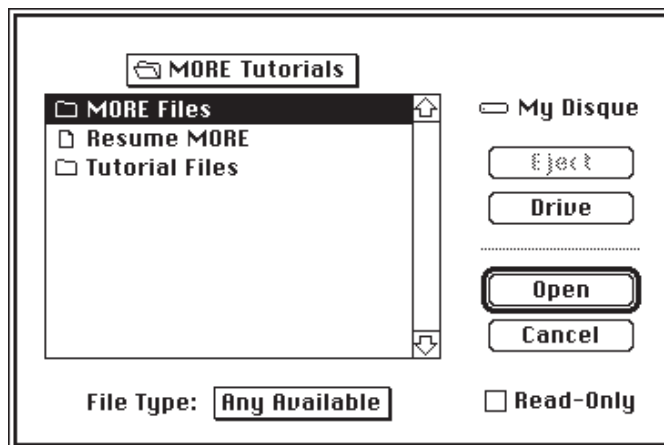
**NOTE:** *If you want to start up the MORE program and reopen all documents that were open when you last quit, double-click the Resume MORE icon. For more information see “Resuming MORE,” earlier in this chapter.*

---

In addition to opening existing MORE documents, you can open documents created in other applications or formats if you have the appropriate MORE translator stored in the MORE Files folder. The translated documents are opened as MORE outlines. MORE provides the following translators for opening files:

- MORE 2.x, 3.x
- Plain text (ASCII)
- GrandView
- MacWrite and MacWrite II
- MORE 1.x
- Microsoft Word 3.x and 4.x
- READY! IBM PC
- ThinkTank 512
- ThinkTank 2.0, IBM PC
- Teach Text
- WordPerfect
- WriteNow

You use the Open dialog box to open existing documents.



*The Open dialog box*

<i>Directory title</i>	Displays the name of the current disk or folder. To open a document in a different folder, press the Directory title and choose from the pop-up menu.
<i>List box</i>	Displays the names of documents and folders that can be opened on the currently selected disk. (If you have chosen an alternative file type, MORE lists only documents of that file type.)
<i>File Type</i>	Displays a pop-up menu listing the available translators in your MORE Files folder.
<i>Eject</i>	Ejects the current disk so that you can insert another disk in the drive.
<i>Drive</i>	Displays the contents of another drive in the list box.
<i>Open</i>	Opens the currently selected document.
<i>Read-Only</i>	Opens a read-only version of the document, which cannot be edited. A read-only version can be read by more than one person on a network at the same time. MORE automatically opens a read-only version if you open a document that is already in use across a network or if the document is locked.

---

---

### **To open a document from the Finder**

- Double-click on the MORE document.

The MORE application launches and the document is opened.

or

- Press Shift and select both the MORE application and the document.

If the document requires a translator, MORE finds the appropriate translator and opens the document.

### **To open a document from within MORE**

1. Choose Open from the File menu, or press **W-O**.

The Open dialog box appears.

2. If the document you want to open was not created with MORE, press the File Type pop-up menu and choose the correct type from the list (if you are unsure, choose Any Available).

The list box shows all documents of the selected type on the current disk.

3. Display the document in the list box.

Use the Drive and Eject buttons to display documents of the selected type stored on another drive or disk.

4. If you want to open a read-only version of the document, select the Read-Only option.

5. Open the document by double-clicking it in the list box, or by clicking Open if the document is already selected in the list box.

As MORE opens the document, a dialog box indicates how the operation is progressing. Clicking Cancel before the document is opened will cancel the open operation.

## Closing a Document

Closing a document removes it from the screen. When the document is reopened, it will be displayed exactly as it appeared when it was closed.

### To close a document

1. Use one of these methods to close a document:

Choose Close from the File menu.

or

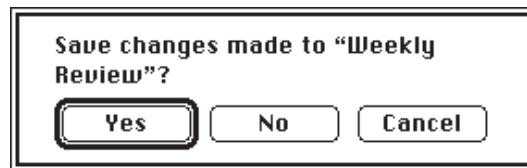
Press **W-W**.

or

Click the close box in the upper left corner of the window.

To close all documents, hold down the Option key while performing any of the methods described above. If you have made changes to the document since you last saved, a message asks if you want to save the changes before closing.

2. To save the changes, click Yes.  
To close the document without saving any changes, click No.  
To cancel the Close command, click Cancel.

If the document is a new, untitled document, clicking Yes displays the Save As dialog box. You can name the new document and specify the folder and disk to which you want the document saved. For more information about saving a new, untitled document, see the next section, "Saving a Document."



---

## **Saving a Document**

Saving stores the current version of your document to disk. With the Save As command, you can save your document in various file formats, such as WordPerfect, WriteNow, or Microsoft Word. The File menu has three commands that save changes—each has a different function:

*Save As* Saves a new, untitled document. You can also use this command to save an existing document under a different name or to a different disk, folder, or file format.

---

*Save* Saves changes as you work on your document. Use this command frequently.

---

*Save All* Saves changes made to all open documents. (Save All replaces Save when you hold down the option key.)

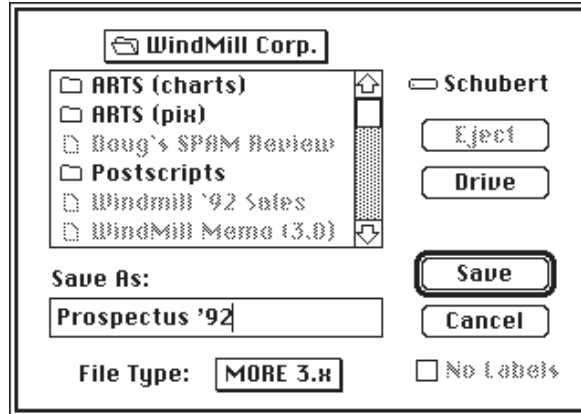
---

### **To save a new, untitled document:**

1. Choose Save from the File menu.  
The Save dialog box appears.
2. Choose the disk and folder to which you want the document saved.
3. Type the name of the new document in the Save As box.  
MORE automatically enters the Home Headline in the Save As box for you. Use this name or enter another.
4. Click Save to save the new document.

When you select Save As from the File menu, the Save As dialog box appears.

*The Save As dialog box*



---

*Directory title*     Displays the name of the current disk or folder. To save your document to a different folder, press the Directory title and choose from the pop-up menu.

---

*List box*             Displays the names of all files and folders on the currently selected disk. You can scroll the list to select a different folder.

---

*Save As*             Displays the name of the document. To change the name, type a different name. You can use any characters except a colon, and any keys except Tab, or Return.

---

*File Type*           Displays the file format in which the document will be saved. To choose a different file format, press File Type and select a format from the pop-up menu.

---

*Eject*                 Ejects the current disk. This option is useful when you want to insert another disk on which to save your document. When you insert another disk, its contents appear in the list box.

---

*Drive*                 Displays the contents of another disk drive in the list box. (This button is inactive if you have only one disk drive.)

---

**Save** Saves the outline according to the selected format and file name.

---

**No Labels** When this option is turned on, headline labels are not saved with your outline. This option is useful when you are saving to a file format other than the MORE format and plan to re-import your document into MORE.

---

### To save a document in a file format other than MORE 3.0

1. Choose Save As from the File menu.
2. Choose the disk and folder to which you want the document saved.
3. Type the name of the document in the Save As box.
4. Press File Type and select the file format you want to use from the pop-up menu.

**NOTE:** You can choose a different file format from the pop-up menu only if you have installed MORE's translator files. If the File Types pop-up menu only contains the MORE and Plain Text formats, the translator files have not been installed. For installation instructions, see "Installing MORE on Your Hard Disk" in Chapter 2 of **Learning MORE 3.0**.

In Bullet Chart view or Tree Chart view, you have the option of saving the document in a graphic file format such as MacPaint, PICT or EPSF. The file can then be opened in other graphics applications.

**NOTE:** When saving a file in the MORE 2.x format, most formatting information, as well as any objects added to your charts, will not be saved.

5. Click the No Labels option if you are saving to a file format other than MORE 3.0 and do not want the headline labels saved with your outline.
6. Click Save to save the new document.

If a file already exists with the same name as the document you are saving, a message asks if you want to replace the existing file. If you do not want to replace the existing file, click No. Type a different name in the Save As box and click Save again. If you want to replace the existing file with the file you are saving, click Yes.

If a message tells you that the disk is too full to save your outline, click Eject to eject the full disk and insert another disk that has more free space, or delete files by choosing Delete from the File menu.

### To save changes as you work

- To save changes to the document in the active window, choose Save from the File menu.
- To save changes to all open documents, hold down the Option key and choose Save All from the File menu.

If a message tells you that the disk is too full to save your outline, you can click Eject to eject the full disk and insert another disk that has more free space or delete files by choosing Delete from the File menu.

As MORE saves the document, a dialog box indicates how the save operation is progressing. If you do not want to see this information, turn off Show Progress Dialogs in the Program Options dialog box.

**NOTE:** *Use the Save command to save your work often—about every 15 minutes. A document is only temporarily stored in the computer's memory until you save it to disk. If a power failure occurs while you are working, any changes you have made since you last saved will be lost. The Save command is inactive when no changes have been made to the document.*

Use the Auto Save feature to have MORE save your documents for you at a specified time interval. Select Program Options from the File menu and select the Auto Save option. Use the pop-up menu to specify a preset time interval or select Other and enter your own time.

### To save a new version of a document

1. Choose Save As from the File menu.
2. Type a new name in the Save As box, and click Save.

The document window now shows the version you saved under the new name. The window containing the old version of the document is automatically closed.

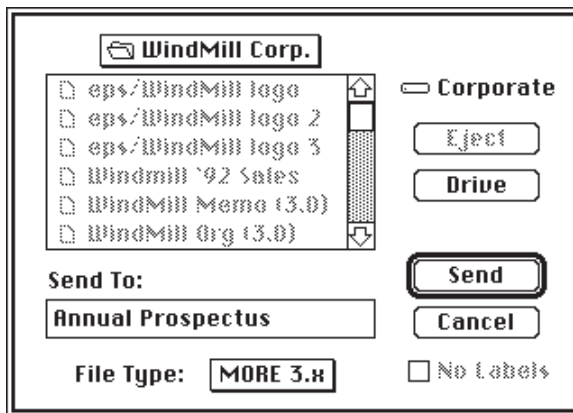
**NOTE:** *If you try to save a document that was originally created with an earlier version of MORE, the current version of MORE automatically adds "MORE 3.0" to the original file name in the Save As dialog. If you wish, you can delete the "MORE 3.0" appendage and copy the file over the original (or save the file in the older MORE format).*

---

## Exporting a Chart or Suboutline

MORE provides a Send To command that lets you export a bullet chart, a selected suboutline, or selected headlines by saving this information to a separate file on disk. You can save the selection in a file format other than MORE 3.0. If you save in MORE 3.0 format, the rules and comments attached to the headlines are also saved.

When you choose Send To from the File menu, the Send To dialog box appears. The Send To dialog box is similar to the Save As dialog box.



*The Send to dialog box*

---

*Directory title* Displays the name of the current disk or folder. To save the file to a different folder, press the Directory title and choose from the pop-up menu.

---

*List box* Displays the names of all files and folders on the currently selected disk. You can scroll to select a different folder.

---

*Send To* Displays the name of the document. To change the name, type a different name. You can use any characters except a colon, and any keys except Tab, or Return.

---

*File Type* Displays the file format in which the document will be saved. To choose a file format other than MORE 3.0, press File Type and select a format from the pop-up menu.

---

*Eject* Ejects the current disk. With this option, you can insert another disk on which to save your document. When you insert another disk, its contents appear in the list box.

*Drive* Displays the contents of another drive in the list box. (This button is inactive if you have only one disk drive.)

---

*Send* Saves the selected outline or suboutline to a file.

---

*No Labels* When this option is turned on, headline labels are not saved with your outline. This option is useful when you are saving to a file format other than the MORE format and plan to re-import your document into MORE.

---

### **To export a selected suboutline or bullet chart**

1. Display the Outline or Bullet Chart view.
2. Select the headline or bullet chart, and choose Send To from the File menu.  
The Send To dialog box appears.
3. Choose the disk and folder to which you want the document saved.
4. Type the name of the new document in the Send To box.
5. Press File Type and choose the file format you want from the pop-up menu.  
If you are saving to a file format other than MORE 3.0 and do not want the headline labels saved with your outline, click the No Labels option.
6. Click Send.



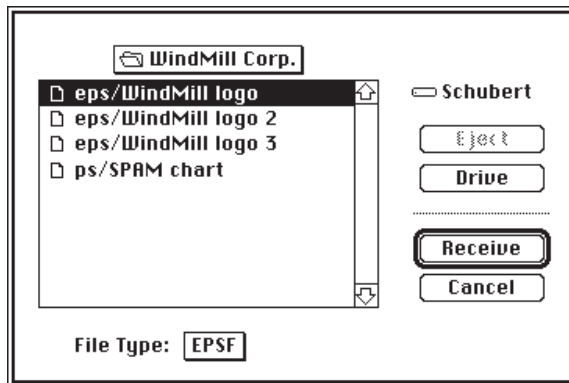
*To select specific headline levels to export to a file, hold down the Option key and choose Select from the Edit menu.*

---

## Importing Text or Graphics

You can insert the contents of a disk file into the current outline or bullet chart using the Receive From command. In an outline, you can import either text or graphics files. Imported text is inserted below the selected headline or in the current comment window. Imported graphics are inserted at the insertion point in outlines or comment windows. In bullet charts, you can import only graphics files; the imported graphic is placed on the current chart. Receive From is not available for Speaker's Notes or Headers/Footers.

When you choose Receive From in the File menu, the Receive From dialog box appears. The Receive From dialog box is similar to the dialog box that appears when you open files from within most Macintosh applications.



**The Receive From dialog box**

---

**Directory title** Displays the name of the current disk or folder. To find a file in a different folder, press the Directory title and choose from the pop-up menu.

---

**List box** Displays the names of all files and folders on the currently selected disk. You can scroll to select a different folder.

---

**File Type** Displays a pop-up menu of file formats that you can open and read into the outline or bullet chart. When you choose a file type from the pop-up menu, MORE displays only the names of files saved in the selected format.

---

**Eject** Ejects the current disk. With this option, you can insert another disk. When you insert another disk, its contents appear in the list box.

<i>Drive</i>	Displays the contents of another drive in the list box. (This button is inactive if you have only one disk drive.)
<i>Receive</i>	Inserts the specified file at the currently selected location in your outline.

---

### **To import a file into an outline or bullet chart**

1. To import text into an outline, select the headline above where you want to insert the contents of the file, or click in the comment window that you want to contain the contents of the file.

To import a graphic into an outline, position the insertion point where you want the graphic to appear.

To import a graphic into a bullet chart, display the chart that you want to contain the graphic.

2. Choose Receive From from the File menu.  
The Receive From dialog box appears.
3. Specify a file format and choose the file you want to receive.
4. Click Receive to insert the contents of the selected file.  
The file is inserted into the outline or bullet chart.

### **Reverting to Last Version Saved**

If you do not like the changes you have made to a document, you can return to the last saved version of the document.

#### **To revert to the last version saved**

1. Choose Revert from the File menu.  
The Revert command is inactive if the document has not been previously saved or if no changes have been made.  
A dialog box asks if you really want to discard the changes that you have made.



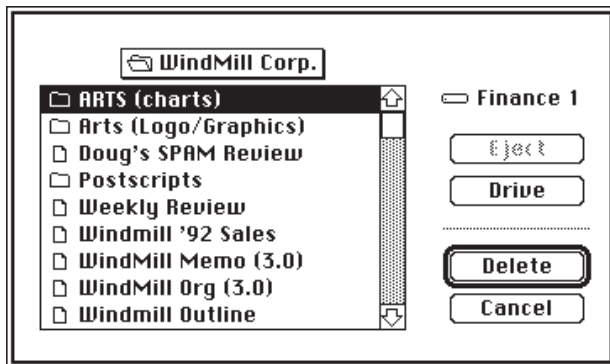
- 
2. To discard the changes and return to the last saved version of the document, click Yes.

The last saved version is displayed.

## Deleting a File

Deleting a document erases it from the disk. MORE lets you delete a document without quitting the application and returning to the Finder. You may want to delete files when a disk is full and you need more disk space to save a document.

When you choose Delete from the File menu, the Delete dialog box appears.



*The Delete dialog box*

---

*Directory title*     Displays the name of the current disk or folder. To find a file in a different folder, press the Directory title and choose from the pop-up menu.

---

*List box*             Displays the names of documents and folders on the currently selected disk.

---

*Eject*                Ejects the current disk. This option is useful when you want to insert another disk from which you want to delete files. When you insert another disk, its contents appear in the list box.

---

*Drive*                Displays the contents of another drive in the list box.

---

*Delete*              Erases the selected file from the disk.

### To delete a document

1. Choose Delete from the File menu.  
The Delete dialog box appears, as shown in the previous illustration.
2. Select the file you want to delete from the list box, and click Delete.  
A message asks you to confirm that you want to delete the selected file.
3. Click Yes to delete the file.  
If you click No, the file is not deleted and the Delete dialog box is redisplayed so that you can select another file from the list.
4. When you have finished deleting files, click Cancel to return to your document.

.....

## PRINTING

When you print an outline, bullet chart, or tree chart, MORE uses the options you have set in the Print Options window and Page Setup dialog box. Print options control what is included in your printout and whether your document prints in color. Each view has different print options.

If your printing device does not support color, MORE converts solid colors to shades of gray and multicolored patterns to black and white (the lighter colors in the pattern convert to white, and darker colors convert to black). To print using only standard black, white, and gray defaults, with no background patterns, use the Draft Printing option.

For information about setting print options, refer to the printing instructions in the chapter for the view you want to print.

### To print

- Choose Print from the File menu, or press **W-P**.

The Print dialog box comes up. Click on OK and MORE prints the current view using the print options and page setup options you have previously set.

**NOTE:** You can also print from within the Print Options window by clicking the Printer icon.

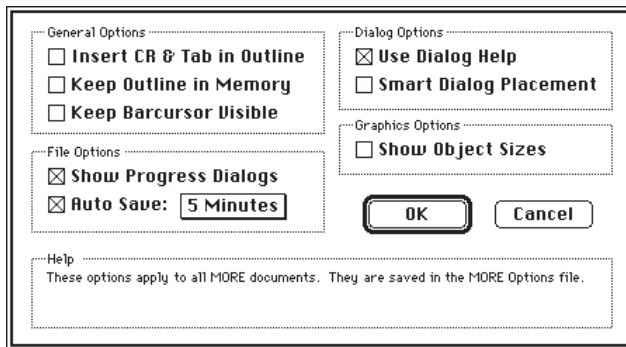
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## SETTING USER PREFERENCES

You can control how MORE operates in your documents by setting Program Options in the File menu and Document Options in the Window menu. For example, you can set the unit of measurement for the text ruler and control whether features such as the Selection bar or structure symbols are shown or hidden. You can also choose to use short or full menus as you work.

### Setting Program Options

Program options apply to all MORE documents you open. To bring up the Program Options dialog box, select Program Options in the File menu.



*Program Options dialog box*

You can set the following program options:

*Insert CR & Tab in Outline* Specifies how the following keystrokes operate in MORE:

<b>Keystroke</b>	<b>Insert CR &amp; Tab Is Selected</b>	<b>Insert CR &amp; Tab Is Deselected</b>
<b><i>Return</i></b>	<i>(Splits the headline:) moves text to a new headline</i>	<i>Adds a new headline to the right of the I-beam cursor</i>
<b><i>Command-Return</i></b>	<i>Adds a new headline</i>	<i>Splits the headline</i>
<b><i>Tab</i></b>	<i>Tabs text</i>	<i>Moves the headline to the right</i>
<b><i>Delete</i></b>	<i>Delete and join</i>	<i>Delete, no join</i>
<b><i>Command-Delete</i></b>	<i>Delete, no join</i>	<i>Delete and join</i>

<i>Keep Outline in Memory</i>	Causes the entire outline to be read into memory. When you work in the outline, MORE will not need to access the disk where the file is stored, however, less memory is available for other outlines you might want to open. When this option is deselected, MORE keeps a limited amount of the outline in memory, leaving more room for other outlines you may open.
<i>Keep Barcursor Visible</i>	Automatically moves the barcursor to the next visible headline as you scroll your outline on the screen. If you do not want the barcursor to move as you scroll, deselect this option.
<i>Show Progress Dialogs</i>	Displays a progress dialog during file operations (Open, Save, and Close).
<i>Auto Save</i>	Automatically saves open MORE documents after a time interval specified in the accompanying pop-up menu.
<i>Use Dialog Help</i>	Displays help for dialog boxes. If you do not want this help information to appear, deselect this option.
<i>Smart Dialog Placement</i>	Displays most dialog boxes in the active window when you are working on multiple monitors. If you want dialog boxes to always appear on the main monitor, deselect this option.
<i>Show Object Sizes</i>	Displays the size and position of an object (relative to the top left corner of the chart) when you select or resize it. If you do not want this information displayed, deselect this option.

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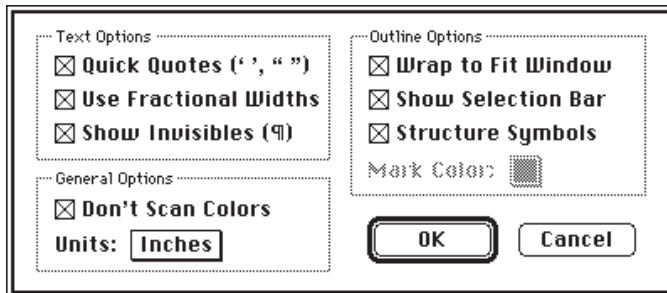
### **To set program options**

1. Choose Program Options from the File menu.  
The Program Options dialog box appears.
2. Select or deselect the options you want, and click OK.  
MORE uses these options for all documents.

---

## Setting Document Options

Document options apply only to the current document. When you open a new document MORE uses the default document options settings. You can change these settings for the current document or replace the default settings MORE uses with the new settings you have chosen (see “Saving Preferences,” later in this chapter). You can set the following document options:



**The Document Options dialog box**

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**Quick Quotes** Generates typographer’s quotation marks and apostrophes when the quote keys are pressed. When this option is selected, pressing Option-[ and Option-] types straight quotation marks and apostrophes. If you always want straight quotation marks and apostrophes displayed, deselect this option.

---

**Use Fractional Widths** Provides better character and word spacing for some fonts when you print on high-resolution printers. If you do not want to use fractional width text, deselect this option.

---

**Show Invisibles** Displays characters to indicate paragraphs (¶), tabs (⇧) and spaces (·) and outlines pictures and hot stamps on the screen. (A hot stamp is a date, time or file name that is dynamically updated by MORE.) These characters do not print. If you do not want the symbols displayed, deselect this option.

---

**Don't Scan Colors** Displays text and objects with colors available in the system palette. When this feature is selected, MORE does not scan pictures or patterns to extract colors. If you are using a 24-bit or 32-bit monitor, select this option. If this option is selected, on-screen colors might appear different than the colors you selected, especially when using gradients.

<i>Units</i>	Allows you to choose inches, centimeters, or pixels as the unit of measurement used for the text ruler, draw rulers, and grid. These units also become the default units for measurements in dialogs.
<i>Wrap to Fit Window</i>	Automatically rewraps text to fit the window size when you resize the outline window. If you want headlines to wrap to fit the width of the printing margin instead of the window size, deselect this option (then resizing the window will not affect how text is wrapped).
<i>Show Selection Bar</i>	Displays the Selection bar in outlines. If you do not want the Selection bar displayed, deselect this option.
<i>Structure Symbols</i>	Displays structure symbols next to headlines. If you do not want structure symbols to be displayed, deselect this option.
<i>Mark Color</i>	Applies color to headlines marked with the Mark command on the Outline menu. If you do not want to apply color to marked headlines, choose None. To customize the color used for marked headlines, see “Choosing Custom Colors for Text,” in Chapter 5. (The Mark Color option is available only when viewing outlines on monitors displaying color or gray-scale.)

---

### To set document options

1. Choose Document Options from the Window menu.  
or  
Double-click any view icon at the bottom of the window.  
The Document Options dialog box appears.
2. Select or deselect the the options you want, and click OK.  
MORE uses these options for the current document only.

**NOTE:** *To save the current document options as the default settings MORE automatically uses when you open a new document, see “Saving Preferences,” later in this chapter.*

---

## USING SHORT OR FULL MENUS

MORE offers short menus for the novice user and full menus for the more advanced user. Choosing Short Menu displays the basic commands you need to perform simple tasks in each view. When you are ready to use MORE's advanced features, choose Full Menu. Choosing Full Menu displays the complete set of menu commands.

### To choose Short or Full Menus

- Choose Short Menu or Full Menu from the Edit menu in any view.

The Edit menu always displays the command for choosing the menu option that is not currently active.

---

## SAVING PREFERENCES

Default settings are the ones MORE automatically applies to new documents. Any changes you make to these settings are saved with your document. However, you can change the default settings by saving the current settings as the new defaults. MORE saves the current state of each of the following as default settings:

- document options
- print options
- global rules for all views
- color set
- contents of header and footer

### To save current settings as default settings

- Choose Save Preferences from the File menu.

The current settings are saved as the default settings.

**NOTE:** *To change a specific default setting, create a new outline, change the setting, then choose Save Preferences.*

**To restore the original MORE default settings**

- Drag the MORE Options file in your System folder to the Trash.

When you restart MORE, a new MORE Options file is created with the original default settings.

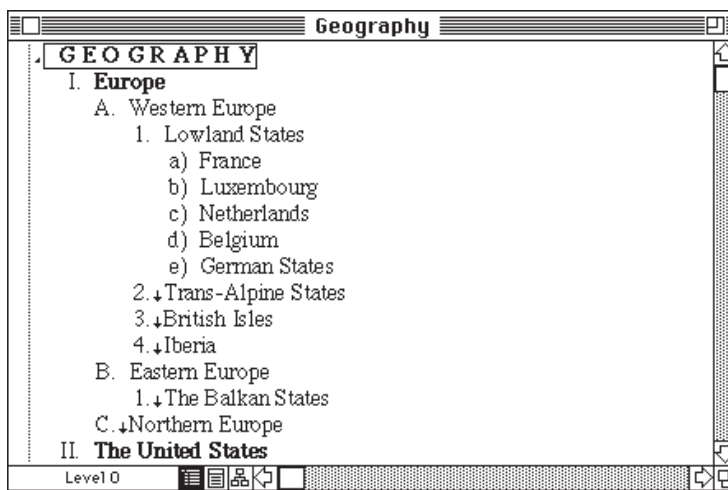


# CHAPTER 2

## USING OUTLINES

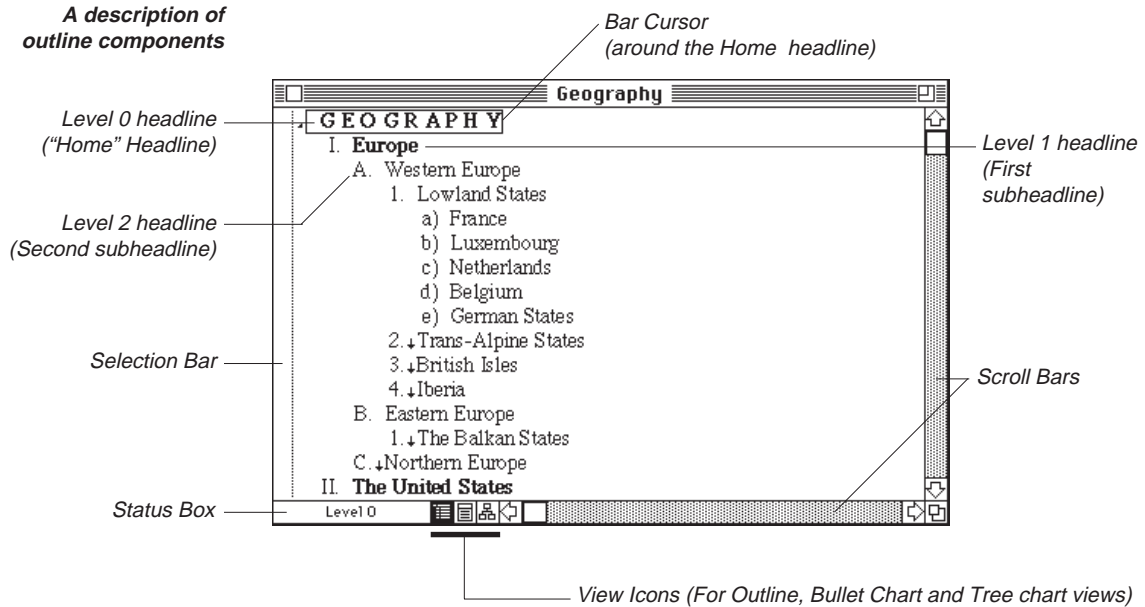
This chapter provides detailed information on creating and managing outlines in MORE.

An outline is the underlying framework for a collection of information—topics are organized into hierarchies depending on their relationship to each other. For example, the level heading “Balkan States” could have subordinate level heads for individual nations, and each of these subordinate levels could contain additional levels of topics concerning each nation.

In its basic function, a MORE outline is identical to the classic outline you used to organize information for high school term papers. But the resemblance ends here. While the traditional outline you created with pen and paper served as a fixed roadmap to a more comprehensive document, a MORE outline is a flexible and powerful organizational tool for managing and manipulating information.



Beyond its standard purpose of organizing information, a MORE outline provides a basis for many sophisticated operations and functions such as creating bullet charts, presenting slide shows, generating tree charts, and producing complete text documents.

## **OUTLINE FEATURES**

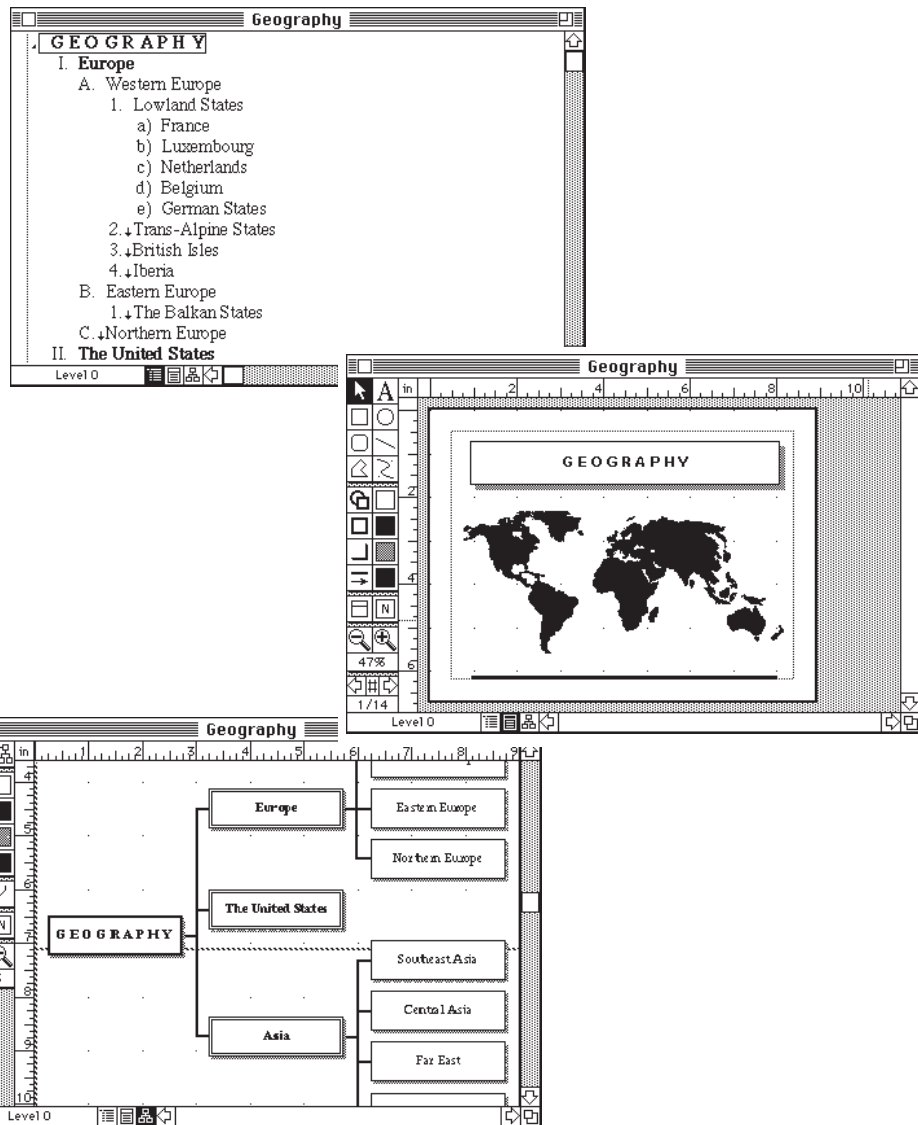
In addition to the basic outlining capability, MORE outlines provide the following features:

- Multiple outlines. You can have up to 16 outline windows open simultaneously on your screen.
- Movable headlines. You can move a headline (and any of its subheads and comment windows) to a new location in the outline by simply dragging it.
- Expandable and collapsible headlines. You can view as many levels of the outline hierarchy as you want. For an overview of your outline, you can display first level headlines only, then expand the headlines further for a more detailed view.
- Headlines can easily be formatted in a variety of styles. You can also create format styles that can be saved and applied to new outlines. MORE provides powerful text editing features that let you create attractive documents directly from your outline.
- Powerful reorganization features. You can promote or demote headlines to different outline levels, mark headlines for other operations, and even clone headlines to create duplicates that mirror any changes to their counterpart headlines.
- Comment windows that you can attach to individual headlines and use to store reminders and asides. Comment windows can be displayed under the associated headline, in a full window view, or hidden from view completely.
- Full search capability for finding text in any part of your outline.
- The capability to paste graphics at any location in the outline.
- The capability to save individual headlines (and their subheads) as files that can be opened and edited in other applications, or as separate MORE outlines. Conversely, files created in other applications, or the contents of other MORE outlines can be inserted in an outline.
- Time and date stamping in headlines as well as headers and footers.
- Sorting of headlines on the basis of text, numerical values, money, time or date.
- Spell checking with a 100,000 word main dictionary and a user-definable dictionary
- Headers and footers.
- Powerful printing options, including page preview, customizable margins, and automatic generation of tables of contents from outlines.

## OUTLINES AND OTHER MORE VIEWS

The outline is your starting point for all MORE operations. The organization and content of an outline determines the structure and appearance of your information as it appears in bullet charts and tree charts; to construct a viable bullet chart or tree chart you must first organize your data into a coherent outline. Although you can control many of the visual aspects of a bullet chart or tree chart within its respective view, the core information displayed in these views depends on the current state of your outline.

*A MORE outline and the derivative bullet and tree charts*



In the example bullet chart, the title is derived from the underlying outline while the graphic embellishments are created directly in the Bullet Chart view. (For more information on using bullet charts, see Chapter 3.) Likewise, the example tree chart displays the contents of headlines created in the outline, but the spacing and appearance of the nodes were specified in the Tree Chart view and are independent of the outline. (For more information on using tree charts, see Chapter 4.)

## **The Home Headline**

The Home headline is always the first and topmost headline in your outline. MORE automatically inserts a Home headline in all new outlines. While you are free to modify the text of the Home headline, its function as the highest level of the outline remains unchanged.

Because Home is the anchor point of an outline, it has some unique characteristics: it cannot be deleted or reorganized to another outline position.

When Home is selected, the Move Left, Move Right, Move Up, Move Down, Promote, Demote, Mark Headline, and Clone commands in the Reorg menu are unavailable, as is the Hoist command in the Outline menu. You can, however, copy the Home headline (which is the same as copying the entire outline) to the Clipboard, and then paste the outline into another outline.

**NOTE:** *If you paste an outline into a new outline that has not been changed in any way, the pasted outline completely replaces the existing outline. However, if you paste an outline into an outline that has been changed, the pasted outline is inserted below the selected headline.*

When you create a new outline, Home always has the default style and format rules attached to it. You can review or change these rules by selecting Home and then choosing Rules from the Format menu. For more information see, “Using Rules,” in Chapter 5.

## Structure Symbols

In Outline view, MORE uses special structure symbols to provide you with information about the structure and content of the outline. Structure symbols appear only on your computer screen; they do not print out. Structure symbols indicate that information is collapsed from view; Speaker's Notes are attached to a headline; a comment window is hidden from view.

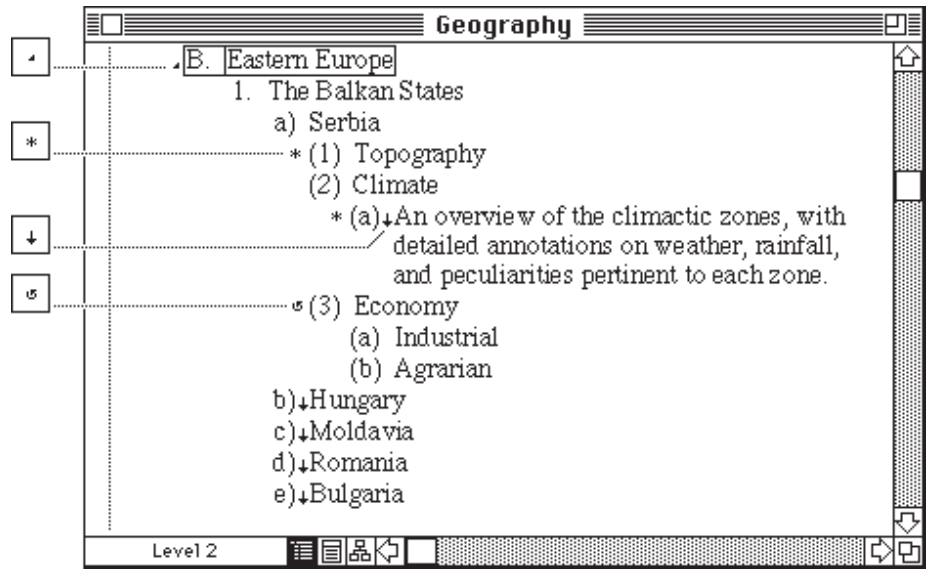
Structure symbols are available with all styles of headline labels, but some symbols may not appear if leader character label style is chosen—leader labels also double as structure symbols.

A headline may display multiple structure symbols. You can control the display of structure symbols by choosing Document Options from the Window menu and clicking Show Structure Symbols in the Document Options dialog box.

The table below describes the meaning of each MORE structure symbol.

<b>Symbol</b>	<b>Meaning</b>
<i>none</i>	<i>Headline does not contain hidden information.</i>
◄	<i>Headline has attached rules.</i>
⊕	<i>Headline contains collapsed subheadlines.</i>
□	<i>Headline contains a collapsed comment window.</i>
*†	<i>A Speaker's Notes window attached to the headline.</i>
⊥	<i>Headline is folded and wrapped.</i>
↵	<i>Headline is a clone</i>

MORE removes the (↓), (↕) and (□) symbols from the selected headline as you display wrapped headlines, collapsed subheadlines, and comment windows, respectively. If the subheadlines, in turn, have undisplayed information, they will display structure symbols. The following illustration shows an outline with structure symbols.



*Structure symbols in an outline*

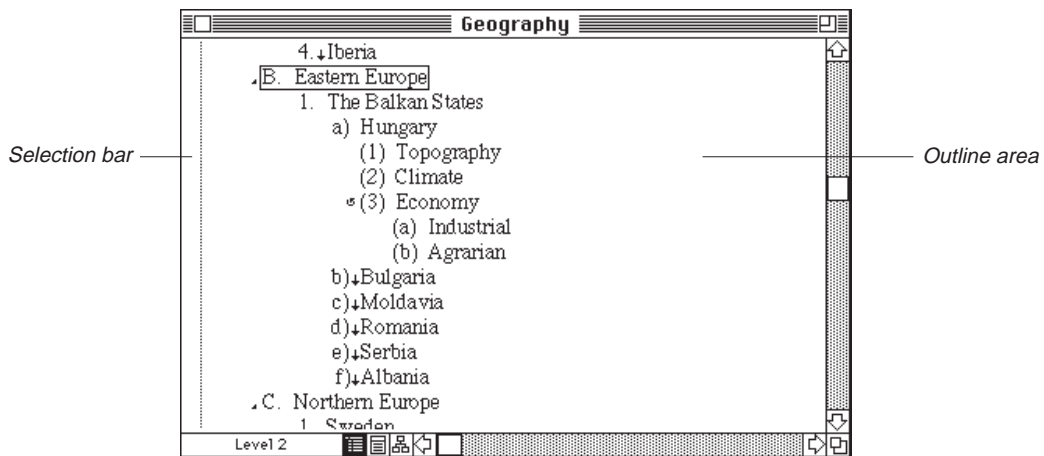
## MANAGING HEADLINES

This section provides detailed information on managing headlines in outlines.

### Selecting Headlines

MORE provides a variety of options for selecting headlines in an outline.

You select a headline by clicking the headline or by clicking the Selection bar on the left border of the Outline window. A dotted line marks the boundary of the Selection bar; when you move the pointer over the Selection bar, the cursor points left to indicate that the bar is active.



Use the Outline area to select individual headlines for reorganization tasks (moving, copying, deleting, hoisting, cloning, and so on) or to position the cursor for operations such as editing, inserting files, or sending headlines to other files.

Use the Selection bar to select entire headlines for text editing, for the selective application of formats (styling), or to select multiple headlines for formatting or for other operations such as marking, copying, exporting, sorting, or printing.

Additionally, you can use the Selection bar to select multiple headlines; as either continuous blocks or noncontiguous selections (where selected headlines are separated by unselected headlines). You can also use the Selection bar to select headlines on specific levels of an outline.



**To select a headline for reorganizing**

- Move the pointer anywhere to the left, right, or inside of a headline in the Outline area and click.

The barcursor identifies the selected headline.

After selecting the headline, you can perform a reorganization task.

**To select text in a headline for formatting or editing**

Use any of the following techniques for selecting headline text for formatting or editing.

- Drag the I-beam cursor over the headline text that you want to edit.
- Click the Selection bar directly across from the headline you want to select. The barcursor appears on the headline and MORE selects the headline text.
- Double-click on a word in the headline to select it.
- Triple-click on a sentence in a headline to select the entire sentence.
- With the text insertion cursor inside a headline, choose Select All from the Edit menu to select all text within the selected headline. The text will be highlighted with the selection color you have specified for your system.

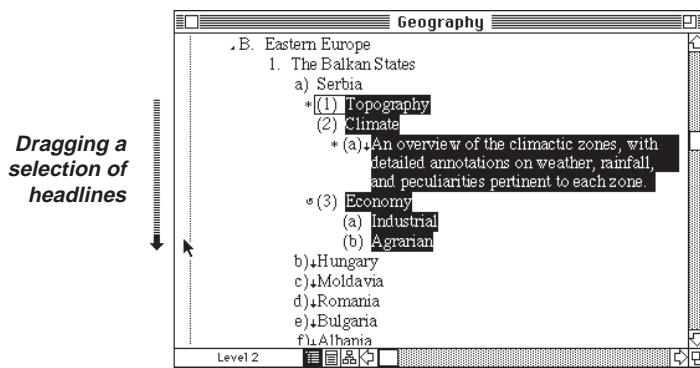
**NOTE:** *You can also select and edit headline text in Bullet Chart view. For more information, see "Editing Text," in Chapter 3.*

## Selecting Multiple Headlines

You can use the Selection bar to select multiple headlines. This feature lets you apply format changes to many headlines simultaneously.

### To select a block of headlines

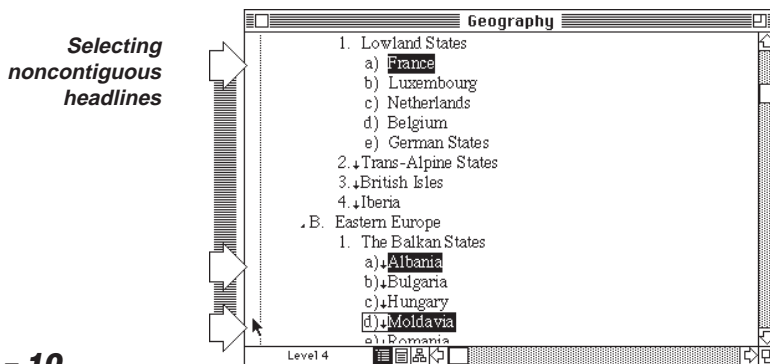
- Drag up or down the Selection bar across from the headlines you want to select.



**CAUTION** Make sure that your cursor is over the Selection bar when you drag a selection of headlines, otherwise you may inadvertently move a headline.

### To select noncontiguous headlines

- Shift-click in the Selection bar across from each headline you want to select. MORE selects each headline without deselecting previously selected headlines. The last headline selected becomes the current headline.



The Shift-click technique also works as a toggle, deselecting previously selected headlines. Dragging up or down the Selection bar while holding down the Shift key also selects or deselects each headline across from the pointer. (The barcursor remains on the first headline you clicked when you started to drag.)

**To select all headlines in an outline**

- Triple-click in the Selection bar next to the Home headline.

MORE selects all headlines displayed in the outline. If you have hoisted a headline to view it separately from the rest of the outline, MORE selects all headlines in the hoisted suboutline. (For more information about hoisting headlines, see “Hoisting Headlines,” later in this chapter.)

**Selecting Levels of Headlines**

You can use the Selection bar to select headlines at specific outline levels. MORE allows you to select

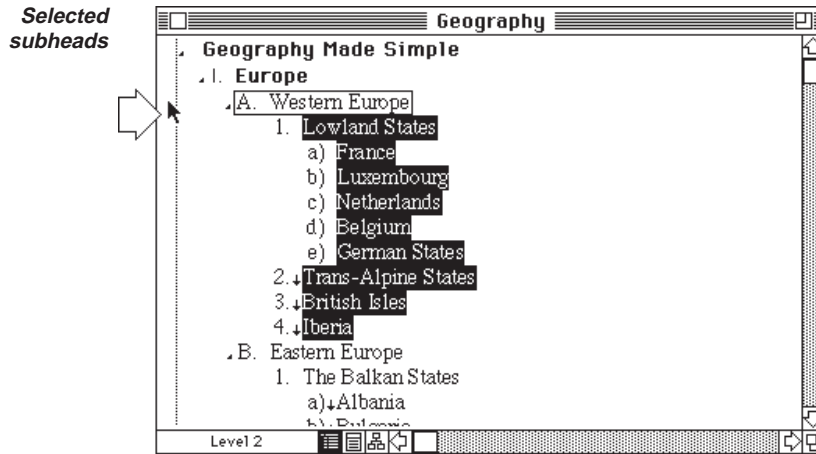
- all the headlines subordinate to a headline
- all subheadlines on a level
- all outline headlines on a specific level

**To select all subheads beneath a headline**

- Double-click in the Selection bar opposite the headline. (At least one level of headlines must be expanded below the parent headline.)

MORE selects all subheadlines of the current headline while deselecting the current headline.

This technique leaves the text of the parent headline unselected. To also select the text of the parent headline, triple-click the headline or Shift-click the parent headline after you select the subheads.



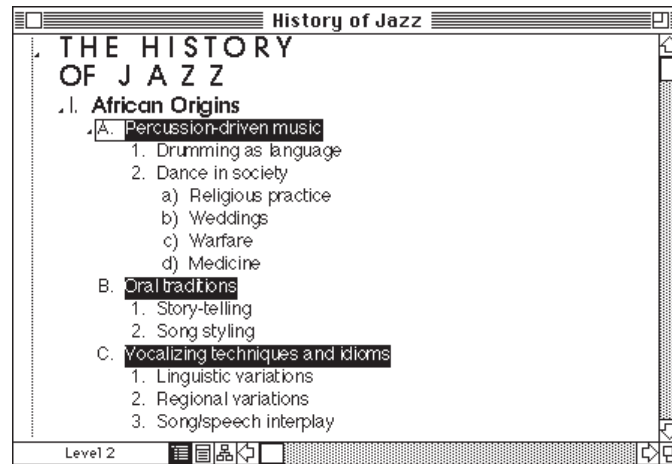
**To select all same-level headlines that share the same parent**

- Hold down the Option key and click in the Selection bar across from a headline.

MORE selects the headline and all of its siblings—headlines on the same level that share the same parent headline. Any headlines on subordinate levels remain unselected.

After you select a level of headlines, you can Shift-click to deselect headlines within the selection, or select additional headlines outside the selection.

**Selected sibling headlines**



**To select all outline headlines on a specific level**

- Hold down the Option key and double-click in the Selection bar across from a headline that's on the level of headlines you want to select.

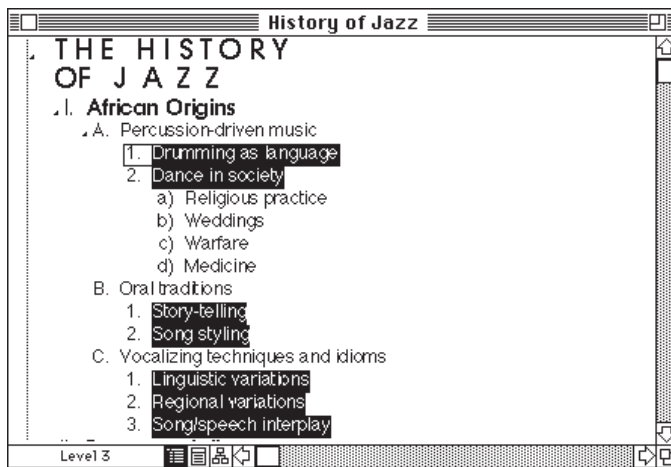
MORE selects all headlines in the (hoisted) outline on the same level as the headline you selected.

or

1. Hold down the Option key and choose Select from the Edit menu.

MORE displays the Select Levels dialog box where you can specify a range of levels to select in the (hoisted) outline. The dialog box provides options for selecting the specified headlines from the entire outline or in a selected area of the outline.

2. Specify the level (or levels) you want to select and click OK.



**Selected headlines on the same level throughout the outline**

**Selecting Multiple Headlines in the Outline Area**

By using the Command key (W) with the selection techniques provided in the Selection bar, you can perform the same kinds of selections by clicking directly in the outline area. For example, to select all the sibling headlines on a headline level, hold down the W key and the Option key while clicking a headline at that level in the outline area.

**NOTE:** *There is one exception to the use of Selection bar clicking techniques in the Outline area. Any variation on a w-click in the Label area of a headline marks that headline (or unmarks it if it was previously marked.)*

## Moving Headlines

In MORE, you can move headlines in one of four ways:

- Drag the headline. This method is best for moving information to different locations that are in close proximity in the outline.
- Use the Move Right, Move Left, Move Up, and Move Down commands in the Reorg menu (and their keyboard equivalents). This method is best for very short moves, within levels of the same suboutline.
- Use the Cut and Paste commands in the Edit menu. This method is useful for moving headlines across long outlines, and between one outline and another.
- Use the Gather command to move marked headlines within the outline. (See “Marking and Gathering Headlines,” later in this chapter.)

Remember, when you move a headline, you are also moving any subheads below the headline, regardless of whether they are displayed.

MORE doesn't permit you to move a headline right more than one level deeper than its parent. If you want to move to the right all headlines below and at the same level as the currently selected headline, you must use the Demote command. For more information on demoting headlines, see “Promoting and Demoting Headlines” later in this chapter.

**NOTE:** *When you paste a headline into an outline, the headline always adopts the level of the currently selected headline, unless the selected headline's subheads are expanded. In which case it is pasted as the first subhead.*

### To drag a headline

1. Position your pointer directly over the label, or to the left or right of the headline you want to move.
2. Press the mouse button and begin dragging in the direction that you want to move the headline.



The pointer becomes a large direction arrow and the barcursor grows to encompass all expanded headlines and comment windows.

3. Continue to drag the direction arrow (the outline scrolls if you drag across the top or bottom of the outline window) until you reach the desired location, then release the mouse button.

MORE moves the headline (and all of its subheads and comments) to the new location in the outline.

You can move a headline to a specific level by releasing the mouse over the approximate indent point of the level. The outline will expand automatically. You may have to move the headline again to put it in the proper location in the newly expanded outline.

You can cancel a headline move by returning the pointer to the original location of the headline and releasing the mouse button or by dragging the direction arrow off the outline area and releasing the mouse button.

**To move a headline up or down**

- Select the headline you want to move and choose Move Up or Move Down from the Reorg menu.
- or
- Position your pointer directly over the headline label, or to the left or right of the headline you want to move and drag up or down, releasing the mouse button when the direction arrow is over the location where you want the headline to appear.

**To move a headline to the right (one level down)**

- Select the headline you want to move to the right and choose Move Right from the Reorg menu.
- or
- Select the headline and press Tab (unless you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box, in which case Tab inserts a tab stop at the insertion point).
- or
- Position your pointer directly over the headline label, or to the left or right of the headline you want to move and drag towards the right, releasing the mouse button when the direction arrow is over the level where you want the headline to appear.

If you move a headline to the right of a headline that has collapsed headlines, MORE automatically expands those subheads to show the new position of the moved headline.



*Hold down the Option key while dragging a headline to the right if you want suppress the automatic expansion of the subheads.*

**To move a headline to the left (one level up)**

- Select the headline you want to move to the right and choose Move Left from the Reorg menu.
- or
- Select the headline and press Shift-Tab.
- or
- Position your pointer directly over the headline label, or to the left or right of the headline you want to move and drag towards the left, releasing the mouse button when the direction arrow is over the level where you want the headline to appear.

.....

**Adding Headlines**

It is easy to add headlines to a MORE outline. To insert a new headline beneath an existing headline, select that headline and press Return (W-Return if you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box). MORE creates a new, empty headline below the currently selected headline.

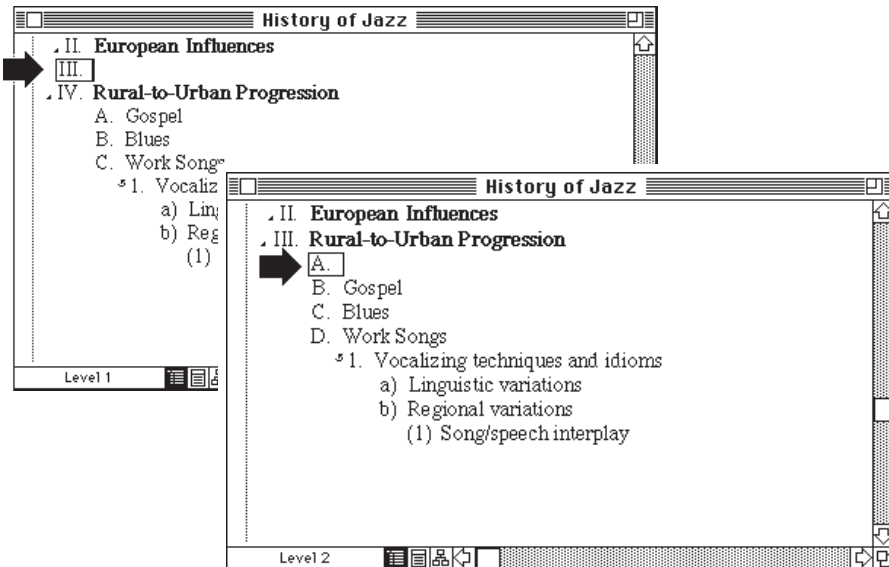
If the selected headline has no expanded subheadlines, MORE creates the new headline at the same level as the selected headline.

If the selected headline has expanded subheadlines or is the Home headline, then MORE creates a new, indented headline below the selected headline.

**Variations on adding headlines**

Headline appears at the same level (Left)

Headline appears at the level below (Right)





## Deleting Headlines

You can select any headline other than the Home headline and delete it from the outline. Remember, deleting a headline also deletes its subheadlines.

### To delete a headline

- Select the headline, then choose Cut or Clear from the File menu.  
If you cut the headline, it is available on the Clipboard for pasting into a new location. If you cleared the headline, it can be retrieved only by choosing Undo from the Edit menu immediately after the deletion.

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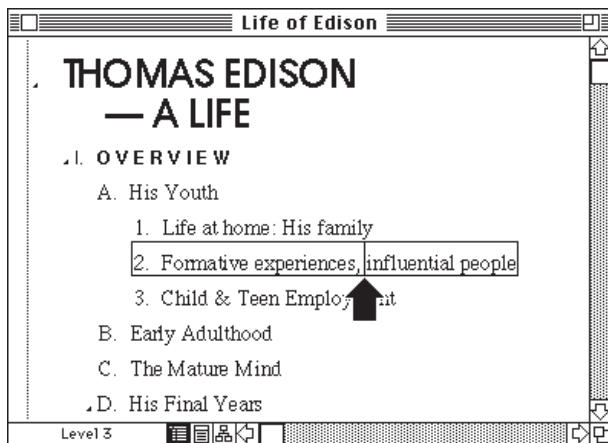
## Splitting Headlines

You can split any headline into two separate headlines.

### To split a headline

1. Click the location in the headline text where you want to break the headline.
2. When the insertion point is positioned where you want to split the headline, press **W-Return** (unless you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box, in which case Return performs the split).

MORE breaks the headline into two separate headlines and moves the new headline immediately below the original headline.

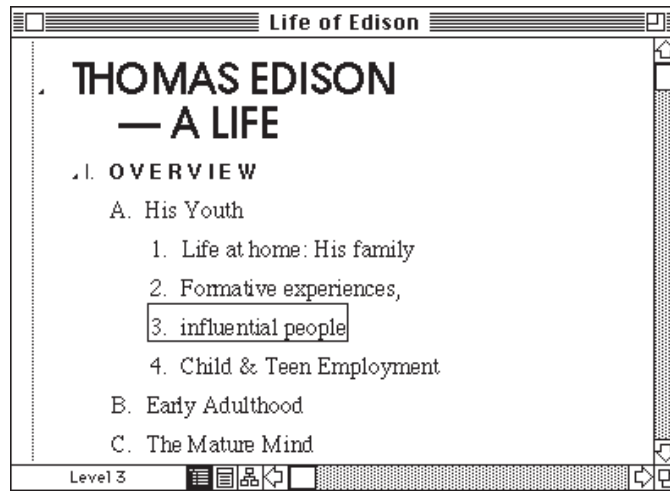


*Before splitting the headline*

If the split headline has no expanded subheads, MORE creates the new headline at the same level as the original headline. If the selected headline has expanded subheads, MORE creates a new, indented headline below the selected headline.

after the split*



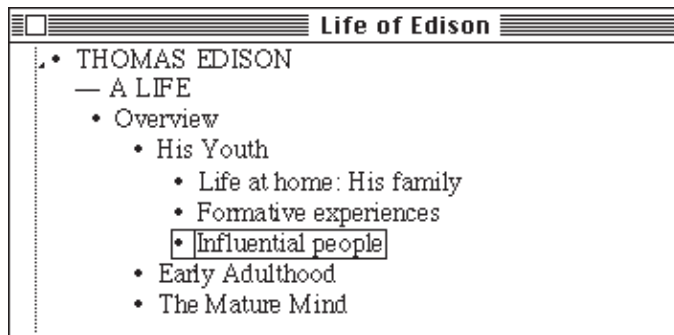
## Joining Headlines

MORE allows you to join adjacent headlines to create a single headline. You can join a headline to a headline above it if the top headline is on the same level or a higher level. MORE does not permit you to join two headlines if the upper headline is on a lower level than the bottom headline or if the bottom headline contains any subheads.

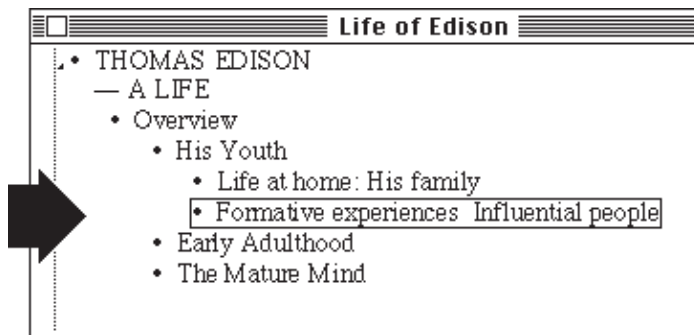
### To join a pair of headlines

- Place the text insertion cursor at the beginning of the lower headline and press **W-Delete** (unless you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box, in which case Delete performs the join).

MORE joins the headline to the headline immediately above it. The joined headline is at the same level as the top headline in the original pair of headlines.

## Expanding and Collapsing Headlines

MORE lets you quickly expand and collapse subheads of a headline. You can expand a single level of headlines beneath a headline or all the headlines beneath a headline or specify a number of levels to expand.

### To expand the first level of subheads below a headline

- Choose Expand Subheads from the Outline menu.  
or  
Press **W-** (period).  
or  
Double-click on the label or to the left or right of a headline.  
or  
Hold down the Option key and double-click the text of the headline.

To expand deeper levels of subheads, you can do any of the following: perform the same operation again on the next level of headlines, choose Expand All Subheads, or choose Expand To and type the level to which you want to see expanded headlines.

When you expand subheads, MORE will not unfold folded headlines. You must choose Unfold Text or Unfold All from the Outline menu to display all the lines of a folded headline.

### To expand all subheads below a headline

- Choose Expand All Subheads from the Outline menu.  
or
- Press **W-E**  
or
- Hold down the Shift key and double-click on the label or to the left or right of a headline.

The Expand All Subheads command expands all the subheads of the selected headline. To expand all the headlines in the outline, select the Home headline and choose Expand All Subheads. The Expand All Subheads command does not expand comment windows or folded headlines—use the Expand All Comments command in the Outline menu to expand all existing comment windows.

**To expand subheads to a specific level**

1. Select a collapsed headline and choose Expand To from the Outline menu.  
MORE displays the Expand To dialog box.



*Expand To dialog box*

2. In the provided field, enter the number of levels that you want to expand. (The default entry is 2.)
3. Click Include Comments to expand any existing comment windows as well.
4. Click OK to expand the headline to the specified level.



*Hold down the Option key to change the Expand To command to a command that expands the headline to the last level specified in the Expand To dialog box. For example, if you previously expanded a headline to level 4, the command appears as Expand to Level 4 when you hold down the Option key and open the Outline menu.*

## Collapsing Subheads

When outline subheads are expanded, you can collapse them beneath a parent headline to compact the outline.

### To collapse subheads below a headline

- Select an expanded headline and choose Collapse Subheads from the Outline menu.

or

Select the headline that you want to Collapse and press **W-** (period).

or

Double-click the label or to the left or right of a headline.

or

Hold down the Option key and double-click the text of the headline.



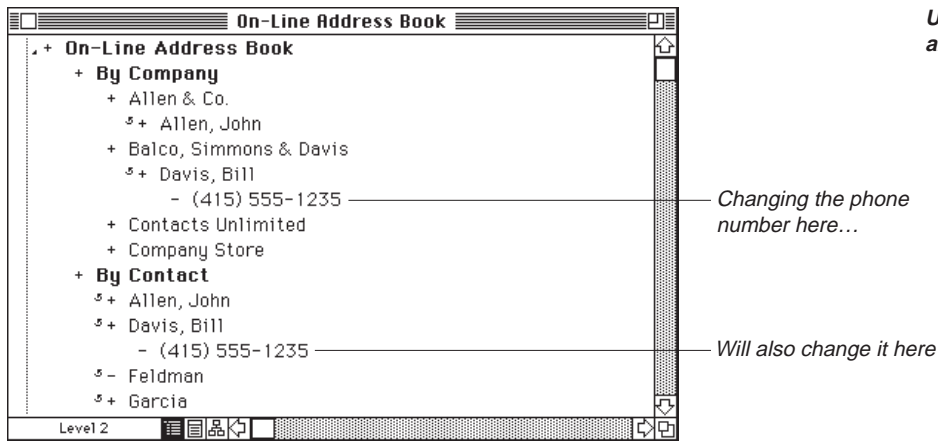
*To also collapse the parent headline of a selected headline, press Option-W- (period), or hold down the Option key and choose Collapse to Parent from the Outline menu.*

---

## Cloning Headlines

MORE lets you create a clone—an exact duplicate of a headline. While you could create copies of headlines with copy and paste techniques, clones display a crucial difference—if you make a change to one member of a set of clones, MORE immediately updates any of its counterpart clones. After a headline is copied the copies can be modified independently, but clones always maintain an exact image of each other.

Clones are especially useful when you are maintaining identical information in different parts of an outline. For example, if you keep the cost of an item in two separate places in the outline, cloning would permit you to update that price wherever it appears by simply making the required change to one member of the clone set.



*Use of clones in an outline*

There are two fundamental restrictions for cloning:

- You cannot move a clone to a position where it would become a subhead of one of its counterpart clones. This action creates a state known to programmers as an infinite loop, which would result in endless repetitions of the operation.
- You cannot clone the Home headline.

**To clone a headline**

- Select the headline and choose Clone from the Reorg menu.

MORE creates a duplicate of the headline immediately below and places a clone symbol next to both headlines.

You can now move the clone to another location in the outline. From now on, the cloned headline will change to conform to the original headline. For example, if you add a new subhead to a cloned headline, MORE adds the same subhead to any cloned headlines.

**Deleting Clones**

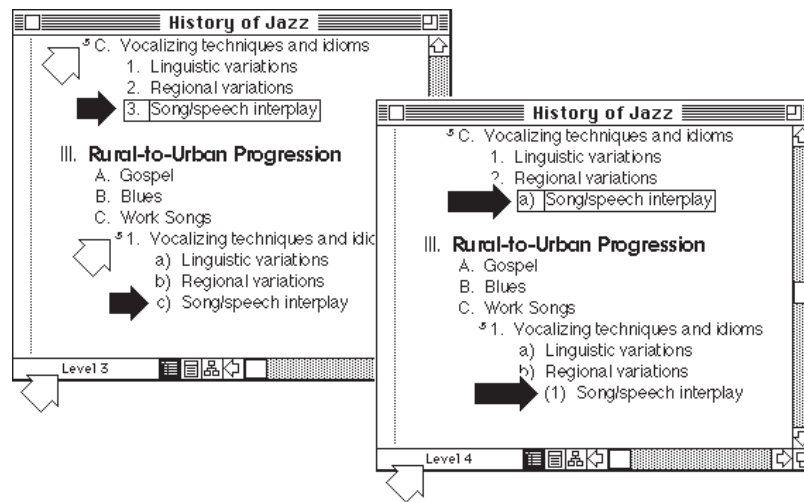
You can delete any cloned headline from an outline; its deletion does not affect any of the other clones. If you delete all but one clone, the remaining clone will no longer display the clone structure symbol.

If you use the Cut command to remove a clone from the outline, then choose Paste to reinsert the clone into the outline, the pasted headline will no longer be a clone, but a simple copy.

## Subheads of Cloned Headlines

While you can move or reorganize cloned headlines without affecting any of their counterpart clones, the subheads of cloned headlines cannot be moved (or reorganized) independently of their counterparts under a cloned headline—otherwise the headlines would no longer be exact duplicates. If you reorganize a subhead of a cloned headline, the same operation will be performed on the identical subhead beneath the headline's clones. The following illustration shows the relationship between subheads of cloned headlines.

## Finding Cloned Headlines

MORE provides a Go To Clone command that lets you quickly locate clones in a large outline.

### To locate a clone

1. Select a cloned headline.
2. Hold down the Option key and choose Go To Clone from the Reorg menu.

MORE selects the next occurrence of the clone in the outline. If the clone is hidden with a collapsed headline, MORE expands the suboutline to display the clone.

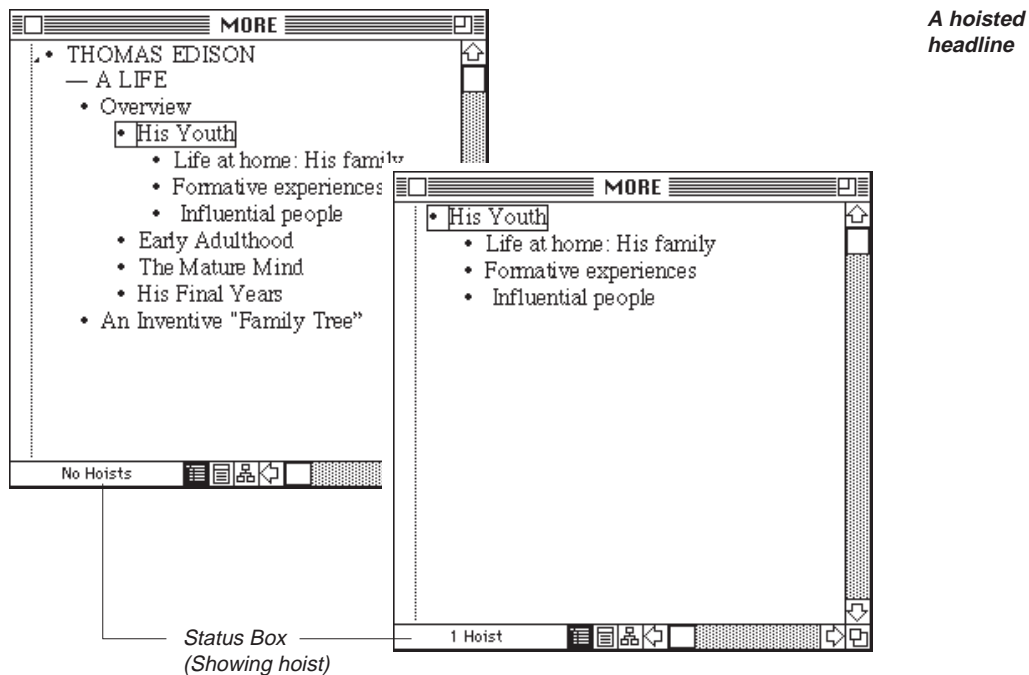


*Clicking on the clone structure symbol (☐) will take you to its clone.*



## Hoisting Headlines

Sometimes it is useful to isolate an outline section from the rest of the outline so that you can focus on the material it contains and perform specific operations. While you could copy the level to a new outline, MORE provides a feature that lets you hoist a level out of an outline, temporarily blocking the rest of the outline from view.



A hoisted headline acts like an outline within an outline. When you hoist a headline, it temporarily takes on some characteristics of the Home headline. The hoisted headline is subject to the same constraints as the Home headline. After hoisting, almost all commands (except Save and Save As) affect only the hoisted headline. For example, a spelling check will be limited to the range of the hoisted headlines.

**NOTE:** When you hoist a headline, it appears at the left margin—regardless of its indented position in the rest of the outline. Hoisting doesn't affect the formatting or labeling of the hoisted headline. However, your line and page breaks may be different when printing since the wrap width changes.

After you've hoisted a suboutline, you can make additional hoists of subheads in the displayed outline. You can hoist suboutlines as many as 10 times. The status box in the lower-left corner of the outline window displays the current number of hoists. Because De-Hoist reverses only one level of hoist at a time, hold down the Option key and choose De-Hoist All from the Outline menu to reverse all previous hoists and redisplay the complete outline.

**To hoist a headline**

1. Select the headline to be hoisted.
2. Choose Hoist from the Outline menu.

**To de-hoist a headline**

1. Select any headline in the hoisted outline.
2. Choose De-Hoist from the Outline menu.

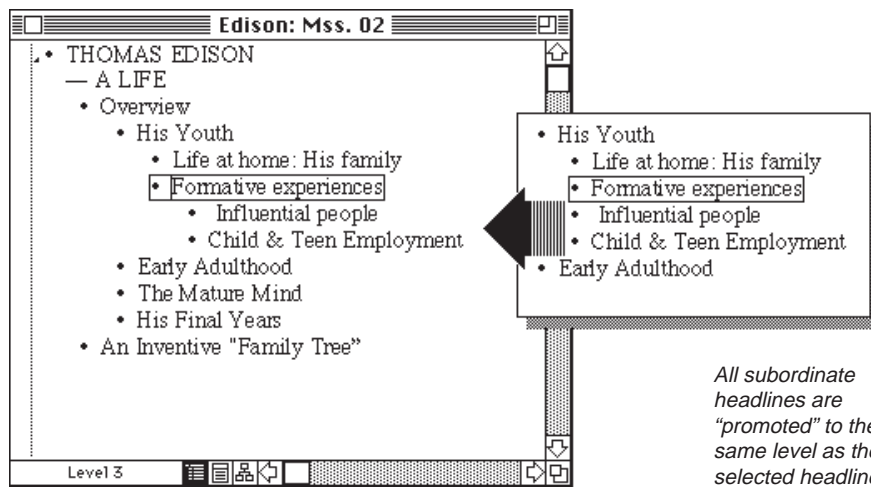
MORE reverses the last hoist.

Hold down the Option key and choose De-Hoist All from the Outline menu to reverse all previous hoists.

.....  
**Promoting and Demoting Headlines**

MORE provides commands in the Reorg menu to change the levels of headlines in the outline. Use the Promote command to move all the subheads of a selected headline to the same level as the selected headline. Use the Demote command to move all headlines beneath (and at the same level of) a selected headline one level lower, so that they become subordinate to the selected headline.

Promoting headlines is useful when you want to delete a headline while retaining its subordinate headlines—you promote the subheads, then delete the former parent headline. Demoting is useful for moving multiple headlines down one level in the outline hierarchy.



*Promoted headlines—  
Before and after*

*All subordinate headlines are "promoted" to the same level as the selected headline*

### **To promote a headline's subheads**

1. Select the headline that contains the subheads you want to promote.
2. Choose Promote from the Reorg menu.

MORE moves the subheads to the same level as the selected headline. (Any subheads contained within the promoted headlines also move one level to the left.)

### **To demote a headline's subheads**

1. Select the headline above, but at the same level as, the headlines you want to demote.
2. Choose Demote from the Reorg menu.

MORE moves the headlines one level to the right of the selected headline. (Any subheads of the demoted headlines also move one level to the right.)

## Folding Headlines

When outline headlines contain more than one line of text, you can use the Fold commands in the Outline menu to limit the display of the headline to the first line of text. This feature is useful if you are using MORE to create a document of text and want to collapse the text to view the overall structure of the document.

### To fold a headline

- Select a headline and choose Fold Text from the Outline menu.  
or
- Press **W-**, (comma).  
or
- Hold down the Option key while double-clicking the label or to the left or right of the headline.

MORE folds the text to one line, clipping the remainder of the headline text and displaying the (↓) structure symbol at the end of the clipped line.

### To fold all subheads below a headline

- Select a headline and choose Fold All from the Outline menu.  
or
- Hold down the Shift and Option keys while double-clicking on the label or to the left or right of the headline.

MORE folds all headline text at the selected headline level and below, clipping the headline text and displaying the (↓) structure symbol at the end of each clipped line.

### To unfold headlines

- Select a folded headline and choose Unfold Text from the Outline menu.  
or
- Press **W-**, (comma).  
or
- Hold down the option key while double-clicking the label or to the left or right of the headline.

MORE unfolds the headline text and restores the headline text to its original length.

Choose Unfold All from the Outline menu to unfold all the folded headlines in and beneath the selected headline.

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## **Marking and Gathering Headlines**

MORE permits you to mark specific headlines for gathering, where the marked headlines are moved, copied, or cloned in a single operation.

Because the Home headline cannot be gathered, it also cannot be marked. Additionally, you can't mark a subhead at the same time that you mark its parent headline—you must either mark it individually or with headlines other than its parent headline.

### **To mark headlines**

1. Select the headline or headlines that you want to mark.
2. Choose Mark Headline from the Reorg menu.
  - or
  - **W**-click on the headline label.
  - or
  - Press **W-M**.

MORE marks the selected headlines by highlighting their labels. If the headlines have the No Label style, MORE marks them with a vertical highlight where the label would be. If you are using a color monitor, the text of marked headlines also appears in the mark color specified in Document Options.

**NOTE:** *If you are selecting multiple headlines for gathering, MORE won't permit you to mark headlines that are subordinate to other selected headlines. Because any subheads are gathered with their parent headlines, the action is unnecessary.*

**To mark the first level subheads beneath a headline**

- Select a headline and choose Mark Subheads from the Reorg menu.  
or
- W-click on the label of each subheadline.  
or
- Select the subheads you want to mark and choose Mark Headline from the Reorg menu (or press W-M.)

MORE marks the selected headline or headlines by highlighting their labels. If the headlines have the No Label style, MORE marks them with a vertical highlight where the label would be.

**To unmark headlines**

1. Select any marked headlines that you want to unmark.
2. Choose Unmark Headline from the Reorg menu.  
or
- W-click on the label of each subheadline.  
or
- Select any marked headlines that you want to unmark and press W-M.

MORE removes the mark from the selected headline.

**To unmark all subheads under a headline**

- Select the headline that contains the marked subheads and choose Unmark All from the Reorg menu.

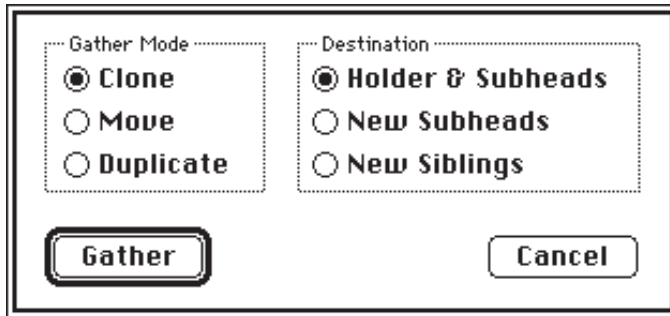
MORE removes the marks from all headlines subordinate to the selected headline.

If you close an outline and later reopen it, MORE retains the marks that were present when you closed the outline.

When you are using the Search window to find or change text, you can instruct MORE to automatically mark headlines that match the search pattern and/or headlines where MORE changed the text. When using the spelling check, you can choose to have MORE automatically mark headlines and comments where text has been changed.

## Gathering Headlines

After you have marked headlines in an outline, you can use the Gather command to move, copy, or clone the marked headlines in a single operation. When you choose Gather from the Reorg menu, MORE displays the Gather dialog box where you can specify options for restructuring and placing the marked headlines.



*The Gather dialog box*

**NOTE:** Any marked headline to which the selected headline is subordinate cannot be gathered.

The Gather Mode area lists the type of gathering options that are available.

*Clone* Specifies that clones of the gathered headlines will be inserted in the selected area of the outline.

*Move* Specifies that the gathered headlines will be moved to the selected area of the outline (and removed from their original locations).

*Duplicate* Specifies that the gathered headlines will be copied to the selected area of the outline. Using Gather to make copies of headlines does not affect the Clipboard.

The Destination area specifies where headlines can be cloned, moved, or duplicated.

**Holder & Subheads** Gathers marked headlines under a new headline, called gathered headlines—which appears just below the current headline selection, either at the same level or indented one level.

---

**New Subheads** Gathers marked headlines one level below the selected headline.

---

**New Siblings** Gathers marked headlines below, but at the same level as the selected headline.

---

### **To gather and then clone, move, or duplicate headlines**

1. Mark all headlines that you want to gather.
2. Select a headline where you want to position the gathered headlines.
3. Choose Gather from the Reorg menu to display the Gather dialog box.
4. Click the Clone, Duplicate, or Move button to specify the restructuring operation.
5. Click one of the destination buttons to specify where MORE will place the gathered headlines.
6. Click Gather to complete the operation, or click Cancel to stop the gathering operation and return to your outline.

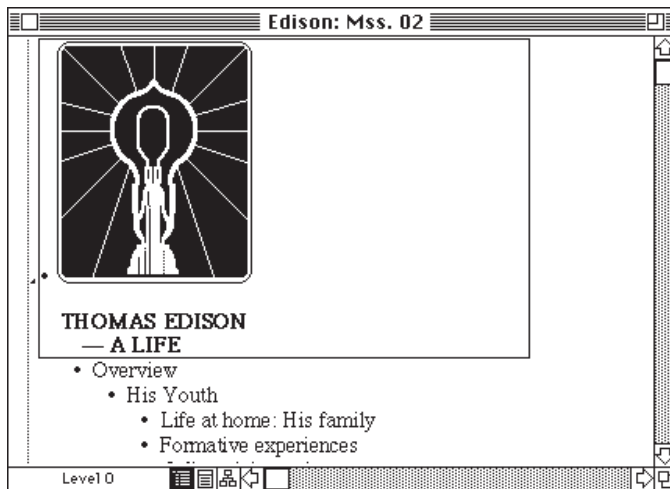


*To bypass the Gather dialog box and gather the marked headlines using the currently defined settings, hold down the Option key and choose Gather Again from the Reorg menu.*



## **INCLUDING GRAPHICS**

You can include a graphic in a headline (or in a window that contains a header/footer, comment, or speaker's note) by pasting a picture from the Clipboard or from the Graphics Library into the outline.



*A picture placed in a headline*

When you paste a graphic into an outline, MORE automatically adjusts the height of the text line to accommodate the height of the picture. After you place a graphic in a headline, MORE treats the graphic as a character of text; as you type, the picture will move with the text.

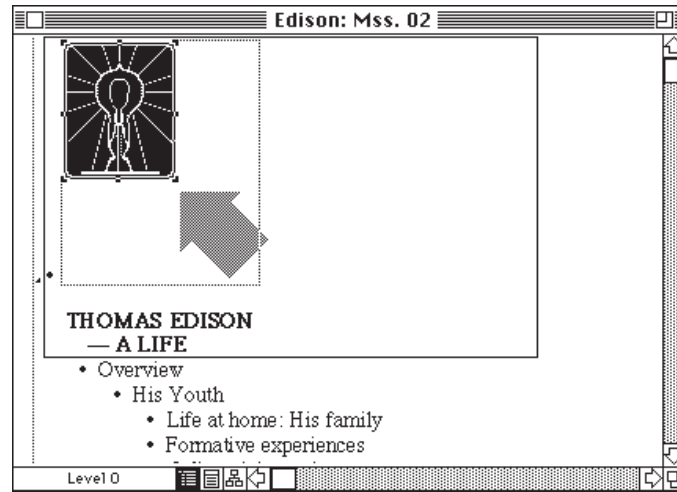
After insertion, you can resize any graphic.

### **To resize a graphic**

1. Select the graphic by double-clicking it to display its handles.
2. Drag a handle in the desired direction.  
To resize the graphic proportionally, hold down the Shift key while dragging.

After resizing, you can return a graphic to its original size by double-clicking it.

*Resizing a picture after placement in a headline*



If you're displaying your outline on a color monitor, MORE displays a color graphic in its original colors. You cannot, however, modify the color of the graphic after it is inserted into the headline.

**NOTE:** *If necessary, MORE automatically scales graphics in the outline to fit within the margins. To accommodate a large picture, you may need to adjust the margins or the indentation of headlines.*

---

## EDITING HEADLINE TEXT

Editing text in MORE outlines is similar to editing text in other Macintosh applications. You click to position the insertion point in the text, drag over a text block to select it, then make your changes. For keyboard shortcuts to selecting and editing text, see the *MORE 3.0 Quick Reference*.

The insertion point is a flashing vertical bar where the next typed character will appear. As you type new text anywhere in MORE, text to the right of the cursor moves forward. Position the insertion point by clicking a location in the text or by pressing the arrow keys on the keyboard.

The method you use to edit text differs slightly for headlines and comment windows.

**To edit text in headlines**

- Press Return in a headline to create a new blank headline beneath the current headline (unless you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box, in which case Return splits the headline at the position of the text insertion cursor).
- Press Tab in a headline to indent the selected headline one level (unless you specified the insertion of carriage returns and tabs in the Program Options dialog box, in which case Tab moves the insertion point to the next tab stop).
- Press Option-Tab in a headline to insert a tab and move the insertion point to the next tab stop.

**To edit text in comment windows**

- Press Return in a comment window to insert a hard line break at the insertion point. The insertion point moves to the next line.
- Press Tab in a comment window to insert a tab and move the insertion point to the next tab stop.

The *MORE 3.0 Quick Reference* lists all the ways you can move the insertion point and select text in headlines and comment windows. Use the Format menu commands to selectively style and format a word or phrase or to create formatting rules based on the structure of your outline.

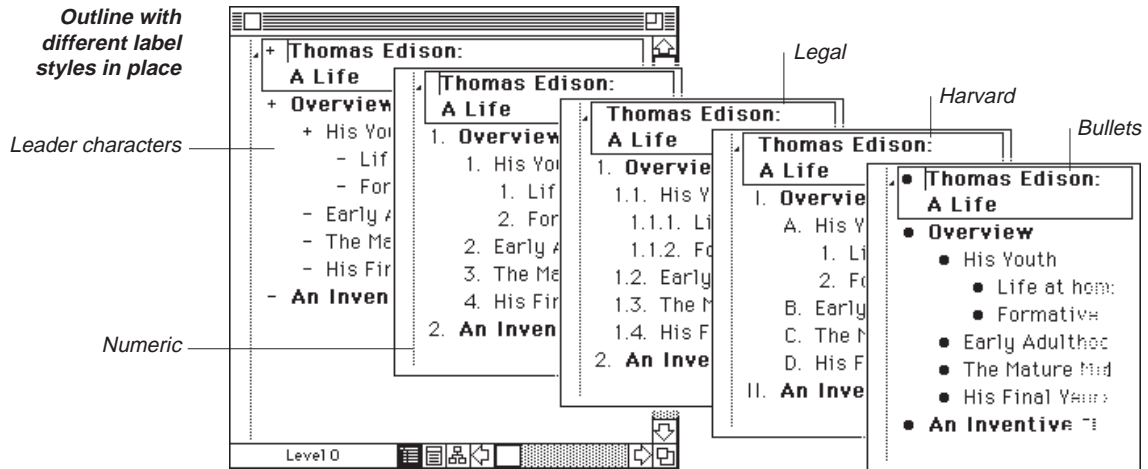

**SELECTING LABEL STYLES**

Headlines are usually labeled with numbers, letters, or other symbols to indicate their position in the outline hierarchy. You are probably familiar with the Harvard style of outline labeling that mixes Roman numerals, letters, and Arabic numerals. With MORE, you simply select a labeling style and MORE applies the labels automatically as you add headlines to the outline.

MORE provides five preset label styles for your outline as well as a Custom Labels feature that lets you create your own label style. MORE also permits you to use multiple label styles in your outline. For example, you may prefer Harvard-style labels for level 1 headlines, and Bullet labels for headlines beneath level 1.

The following illustration shows an outline with different label styles.



MORE's preset label styles are:

*No Labels* MORE does not use any labels.

*Leader Characters* MORE uses plus (+) and minus (-) characters to indicate the outline structure.

*Harvard* MORE uses standard mixture of Roman numerals, letters, and arabic numerals

*Numeric* MORE assigns an Arabic numeral to each headline.

*Legal* A number shows the relative level and placement of each headline in the outline hierarchy.

*Bullets* A bullet (•) appears in front of each headline.

## Leader Character Symbols

By default, MORE starts new outlines with the leader character style of labels, which conveys the most information about outline structure. (For more information, see the section “Structure Symbols,” earlier in this chapter.) The following table describes the meaning of each leader character.

<b>Symbol</b>	<b>Meaning</b>
–	<i>The headline contains no subheadlines.</i>
+	<i>The headline has one or more subheadlines.</i>

---

### To label headlines

1. Select the headline or headlines you want to label. (To select all of a headline’s subheads, double-click in the Selection bar.)
2. Choose a label style from the Labeling submenu in the Format menu.

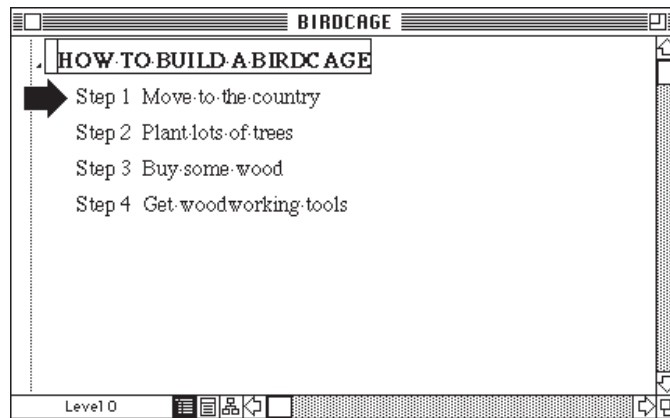
**NOTE:** *You can also specify label styles through the Rules window. With rules you can specify mixed label styles for different headline levels without having to select headlines in the outline. For more information on see “Using Rules,” in Chapter 5.*

## Creating Custom Labels

MORE lets you customize the existing label styles and even define your own unique labels. For custom labels you can specify up to 16 characters in any font, size, style, and text color for displays as labels. For example, if you update information frequently, you could create the label NEW and apply it to all updated headlines, or you could specify a Zapf Dingbats font character to create check boxes or check marks for a to-do list.

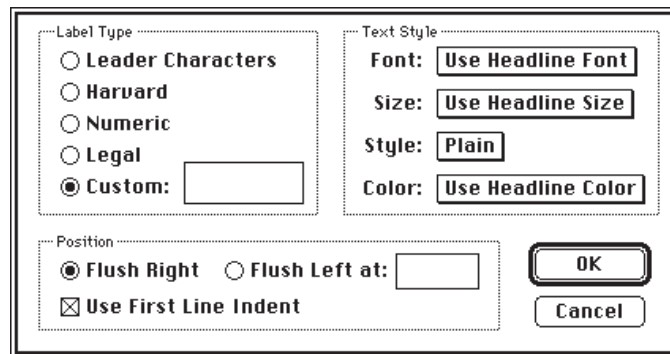
**A custom "smart" label in an outline—**

When you choose Custom Labels, MORE displays the Custom Labels dialog box:

**Custom Labels dialog box**



<i>Label Type radio buttons</i>	Offer label styles for Leader Characters, Harvard, Numeric, Legal, or Custom, respectively. Choose one of the built-in label styles, such as Harvard, if you want to customize that label style by modifying the existing font, color, size, or style.
<i>Font</i>	Displays a pop-up menu of available fonts. Unless you choose a different font, MORE uses the same font that appears in the headline.
<i>Size</i>	Displays a pop-up menu of available font sizes. Unless you choose a different font size, MORE uses the same font size that appears in the headline.
<i>Style</i>	Displays a pop-up menu of available font styles. Unless you choose a different font style, MORE uses the Plain style. As with other text, you can apply multiple styles such as choosing both Bold and Italic. If you make a mistake, choose the Plain style again and start over. Plain removes all previously selected styles.
<i>Color</i>	Displays a pop-up menu of available colors. Unless you choose a different color, MORE uses the same color that appears in the headline. Choosing Custom Color from the pop-up menu displays the Color dialog box, where you can specify colors other than those displayed in the pop-up menu. For more information on custom colors, see “Customizing Colors, Patterns, and Gradients,” in Chapter 5.
<i>Flush Right</i>	Aligns labels along their right edge.
<i>Flush Left at</i>	Aligns labels along their left edge at a distance from the headline specified in the provided text box.
<i>Use First Line Indent</i>	Indents the labels with the first line of the headline.

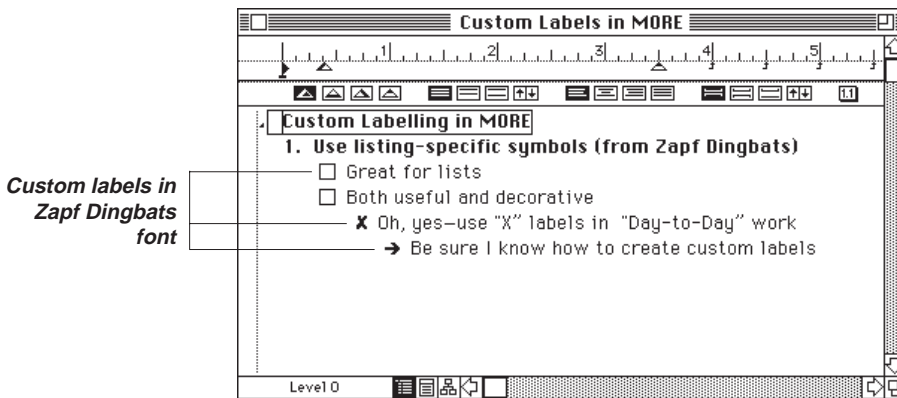
---

The Custom Label dialog box also provides an entry field next to the Custom label type button that you can use to specify the actual text of a custom label. By selecting special fonts such as Symbol or Zapf Dingbats, you can use this field to specify symbols such as check marks for as your label. You can also use this area to enter “smart characters” which will allow you create labels such as Step 1, Step 2, and so on.

**To create custom labels**

1. Select one or more headlines and choose Custom Label from the Labeling submenu in the Format menu.
2. When the Custom Label dialog box appears, enter custom characters or text (if desired) in the provided entry field, then choose the desired font, size, style, or color from the pop-up menus.
3. Select any desired indentation options, and click OK.

If you create a label in a font size larger than the headlines, MORE adjusts the height of the headline to match the label. The following illustration shows custom labels applied to headlines.



By specifying custom labels through the Rules window, you can create several custom labels and apply them to different outline levels. When you choose Custom Labels from the pop-up menu in the Rules window, MORE displays the standard Custom Labels dialog box. Later you can install the custom labels as a rule set in the Library so that the labels will be available for use in other outlines. For more information on copying rules into the Library see, “Installing Rules,” in Chapter 5.



## Using Smart Characters

When you specify special characters as leaders, MORE identifies some characters as smart characters, which indicate a style of leader text instead of static characters. For example, if you enter A as custom label text, MORE recognizes the letter as the first in an alphabetical sequence of leader characters and applies leaders accordingly to any other selected headlines on the same level. (For example, A, B, ...Z) The following table describes the smart characters available for use in custom labels.

### **Character Sequence**

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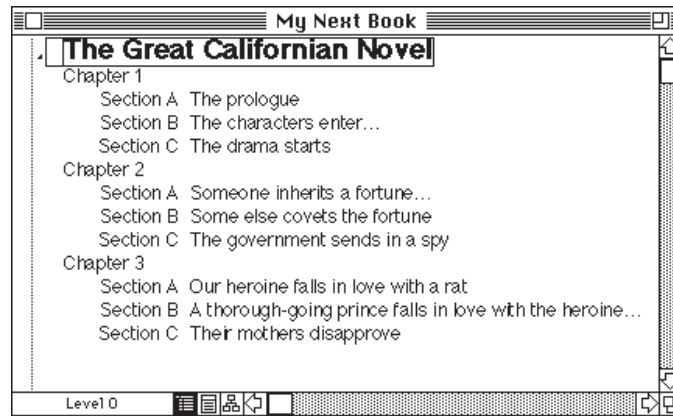
<b>A</b>	<i>Uppercase (A, B, C...Z). When Z is reached, MORE starts over using a double character sequence (AA, AB...ZZ).</i>
<b>a</b>	<i>Lowercase (a, b, c...z). When z is reached, MORE starts over using a double character sequence (aa, ab...zz).</i>
<b>1</b>	<i>Arabic numerals (1, 2, 3...999999999).</i>
<b>I</b>	<i>Uppercase Roman numerals (I, II, III, IV, V).</i>
<b>i</b>	<i>Lowercase Roman numerals (i, ii, iii, iv, v).</i>

---

If you use smart characters to create custom labels, MORE automatically adjusts headline labels to maintain the correct sequence as you add, delete, or move headlines. MORE does not recognize smart characters that are part of other words entered as custom text. For example, MORE does not recognize the I in Item as a smart character.

You can also mix smart characters with other text to create custom labels. The following illustration shows such a customized labeling scheme. For example, if you select all level-1 headlines and specify Chapter 1 as the custom label text, MORE automatically labels each level-1 headline as a chapter and provides the correct chapter number for each headline. You could then select all level-2 headlines and specify Section A as the custom text to create a sequence.

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## USING THE TEXT RULER TO FORMAT TEXT

MORE provides a text ruler for quickly formatting outline text. (Each setting has an equivalent command in the Format menu.) You can change the following settings from the text ruler:

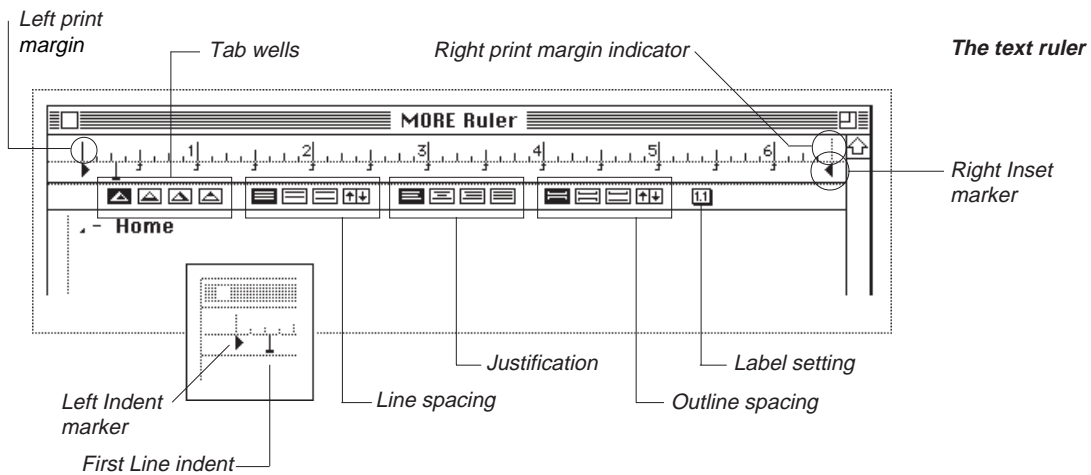
- Left indent and right inset
- Tabs
- Text alignment (justification)
- Text spacing
- Outline spacing
- Headline labeling

Unlike character format commands which affect selected text, MORE's formatting commands (applied from either the text ruler or the Format menu) affect entire text objects, which include

- Headlines
- Comments
- Speaker's notes
- Headers and footers
- Titles, subheads, and comments in bullet charts
- Caption text in bullet charts

The text ruler appears at the top of the Outline window, or the window that contains a text object, and displays the current settings for the selected text object. A separate text ruler appears in each open comment window, Header/Footer window and Speaker's Notes window and shows the current format settings for text in that window. The following illustration shows the major features of the text ruler. For information about changing a specific ruler setting, see the appropriate sections that follow.

**NOTE:** *The Left Indent marker and Right Inset marker are not the same as the left and right print margins. Left indent is measured relative to either the left print margin or a headline's parent headline. The right inset is measured relative to either the right print margin or a headline's parent headline. The left print margin is equal to 0 (zero) on text ruler. The right print margin is indicated by a light gray line on the ruler. Both of these print margins are set in the Print Options window.*



*Left Indent Marker* Indicates where the left edge of text begins. You can set the left indent relative to the left page margin or relative to the parent headline.

---

*Right Inset Marker* Indicates where the right edge of text ends. You can set the right inset relative to the right page margin or relative to the parent headline.

---

*First Line Indent Marker* Determines where the first line of text begins.

---

*Tab Wells* Contain left, center, right, and decimal tabs. Tabs may be positioned anywhere on the ruler between the left and right margin markers.

---

*Line Spacing* Control the spacing in

- headlines
- comment windows
- header or footers
- the Speaker's Notes window
- the caption text in a bullet chart
- the title on a bullet chart
- subheads on a bullet chart
- comments on a bullet chart

---

*Outline Spacing* Control spacing

- between headlines in Outline view
- before and after lines in a header, footer, or comment
- between subheads in Bullet Chart view

---

*Justification* Control how text is aligned between the margins.

---

**To display the text ruler**

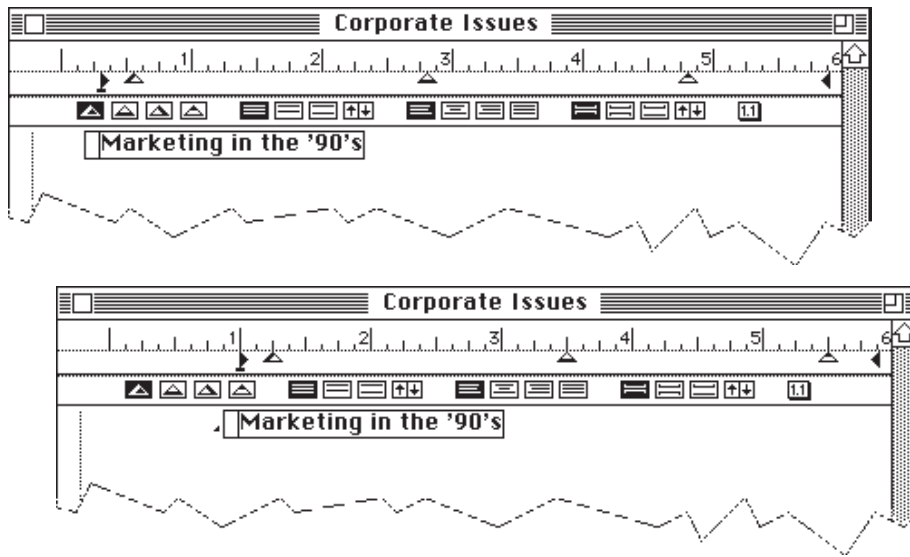
- Choose Show Ruler from the Format menu.

The text ruler appears at the top of the window. The ruler shows the settings for the current text object (headline, comment, header, footer, speaker's note, and so on).

**Setting Left Indents and Right Insets**

You can adjust the left indent and right inset by dragging their markers on the text ruler. When you move the Left Indent marker on the ruler, the first line indent and tab settings also move to maintain their relative distance. (See the following illustration.) In addition, MORE does not permit you to move the Left Indent marker of a headline to the left of the left indent setting of its parent headline unless the indent is specified as relative to the page margin

Moving the right inset marker does not affect the position of the left indent or other settings.



*The effect (shown in two stages) on the Home headline from moving the Left Indent marker*

You can enter a precise location for the left indent or right inset by electing either Left Indent or Right Inset from the Outline Layout submenu of the Format menu.

**To set the left indent with the text ruler**

- Select the text you want to modify and drag the Left Indent marker to a new location on the ruler.

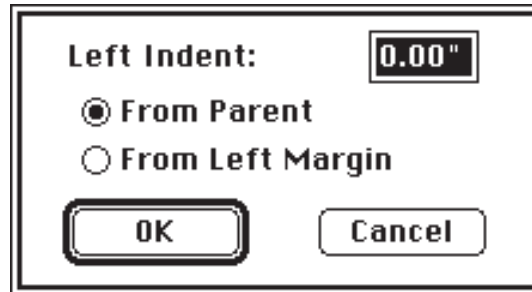
MORE adjusts the headline to the new indent setting. Dragging the Left Indent marker also moves the First Line Indent marker and any tabs so that they maintain their relative positions to the Left Indent marker.

**To specify a precise location for the left indent**

1. Double-click on the Left Indent marker (or choose Left Indent from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu).

The Left Indent dialog box appears.

*Left Indent dialog box*



2. Type a new value (in inches, centimeters, or pixels if you want to override the default unit of measurement).
3. Click the appropriate button to specify that you are setting the left indent relative to the parent headline or to the left page margin.
4. Click OK to apply the setting.

**To set the right inset with the text ruler**

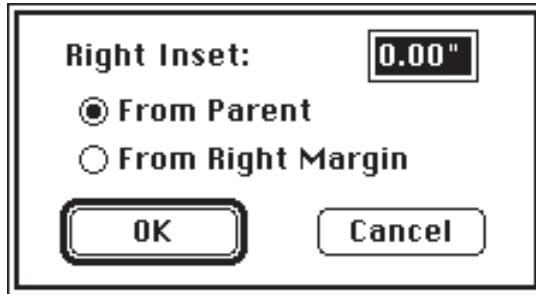
- Drag the Right Inset marker to the setting you want on the ruler.

The outline adjusts to the new setting.

**To specify a precise setting for the right inset**

1. Double-click on the Right Inset marker (or choose Right Inset from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu).

The Right Inset dialog box appears.

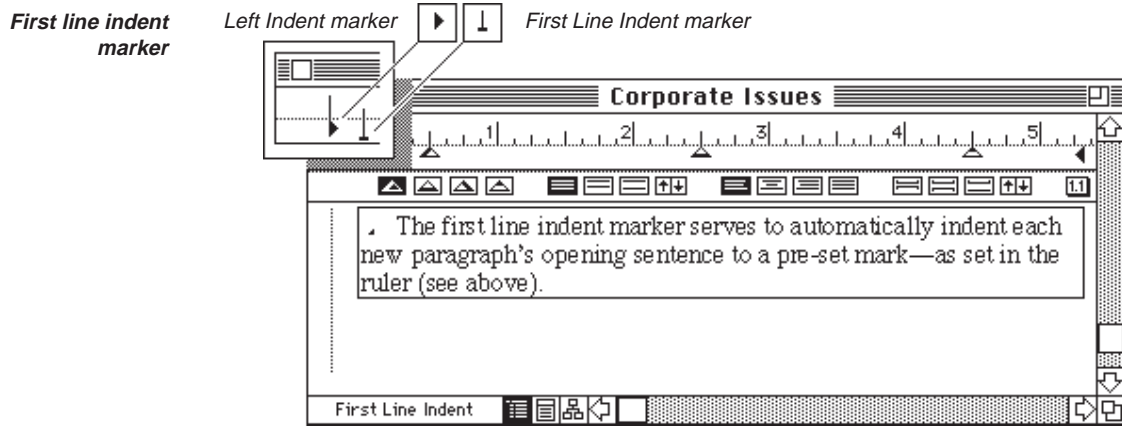


*The Right Inset dialog box*

2. Type a new value (in inches, centimeters, or pixels if you want to override the default unit of measurement).
3. Click the appropriate button to specify that you are setting the right inset relative to either the parent headline or to the right page margin.
4. Click OK to apply the setting.

## Setting First Line Indents

MORE automatically sets the first line indent the same as the left indent. However, you can set the first line indent anywhere in the two inches to the right of the left indent by moving the First Line Indent marker. The first line indent setting is relative to the left indent setting, so if you change the left indent setting, MORE also adjusts the first line indent setting to retain its position relative to the left indent.



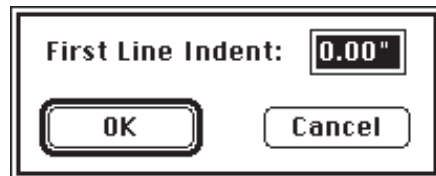
### To set a first line indent with the text ruler

- Drag the First Line Indent marker to the setting you want on the ruler.

### To specify a precise setting for the first line indent

1. Double-click on the First Line Indent marker (or choose First Line Indent from the Text Format submenu in the Format menu).
2. When the First Line Indent dialog box appears, enter a new value (in inches, centimeters, or pixels to override the default unit of measurement) and click OK.

*First Line Indent dialog box*

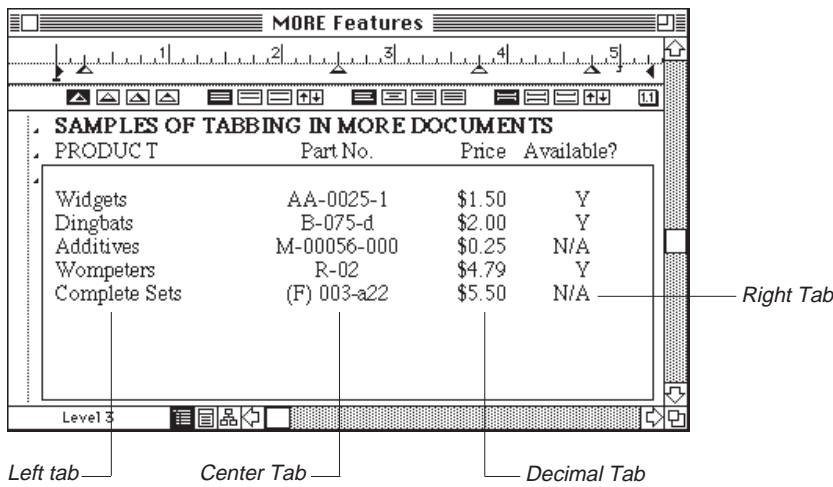




## Setting Tabs

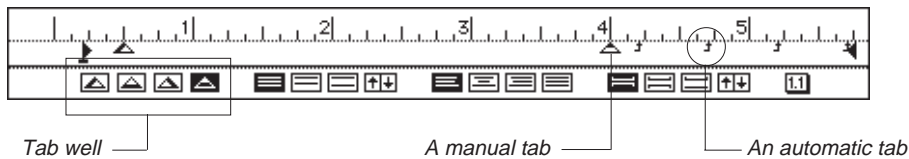
You can use the text ruler to set the four types of tabs:

- left
- center
- right
- decimal



*The four tab types used in a MORE outline*

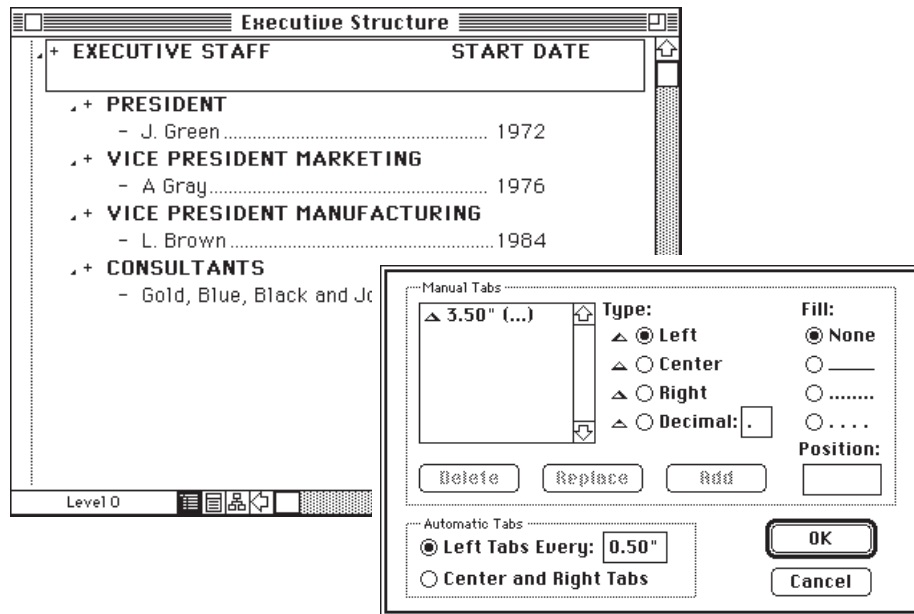
In the text ruler, each type of tab is stored in a separate tab well. You set a manual tab by dragging it from the tab well to the desired location on the ruler. When you set a manual tab, MORE removes any automatic tab settings between the left margin and the new manual tab.



*A Text Ruler showing both manual and automatic tabs*

To specify a precise tab setting, define an alternate delimiter to replace the period commonly used for decimal entries, or specify a tab fill (also known as a tab leader), you must first display the Set Tabs dialog box by double-clicking a tab well or a tab marker on the ruler.

*Tab leader fills in an outline*

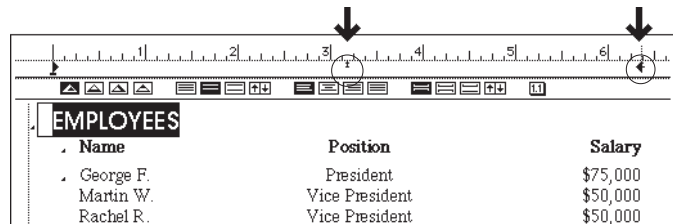


You can also use the Set Tabs dialog box to specify the position of the automatic tabs that MORE generates for you. MORE provides two types of automatic tabs:

*Left tabs* These tabs are automatically inserted at equal intervals in the text

*Center and right tabs* More automatically inserts a center tab in the middle of the text area and a right tab at the right margin. These automatic tabs are dynamic; if you change the margins for the text that contains center and right tabs, the tabs will always move to the new center and right margin respectively. (Center and right tabs are especially useful for positioning page numbers, dates, or other information on headers and footers.)

*Center and Right Automatic Tabs*

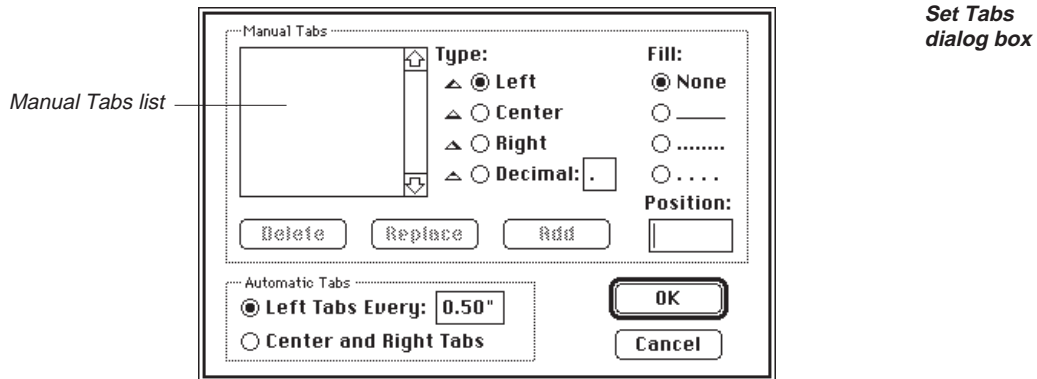
MORE provides four types of tab fills—characters that fill the space between text and the next tab stop. (The default tab fill is blank space.)

**To set a new tab stop on the text ruler**

1. Drag a tab from the appropriate tab well to the ruler.
2. Continue holding down the mouse button as you drag along the ruler to position the tab exactly where you want it.
3. Release the mouse button to set the tab.  
To set additional tabs of the same type, simply click the ruler where you want each additional tab to be positioned.

**To set a new tab stop using the Set Tabs dialog box**

1. Double-click on a tab well or any tab marker on the text ruler (or choose Tab Stops from the Text Format submenu in the Format menu) to display the Set Tabs dialog box.



2. Click an existing entry in the Manual Tabs list.
3. Enter the position (in inches from the left margin) of the new tab stop in the Position text box.
4. Select the kind of tab you want by clicking a tab type radio button.

5. Click Add to add the tab to the list.

or

Click Replace to substitute the new tab stop for an existing tab stop.

Clicking OK also adds or replaces the tap stop and closes the Set Tabs dialog box.

If you select the Decimal tab style, you can type an alternate delimiter for the standard decimal point. For example, European users may want to use a comma as a delimiter for decimal tabs.

6. Click OK to apply the new tab or tabs.

**NOTE:** *Setting a new tab stop deletes any automatic tabs that appeared before the new tab. This feature lets you simultaneously remove unwanted tabs when placing a new tab stop. If you later delete the manual tab, MORE reinserts the automatic tabs, using the current automatic tab settings.*

#### To specify a tab fill

1. Double-click a tab well or any tab marker on the ruler (or choose Tab Stops from the Text Formats submenu in the Formats menu) to display the Set Tabs dialog box.
2. Click the entry on the Manual Tabs list that you want to add the tab fill to.
3. Select the kind of tab fill you want by clicking a tab fill button.
4. Click Replace to assign the tab fill.  
The tab fill appears in parentheses next to the selected tap stop in the Manual Tabs list.
5. Click OK to apply the new tab fill.

#### To remove a tab fill

1. Double-click the Tab marker to display the Set Tabs dialog box.
2. Select the tab in the Manual Tabs list with the fill you want to remove.

3. Click the None fill, then Click Replace to remove the fill assignment from the selected tab stop.
4. Click OK to apply the new tab fill.

**To move an existing tab**

- Drag the tab to a new position on the ruler.  
or
1. Double-click the Tab marker to display the Set Tabs dialog box.
  2. Type the new position in the Tab Position box, then click Replace.
  3. Click OK.

**To delete a tab**

- Drag the tab from the bottom of the ruler.  
or
1. Double-click the Tab marker to display the Set Tabs dialog box.
  2. Select the tab in the Manual Tabs list.
  3. Click Delete.

**To change automatic tab settings**

1. Double-click a tab well or any tab marker on the ruler.  
MORE displays the Set Tabs dialog box.
2. Click Left Tabs and type an interval (in inches, centimeters, or pixels) in the text box.  
or  
Click Center and Right Tabs.
3. Click OK to add the new tab stops to the selected text.

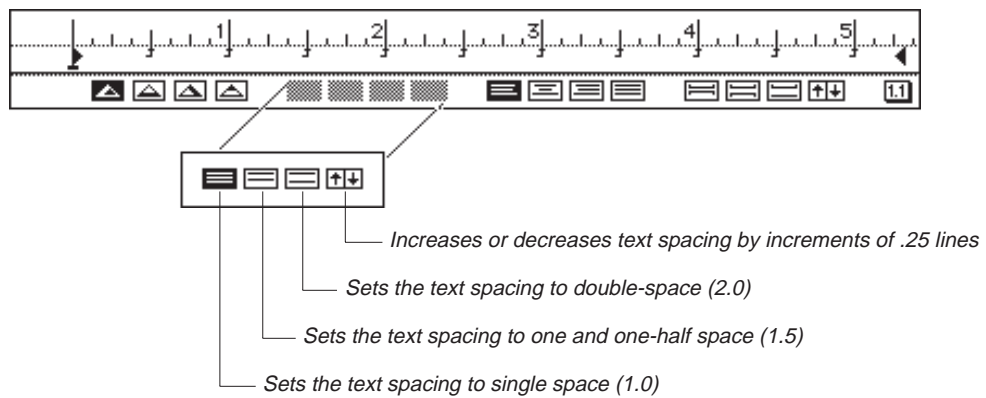
## Setting Text Spacing

You can use the text ruler to specify the spacing between lines of text in headlines or other text objects. Text objects for which you can specify spacing include

- headlines
- comment windows
- headers
- footers
- the Speaker's Notes window
- the caption text object in a bullet chart
- the title on a bullet chart
- the subhead on a bullet chart
- the comment on a bullet chart

The text ruler provides three preset text spacing options that you can apply to a selected text object. You can also use the ruler to increase or decrease text spacing by increments.

**The Text Ruler**



You can also specify a precise text spacing by double-clicking any of the line spacing icons to display the Custom Space dialog box.

**To set text spacing**

- Select a headline or other text object and click the text spacing icon that represents the preset spacing you want.

To increase or decrease text spacing by increments of .25 lines, click the up arrow or down arrow in the Decrease/Increase icon.

or

- Choose a text spacing command from the Text Format submenu in the Format menu.

or

1. If you want to set a precise text spacing, double-click any of the text spacing icons (or choose Custom Space from the Text Format submenu in the Format menu) to display the Custom Space dialog box.



*The Custom Space dialog box*

2. Type the text spacing you want.

You can specify any decimal value up to 4.0 for the number of lines. Also, you can use the text box to type a text spacing value with a unit of measurement (in, cm, or px)—such entries are constant and will not vary depending on individual line height.

3. Click OK.

**NOTE:** *If you specify double-spacing for a headline that contains a graphic, MORE applies a space that is twice the largest font size, or the height of the graphic; whichever is larger.*

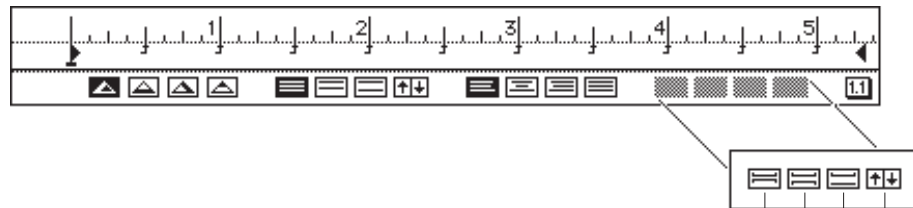
## Setting Outline Spacing

You can use the text ruler to specify the spacing before and after headlines (or other text objects). In the ruler, the outline spacing icons control the space that appears before a text object. The icons control spacing

- before a selected headline
- before text in a header
- before text in a footer
- between subheads in Bullet Chart view

You can select from one of three standard outline spacings, increase or decrease paragraph spacing by increments, or specify a custom line space to fit special needs. Outline spacing normally affects the spacing that appears before a headline or other text object. To set spacing after a text object to any value other than zero, you need to specify a custom line space.

**The Text Ruler**



*Sets the space above the selected headline to single-space (1.0)*

*Sets the space above the selected headline to one and one-half space (1.5)*

*Sets the space above the selected headline to double-space (2.0)*

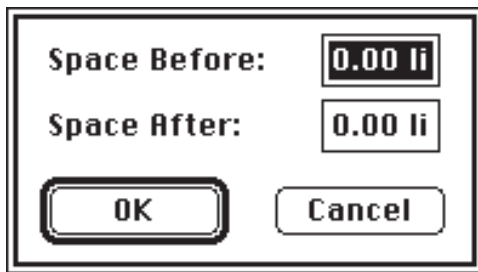
*Increases or decreases space above the selected headline by increments of .25 lines*

You can also specify an exact value for paragraph spacing in the Custom Space dialog box by double-clicking one of the Outline spacing icons.



**To set Outline spacing**

1. Select a headline.
2. To choose preset outline spacing, click the icon for the spacing you want. To increase or decrease the space above a selected headline by increments of .25 lines, click on the up arrow or down arrow in the Increase/Decrease icon.  
or
  - Choose a spacing command from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu.or
  1. If you want to set a precise outline spacing, double-click any of the outline spacing icons (or choose Custom Space from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu) to display the Outline Spacing dialog box.



*Outline Spacing dialog box*

You can specify any decimal value for the number of lines in a line space (up to four-line spacing) in either (or both) the Space After and Space Before text boxes. As with line spacing, you can also enter a unit measurement in the text boxes. The actual space of each line is determined by the largest font size in each line.

2. Type the line spacing you want to use and click OK to apply the spacing.



*To precisely control the space between the header and the body text of your MORE document, enter an appropriate Space After value for the Header window.*

## Aligning Text

As with a word processor, you can specify how you want outline text to be aligned with respect to the left and right margins. MORE provides four styles of text alignment.

*Flush Left*      Text is aligned with the left margin; also known as ragged right.

---

*Flush Right*      Text is aligned with the right margin; also known as ragged left.

---

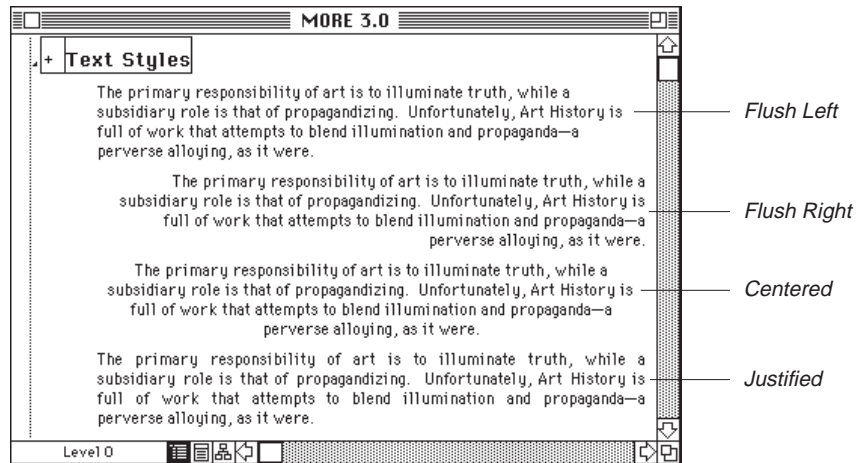
*Centered*      Text is centered between the left and right margins. This style is useful for titles.

---

*Fully Justified*      In this style, MORE adds space to each line of text so that the text is aligned with both the left and right margins. This is the style of text alignment normally used in newspapers and books.

---

**The four text alignment styles**



**To align text**

- Select a headline (or other text object) and click an alignment icon in the text ruler.

The paragraph adjusts to the alignment position you have selected.

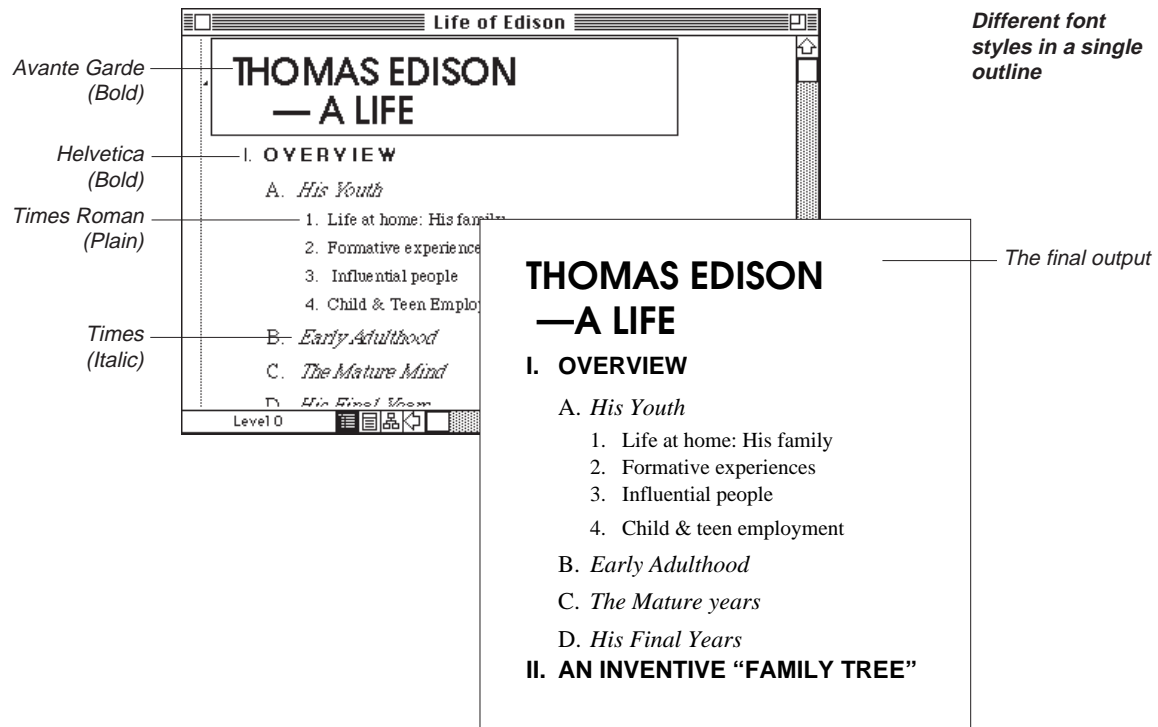
or

- Select a headline (or other text object) and choose an alignment style from the Text Format submenu in the Format menu.

**APPLYING CHARACTER FORMATS TO TEXT**

MORE lets you specify different fonts, sizes, colors, and styles for outline text. You can apply character formats through Format menu commands or with the Character Formats dialog box.

You can mix different character formats freely within an outline—even within headlines or comment text.



In bullet charts and tree charts, you can specify fonts, sizes, colors, and styles different from those used in the underlying outline. You can also apply fonts, sizes and styles, and colors by modifying the rules that govern text in the outline. For more information on setting text rules, see “Using Rules” in Chapter 5.



*You can apply a character format to a selected headline and all of its subheads by holding down the Option key while choosing a character style in the Format menu.*



*MORE provides “intelligent” font handling for your outlines. This means that if you move your outline to another Macintosh computer that doesn’t have one of the large screen fonts installed, MORE remembers the missing font, even though it displays the affected text in a default font (Geneva).*

---

## Applying Fonts

MORE provides a submenu of available fonts in the Format menu. To use a font in a MORE outline you must first install the font for use, either with the Font/DA Mover or a utility program such as Suitcase II™ or Font/DA Juggler™.

### To apply a font using menu commands

- Select the text you want to change and choose a font from the Font submenu in the Format menu.

To change the font of the selected headline and all its subheads, hold down the Option key while choosing Font.

MORE applies the font to the selected text, or at the insertion point if no text is selected.

### To apply a font using the keyboard

- Select text in the outline and press **W-Shift-[** to apply the previous font listed in the Font submenu, or press **W-Shift-]** to apply the next font listed in the Font submenu.

When you change a font from the keyboard, MORE also changes the font size to the nearest installed size for the current font and displays the font name and size in the status box.

## Applying Font Sizes

MORE provides a submenu of available font sizes in the Format menu. Sizes displayed in outlined text in the submenu identify the sizes of the currently selected font that are installed in your System file. Although your computer can display fonts in other sizes, these sizes will display and print more clearly.

### To apply a font size using menu commands

- Select the text you want to change and choose a font size from the Size submenu in the Format menu.

MORE applies the font size to the selected text, or at the insertion point if no text is selected.



*To change the size of the selected headline and all its subheads, hold down the Option key while choosing Size.*

### To apply a font size using the keyboard

- Select text in the outline and press **W-Shift-** (period) to increase the font size to the next higher installed point size, or press **W-Shift-** (comma) to decrease the font size to the next lower installed point.

When you change font size from the keyboard, MORE changes the font size to the closest installed size available for the font and displays the newly applied font size in the status box.

## Applying Font Styles

MORE provides a submenu of various font styles in the Format menu. The available styles include

- plain
- bold
- italic
- underline
- outline
- shadow
- superscript
- subscript

### To apply a font style using menu commands

- Select the outline text you want to change and choose a style from the Style submenu in the Format menu.



*You can change the style of the selected headline and all its subhead, hold down the Option key while you choose a style. MORE applies the style to the selected text, or at the insertion point if no text is selected.*

### To apply a font style using the keyboard

- Use the keyboard combinations listed in the table below to apply the styles in the Style submenu.

**Table of key combinations for styles**

w-Shift-B	<b>Bold type</b>	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift-I	<i>Italic type</i>	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift-U	<u>Underlined type</u>	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift-O	<b>Outlined type</b>	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift-S	Shadowed type	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift+= (plus)	Superscript	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>
w-Shift- (minus)	Subscript	<i>(also works to undo formatting)</i>

The offset distance of characters that have been formatted as superscript or subscript is based on the height of the character immediately preceding the formatted text. If there is no preceding character, MORE uses the default font size for that text.

**NOTE:** *Because superscript and subscript are normally used sparingly in text, they are not available as rules, nor can they be applied to more than one headline at a time.*


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## Applying Text Colors

You can apply any colors in the current color palette to outline text.

**To apply a color**

- Select text and choose a color from the Color submenu in the Format menu.  
MORE applies the color to the selected text, or at the insertion point if no text is selected.

 *To change the color of the selected headline and all its subheads, hold down the Option key while you choose Color.*

To specify a color for marked headline text, use the Document Options

command in the Window menu.

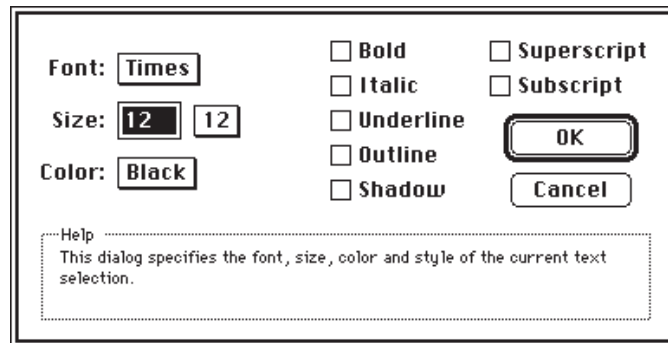
**NOTE:** *You can also apply custom colors that don't appear in the palette and modify the appearance of the palette itself. For more information, see "Customizing Colors, Patterns, and Gradients" in Chapter 5.*

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## Using the Character Dialog Box

The Character dialog box lets you apply multiple character formats in a single operation instead of choosing successive commands from the Format menu. The Character dialog box appears when you choose Character from the Format menu.

*Character  
Formats dialog  
box*



### To apply multiple attributes

1. Select the text and choose Character from the Format menu.  
MORE displays the dialog box, which presents the current character formats of the selected text.
2. Click style check boxes and choose the desired options from the pop-up menus to select the character attributes.
3. Click OK to apply the attributes to the selected text.

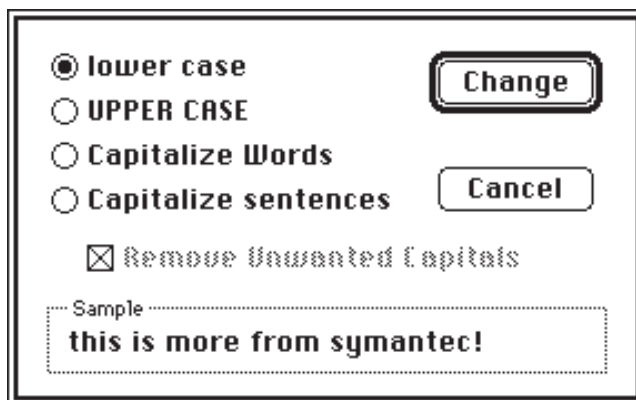


## **CHANGING THE CAPITALIZATION STYLE**

MORE lets you quickly change the style of capitalization or case of selected text in text objects, including text that appears in bullet charts and trees. This feature lets you quickly modify the appearance of text without having to edit individual characters.

### **To change case**

1. Select the text you want to modify.
2. Choose Change Case from the Edit menu to display the Change Case dialog box (shown in the following illustration).



3. Click the options you want and click OK to apply the case settings to the selected text.

## USING OUTLINES

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<i>lower case</i>	Displays all selected characters in lowercase.
<i>UPPER CASE</i>	Displays all selected characters in uppercase.
<i>Capitalize Words</i>	Displays the first letter of each selected word in uppercase.
<i>Capitalize sentences</i>	Displays the first letter of each selected sentence in uppercase.

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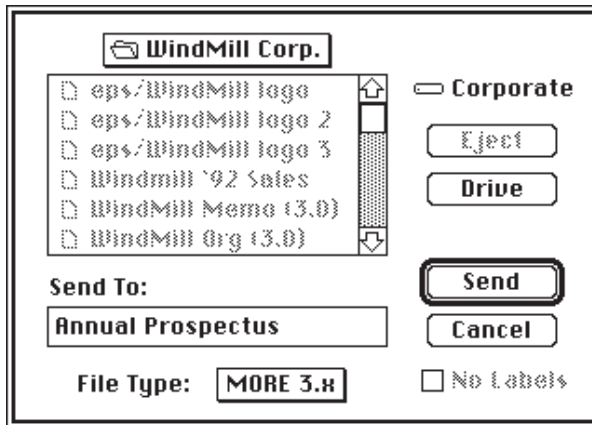
If you clicked “Capitalize Words” or “Capitalize sentences,” you can click Remove Unwanted Capitals to change other capital characters in the selected text to lowercase characters.

## **SAVING SUBOUTLINES AS FILES**

MORE provides a Send To command that lets you save the selected suboutline or selected headlines to a disk file. Use this feature when you want to save part of your outline to reopen as a new MORE outline or as a file that can be opened with another application (for example, Word 4.0).

MORE lets you send information to disk files in a variety of file formats, provided the translators for those formats are in your MORE Files folder.

When you choose Send To from the File menu, MORE displays the Send To dialog box:



**Send To  
dialog box**

The Send To dialog box closely resembles the dialog box that appears when you save files from within most Macintosh applications. It displays a directory of the current folder or disk. The directory title (and a folder or disk icon) appears above the list of the directory's contents. The name of the current disk appears to the right of the list. Eject and Drive buttons are available for switching disks or drives.

**Send To** Displays the text of the currently selected headline as the default file name. You can use any characters in the file name except a colon, and press any keys except tab and Return. If you want to save the outline by another file name, just type the desired name.

**File Type** Displays a pop-up menu of file formats that you can use to save the text.

*No Labels* Specifies whether headline labels are sent along with the headline text. When saving to word processor file types, you may prefer to select the No Labels check box, especially if you plan to re-import the file into MORE.

---

*Send* Saves the outline under the specified file name and according to the chosen format.

---

#### **To send part of an outline to a file**

1. Select the headline or headlines that you want to save as a file.
2. Choose Send To from the File menu.
3. When the Send To dialog box appears, use it to specify a destination, a file name, and a file format. If you are saving to a word processor, you also need to specify whether or not outline labels are to be saved with the file.
4. Click Send to save the headline (and any of its subheads) to the specified file.

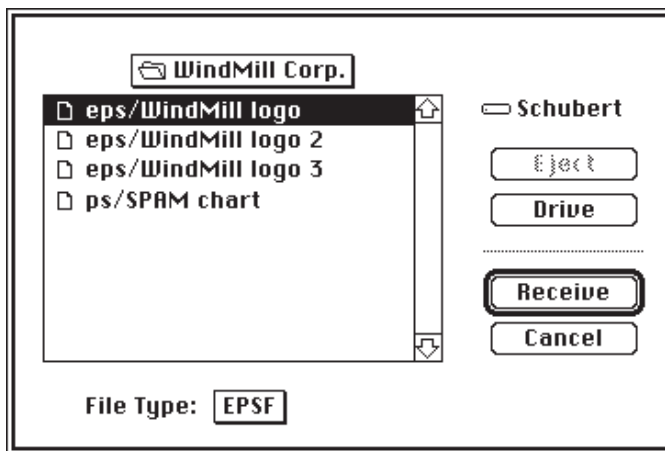
If you selected a single headline, MORE sends the complete suboutline contained in the selected headline.

If you selected multiple headlines, MORE sends the selected headlines and any associated comments to the specified file. If the destination file is a MORE outline, MORE also sends any speaker's notes, rules, and bullet chart information associated with the selected headlines.

## INSERTING MATERIAL FROM OTHER FILES

MORE provides a Receive From command that lets you open a disk file and insert its contents into the current outline. Use this feature when you want to incorporate information from other outline files or other types of files, including graphics, into the current outline.

When you choose Receive From from the File menu, MORE displays the Receive From dialog box (as shown in the following illustration). The Receive From dialog box closely resembles the dialog box that appears when you open files from within most Macintosh applications. It displays a directory of the current folder or disk. The directory title (and a folder or disk icon) appears above the list of the directory's contents. The name of the current disk appears to the right of the list. Eject and Drive buttons are available for switching disks or drives.



*Receive From dialog box*

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*Receive* Opens the specified file in the selected format and inserts it in your outline. Pressing Return is the same as clicking Receive.

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*File Type* Displays a pop-up menu of file formats that you can open and read into the outline. When you choose a file type from the pop-up menu, MORE displays only the names of files saved in the selected format.

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**To insert a file into an outline**

1. Select the headline where you want to insert the contents of a file.
2. Choose Receive From from the File menu.
3. When the Receive From dialog box appears, choose a file type, then choose the file you want to insert into the outline.
4. Click Receive to insert the contents of the selected file beneath the currently selected headline.

If a headline is selected when you insert a file, MORE recognizes the imported text as a new suboutline and inserts the headlines beneath the selected headline.

If the insertion point is in a comment window, MORE inserts the imported information as text at the insertion point.

**NOTE:** *If you receive a MORE outline into a new, unchanged outline, the Home headline is replaced.*

.....

**USING A LIBRARY IN OUTLINE VIEW**

When you're in Outline view, you can use a library such as the MORE Library, to select and use formats and templates that have been saved or to save formats and templates for use in other outlines.

Use the Outline section of a library to store frequently used outline templates. You can install any outline or suboutline as a template in the Outline submenu of the Library menu. Conversely, you can choose any outline template from the bottom of this menu, and MORE will insert it into the active outline. The outline template will contain all the outline text or graphics, as well as any rules included in the suboutline. Use outline templates for outline sections you use repeatedly, such as telemarketing questionnaires, incoming and outgoing call logs, marketing plans, and form letters.

Use the Rule Sets section of the library to store rule sets attached to any headline (in addition to rule sets attached to bullet charts or tree charts). After saving a rule set in a library, you can apply the rule set to another outline, bullet chart, or tree chart.

For more information on rules, see "Using Rules," in Chapter 5.

Use the Pictures section of a library to store graphics created in other applications—for example, logos, trademarks, or illustrations. You can also install graphics created with the palette tools in Bullet Chart view, or tree charts created in Tree Chart view.

Use the Color Sets section of a library to store color sets. All the available color commands (text color, mark color, and fill color) are contained in the color set.

Your MORE diskettes include sample libraries. You can experiment with the samples to get some ideas for creating your own libraries.

For more information on library features, see “Using Libraries,” in Chapter 5.

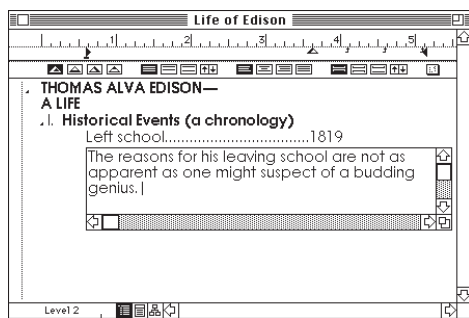

## **USING COMMENTS**

MORE lets you open a comment window under any headline in your outline. Comment windows (identical to document windows in previous versions of MORE) serve as electronic Post-it notes. Here you can type notes and reminders or store graphics or other material indirectly related to the headlines—you can expand or collapse the comment windows as they are required. The text ruler is also available within comment windows for formatting comment text.

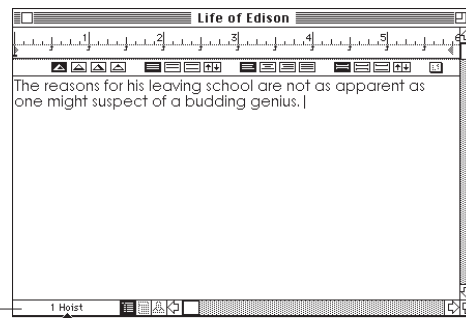
You can view comment windows beneath their associated headlines or hoist individual comment windows to fill the current outline window. As is the case with hoisted headlines, hoisting a comment window limits the scope of most operations to the contents of the hoisted comment window.

MORE uses the (▣) structure symbol to indicate the presence of a collapsed comment window. When a comment window is expanded, MORE removes the structure symbol.

### To expand a comment window

- Select a headline and choose Expand Comment from the Outline menu.  
or
- Double-click on the comment window structure symbol. (▣) (When the pointer is positioned correctly, it will take the shape shown in the margin.)



To simultaneously hoist the comment window, hold down the Option key while double-clicking on the comment window structure symbol.

- or
- Select a headline and press Enter (on the numeric keypad).  
To simultaneously hoist the comment window, press Shift-Enter.

### To hoist a comment window

- When a comment window is expanded, double-click on the size box of a comment window to hoist it.  
or
- Select an expanded comment window and choose Hoist from the Outline menu.

### To collapse a comment window

- Select the comment window and choose Collapse Comment from the Outline menu.  
or
- Press Enter, or Shift-Enter if the comment window is also hoisted.  
or
- Hold down the Option key and double-click inside the comment window.

### To dehoist a comment window

- Choose De-hoist from the Outline menu.  
or
- Press Enter.



**To expand all comment windows in a suboutline**

- To expand all comment windows in the suboutline, hold down the Shift key and double-click on the headline’s comment window structure symbol.
- or
- Select a headline and choose Expand All Comments from the Outline menu.

**To collapse all comment windows in a suboutline**

- Hold down the Shift key and double-click the structure symbol of the parent headline.

.....

**ATTACHING SPEAKER’S NOTES TO HEADLINES**

When you are creating an outline that will form the basis for a slide show presentation, you can associate headlines with speaker’s notes that can be referenced during the presentation. You can also use the Bullet Chart view to create these notes as you are refining your presentation.

Regardless of which view you create a speaker’s note in, it is available for viewing and editing in any MORE view. If you create a speaker’s note for a headline in Outline view, the same note will appear in Bullet Chart view if the headline is also a chart title.

If a Speaker’s Notes window is associated with a headline, you can display the window by selecting the headline and choosing Speaker’s Notes from the Window menu, or by double-clicking on the Speaker’s Notes structure symbol.

For more information on creating and using speaker notes, see “Attaching Speaker’s Notes to Charts” in Chapter 3.

**NOTE:** *Speaker’s notes can be printed only from Bullet Chart view.*

## CHECKING SPELLING

Use MORE's spelling checker to find and correct misspelled words in your outline. You can check the spelling of headlines and comments within either Outline view or Bullet Chart view. In Outline view, MORE checks all headlines and comments, even if they are not expanded (displayed). In Bullet Chart view, MORE checks only text that appears on a chart. You can check spelling in Speaker's Notes and headers/footers from all three views. However, in Bullet Chart view, Speaker's Notes are checked for chart titles only. To check Speaker's Notes, you must open the Speaker's Notes window. To check header or footer text you must open the Header/Footer window.

Unless you specify otherwise, MORE starts a spelling check from the current cursor position and proceeds down the outline—through all collapsed headlines and comment windows at all sublevels—until it reaches the end of the outline. However, if you begin the spelling check inside a hoisted comment window, the scope of the check is limited only to that comment window. Press **W-** (period) to stop a spelling check in progress.

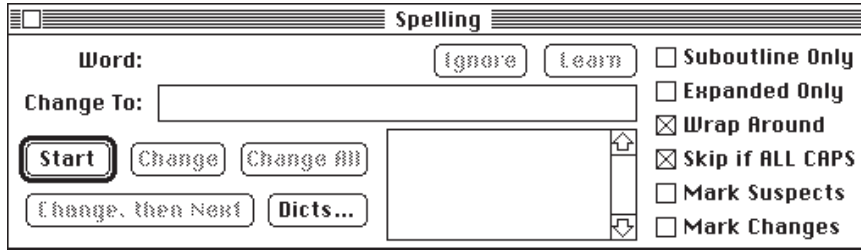
To check spelling, MORE uses a main dictionary that contains over 100,000 words and the user dictionary that is currently open. A user dictionary is one that you compile by adding the words yourself. You can create multiple user dictionaries, but MORE uses only one user dictionary at a time when it checks spelling.

Before you start a spelling check, you specify the user dictionary you want to use. If the Main Dictionary and user dictionaries are not stored in the same folder as the MORE application, the MORE files folder, or the System folder, you will be asked to locate the dictionaries the first time you check spelling. MORE remembers where they are located unless you move or rename them.

When you check spelling, MORE looks for words that are not contained in either the main dictionary or the user dictionary that is currently open. When MORE finds a word it does not recognize, it displays the suspect word and suggests possible replacements. If the word is spelled correctly, you can skip the word, ignore the word and all further occurrences, or add it to a user dictionary. Once a word has been added to the user dictionary the word is recognized as correct when it is encountered again. If the word is misspelled, you can change it by clicking a suggested replacement or typing the correct word.

When you add or ignore a word that contains capital letters, MORE asks if you want it to match the uppercase and lowercase exactly when it looks for further occurrences of the word. If you match the case, MORE will find the word when it is incorrectly capitalized. For example, if you match the case for the word Symantec, MORE ignores further occurrences of Symantec but finds errors in capitalization such as SymanTec or symantec. If you do not match the case, MORE finds the word when it is misspelled, but ignores capitalization.

You check spelling from within the Spelling window:



*The Spelling window*

The Check Spelling window includes the following:

<i>Word</i>	Displays the suspect word.
<i>Change To box</i>	Is where you can type a replacement word.
<i>Start</i>	Starts or continues to check spelling. (After you begin a spelling check, the button label changes to Next.)
<i>Ignore</i>	Ignores the word (and any subsequent words with the same spelling) and continues the spelling check.
<i>Learn</i>	Adds the word to the user dictionary.
<i>Change</i>	Replaces the misspelled word with the contents of the Change To box.
<i>Change All</i>	Replaces all occurrences of the misspelled word with the contents of the Change To box.
<i>Change, then Next</i>	Performs the same function as clicking Change and then Next or pressing <b>W</b> -Return.
<i>Dicts</i>	Displays the Dictionaries dialog box so that you can select (or modify) a user dictionary or find another main or user dictionary.

You can specify how you want a spelling check to proceed by specifying the following options:

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<i>Skip if ALL CAPS</i>	Skips words that are in uppercase letters.
<i>Mark Suspects</i>	Marks headlines that contain a suspected misspelled word. MORE marks a headline by highlighting its label. When the spelling check is completed you can quickly review marked headlines to verify changes and suspected words.
<i>Mark Changes</i>	Marks headlines that contain a word that was changed during the spelling check.
<i>Suboutline Only</i>	Checks spelling only in the selected suboutline. Deselect this option to check spelling from the insertion point to the end of your outline.
<i>Expanded Only</i>	Checks spelling only in expanded (displayed) headlines. Deselect this option to check all headline levels and associated comment windows (whether they are expanded or not).
<i>Wrap Around</i>	Specifies the range of the spelling check. When Wrap Around is checked, MORE checks spelling to the end of the outline (or the end of the text in a header/footer window, comment window, or Speaker's Notes window), then starts at the beginning of the outline and continues to the point where you began the spelling check.

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### **To check spelling**

1. Place the insertion point where you want to begin checking spelling.
2. Choose Check Spelling from the Edit menu, or press **W-T**.
3. Click Start in the Spelling window or press Return to start the spelling check.  
When MORE finds a word it does not recognize, it highlights the word in the outline and suggests possible spellings in the list box.

4. To skip the word and go on to the next, click Next.

To ignore the word and all further occurrences, click Ignore. (Subsequent appearances of the word will be ignored until the Spell window is closed and reopened.)

You can also change the word or add it to the user dictionary.

When a spelling check is complete, MORE displays a dialog box that lists the number of words searched, the number of suspect words found, and the number of replacements.



*Continue/Done dialog box*

5. Click Continue to restart the spelling check from the beginning of the current selection or click Done to end the spelling check.

### **To change the word**

1. Click the correct word in the list box (use the scroll bar to display additional words) or type the word in the Change To box.
2. To replace the misspelled word with the contents of the Change To box, click Change.

**TIP** *To insert the misspelled word in the Change To box for editing, click on it, make any changes, then click Change.*

To replace all occurrences of the misspelled word, click Change All.

To replace the misspelled word and continue checking spelling, click Change, then Next (or press **W-Return**).

**TIP** *Double-clicking a selection in the list box is the same as clicking the word, then clicking Change, then Next.*

**To add the word to the user dictionary**

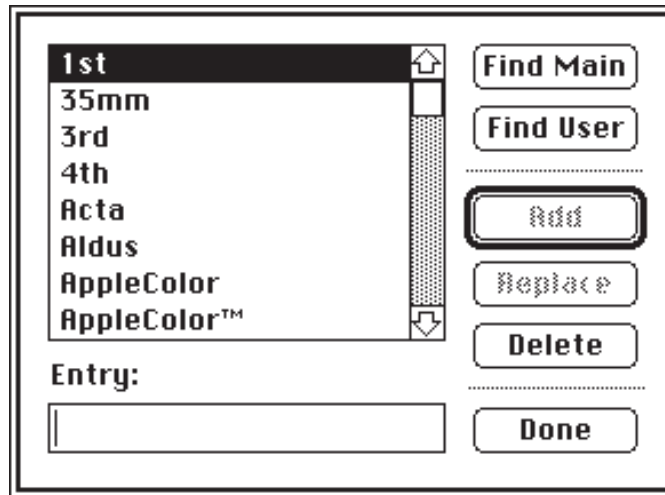
- Click Learn in the Spelling window.

If the Learn button is dimmed, there is no user dictionary currently open. You must open an existing user dictionary or create a new one before you can add the word.

**To open a user dictionary**

1. Click Dicts... to display the following dialog box:

*Dictionary dialog box*



2. Click Find User. In the dialog box that appears, locate the user dictionary you want by opening the appropriate folder and selecting the dictionary.

The list box displays the words contained in the selected dictionary. You can edit this dictionary, or click Done to return to the Spelling window to continue checking spelling with this user dictionary.

**To close a user dictionary**

Close a user dictionary if you do not want MORE to use it.

1. Click Dicts in the Spelling window.  
The Dictionary dialog box appears
2. Click Find User.  
A dialog box appears.
3. Click None to close the current user dictionary.
4. Click Done to return to the Spelling window.

**To create a new user dictionary**

1. Click Dicts in the Spelling window.  
The Dictionary dialog box appears.
2. Click Find User.  
A dialog box appears.
3. Click New.  
Another dialog box appears.
4. Type the name of the new dictionary in the entry box, and click Open or press Return. Then click Done to return to the Spelling window.  
The user dictionary you have created automatically becomes the selected user dictionary. As you check spelling, when MORE finds a word it does not recognize, you can add it to the user dictionary by clicking the Learn button.

**To edit a user dictionary**

1. Open the user dictionary that you want to edit (if you're not sure how to do this, see "To open a user dictionary," earlier in this section).

The list box shows the words in the user dictionary.

2. To replace a word, select the word you want to replace in the list box, type the new word in the text box and click Replace or press Return.

To delete a word, select the word in the list box and click Delete.

To add a word, type the new word in the text box and click Add or press Return.

3. When you have finished editing the dictionary, click Done to return to the Spelling window.

.....

**SEARCHING AND CHANGING TEXT**

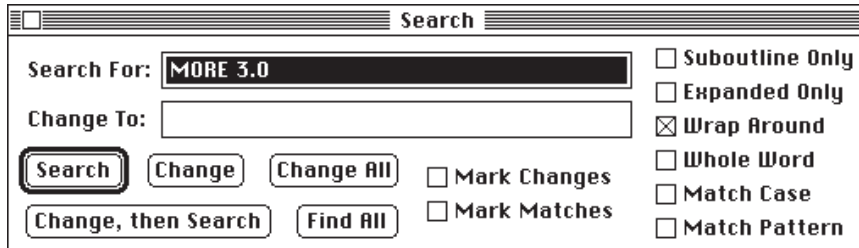
In an Outline view, you can search for specific text that appears in headlines or comment windows. You can perform text searches in either Outline view or Bullet Chart view. In Outline view, MORE searches through all headlines and comments, even if they are not expanded (displayed). In Bullet Chart view, MORE searches only through text that appears on a chart. You can perform searches in speaker's notes and headers/footers from all three views. However, in Bullet Chart view, speaker's notes are searched for chart titles only. To search for the text in speaker's notes, you must open the Speaker's Notes window. To search header/footer text you must open the Header/Footer window.

Unless you specify otherwise, MORE starts searches from the current cursor position and proceeds down the outline—through all collapsed headlines and comment windows at all sublevels—until it reaches the end of the outline. However, if you begin the search operation inside a hoisted comment window, the scope of the search is limited only to that comment window. Press **W-** (period) to stop a search in progress.

You can search for any character pattern up to 127 characters. In addition, MORE also provides "quick find" options for repeating searches and finding the next occurrence of selected text. (After you specify a search pattern, MORE displays the first part of the search string next to Find Next on the Edit menu.)



When you choose Search from the Edit menu (or press **W-K**), the Search Window appears.



*Search window*

You enter the text that you want to find (also known as the search string) in the Search For field. If you previously specified a string of text, it will appear in the box. If text is highlighted in the Outline view when you choose the Search command, it will appear in this box instead.

You type any replacement text in the Change To field. If a text string was previously specified for the change-to text, it will appear in the box.

The Search window contains the following elements:

- |                            |  |
|----------------------------|--|
| <i>Search</i>              | Finds the next occurrence of the search string and selects it. (Pressing Return also finds the next occurrence of the search string.)  |
| <hr/>                      |  |
| <i>Change</i>              | Changes the selected text to the text specified in the Change To field.  |
| <hr/>                      |  |
| <i>Change, then Search</i> | Changes the selected text to the text specified in the Change To field, then searches for the next occurrence of the search string. (Pressing <b>W-Return</b> also changes the selected text then searches for the next occurrence)  |
| <hr/>                      |  |
| <i>Change All</i>          | Replaces all occurrences of the search string with the text in the Change To field.  |
| <hr/>                      |  |
| <i>Find All</i>            | Searches for all the occurrences of the search string at once. A dialog box will appear telling you how many there are. This option is often used with the Mark Matches option to flag all the headlines that contain the search string, so that they can be gathered to a new location. |

*Whole Word* Finds only search strings that are whole words. Otherwise, MORE finds patterns that are embedded in other words as well as whole words.

---

*Match Case* Finds only the occurrences that have the same arrangement of uppercase and lowercase letters as the search pattern. If Match Case is active in search and replace operations, MORE replaces text with the identical search string. If Match Case is not active, MORE ignores the case of the letters in the search string and replaces text with the case arrangement in the found occurrences.

---

*Match Pattern* Uses special characters specified in the search string as wild card characters, rather than as literal characters. A detailed description of wildcard characters is provided later in this chapter.

---

*Suboutline Only* Limits the search to those headlines and comment windows subordinate to the selected headline. Otherwise, MORE searches through the entire outline, starting after the insertion point of the selected headline.

---

*Expanded Only* Limits the search to expanded headlines and comment windows.

---

*Wrap Around* Specifies the range of the search. When Wrap Around is checked, MORE searches to the end of the outline (or the end of the text in a header/footer window, comment window, or Speaker's Notes window) then starts at the beginning of the outline and continues to the point where you began the search.

---

*Mark Changes* Marks the headlines where there are changes made in the headline or its comment window.

---


*Mark Matches* Marks the headlines containing a match in the headline or comment window text.

---

For searches, MORE provides a pattern matcher that permits you to search through an outline for almost any combination of characters, without having to specify the exact characters themselves. You do this by typing special wildcard characters that represent one or more characters in the pattern.

To have MORE interpret special characters as wildcard characters, click the Match Pattern box in the Search window. This turns on the Pattern Matcher. Thereafter, you can incorporate wildcard characters in the pattern in the Search For text box. For more information, see “Using Wild Card Characters,” later in this chapter.

**To search for text**

1. Position the cursor at the beginning of the outline or comment window that you want to search.
2. Choose the Search command from the Edit menu.  
MORE displays the Search window.
3. Enter a search string in the Search For entry box.  
 *To search for the Tab character, press Option-Tab-Return.  
To search for the Return character, press Option-Return.*
4. Click any search options you want to use in the search.
5. Click Search to find the first occurrence of the search string. (Pressing Return also finds the first occurrence of the search string.)  
or  
Click Find All to find all occurrences of the search string.
6. Click Search or choose Find Next from the Edit menu (MORE displays the search string in the menu command) to find the next occurrence of the search string.

**To quickly find text**

1. Hold down the Option key and choose Quick Find from the Edit menu.  
MORE displays the Quick Find dialog box, an abridged version of the Search window that uses the current search options.
2. Enter a search string in the Search For field and click Find to find the first occurrence of the search string.
3. Choose Find Next from the Edit menu (MORE displays the search string in the menu command) to find the next occurrence of the search string.

### To quickly find selected text

1. Select the text that will serve as the search string.
2. Hold down the Option key and choose Find Next from the Edit menu.  
MORE finds the next occurrence of the selected text in the outline, using the search options that are currently active in the Search window. In addition, the selected text becomes the search string for subsequent searches.

### To search and modify text

1. Position the cursor at the beginning of the outline or comment window that you want to search.
2. Choose the Search command from the Edit menu.  
MORE displays the Search window.
3. Enter a search string in the Search For field.
4. Enter replacement text in the Change To field.
5. Click any search options you want to use in the search.
6. Click Search to find the first occurrences of the search string. When MORE highlights the first pattern found, click Change to modify the text. You can also click Change, then Search to modify the text and immediately search for the next occurrence of the search string.



*Use w-Return to Change, then Search.*

or

Click Change All to modify all occurrences of the search string.



*You cannot undo a Change All operation.*

After the operation is complete, MORE tells you how many occurrences were found and changed. If you specified the marking of headlines that contain changed text, you can use the Unmark Headline command in the the Reorg menu to remove the marks.

## Using Wild Card Characters

A wild card character substitutes for other characters in a search pattern. You can use these substitute characters to search through an outline for almost any combination of characters—without having to specify the exact characters themselves.

To have MORE interpret special characters as wild card characters, click the Match Pattern box in the Search window. Thereafter, you can incorporate wild card characters in the pattern in the Search For box. The table below summarizes the purpose of each wild card character and provides examples of their use.

<b>Characters</b>	<b>Explanation</b>	<b>Example</b>	<b>Result</b>
[ ]	Encloses a set of alternative characters	[012345689]	Finds any single digit except 7
[A-Z]	Finds any single uppercase letter when Match Case is enabled	[A]	Finds all occurrences of uppercase A.
#	Represents any digit	91###	Finds all mailing zip codes beginning with “91”
?	Represents any character (except Return)	b?n (Whole Word must be enabled)	Finds all three-letter words that begin with “b” and end with “n”
*	Indicates zero or more repetitions of the preceding characters	John[a-z]*	Finds “John,” “Johnson,” “Johnston,” “Johnstown,” and so on
+	Represents one or more repetitions of the preceding character	9/#+/1986	Finds any date in September, 1986, (when the date is in the format of “mm/dd/yyyy”)

## **Word Counts**

You can use MORE searching capabilities to count words, sentences, paragraphs, and headlines. Turn off the Match Case option and use wild card characters as described below.

### **To count the number of words in an outline**

1. Select the Home headline.
2. Enter the search string:

**[a-z][a-z][a-z][a-z]+**

3. Click Find All.

MORE counts and displays the number of words of four letters or more in the outline.



*The spelling checker also counts words automatically, but puts no restriction on word length.*

### **To count the number of sentences in a single comment window**

1. Place the cursor at the beginning of the comment window, hoist the comment window, and turn off the Match Case option.
  2. Enter the search string:
- [.!?]+**
3. Click Find All.

MORE counts and displays the number of sentences in the comment window. This search pattern assumes that sentences always end in a period, question mark, or exclamation point.

**To count the number of paragraphs in a comment window**

1. Place the cursor at the beginning of the comment window and hoist.
2. Enter the search string:  
**[<Option-Return>]<Option-Return> or [<Option-Return>]+**
3. Click Find All.

**NOTE:** *<Option-Return> is the character produced by pressing the Option and Return keys at the same time. The second example doesn't assume that two return characters end every paragraph.*

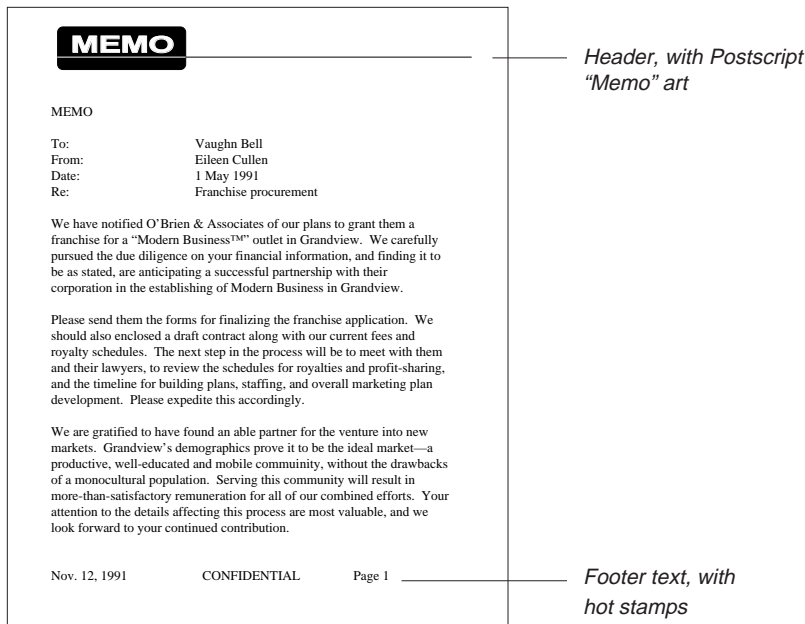
**To count the number of headlines in an outline**

1. Select the Home headline.
2. Choose the Expand All command from the Outline menu to display all headlines.
3. Click the Expanded Only box in the Search window to exclude document windows from the search.
4. Enter the search string:  
**%?**
5. Click Find All.  
MORE counts and displays the number of non-empty headlines.



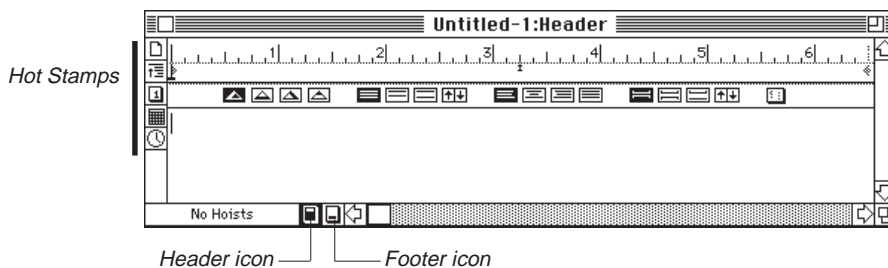
## ADDING HEADERS AND FOOTERS

A header or footer contains text or graphics that you want to print at the top (header) or bottom (footer) of outline pages. Adding a header or footer in one MORE view adds it in all views. You can modify a header or footer from any view. You can specify whether to print headers or footers from the Print Options window. For more information on specifying print options, see “Printing Outlines,” later in this chapter.



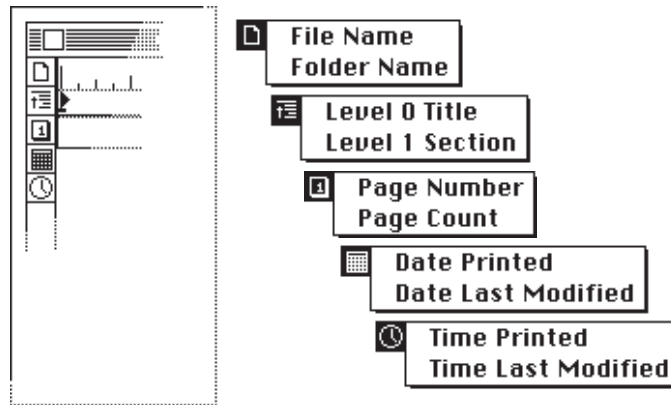
**A MORE generated outline used as a memo**

You enter header or footer information in the Header/Footer window (shown in the following illustration). The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed. To change the display, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom edge of the dialog box, or choose View Header/Footer from the Header/Footer menu.

**Header/Footer icons and the options available**



The icons along the left side of the Header or Footer dialog box insert hot stamps at the insertion point in the header or footer window. Hot stamps are placeholders for data that will vary between pages or between printings—page numbers, headlines, date, time, and file or folder name. When you print, MORE automatically replaces the placeholder with the correct information. Pressing an icon displays a pop-up menu of available choices. For example, pressing the Date icon allows you to choose whether you want to display the date the chart is printed or the date the chart was last modified. The Hot Stamp command in the Edit menu inserts the same data as the Header/Footer icons. You can use this command to insert dynamic data in the text of outlines of bullet charts. For more information on Hot Stamps, see “Using Hot Stamps” later in this chapter.

The following is a description of the Header/Footer icons:

<i>File icon</i>	Inserts the name of the MORE file or the folder where it is located.
<i>Title icon</i>	Inserts the level-0 (zero) headline or level-1 headline from the beginning of the current page. In the table of contents, the words <i>Table of Contents</i> prints in place of the level-1 headline. (A level-1 stamp provides the equivalent of a running header or footer.)
<i>Page icon</i>	Inserts either a page number or a page count. By default, MORE displays numbers in the Arabic format (1, 2, 3,...); use the Hot Stamp command if you want to display page numbers or page count in Roman numerals.

**NOTE:** *In the Table of Contents, the page count always refers to the number of pages in the Table of Contents, not the entire outline. These numbers always appear in lower case Roman numerals.*

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*Date icon*      Inserts the date the outline or chart was printed or the date it was last modified.

---

*Time icon*      Inserts the time the outline or chart was printed or the time it was last modified.

---

**NOTE:** *The time and date stamps use the time and date format in effect when they are stamped. To change the format, delete the old stamps and create a new one.*

---

The Header/Footer window has a text ruler that you can use to set tabs and change line spacing and justification. For information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text,” earlier in this chapter.

When you add a header or footer, you can control whether it appears on the first page and specify a starting number for page numbering. For example, if you specify 4 as the starting page, the numbering sequence will be 4, 5, 6, and so on.

#### **To add a header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu.  
The Header/Footer window appears. The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed.
2. To change the current display, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom of the window.
3. Type the text you want to appear in the header or footer.
4. Use the hot stamp icons to insert information such as the date or time.
5. Use the text ruler to set tabs, change line or paragraph spacing, or change text justification.  
For information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text,” earlier in this chapter.
6. To specify a starting number for the pages to be printed, choose Starting Page Number from the Header or Footer menu. Type the page number in the dialog box and click OK.

7. To specify that the header or footer not print on the first page, choose Skip First Page from the Header or Footer menu.

A check mark appears next to this menu command when it is selected.

8. To close the Header/Footer window, click the Close box.



*You can precisely control the space between the header and the body text of your MORE document. To do this, choose Custom Space from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu to display the Outline Spacing dialog box, then enter an appropriate Space After value for the Header window.*

### **To view, change, or delete an existing header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu to display the Header/Footer window.
2. Display the header or footer by clicking the Header or Footer icon at the bottom of the dialog box.
3. Edit or delete header or footer text as you would any other text.
4. When you have finished editing text, click the close box.

.....

## **ADDING TIME AND DATE STAMPS**

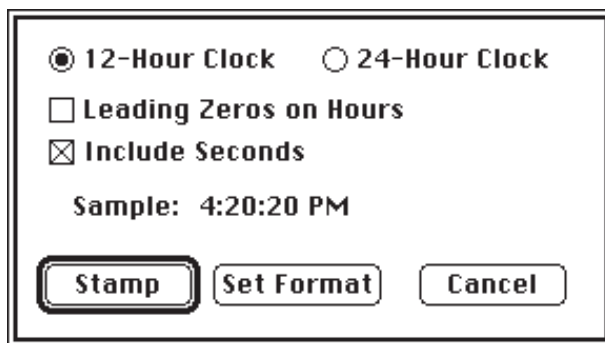
MORE lets you add time and date stamps to your outline. Time and date stamps are useful for

- Recording the time and date of the changes made in an outline.
- Marking times and dates on a list of projects in your outline. (Afterwards you can use the Sort command to compile the outline contents according to time and date.)
- Automatically dating a memo or other report.
- Logging phone calls with clients.
- Recording the dates that items are received or shipped.
- Recording start and stop times for daily activities, providing a tool for personal time management.
- Stamping a date into bullet charts that you'll use in presentations.

## Stamping Times and Setting Time Formats

MORE provides a Time Stamp command that automatically places today's time at the insertion point in a headline or other text object.

When you choose Time Stamp, MORE displays the Time Stamp dialog box, where you can select a format for displaying time and set a default format for subsequent time stamps.



*The Time Stamp dialog box*

## Time Formats

The format you select for the date will affect

- the time stamped into text
- the time display in the status box
- the time displayed in the Bullet Chart control panel
- the format of times stamped with the icon that appears in the Headers and Footers window, or with the Hot Stamp command
- times generated by the Calendar command

---

**To stamp the time**

1. Position the insertion point at the place in the text where you want to insert the time.
2. Choose Time Stamp from the Edit menu (or press **W-;** [semicolon]).  
or  
Click the desired options in the Time Stamp dialog box. Sample in the dialog box shows you the currently selected time format.

3. Click OK to stamp the time.

or

Click Set Format to specify your selections as the format for displaying time elsewhere (without stamping).

The next time you display the Time Stamp dialog box, the settings you specified will appear as the current settings.



*Hold down the Option key while choosing Time Stamp from the Edit menu (or press Option-w-) to bypass the Time Stamp dialog box and directly stamp the time at location of the insertion point. If you bypass the dialog box, MORE uses the last time format settings you specified.*

## Stamping Dates and Setting Date Formats

MORE provides a Date Stamp command that automatically places today's date at the insertion point in a headline or other text object.

When you choose the Date Stamp, MORE displays the Date Stamp dialog box, where you can select a format for displaying the date and set a default format for subsequent date stamps.

The format you select for the date will affect

- the date stamped into your text
- the date used in the Bullet Chart Control Panel
- the date used in an outline created with the Calendar command
- the format of dates stamped with the icon that appears in the Header/Footer window, or with the Hot Stamp command

### *Date Format*

### **To stamp the date**

1. Position the insertion point at the place where you want to insert the date.
2. Choose Date Stamp from the Edit menu or press **W-'** (apostrophe).
3. Click the desired options in the Date Stamp dialog box. The sample in the dialog box shows you the currently selected date format.
4. Click OK to stamp the date.

or

Click Set Format to specify your selections as the format for displaying the date elsewhere (without stamping).

The next time you display the Date Stamp dialog box, the settings you specified will appear as the current settings. If you bypass the dialog box, MORE uses the last date format settings you specified.



*Hold down the option key while choosing Date Stamp from the Edit menu (or press Option-w-' [apostrophe]) to bypass the Date Stamp dialog box and directly stamp the time at location of the insertion point. If you bypass the dialog box, MORE uses the last date format settings you specified.*

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### **Using Hot Stamps**

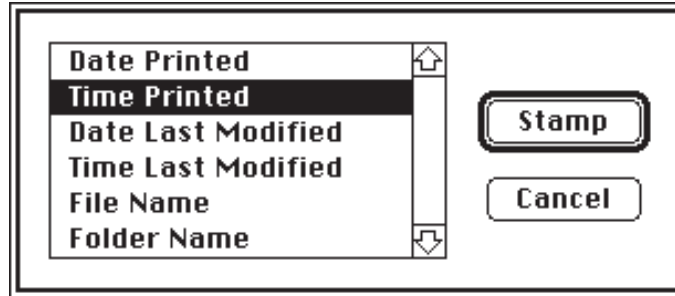
In addition to the time and date stamps, MORE provides a Hot Stamp feature for stamping additional information in printouts of outlines and bullet charts. Unlike conventional time and date stamps, hot stamps are dynamic: they insert a variable placeholder in the text that automatically changes to reflect a change in status. Use Hot Stamps to insert the following information in printed text:

- the Date the file was last modified
- the Date the file was printed
- the Time the file was last modified
- the Time the file was last printed
- the Current file name that the printed document is saved under
- the Current folder name where the printed file resides
- the Page number (Arabic or Roman)
- the Total page count (Arabic or Roman)

**To insert a hot stamp**

1. Position the insertion point in the text where you want to insert the date.
2. Choose Hot Stamp from the Edit menu to display the Hot Stamp dialog box.

*The Hot Stamp dialog box*



3. Select the desired option from the list of Hot Stamp options.
4. Click OK to insert the hot stamp placeholder in the text.

To preview how the hot stamps will appear in the printed text, choose Print



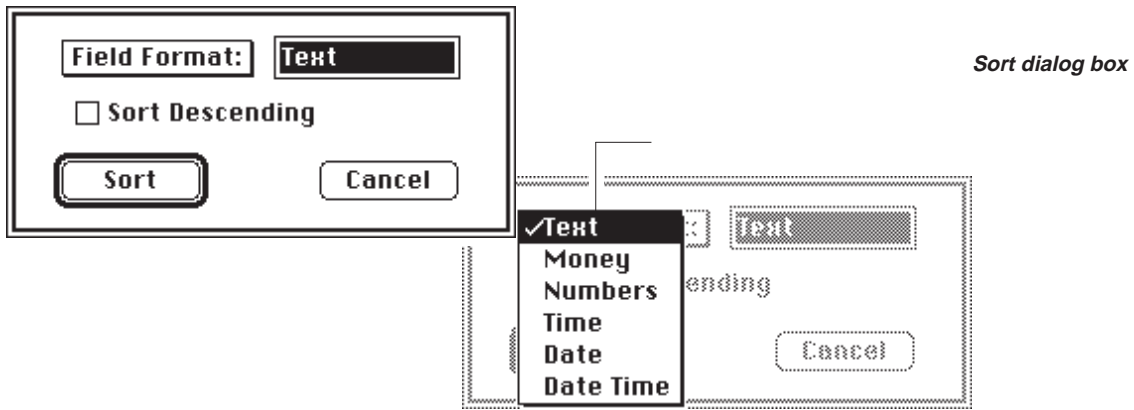
*Hold down the Option key and choose Hot Stamp Again from the Edit menu to bypass the Hot Stamp dialog box and insert the previously selected placeholder.*

.....

## **SORTING HEADLINES**

MORE provides a Sort command that lets you arrange headlines alphabetically or according to the contents of headlines. Sort is useful for arranging headlines to track schedules and create timelines. For example, you can use the Sort command in conjunction with the Mark and Gather commands to pick up items that have date or time stamps and then sort them into order.

When you choose Sort, MORE displays the Sort dialog box, where you choose the type of sort and specify either a descending or ascending sort order.



*Categories pop-up menu*

The dialog box includes a Field Format pop-up menu that lets you choose the types of values you want to base the sort upon. You can choose General, Money, Numbers, Date, Time, and Date Time.

**Text** Performs an alphanumeric sort, with numeric characters taking precedence over alphabetic characters. An ascending sort on a group of subheadlines beginning with letters starts with “A” and ends with “Z.” A descending sort starts with Z and ends with A. When two different letters are sorted alphabetically, their case is ignored. That is, “G” sorts lower than “h.” However, the lowercase form of a single letter sorts lower than the uppercase form of that same letter. That is, “g” sorts lower than “G.”

**Money** Sorts headlines by numbers preceded by a dollar sign (\$).

**Numbers** Sort headlines beginning with plain numbers (not dollar amounts), with or without a decimal point. An ascending sort on headlines beginning with numbers starts with the lowest number and ends with the highest. A descending sort starts with the highest number and ends with the lowest.

**Time** Sorts headlines with time values. To sort headlines on times, use the 24-hour format, and include seconds, if you wish. An ascending sort will begin with the earliest time and end with the latest. A descending sort will begin with the latest time and end with the earliest.

**Date** Sorts headlines with numeric date values. The date in the headline must be in the same order currently selected with the Date Stamp command. You can, however, override this order by typing a pattern into the Sort dialog box, such as yy/mm/dd, dd/mm/yy. Abbreviated and full dates (those containing the word Tuesday, etc.) cannot be sorted. An ascending sort will begin with the earliest date and end with the latest. A descending sort will begin with the latest date and end with the earliest.

---

**Date Time** Sorts headlines with both date and time values. Typically, you will be sorting headlines that have been date and/or time stamped.

---

### To sort a group of subheads at the same level

1. Select the parent headline of the group of subheads you want to sort.
2. Choose Sort from the Outline menu.
3. Choose the desired sort format from the pop-up menu.
4. If you want to sort on a custom format, enter the appropriate characters in the entry box that displays the current format. For more information, see “Custom Sorting” next in this chapter.
5. If you want to sort in descending order, click Sort Descending. Leave this box unchecked if you want to sort in ascending order.
6. Click Sort or just press Return to sort the subheads.

**NOTE:** *If you have a string currently highlighted in a headline when you choose the Sort command, MORE will use that current selection to determine the default format for the sorting operation. For example, if you highlight the string 4/5/1988 MORE will choose the Date format as the default format for the sort.*

---



*Hold down the Option key and choose Sort Again from the Reorg menu to bypass the Sort dialog box and immediately perform the sort. If you bypass the dialog box, MORE uses the sort format last specified in the dialog.*

## Custom Sorting

You can use same wild card characters available in the Search command to sort for specific text patterns. For example, you can use the pattern **[a-z]+\$** to sort headlines by the last word. For more information, see “Using Wild Card Characters” earlier in this chapter.

You can enter any of the following patterns to sort on dates (and thus override the format currently chosen in the Date Stamp dialog box):

- *mm/dd/yy*
- *dd/mm/yy*
- *yy/mm/dd*
- *mm/yy/dd*
- *dd/yy/mm*
- *yy/dd/mm*

In the above patterns, “y” is the year, “m” is the month, and “d” is the day.

You can enter any of the following patterns to sort, and thus match only times with or without sections, respectively:

- *hh:mm:ss*
- *hh:mm*

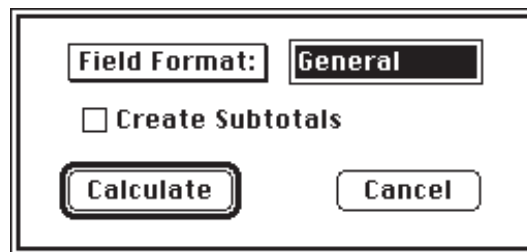
In the above patterns, “h” is the hour, “m” is the minute, and “s” is the second. You can also combine dates and times together, if they appear one after another in the headline, by typing a pattern such as *dd/mm/yy hh:mm* into the Sort dialog box.

## PERFORMING CALCULATIONS

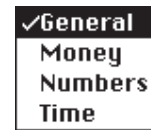
MORE provides a Calculate command that lets you sum numbers in headlines. Calculate is useful for tracking costs, adding expense reports, projecting costs, and summing times.

When you choose Calculate, MORE looks for numbers in each level of headlines under the selected headline, adds the values, then inserts the sum of the selected headline's subheads at the insertion point. (If a number already exists in the selected headline, MORE replaces the number, regardless of its position in the headline.) Calculate does not perform division or multiplication functions, nor does it perform addition and subtraction of numbers within a given headline.

*The Calculate dialog box*

The dialog box includes a Field Format pop-up menu that lets you choose the types of numbers that you want to calculate. You can choose General, Money, Numbers, and Time.

*General*      Calculates any combination of numbers and dollar amounts. If there are dollar amounts, the totals and subtotals will also be in dollars.

---

*Money*      Calculates only headlines with dollar amounts. It ignores other numeric formats.

---

*Numbers*      Calculates only headlines with plain numbers (not dollar amounts), with or without a decimal point.

---

*Time*      Sums time. It calculates numbers in the form of hh:mm:ss or mm:ss, where h is hours, m is minutes, and s is seconds.

---

**NOTE:** *If there is a text selection in a headline when you choose Calculate, MORE will use that current selection to determine the default format for the calculate operation. For example, if you select \$50.00, MORE will choose the Money format as the default format for the calculation.*

The text box displays the field selected from the pop-up menu. You can also type a custom pattern to be calculated. For example, typing **# students** calculates all subheadlines with a number, represented by #, followed by the word students.

*Create Subtotals*      When subheadlines are summed, a subtotal is inserted in their parent headline. To suppress the generation of subtotals, deselect the option. Even with this option turned off, MORE still calculates numbers at subtotals to derive the total at the selected headline.

---

*Calculate*      Performs the specified calculation.

---

*Cancel*      Cancels the command and returns to the outline.

---

Calculate works according to the following rules:

- Positive and negative figures in subheads are summed and their total is assigned to the parent headline of the subheads. If you choose the Create Subtotals option or if the parent headline already contains a subtotal, MORE inserts the total in the parent headline.
- If a single headline contains two numbers of the type you specify, MORE recognizes the first number, but not the second number.
- Only the first eight decimal places are used; for amounts in dollars, only the first two decimal places are used. Any extra numbers are truncated, not rounded off.
- Values cannot be imbedded in other text; each value must be a separate string of numbers.

Example:      Good: Billing 10 hours  
                  Bad: 1024k of memory.

- If you've selected the General format and any of the figures being summed are preceded by a dollar sign ( \$ ), then the total of all the numbers (whether or not the numbers are preceded by a dollar sign) will be expressed in dollars. If a headline has both dollar and plain numbers, the first dollar figure will be used.
- For negative dollar amounts, either the minus sign (–) must precede the dollar sign or the amount must be in parentheses.
- MORE accepts the same typed tokens that are used with the Pattern Matcher. However, it expands the meaning of a single # to mean any number, with or without a decimal. Any pattern containing a more complex combination of # characters will interpret each # character to match only a single digit, as with Search. For example, typing **Project Costs \$#** will calculate only headlines that contain the text, Project Costs, followed immediately by a dollar amount, while **#####** will match only five consecutive digits. For more information, see "Searching and Changing Text," earlier in this chapter.

**To sum numbers in a group of subheadlines**

1. Select the headline that contains subheads you want to calculate.
2. Choose Calculate from the Outline menu, or press **W-=**. (Press Option-**W-=** to bypass the Calculate dialog box, and immediately perform the operation.)
3. Choose the desired numeric format from the Field Format pop-up menu.
4. If you also want new subtotals inserted, click Create Subtotals.
5. Click Calculate, or press Return.



*Hold down the Option key and choose Calculate Again from the Reorg menu to bypass the Calculate dialog box and immediately perform the calculation. If you bypass the dialog box, MORE uses the numeric format last specified in the dialog.*

.....

**PHONE DIALING**

If your outline contains phone numbers, you can quickly dial the numbers with MORE's Dial Phone command. MORE lets you dial numbers through a connected modem or directly through the phone receiver.

**To dial a telephone number**

1. Select a headline or text that contains the number you want to dial.
2. Choose Dial Phone from the Reorg menu.

MORE displays the Dial Phone dialog box.

*Dial Phone dialog box*



The Phone Number field in the dialog box displays the phone number contained in the selected headline or outline text.

3. If necessary, modify the phone number or enter a new number.

You can insert any number of characters, including long access codes for long-distance carriers.

You can also delay the dialing of a phone number for several seconds by inserting a comma in the number. (This feature is useful if your phone is on a PBX system.)

4. Click Tone Dial if you are placing the call through a modem and your phone is a push-button model.

or

Click Pulse Dial if you are placing the call through a modem and your phone is a pulse (rotary) model.

or

Click "Tone dial through speaker" if you have a push-button model and are placing the call without a modem.



*You can enhance the speaker dialing feature by connecting amplified speakers to the Audio Out jack on your Macintosh.*

5. If you are dialing through the speaker, hold the phone receiver next to your Macintosh's speaker and click Dial.

or

If you are dialing through a modem, click Dial.

After MORE dials, it will ask you to pick up the receiver. The Dial Phone dialog box closes.

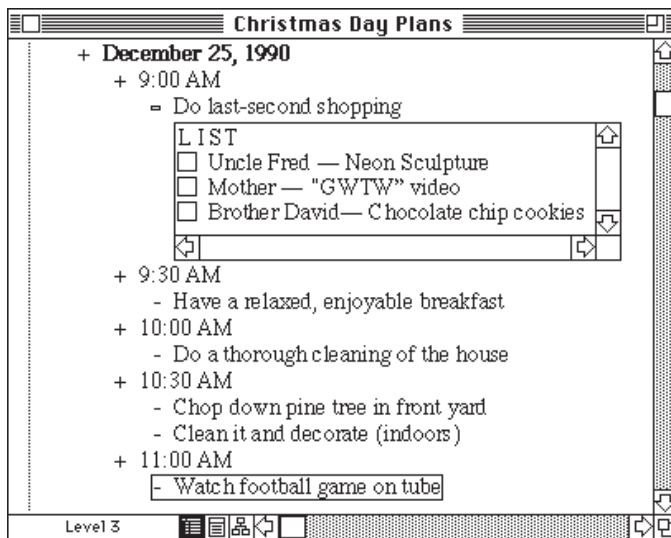

## **MAKING CALENDARS**

Calendars are indispensable for managing time and tasks. MORE provides a Calendar command in the Outline menu that lets you quickly generate calendars for your outlines.

The Calendar command gives you the ability to incorporate scheduling in your outlines. You can then track appointments, due dates, and other activities. MORE lets you specify any length of time for the calendar to cover and select time slots for any intervals you want.

You can insert a calendar into any outline quickly and easily. Each day and each time interval constitutes a headline of text in the outline. The dates and times will appear in the current formats of the Time Stamp and Date Stamp commands on the Edit menu.



*A calendar placed in an outline*

Once you have inserted a calendar in an outline, you can edit the headlines and add additional information, including

- appointments in the time slots
- detailed notes in comment windows
- reports and comments due at meetings listed in your agenda
- lists of persons attending a meeting

You may want to create the calendar outline in its own separate outline window so that is readily available, even while you are working in another outline.

You can also create a Tree Chart view of a calendar to communicate time lines and product schedules to your co-workers and associates.

When you choose Calendar from the Reorg menu MORE displays the Calendar window where you can specify the appearance of the calendar you are placing in the current outline.

When the Calendar window first appears, MORE displays a calendar of the current month and highlights the current date. Immediately below the calendar is a list of months in the year, and the last two digits of the previous and next year.

In the Dates area, MORE displays a range of dates for the calendar. Today's date appears as a preset value for the From and To fields. You can specify a new range by dragging the pointer through a range of dates in the calendar. Use the Include Weekends check box to specify whether or not you want weekends included in the calendar. If you want to extend the range of dates to another month, click the month below the calendar and shift-click (or shift drag) the additional dates.

The Time area displays values for the beginning and ending time slots in the calendar. (If time slots are included, they will appear under each day in the calendar suboutline.) The default value for the From field is 9:00 AM, and the default value for the To field is 5:00 PM. To change either one, click inside the box and type another time. The area also provides a field where you can enter an interval for the time slots. You can specify intervals of minutes, hours, half hours, and so on. The preset value is 30 minutes. To change it, click inside the box and type another time interval. Use the Include Time Slots check box to specify whether you want the times slots included in the calendar. MORE retains the time slot values between sessions.

**To set up the range of dates for an outline calendar**

1. Select the headline under which you want to put the calendar.
2. Choose Calendar from the Outline menu.  
MORE displays the Calendar window.
3. If necessary, click the previous or next year box.  
MORE updates the displayed calendar to reflect the selection.
4. If necessary, click on the appropriate month.  
MORE updates the displayed calendar to reflect the selection.
5. In the calendar, drag across the days you want to include in your outline; the range of days displayed in the Dates area changes accordingly.

6. Turn the Include Weekends check box on or off, as desired.
7. Click Make Calendar Outline to insert the calendar into your outline.

**To include days from more than one month**

1. Select the days from the first month, as in step 5 above.
2. Click the next month.
3. Hold down the Shift key, and continue highlighting days with the Shift key held down.

You can continue to the next year in the same way: click the year, click the month, and then continue holding down the Shift key and highlighting days.

All the days, months, and years in a range of dates for an outline calendar must be consecutive. You can select dates backward or forward through time.

Once you have set up the dates, you can select the time slots for each day with the Time box in the Calendar window.

4. Click Make Calendar Outline to insert the calendar into your outline.

**To set up time intervals for an outline calendar**

1. In the From field, enter the time with which you want to begin the daily calendar, using AM or PM, as appropriate.
2. In the To field, enter the time with which you want to end the daily calendar, using AM or PM, as appropriate.
3. In the Interval field, enter the amount of time in minutes or hours that you want between each slot in the daily calendar. Type the number, and as appropriate, follow the number with min for minutes, or use hr, hrs, or hour for hours.

4. Click Include Time Slots to turn it on, if necessary.

If Include Time Slots is not checked, the time slots will not appear in the outline.

5. Click Make Calendar Outline to insert the calendar into your outline.



## **ADDING PAGE BREAKS**

MORE provides a number of options for specifying page breaks in printed outlines. Commands for governing page breaks appear in a submenu of the Format menu. Use the Page Break submenu to

- remove manually set page breaks from an outline
- insert page breaks
- keep lines in wrapped headlines (or comment windows) on the same page
- keep a headline and all its subheads on the same page (space permitting)

### **To insert a page break**

1. Select the headline above which you want to insert a page break.
2. Choose Start New Page from the submenu that appears when you choose Page Breaks from the Format menu.

When you print the outline, MORE starts a new page immediately before the selected headline.

### **To clear page breaks or page break options**

1. Select a headline (or headlines) where you inserted a page break (or specified an option for keeping lines or subheads together).
2. Choose Clear Page Breaks from the Page Breaks submenu.  
MORE removes the page breaks from the selected headline.

### **To keep lines in a headline or comment window together**

1. Select a headline or comment window that contains text that you want to keep on the same page.
2. Choose Keep Lines Together from the Page Breaks submenu.

When you print the outline, MORE will keep the text on the same page (unless, of course, the text is longer than one page).

### To keep headlines together

1. Select a headline that contains subheads that you want to keep on the same page.
2. Choose Keep Outline Together from the Page Breaks submenu.

When you print the outline, MORE will keep the headline and its subheads on the same page (unless the subheads are longer than one page).

After specifying page breaks or page break options, you should preview the outline with the Print Options command.

---

## CREATING A TABLE OF CONTENTS

MORE provides a feature that lets you automatically generate tables of contents from your outlines. Use the dialog box to set the style and format of your printed table of contents pages. Choose Table of Contents from the Format menu to display the Table of Contents dialog box.

Use the Table of Contents area to specify the range of headline levels that will appear in the table of contents. Enter the number of the beginning level in the Levels entry area and an ending level number in the To entry area.

Use the Text Format area to format the text that will appear in the table of contents. The area includes pop-up menus for selecting fonts and font sizes. The font you select will be applied to the complete table of contents listing.

The Table of Contents dialog box contains the following options:

---

*Use Headline Style* Specifies that, when printed, the table of contents use the same style used for each headline in the outline. If this option is unchecked, the print style will be plain.

---

*Use Headline Color* Specifies that, when printed, the table of contents use the same color used for each headline in the outline. If this option is unchecked, MORE will print the headline in black.

---

**NOTE:** *If you have selectively applied formats (fonts, size, style, or color) within headline text, these formats automatically carry over to the table of contents, regardless of the formats you specify in the Table of Contents dialog box. Only headline formats specified by formatting rules can be modified through the dialog box.*

---

The Page Numbers area provides pop-up menus where you can select formats for displaying page numbers in your table of contents. The formats displayed in the Sections pop-up menu apply to the main listings (the first level of heads in the table of contents), and the formats displayed in the Subheads pop-up menu apply to their subordinate listings.

The Headline Layout area provides additional options for displaying outline text in a table of contents.

*Fold Headline Text* Displays only the first line of a wrapped headline in the table of contents. If this option is unchecked, all lines in wrapped headlines appear in the table of contents listing.

---

*Include Headline Labels* Includes any headline labels in the table of contents. If this option is unchecked, the table of contents does not include the labels of the listed headlines.

---

*Use Text Justification* Specifies that the table of contents use the same text justification settings as the selected headlines. If unchecked, then text is left justified.

---

*Use Outline Spacing* Specifies that the table of contents use the same outline spacing settings as the selected headlines. If unchecked, then the table of contents listing is single-spaced.

---

*Use Outline Indent* Indents the table of contents listings to the left, the same as their companion headlines. If deselected, the table of contents listings will not be indented.

---

After selecting the various settings on the Table of Contents dialog box, be sure to check the Table of Contents box in the Print Options window to turn on the printing of table of contents pages. Also check the effect of your settings in the Preview display.

.....

## **PRINTING OUTLINES**

MORE prints your outline according to the options you have set in the Print Options window and Page Setup dialog box. Print options control exactly what is printed. For example, you may choose to print only a selected portion of the outline, only expanded headlines, specific headline levels, or comments. You also use the Print Options window to set page margins and preview how your document will look when it is printed. Page setup options control paper size, page orientation, and other settings specific to your printer (or other output device). MORE retains your options settings, so you don't have to set them each time you print.

### **To print an outline**

1. Choose Print from the file menu.  
The Print dialog for your printer will appear. Click OK to print the outline with the options specified in the Print Options window.

### **To print a selected suboutline**

1. Click the parent headline to select it. (Do not use the Selection bar to select.)  
To print a selected portion of the outline, use the Selection bar to select the headlines you want to print.

**NOTE:** *To print a selected suboutline or selected portion of your outline, the Selected Outline Only print option must be turned on in the Print Options window. Otherwise, MORE prints the entire outline regardless of your selection.*

2. To change the page setup options, choose Page Setup from the File menu or click the Page Setup icon to display the Page Setup dialog box. For more information, see “Setting Print Options and Previewing,” next in this chapter.
3. After setting the options, you can print by choosing Print from the file menu or by clicking the Printer icon in the Print Options window.

## Setting Print Options and Previewing

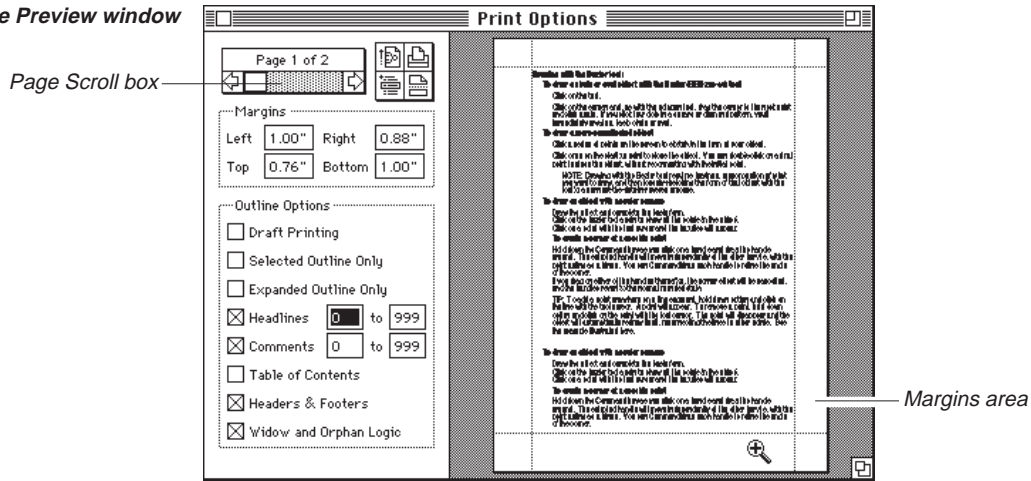
Use the Print Options window to set the page margins, preview your outline, and set print options. The print options allow you to

- print a table of contents
- print a draft copy
- specify the headline levels to be printed
- print the selected suboutline
- print only expanded headlines and comments
- print headers and footers
- prevent a page break from occurring after the first line or before the last line of a multiple-line headline or comment

When you choose Print Options from the File menu, a preview of your outline appears in the Print Options window (shown in the following illustration). When you move the pointer over the preview, it changes to a magnifying glass (shown in the margin.) To magnify a portion of the outline, position the magnifying glass over the section you want to enlarge, and click. To see a part of the outline that is out of view, hold down the **W** key to display the grabber hand (shown in the margin), then drag to scroll through the outline. Clicking anywhere on the Preview area returns you to the normal view.



The Preview window

**Page Scroll box**

Indicates the page number currently displayed in the Preview area and the total number of pages that will be printed. Use the scroll bar to scroll the pages in the Preview area of the window.

**Page Setup icon**

Displays the Page Setup dialog box.

**Printer icon**

Displays the Print dialog box.

**“Go To” Headline icon**

Allows you to go to any headline in your document. Click the “Go To” Headline icon and use the pointer to click the headline in the Print Options window that you want to go to in your document.

**Page Break icon**

Allows you to insert a page break in your outline. Click the Page Break icon, then select the headline that you want to appear on a new page. You also use the same method to remove a page break from the first headline on a page.

*Margins* Use the entry boxes to specify the left, right, top, and bottom page margins for the outline. Type the values you want in the margin boxes. Margins can be specified in inches, pixels, or centimeters. You choose the unit of measurement in the Document Options dialog box (see “Setting Document Options” in Chapter 1).

---

The Print Options dialog box has the following options for printing outlines:

*Draft Printing* Prints the outline in black and white. When Draft Printing is selected, MORE prints colored text as black. However, inserted graphics return to their color.

---

*Selected Outline Only* Prints only the selected headline and its suboutline. If headlines are selected with the Selection bar, only those headlines will print. Deselect this option to print the entire outline (or hoisted outline).

---

*Expanded Only* Prints only expanded (displayed) headlines and comment windows. Deselect this option to print both expanded and collapsed (hidden) headlines and comment windows.

---

*Headlines* Lets you specify the subhead levels you want to print. You can type the range of levels in the text boxes (pressing Tab moves the insertion point to the next text box), or you can click in the area to the left of each text box and choose a range from the pop-up menu that appears. Deselect the Headlines option to omit all headlines from the printout.

---

*Comments* Lets you specify the level of the Comments you want to print. You can type the range of levels in the text boxes (pressing Tab moves the insertion point to the next text box), or you can press in the area to the left of each text box and choose a range from the pop-up menu that appears. If you do not want to print comments, deselect this option.

---

*Table of Contents* Prints the table of contents. The table of contents will print with the format and layout you have specified in the Table of Contents dialog box. The table of contents appears at the end of the outline in the Print Options window.

<i>Headers &amp; Footers</i>	Prints headers and footers. Headers and footers will print as specified in the Header/Footer window.
<i>Widow and Orphan Logic</i>	Prevents a page break from occurring after the first line or before the last line of a multiple-line headline or comment. (The option also prevents a page break before the first subhead of a one- or two-line headline or before the last headline in a series of one- or two-line headlines.) Deselect this option if you do not care where page breaks occur and you want as many lines as possible to print on the page.

---

### To preview an outline

1. Choose Print Options from the File menu.  
The outline appears in the Print Options window.
2. Set the page margins and print options you want.  
The Print Options window changes to show how the printed outline will appear with the options and margins you have set.
3. Change the page setup options, if necessary. For more information, see “Changing Page Setup,” later in this chapter.  
If you changed page setup options, the Print Options window shows how the printed outline will appear with the new settings.
4. When you are ready to print, click the Printer icon in the Preview dialog box, or choose the Print command from the File menu.  
A dialog box appears for the printer you are using.
5. Specify the options you want and click OK.









### To go to a selected headline in the outline

1. Click the “Go To” Headline icon.  
The pointer changes to a horizontal arrow.
2. Click on the headline you want to find in the outline.  
MORE displays the outline and automatically selects the headline.



### To insert a page break

1. Click the Page Break icon.  
The pointer changes to a horizontal arrow.
2. Click on the headline you want to appear on a new page.  
A page break is inserted above the headline. The Print Options window changes to show the current page content.

---

## Changing Page Setup

Before printing, you can specify the page setup options you want, such as paper size, orientation of your printed outline, and any special printer effects, such as smoothing or font substitution. The options that are available will vary depending on the printing device and system software version you are using.

### To change page setup options



- Choose Page Setup from the File Menu (or click the Page Setup icon in the Print Options window).  
MORE displays the Page Setup dialog box for your printing device. For more information about page setup options, refer to the user's guide that accompanies your printing device.

# CHAPTER 3

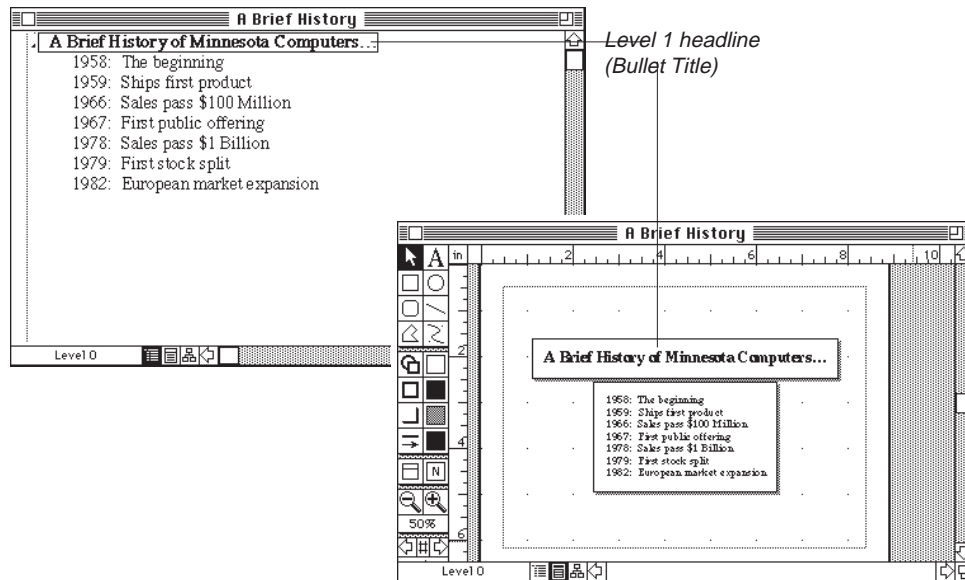
## USING BULLET CHARTS

This chapter provides detailed information on creating and managing bullet charts in MORE.

A bullet chart is another way of viewing and presenting information organized in an outline. After you structure your information in Outline view, you can switch to Bullet Chart view where your information is instantly transformed into a series of bullet charts. These charts can then be styled and enhanced with graphics and color.

In Bullet Chart view, MORE displays the entire (hoisted) outline as a series of charts where each parent headline appears as a chart title, and its subheads are displayed as bulleted subheads.

Initially, the chart series includes one chart for the summit of the outline—the Home headline and a bulleted list of first level headlines—and additional charts for each of the first level headlines and their subheads (if any).



## BULLET CHART FEATURES

MORE provides a variety of features for creating sophisticated bullet charts:

- **Drawing tools**  
MORE provides a powerful set of object-oriented drawing tools for adding and manipulating graphics in charts.
- **Advanced styling tools**  
MORE provides advanced styling tools for customizing your charts. You can add special edges to objects and even create shadow effects. MORE also provides color palettes and pattern editors for creating your own custom patterns and gradient fills.
- **Master Chart**  
MORE provides a Master Chart where you can place objects and specify formatting options that will appear on each chart in a series. You can suppress the display of Master Chart elements on any individual chart.
- **Slide Show**  
MORE provides special commands for creating a dramatic presentation of charts as slides. A control panel lets you time presentations, and a variety of special effects are available including transitions and text builds. MORE also supports multiple-monitor presentations.
- **Speaker's Notes**  
You can associate a speaker's note with each chart. These notes can be displayed on the speaker's monitor (if you are using multiple monitors) or printed with your slides in a variety of formats for audience handouts. Use speaker's notes to store reminders, prompts, quotes, statistics, or anecdotes.

.....

## CREATING BULLET CHARTS

You can readily create a series of bullet charts from any MORE outline or any portion of an outline. MORE creates the bullet charts automatically when you switch from Outline view or Tree Chart view.

Before switching to Bullet Chart view, first organize and structure the information in Outline view. When you switch to Bullet Chart view, MORE displays a chart for the currently selected headline, but charts for all the outline headlines are available for viewing. For more information on creating and modifying MORE outlines, see Chapter 2.

**To switch to Bullet Chart view**

- Choose Bullet Chart from the Outline menu when you are using Outline view, or from the Tree menu when you are using Tree Chart view.

or

- Press W-I.

or

- Click the Bullet Chart icon on the status line.

MORE displays the currently selected headline in the form of a chart. The parent headline appears as the chart *title*, and its subheads are displayed as bulleted *subheads*. By default, MORE displays up to six subheads per chart, then continues the subheads on a continuation chart where the title is duplicated. See “Specifying Continuation Charts” later in this chapter for more information on creating custom continuation charts.



*To view a subset of headlines in Bullet Chart view, hold down the Option key while clicking the Bullet Chart icon or choosing the Bullet Chart from the Outline menu. MORE displays only the selected suboutline in bullet charts.*

**To switch back to Outline view**

- Choose Outline View from the Bullet menu.

or

- Press W-I.

or

- Click the Outline icon on the status line.

If your outline has graphics, they will also appear in their corresponding bullet charts. The same is true for text in comment windows. The following illustration shows some of the elements of a bullet chart.

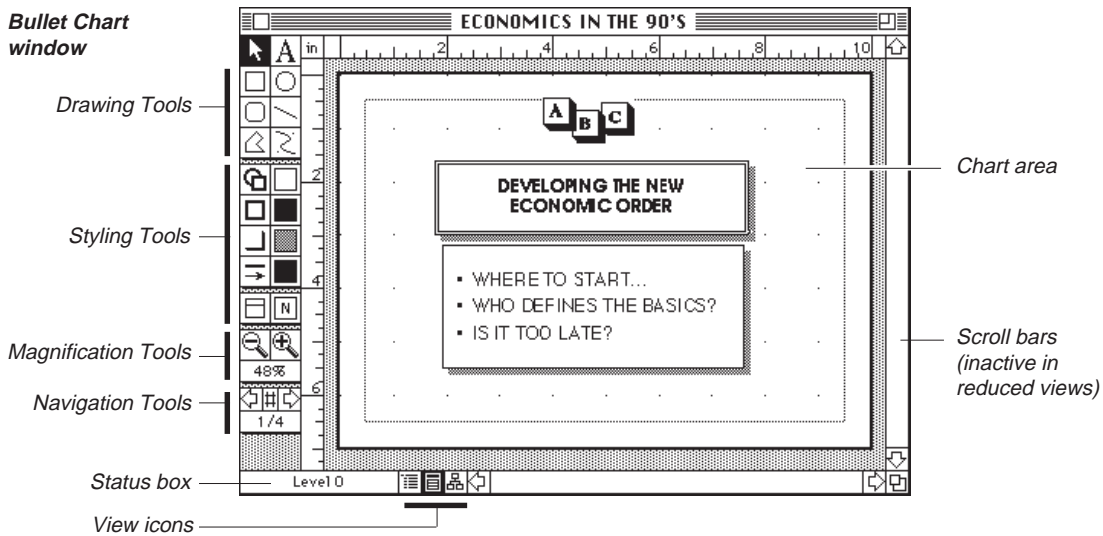
As you switch back and forth between Bullet Chart and Outline views, MORE retains your position in the chart sequence. This feature allows you to quickly switch between the two views when you need to edit or reorganize your outline material.

## THE BULLET CHART WINDOW

The Bullet Chart window is where you manage and modify your bullet charts. The window provides

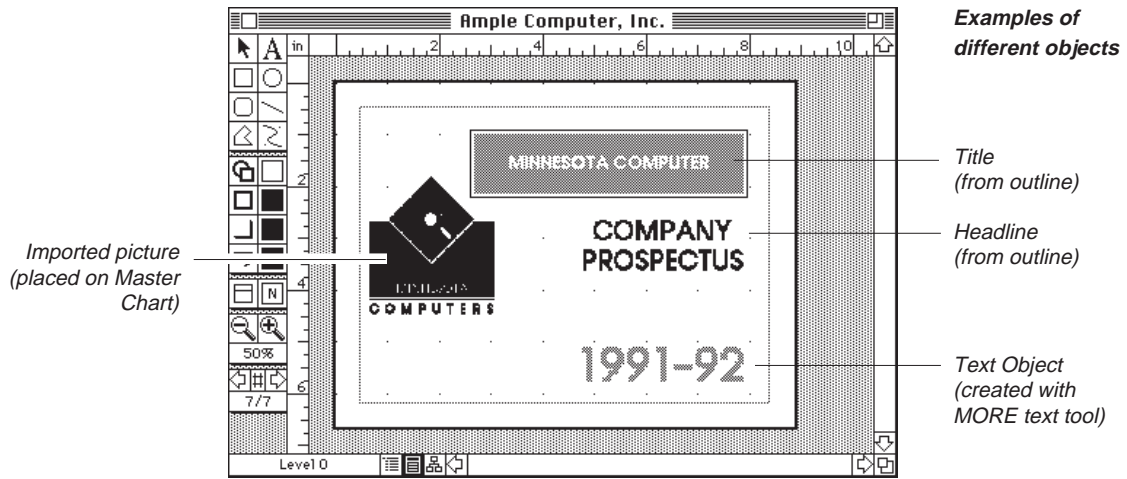
- a palette of tools for creating and modifying bullet chart objects
- a grid, a pair of rulers, and positioning guides for aligning objects on the chart
- View icons that you can use to switch between the MORE views. (Click an icon to switch the view.)

The following illustration shows the various elements of a Bullet Chart window:



In a Bullet Chart window, you modify the appearance of charts by manipulating objects. In bullet charts, there are two basic types of objects:

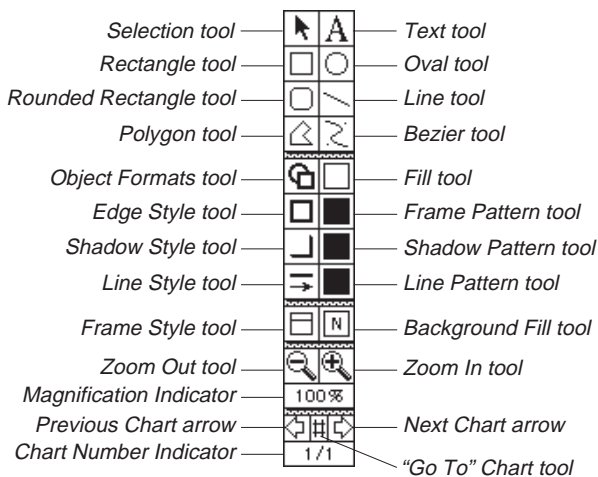
- Objects that you create directly in the bullets charts with palette tools, or place in the chart; these objects can include graphics or text pasted from the Clipboard.
- Objects created automatically by MORE, including text from the underlying outline and the frames that enclose outline text.



**THE BULLET CHART TOOL PALETTE**

On the left side of the Bullet Chart window, the Bullet Chart palette provides five sets of tools for drawing, modifying, and managing bullet chart objects:

- drawing tools for creating and editing chart objects
- styling tools for changing the general appearance of the chart
- fill and pattern tools for applying fills, patterns, and shadows to chart objects
- magnification tools for zooming in and out of chart views
- navigation tools for moving between the charts and the Master Chart

## THE BULLET CHART TOOLS

---

*Selection Tool* Use the Selection tool to select objects you want to drag, size, style, copy, cut, and delete. To select an object, first click the selection tool, then click the object.



*Text Tool* Use the Text tool to create new caption text objects or to edit existing text on your bullet charts. When you choose the text tool to create a new text object, you may specify a width by dragging before you begin typing, otherwise, the new object's width will be automatically adjusted to the width of the text it contains. When you edit Title, Subhead, or Comment text objects, the corresponding outline material is changed, too.



*Rectangle Tool* Use the Rectangle tool to create rectangles in your chart. After you create a rectangle, you can use the styling tools to modify its border, change the fill within the rectangle, or add a shadow behind the object. For more information, see "Drawing Rectangles," later in this chapter.



*Rounded Rectangle Tool* Use the Rounded Rectangle tool to create rectangles in your chart. After you create a rectangle, you can use the styling tools to modify its border, change the fill within the rectangle, or add a shadow behind the object. For more information, see "Drawing Rectangles," later in this chapter.



*Oval Tool* Use the Oval tool to create circles and ovals in bullet charts. After you create a circle or an oval, you can use the styling tools to modify its border, specify a fill pattern, or add a shadow to the object. For more information, see "Drawing Ovals," later in this chapter.



*Line Tool* Use the Line tool to draw lines in bullet charts. After you draw a line, you can use the styling tools to modify line thickness, specify a line pattern or color, select a line ending shape, or add a shadow to the object. For more information, see "Drawing Lines," later in this chapter.





*Polygon Tool*



Use the Polygon tool to draw polygons of any shape in a chart. After you create a polygon, you can use the styling tools to modify its border, change the polygon fill, or add a shadow to the object. For more information, see “Drawing Polygons,” later in this chapter.

---

*Bezier Tool*



Use the Bezier tool to draw Bezier curves in a chart. You can create Bezier curves that are either open or closed. After you create a Bezier object, you can use the styling tools to modify its border, change the object fill, or add a shadow to the object. For more information, see “Drawing Bezier Curves,” later in this chapter.

---

*Object Formats Tool*



Use the Object Formats tool to quickly apply multiple styles to selected objects or set text object size and standoff without having to choose successive styling tools from the palette or choosing Text Layout from the Draw menu.

---

*Fill Tool*



Use the Fill tool to specify a fill pattern or color for the interiors of bullet chart objects. Pressing the Fill tool displays a pop-up menu of patterns (which can also contain solid colors and gradients). For more information on using the Fill tool, see “Applying Fills,” later in this chapter.

---

*Edge Style Tool*



Use the Edge Style tool to specify a style for the edges of objects. Pressing the Edge Style tool displays a pop-up menu of line widths and border styles. For more information on using the Edge Style tool, see “Changing Edge Styles,” later in this chapter.

---

*Edge Pattern Tool*



Use the Edge Pattern tool to specify a pattern for the edges of objects. Pressing the Edge Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available patterns. For more information on using the Edge Pattern tool, see “Changing Edge Patterns,” later in this chapter.

---

*Shadow Style Tool*



Use the Shadow Style tool to add shadows to objects. Pressing the Shadow Style tool displays a pop-up menu of available shadow styles. Choose None to remove a shadow from selected objects. After you apply a shadow to an object, you can modify the shadow with the Shadow Pattern tool. For more information about using the Shadow Style tool, see “Adding Shadows,” later in this chapter.

**Shadow Pattern Tool** Use the Shadow Pattern tool to modify the pattern or color of an object's shadow. Pressing the Shadow Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available patterns or colors. For more information about using the Shadow Fill tool, see "Changing Shadow Patterns," later in this chapter.



**Line Style Tool** Use the Line Style tool to specify line widths and apply shapes to the endings of lines drawn with the Line tool. Pressing the Line Style tool displays a pop-up menu of different line weights and line endings. For more information about using the Line Style tool, see "Changing Line Styles," later in this chapter.



**Line Pattern Tool** Use the Line Pattern tool to modify the pattern or color of an object's shadow. Pressing the Line Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available patterns or colors. For more information about using the Line Pattern tool, see "Changing Line Patterns," later in this chapter.



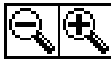
**Frame Style Tool** Use the Frame Style tool to specify a style for framing text from the underlying outline. Pressing the Frame Style tool displays a pop-up menu of frame styles.



**Background Pattern Tool** Use the Background Pattern tool to apply a pattern to the drawing area that serves as a backdrop for all the chart objects. When you press the Background Pattern tool, MORE displays a pop-up menu of patterns and gradients. The palette that appears in the pop-up menu can be modified to fit your needs.



**Magnification tools** Use these tools to specify a magnification level or to view the current chart magnification level. Use the Zoom in or Zoom Out tools to zoom in or out of charts. The Magnification Indicator displays the current level of magnification and provides a pop-up menu where you can specify a new magnification level. For more information, see "Zooming In and Out," later in this chapter.



**Previous and Next Chart arrows** Use either the Previous or Next Chart arrow tools to move backwards or forwards through a series of charts.

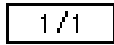


*“Go To” Chart tool* Click the “Go To” Chart tool icon to display a dialog box where you can select a specific chart for display.



---

*Navigation Indicator* The Navigation Indicator displays the number of the current chart in the chart sequence; press the indicator to display a pop-up menu where you can search for a chart by text, go to a specific chart in the series, or go to the Master Chart.



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## **MANAGING BULLET CHARTS**

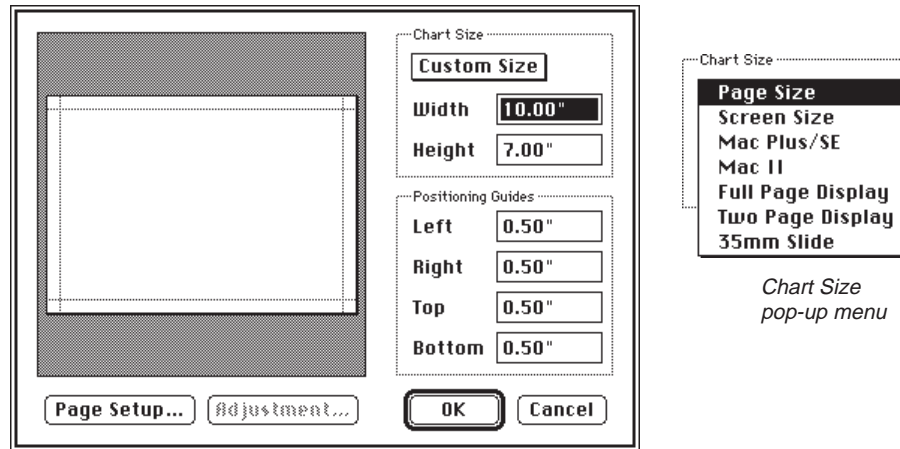
This section provides detailed information on managing your bullet charts. It provides instructions for

- Setting chart size
- Choosing frames styles for displaying outline text
- Zooming in and out of chart views
- Navigating a series of charts
- Specifying continuation charts
- Using draw rulers and grids
- Using Master Charts to establish global settings and set permanent objects

### **Setting Chart Size**

MORE provides a Chart Size dialog box where you can specify the boundaries of the chart and set positioning guides for aligning objects in the drawing area. You should always set the chart size before adding objects and modifying chart contents. The Chart Size dialog box appears when you choose Chart Size from the Bullet menu.

**Chart Size dialog box**



The dialog box also contains a preview of your chart. Click anywhere in the Preview area to view a close-up of the selected area. Click again to return to the regular preview size. You can also drag the positioning guides of the preview; MORE updates the values in the margin fields accordingly. Setting the chart size affects all the charts in the presentation.

Click the Magnifying Glass icon to zoom in on a specific area of the chart. Click again to zoom back out.

The Chart Size area contains a pop-up menu for specifying the chart boundaries as well as fields for entering dimensions that differ from the options that appear in the pop-up menu. When you first display a bullet chart, MORE's preset option on the Size pop-up menu label is the size of the monitor screen you're currently using. Depending on the requirements for your presentation, you can choose any of the following settings from the pop-up menu:

- Page Size
- Screen Size (the size of the screen that the chart is currently displayed on)
- Mac Plus Screen
- Mac II Screen
- Full Page Display (tall monitors)
- Two Page Display (wide monitors)
- 35mm Slide

If you open a bullet chart that was created for a different size screen display, MORE retains those original dimensions. When you choose a setting from the Chart Size pop-up menu, MORE automatically realigns the preview and displays the corresponding values in the width and height boxes.

*Page Setup* Displays the Page Setup dialog box where you can specify the page setup options you want, such as paper size, orientation of your printed charts, and any special printer effects, such as smoothing or font substitution.

---

*Adjustment* Displays the Adjustment dialog box where you can specify that MORE adjust the size and position of chart objects to conform to new chart sizes. The Adjustment dialog box automatically appears if you choose a different display area from the pop-up menu and click OK.

---

*Width Field* Enter a value in the Width field if you want a chart width different from the preset values that correspond to the choices in the pop-up menu. For example, you may want to specify small margins for a chart that will include corporate logos or pictures.

---

*Height Field* Enter a value in the Height field if you want a chart height different from the preset values that correspond to the pop-up menu choices.

---

*Positioning Guides* The Positioning Guides area provides entry fields for specifying the position of the guides that are used to align chart objects. (You can also drag the guides to new locations.)

---

**To set chart size**

1. Choose Chart Size from the Bullet menu to display the Chart Size dialog box.
2. Choose a new chart size from the pop-up menu or enter height and width in the provided fields to specify dimensions that aren't available as menu choices.
3. If necessary, enter new values for the positioning guides in the provided fields (or drag the guides to their new locations).
4. Click OK.

If you specified a new chart size, MORE displays the Adjustment dialog box.

**Adjustment  
dialog box**



5. Click Position Only to only adjust the position of objects to fit the new display area.

or

Click Position and Size to adjust both the position and size of objects to conform to the new chart size. If you select this option, you can also click Maintain Proportion to specify that the proportions of the chart objects remain the same if they are resized.

or

Click No Adjustment to specify that the position and size of chart objects remain unchanged in different chart sizes.

6. Click OK to accept the new chart size and any adjustment settings.

The new chart size affects *all* the charts in the presentation, not just the current chart.

**TIP** Use the Adjustment button to preview how each option will affect the current chart.

### To set up bullet charts for 35mm slides (film recorder)

1. Select the film recorder device from the Chooser in the Apple menu.
2. Choose Chart Size from the Bullet menu to display the Chart Size dialog box and then select "35 mm Slide" from the Page Size pop-up menu.
3. Click Page Setup in the Chart Size dialog box and select whatever options are available from the device driver. Set all margins to zero.

4. If required, use the Positioning Guides text boxes to create alignment guides on all four sides of the chart.

**NOTE:** *If you are making slides with a method other than a device available through the Chooser, specify a custom chart size with a width:height ratio of 3:2 (for example, a width of 9 inches and a height of 6 inches), or choose 35mm from the pop-up menu of standard sizes.*

You should also use this procedure to prepare for exporting PICT files for eventual printing as 35mm slides.

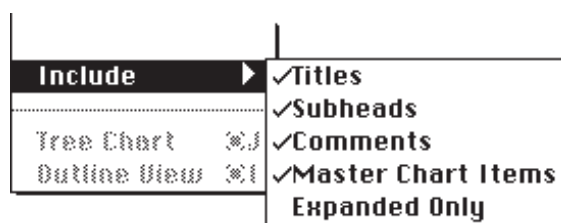
## Specifying Outline Elements

MORE provides an Include submenu on the Bullet menu that you can use to control the display of bullet chart elements incorporated from the underlying outline or from the Master Chart. A check next to a menu item means that element will be displayed in the current chart if it exists in the outline.

Use the Include submenu to specify the display of elements on

- the currently displayed chart
- all the charts in a series (by choosing an Include option when the Master Chart is displayed)

You can also control the display of elements on a series of charts through the Rules window. For more information see “Using Rules,” in Chapter 5.



*Include submenu*

---

*Titles*            Displays the outline’s companion headline as a chart title.

---

*Subheads*        Displays the outline’s subheads as a block distinct from the chart title.

---

*Comments*        Displays the contents of comment windows on the chart.

---

**NOTE:** Deleting a title, subhead, or comment from a chart is equivalent to deselecting the corresponding Include menu item. You can recall any of these deleted outline objects by choosing the appropriate Include menu item.

---

**Master Chart Items** Displays all objects other than outline objects from the Master Chart. You can suppress the display of Master Chart items by removing the check from the menu item.

---

**Expanded Only** Displays only expanded material in the outline as charts. If you choose this option, MORE excludes collapsed subheadlines and comments from the chart.

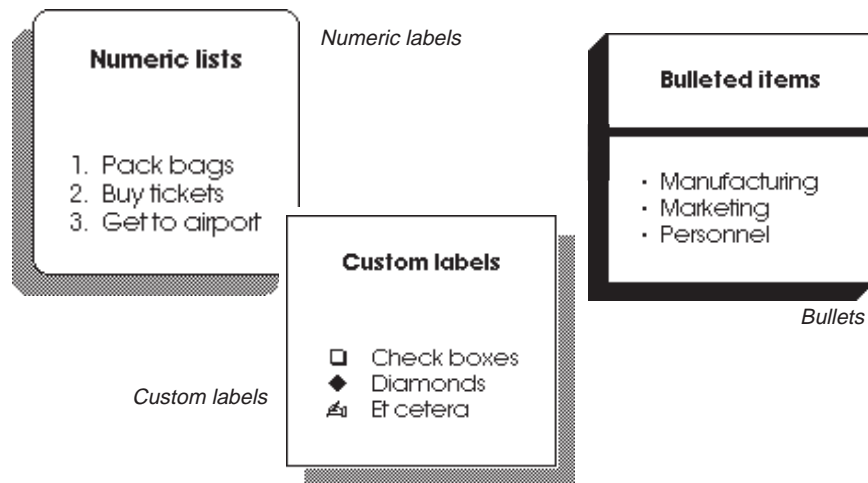
---

### Labeling Bullet Chart Items

As in Outline view, you can apply different kinds of labels to titles and subheads in a series of charts. You change the label style by first selecting the title and/or subheads on the bullet chart, then using the Labeling submenu in the Format menu to specify a label style. To apply a global label style, display the Master Chart and apply the label styles you want to use. For a detailed description of available label styles, see “Selecting Label Styles” in Chapter 2.

You can also change bullet chart label styles through the Rules window. For more information, see “Using Rules,” in Chapter 5.

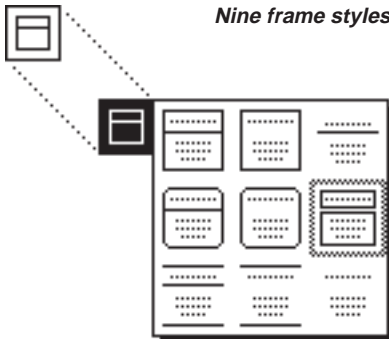
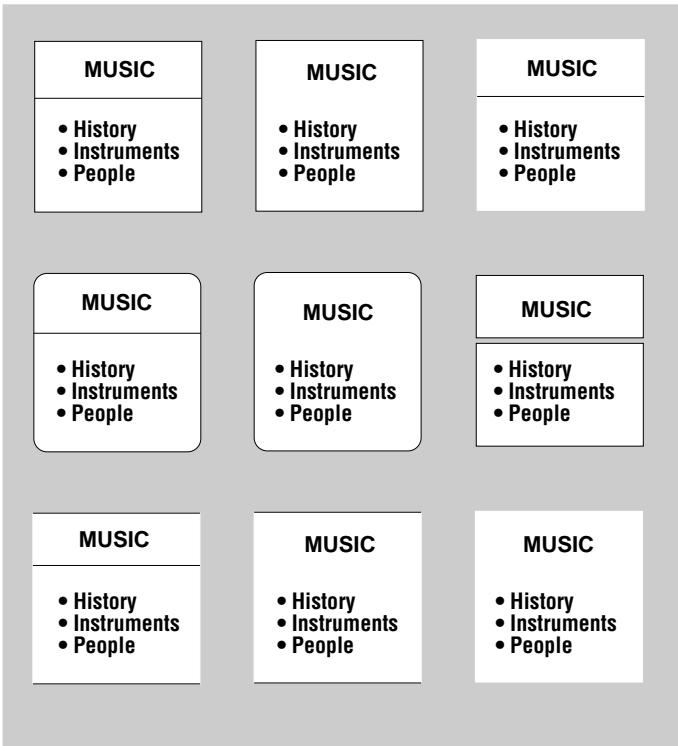
**Different label styles in a bullet chart**





### Choosing a Frame Style

MORE provides *frames*, special borders drawn around outline objects (titles, subheads, and comments) that appear in a chart. MORE lets you specify one of nine preset frame styles that help provide a polished, consistent appearance to your charts. You do not have to resize frames to accommodate outline text; when you select a frame style, MORE draws the frame, automatically adjusting its dimensions to fit the size of the outline objects. The nine frame styles are shown below:

You can change frame styles on individual charts, or use the Master Chart to apply a global frame style to the bullet chart series.

**To choose a frame style**

1. Hold down the Frame Style tool to display a pop-up menu of the chart frame styles.
2. Then drag to the desired style and release the mouse button to choose the new frame style for the currently displayed chart.

Frames automatically adjust to accommodate the text from the outline.

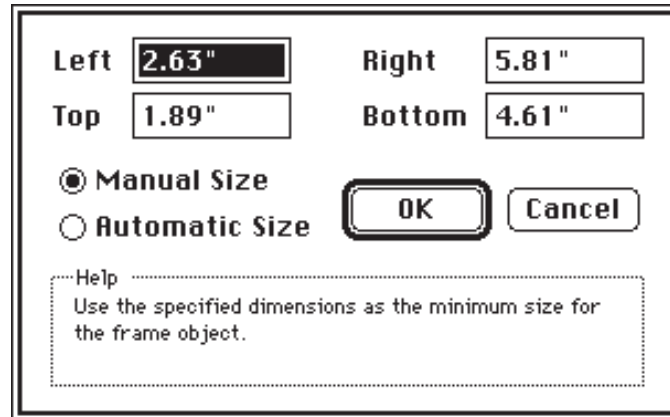
To display outline objects as individual objects, choose the frame style which shows two separate text blocks.

To display outline objects without visible frames while retaining the ability to apply fills and shadows to the framed area, choose the frame style with no edges or underline.

After you specify a frame style, you can use the Edge Style tool and the Edge Pattern tool to modify the appearance of frame edges. Use the Fill tool to apply a fill to the inside of the chart frame. (Outline text always appears in front of the fill.)

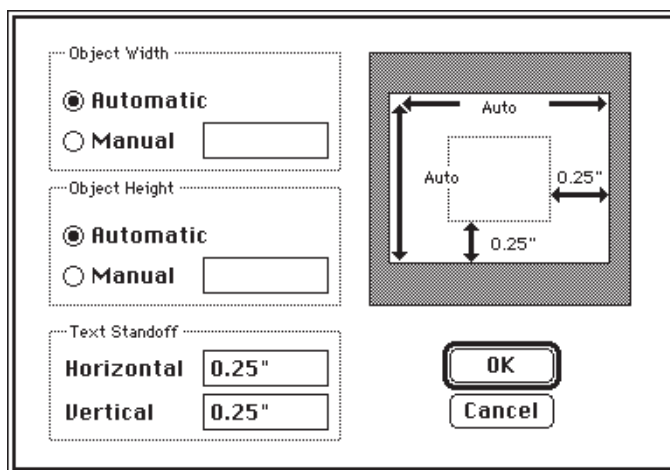
While you can manually resize frames, MORE retains the ability to automatically resize a frame so that outline objects remain enclosed. See "Resizing Frames" later in this chapter for more information on resizing frames.

## Setting Text Object Size and Standoff

When you switch to Bullet Chart view, MORE automatically sets text object sizes to the widest line of text within the object (captions, framed outline text). You can, however, turn off the automatic settings through the Text Layout dialog box and manually specify the height and width for a text object as well as the object's standoff—the distance between the text and the edges of the object that contains it. (Resizing a text object directly on the chart also establishes a manual size.)

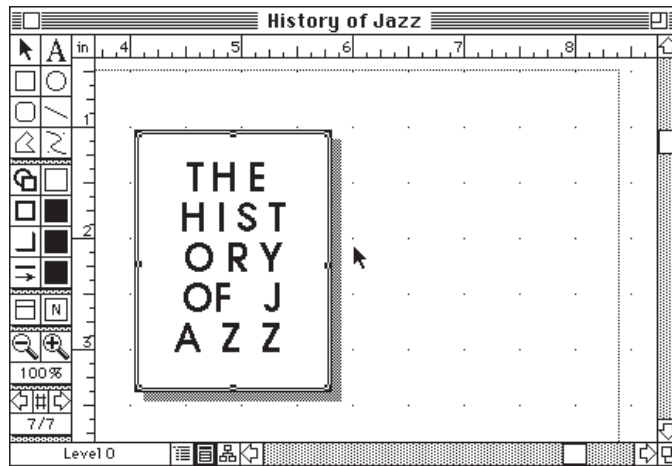


*Text Layout dialog box*

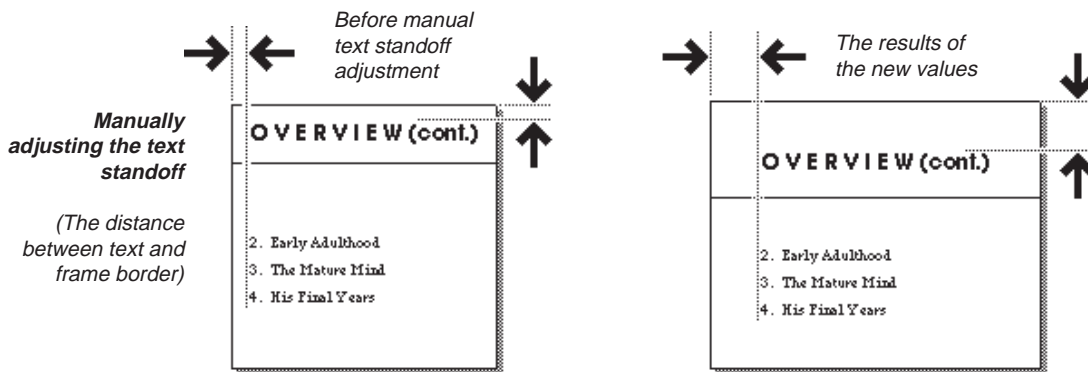
### To display the Text Layout dialog box

- Select a text object and choose Text Layout from the Draw menu.  
or  
Press the Object Formats tool and choose Text Layout from the pop-up menu.  
or  
Double-click a text object in the bullet chart.

**The effect of setting a fixed width in framed text**



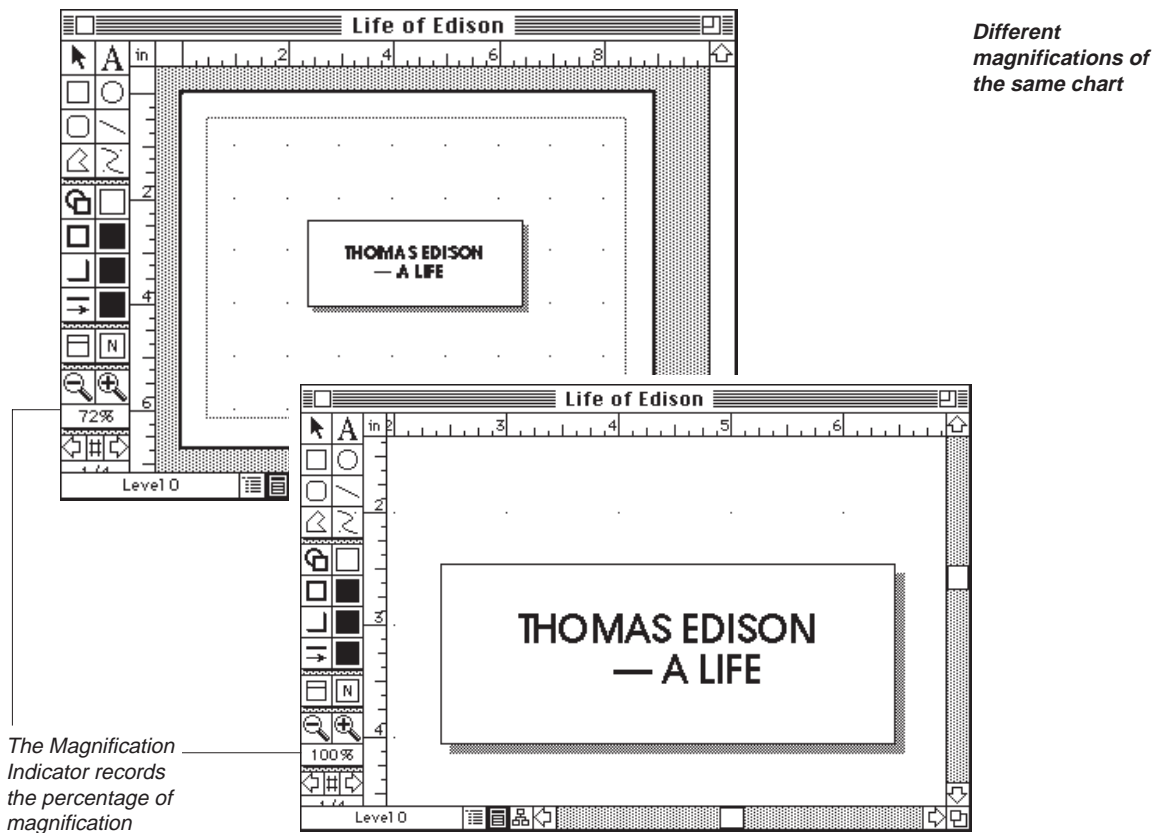
Click Manual in either the Object Width or the Object Height text box to specify a fixed width or height for an object. (Typing a number in one of the text boxes also selects the Manual option.) If you enter a width in the Object Width field, MORE wraps the text to fit the specified width and adjusts the height of the object accordingly. Here's an example:



If the height you specify for the object is less than the height of the text, MORE will not clip the text within the object. MORE also lets you specify text standoff—the distance between the edges of the text and the sides of the text object. To set text standoff, enter horizontal and vertical standoffs (in inches) in the Text Standoff fields. If you are using automatic sizing, MORE adjusts the dimensions of the object to provide the new standoff between the text and the edges of the frame.

## Zooming In and Zooming Out

As you work in the Bullet Chart view, you can use the magnification tools to change your view of the current chart. Click one of the zoom tools to enlarge or reduce the display by one level of magnification, or use the Magnification Display tool to choose a specific level of magnification.



### To zoom in on a bullet chart

- Click the location on the bullet chart that you want to magnify and click the Zoom In tool.
- or
- Choose a magnification scale from the pop-up menu that appears when you press the Magnification Indicator.

**NOTE:** "Choosing Reduce to Fit" lets you base the magnification on the size of the window. If you resize the window, the magnification will automatically adjust.

**To zoom out from a bullet chart**

- Click the Zoom Out tool.  
or
- Choose a magnification scale from the pop-up menu that appears when you press the Magnification Indicator.

The actual dimensions of the chart depends on your Chart Size settings. For more information on setting chart size, see “Setting Chart Size,” earlier in this chapter.

.....

**Navigating Bullet Charts**

MORE provides a number of options for navigating through a series of bullet charts. The Chart Number Indicator always displays the number of the currently displayed chart and the number of charts in the current series.

**To move through a series of charts**

- Click the Previous Chart or Next Chart icons in the palette  
or  
Press the left arrow or right arrow key on your keyboard  
or  
Choose Next Chart or Previous Chart from the Bullet menu  
or  
Press Return (forward) or Shift-Return (back)



*Display the first or last chart in a series by holding down the Option key and choosing First Chart or Last Chart from the Bullet menu.*

**To go to a specific chart**

1. Click the “Go To” icon in the bullet window palette  
or  
Press the Navigation Indicator and choose “Go to Chart” from the pop-up menu that appears.

MORE displays a dialog box that identifies the number of the current chart and prompts you for a new chart number.



*Shift-\* (asterisk) will bring up the “Go to Chart” dialog. Simply enter the chart number you wish to go to and click OK.*

2. Enter the number of the chart you want to display and click OK.

MORE displays the specified chart.

### **To find a chart with a search string**

1. Press the Navigation Indicator to display the pop-up menu and choose Find Chart.

MORE displays a dialog box where you can enter outline text contained in the chart that you want to find.

or

Choose Search from the Edit menu to display the Search dialog box.

2. Enter the search string and click OK.

MORE displays the first chart it finds in the current series that contains the string. If the text is not located, a message appears.

If you are searching for text with the Search dialog box, you can use the expanded search options available through the Search window, including the substitution of found strings with a new text string. For more information on searching and modifying text, see “Searching and Changing Text” in Chapter 2.

.....

### **Checking Spelling in Charts**

You can use MORE’s spelling checker to find and correct misspelled words in bullet charts. To check spelling, choose Check Spelling from the Edit menu and select options in the Spelling window. For a detailed discussion of the spell checker, see “Checking Spelling” in Chapter 2.

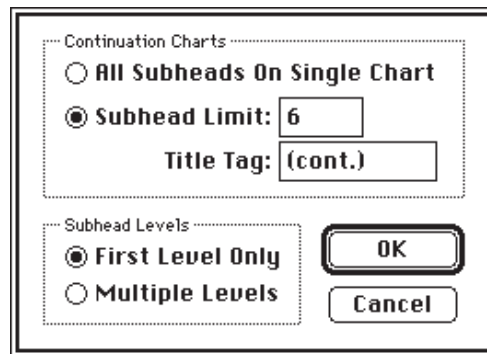
## Specifying Continuation Charts

The Subheads command lets you specify the number of subheads that can appear below a title in a chart. When there are more than the specified number of subheads beneath a title, MORE automatically creates the required number of continuation charts where the title is duplicated and the subheads continue.

### To specify a continuation chart

1. Display the chart you want to present as multiple charts.
2. Choose Subheads from the Bullet menu.  
MORE displays the Subheads dialog box.

**Subheads  
dialog box**

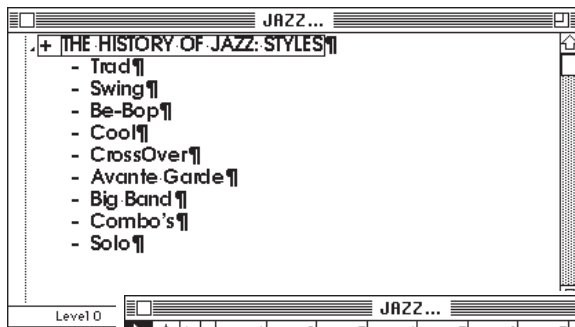


3. Click Subheads Limit and type the number of subheads that you want to display on each continuation chart.
4. Type any text in the Title Tag field that you want to append to the title of each continuation chart (the default is **(cont.)**).
5. Click OK.

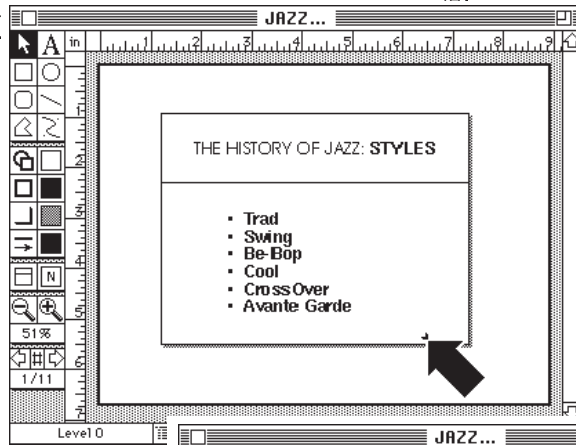
MORE breaks the chart into multiple charts—the number of continuation charts is determined by the number of subheads beneath the title and the levels of subheads displayed. All but the last chart in a continuation series displays an arrow to indicate that a continuation chart follows.

Any graphic elements that were present in the original chart also appear in the continuation charts. Also, MORE uses the same title for each continuation chart (the underlying outline is unaffected).



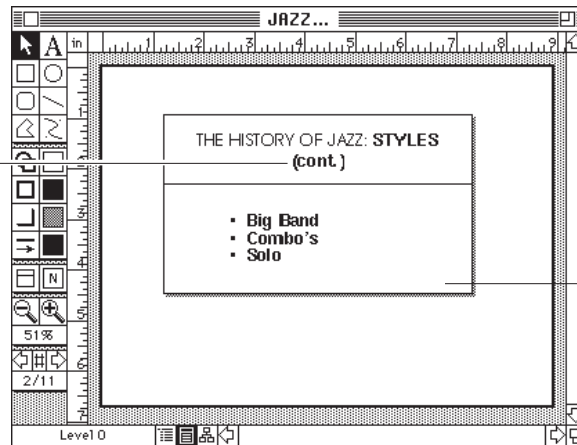


*Original outline and resulting continuation bullet charts*

**NOTE:** You can specify continuation charts for all the charts by displaying the Master Chart, then choosing Subheads. The subhead limit and title tag specified in this manner will apply to all charts.

If you are using continuation charts, any design change you make to one chart in the continuation series also affects the other charts in the series—much in the same way that a change to a cloned headline also modifies its counterpart clones.

**TIP** To bypass the Subheads dialog box and directly specify the display of multiple levels in continuation charts, hold down the Option key and choose Multiple Levels from the Bullet menu.

## Adding a New Chart

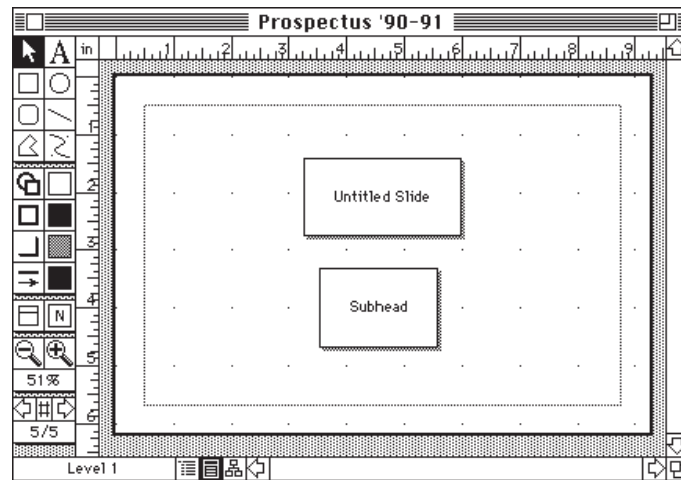
You may want to add an empty slide to a series of bullet charts to provide an area for displaying a large graphic element, or you may want to quickly add a new headline and subheads to your outline without leaving Bullet Chart view.

### To insert an empty chart

1. Display the chart that you want to place the new chart after.
2. Choose Add New Chart from the Bullet menu.

MORE adds a new chart to the series and displays placeholders for the new headline and its subhead.

*New chart with placeholders*



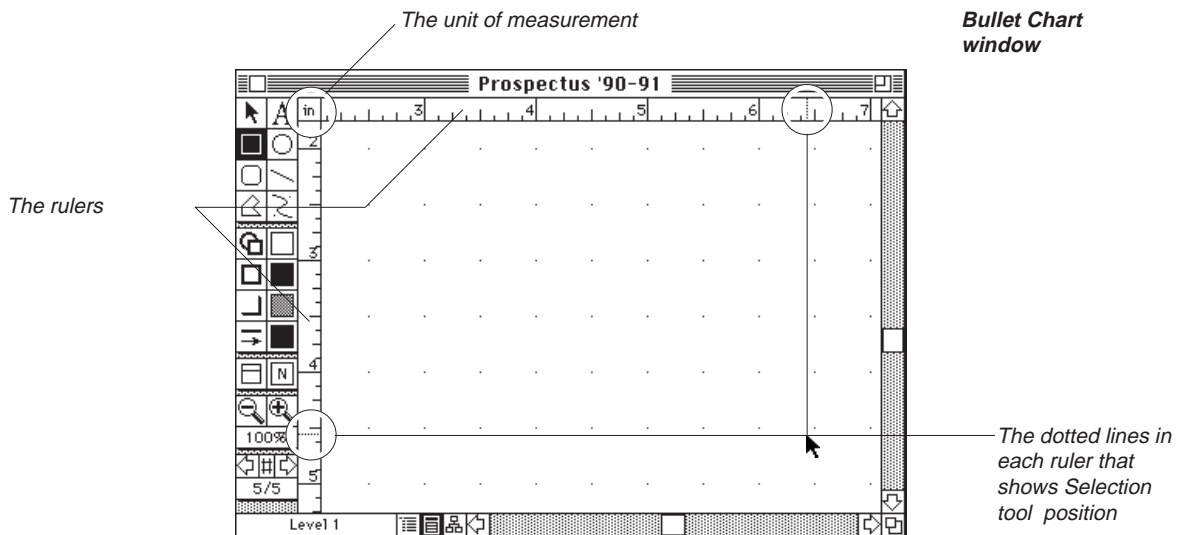
After you create the empty chart you can treat the chart as if it were any other chart in the series; you can edit placeholder text, draw objects, or paste graphics into it.

If you want an empty chart to display a large graphic such as a map or a tree chart copied from Tree Chart view, you can remove all the objects from the new chart (with the Include commands or by selecting them and pressing Delete) and paste in the desired graphic. If you do remove objects from a new chart, the underlying outline is unaffected. (You may want to type some text in the title before removing it so that you can identify the chart from Outline view.)

## USING GRIDS AND RULERS

The Bullet Chart window provides a set of rulers and a grid to help you position and align objects. There are two rulers: a horizontal ruler across the top of the window and a vertical ruler down the left edge. A dotted line in each draw ruler shows the current position of the Selection tool in the bullet chart. The grid is displayed as a matrix of dots. You can automatically align a selected object with the nearest grid point by choosing the “Snap to Grid” command on the Draw menu. If the Auto Grid Snap command is checked in the Draw menu, MORE automatically aligns *all* subsequently drawn objects to the nearest grid point.

You can set the unit of measure used in the rulers and grid to inches, pixels, or centimeters. In addition, you can specify the density of the dots on the grid. The rulers and grid can also be hidden from view while remaining active.



### To hide or show the draw ruler

- Choose Hide Draw Ruler or Show Draw Ruler from the Draw menu. (This command changes depending on whether the draw ruler is currently hidden or displayed.)

### To hide or show the grid

- Choose Hide Grid or Show Grid from the Grid submenu in the Draw menu. (This command changes depending on whether the grid is currently hidden or displayed.)

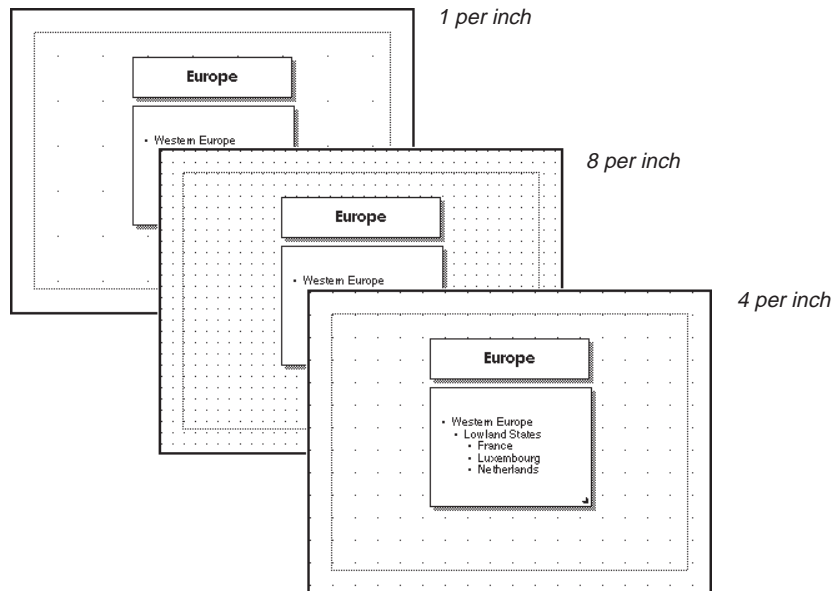
### To set the unit of measurement

1. Choose Document Options from the File menu.  
or  
Double-click the corner where the horizontal and vertical rulers intersect.  
or  
Double-click the currently highlighted View icon displayed at the bottom of the Bullet Chart window.  
MORE displays the Document Options dialog box.
2. In the dialog box, select the unit of measure from the Units pop-up menu and click OK.  
When you display rulers in the Bullet Chart view, MORE displays the current unit of measurement at the corner where the horizontal and vertical rulers intersect.

### Setting Grid Spacing

You can change the spacing of grid points in the Bullet Chart window. MORE provides three options for grid spacing as well as an option to hide the grid from view.

*Different grid densities for the same view*

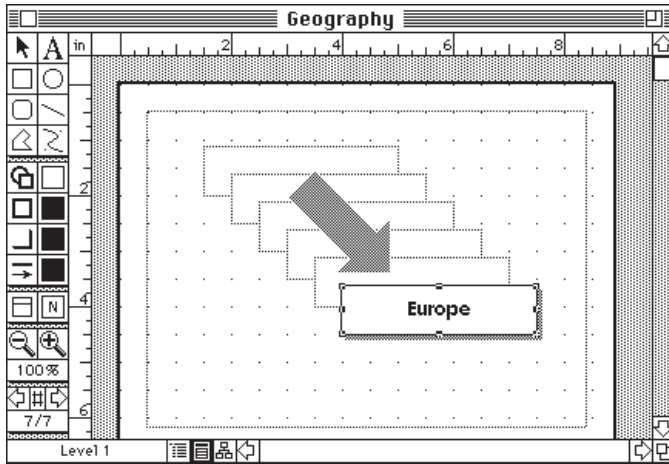


**To set grid spacing**

- Choose a spacing option from the Grid submenu in the Draw menu.

**Using Auto Grid Snap**

After you specify grid spacing for the Bullet Chart window, you can use the Snap to Grid command to snap bullet chart objects to the grid. When Auto Grid Snap is active, objects that you create or move on chart will snap to points on the grid. Auto Grid Snap is useful for precisely aligning objects in the charts.



*Moving objects with Auto Grid Snap active*

To activate Auto Grid Snap, choose Auto Grid Snap from the Draw menu. A check next to a menu item means that Auto Grid Snap is active.

**NOTE:** *If the grid is hidden, objects will still snap to the grid if Auto Grid Snap is active.*

## Snapping Objects to the Grid

If your chart contains objects that are not aligned to the grid, you can snap these objects to the grid by selecting them and choosing Snap to Grid from the Draw menu.

Snap to Grid works even if the grid is hidden, and regardless of whether or not Auto Grid Snap is active.

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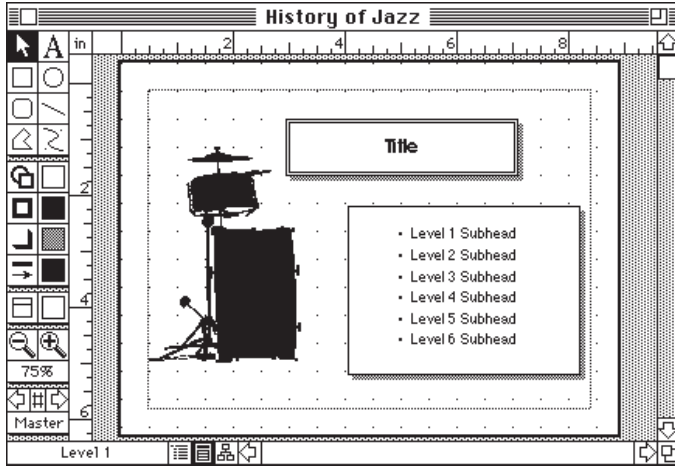
## USING MASTER CHARTS

In many cases, you will want your charts to display a global format or element that is not derived from the outline. Instead of having to modify each chart individually, you can use MORE's Master Chart feature to apply an object or format to any number of charts.

A Master Chart is a template that displays the global elements of each chart—anything displayed on the Master Chart will automatically appear in each chart (unless you suppress the Master Chart features with the Include command). If you draw or paste an object on the Master Chart, it will appear on all charts.

The Master Chart is especially useful for incorporating graphic elements such as a corporate logos, copyrights, and trademarks, or for making a background picture for all your charts. You can also use the Master Chart to select any chart option or apply any format that is also available for modifying individual charts. For example, you could use the Master Chart to set a global frame style for all charts, or to apply a specific font to all chart subheads.

To display the Master Chart, choose Master Chart from the Bullet menu. MORE displays the Master Chart for the current presentation.



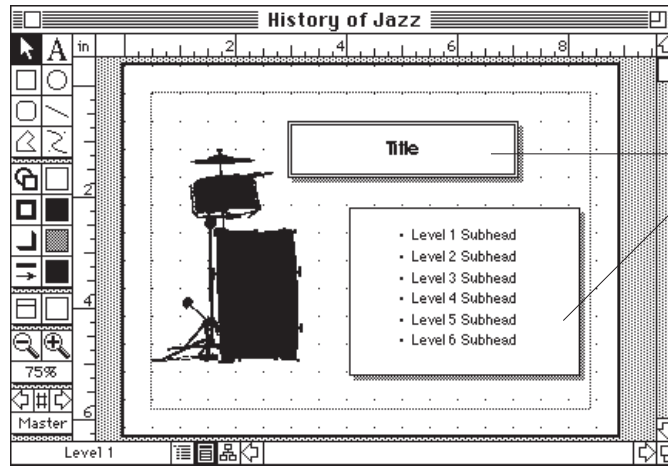
*A Master Chart with text placeholders and artwork placed*

Create and edit Master Chart objects in the same way you would create or edit objects on a regular bullet chart.

Any graphic object you add to a Master Chart is protected from editing when displayed on a regular chart. However, you are still free to modify frames and outline text in individual bullet charts regardless of the settings in the Master Chart. Changes you make to outline objects or attributes specific to individual charts are remembered as “rules.”

With the placeholders for outline text, you can modify the text format or reposition the outline objects to control their appearance and location on all the bullet charts in a series.

*If the title and the pertinent subheads are relocated (from an automatic centerline positioning) every chart will display those text frame accordingly*

When you modify one of the placeholders or a frame, MORE automatically generates a rule that governs all the charts in the series. If one or more charts has rules of the same type as those generated by the change you are making on the Master Chart, MORE displays a dialog box that asks if you want to delete the conflicting rule. If you click No, MORE allows the conflicting rules to remain in effect; the charts with conflicting rules retain their original appearance while the remaining charts adopt the new format. If you click Yes, MORE deletes the conflicting rules.

After you are satisfied with the appearance of the Master Chart, choose Master Chart again from the Bullet menu to return to the last bullet chart displayed, or use the Navigation Indicator pop-up menu to display another chart. The displayed chart will now display any objects and formats specified on the Master Chart.

You can turn off the display of Master Chart objects for any chart in a series by deselecting Master Chart Items from the Include submenu in the Bullet menu.





*Save frequently used objects or formats that you create on the Master Chart in the Library so that you can use them in another presentation without having to create them from scratch.*

## **USING THE LIBRARY IN BULLET CHART VIEW**

When you are in the Bullet Chart view, you may access the Objects, Rule Sets, Pictures, Color Sets, and Layouts categories of the Library.

Use the Objects category of the Library to store chart objects. MORE lets you store multiple objects as a single library entry. You can select multiple objects on a chart and then store them together. If you group multiple objects into a single object for insertion into the library, you can ungroup them after pasting them into another chart and then edit or position them individually.

Use the Rule Sets category of the Library to store rule sets from the bullet charts. After installing bullet chart rule sets in the Library, you can apply the rule set to another set of bullet charts. Rules govern every aspect of the appearance of outline objects on charts, including size, position, styling, and patterns.

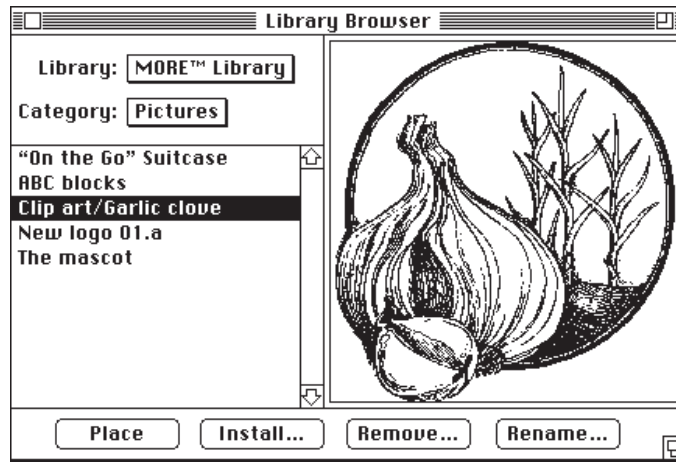
This method is especially handy if you're setting up corporate standards for your presentations. You can create a consistent look and style for your presentations, then store the bullet chart rules as a rule set that you can pass to your coworkers, who can use the existing rule set instead of styling a presentation from scratch.

There are special styles and designs included on your MORE diskettes. Experiment with the Bullet Chart styles in the Rules category of the libraries provided on these diskettes to get some ideas on how to use rules in MORE.

Use the Pictures category of the library to store clip art such as logos, trademarks, or illustrations. You can also use this library category to store bullet chart objects that can be installed in Outline view.

You can also install objects created with MORE's palette tools. If you store grouped objects in the Pictures category of the Library, they can be ungrouped after being placed in another chart.

Use the Layouts category of the Library to store complete layout designs (background, text formats, rules, draw objects, and graphic elements) that can be applied to specific charts or to all charts through the Master Chart. Layouts encompass all the information specified by rules as well as objects drawn on the chart. Unlike rule sets, the installation of an individual chart's layout creates a complete specification of the chart, instead of just those formats that differ from Master Chart formats.

**NOTE:** *If you place a chart layout which uses a different chart size than your current chart, MORE displays the Adjustment dialog box where you can select an option for displaying your current chart objects in the modified chart size. For more information on adjusting chart objects to a new chart size, see "Setting Chart Size," earlier in this chapter.*

For more information on library features, including use of the Browser, see "Using Libraries" in Chapter Five.

## **ATTACHING SPEAKER'S NOTES TO CHARTS**

MORE lets you attach speaker's notes to each chart in a series of bullet charts. These notes are especially useful for slide show presentations. After creating notes, you can print them in the various formats shown on the Print Options window and hand them out to your audience.

Notes are interchangeable between Outline and Bullet Chart views. If you create a speaker's note for a headline in Outline view, the same note will appear in Bullet Chart view if the headline is also a chart title.

If you're going to do a multiple-monitor slide show presentation, then you can display the speaker's notes as prompts on the speaker's monitor (unseen by the audience). For more information on slide show presentations, see Chapter 5.

Use speaker's notes to store

- Statistics
- Quotations
- Prompts and questions for the audience
- Instructions to the speaker, such as "take lunch break," "pass handouts to audience," "give test," and so on

Entering text in a Speaker's Note window is similar to entering text in a Header/Footer window in Outline view. The cut, copy, and paste functions are available and you can use the text ruler and format commands to modify the appearance of text in the notes. However, all Speaker Notes will share the same formatting.

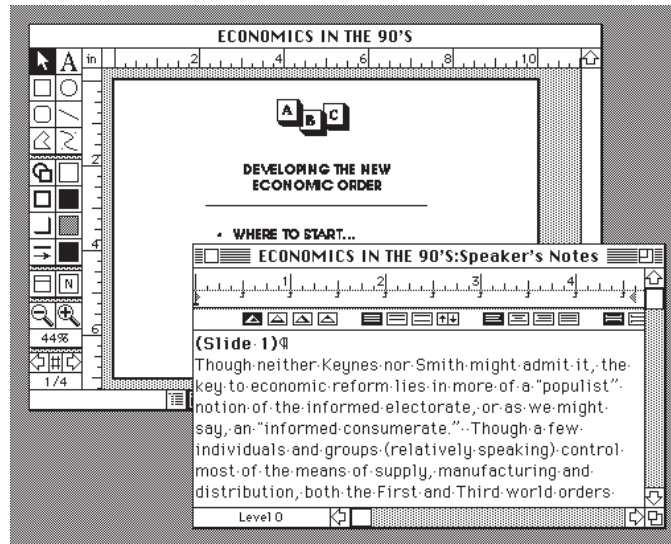
MORE attaches each Speaker's Notes window to the headline that corresponds to the chart title. When you switch to Outline view, an asterisk (\*) structure symbol will mark the headline of a chart that has a speaker's note.

### **To attach Speaker's Notes to charts**

1. Display the chart where you want to attach a Speaker's Notes window.
2. Choose Speaker's Notes from the Window menu.

You can drag and size the note window as you would any other Macintosh window.

3. Type the note text, just as you would type, edit, and format text in the comment window of an outline.

**To format Speaker's Note text**

1. Select text in the Speaker's Notes window.
2. Choose commands from the Format menu to format the text in the window (or use the text ruler).

**NOTE:** All Speaker's Notes share the same rules. This means that if you change a ruler setting or apply a new character format to all the text in a Speaker's Note, the modification also affects all the other Speaker's Notes.

**To print the Speaker's Notes window**

1. After you've written and formatted all the Speaker's Notes windows in your presentation, click the Bullet Chart window to make it active.
2. Choose Print Options from the File menu.
3. Click the desired layout icon from the Bullet Options area of the window.
4. Adjust page setup in the Page Setup dialog if necessary. Then return to the Print Options window.
5. Click the printer icon to bring up the Print dialog.

Click OK to begin printing.

## MANAGING BULLET CHART OBJECTS

This section provides detailed information on creating and manipulating objects in bullet charts.

Drawing objects in a bullet chart basically consists of creating a shape by first selecting a drawing tool, then dragging across the chart to create an object of the desired size.

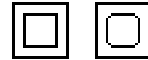
After you draw an object, MORE automatically selects the Selection tool (shown in margin) so that you can immediately manipulate the new object.



**TIP** *If you want to draw more than one object with the same tool, double-click the tool or hold down the Command key while you draw another object.*

### Drawing Rectangles

MORE provides a Rectangle tool (left in margin) and a Rounded Rectangle tool (right in margin) for drawing rectangles and squares.



#### To draw a rectangle

- Click either one of the rectangle tools, then drag diagonally anywhere on the bullet chart.

In drawing a rectangle you can employ certain mouse-keyboard techniques:

*Shift-drag*      constrains a rectangle or rounded rectangle so that it retains its height to width ratio.

---

*Option-drag*      draws the object from the center.

---

*Option-Shift-drag*      constrains the object so that it retains its height to width ratio and draws it from the center.    Resize by dragging one of the handles.

---

You can move the rectangle by dragging anywhere inside the object. See also “Sizing Objects” and “Moving Objects,” later in this chapter.

## Drawing Ovals



You use the Oval tool (shown in margin) to draw ovals or circles.

### To draw a circle or oval

- Click the Oval tool, then click anywhere on the bullet chart and drag from any direction.

In drawing a circle or oval you can employ certain mouse-keyboard techniques:

*Shift-drag*      constrains the object to be a circle.

---

*Option-drag*      draws the object from the center.

---

*Option-Shift-drag*      constrains the object to be a circle and draws it from the center.  
Resize by dragging one of the handles.

---

You can move the oval by dragging anywhere inside the object. See also “Sizing Objects” and “Moving Objects,” later in this chapter.

## Drawing Lines



MORE provides a Line tool (shown in margin) for drawing straight lines.

### To draw a line

- Click the Line Tool, then click anywhere on the bullet chart and drag from any direction.
- You can resize a line by dragging one of the end handles.



*In drawing a circle or oval you can employ Shift-dragging to constrain the line to a vertical, horizontal, or 45-degree diagonal line, depending on which direction you start to draw.*

You can move a line by dragging anywhere on the object except for the handles. See also “Sizing Objects” and “Moving Objects,” later in this chapter.

## Drawing Polygons

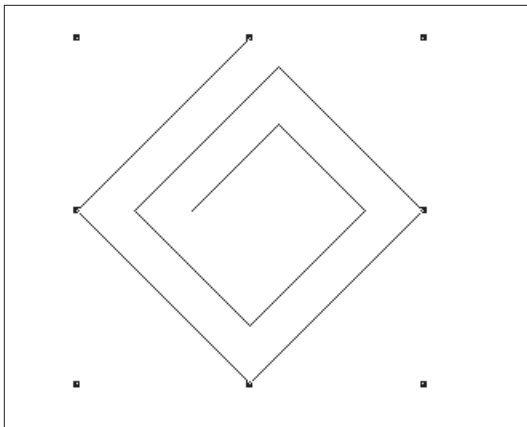
In addition to drawing standard shapes such as rectangles and circles, you can also draw irregular objects with MORE's Polygon tool. Use the Polygon tool to create objects of variable shapes in your charts. After you create a polygon, you can apply fills, line styles, and shadows to the object.

### To draw a polygon

1. Click the Polygon tool (shown in margin).
2. Click somewhere on the chart to specify a beginning point, then click additional points to draw the polygon's border. (Turn on Auto Grid Snap to create a polygon with right angles and parallel sides.)



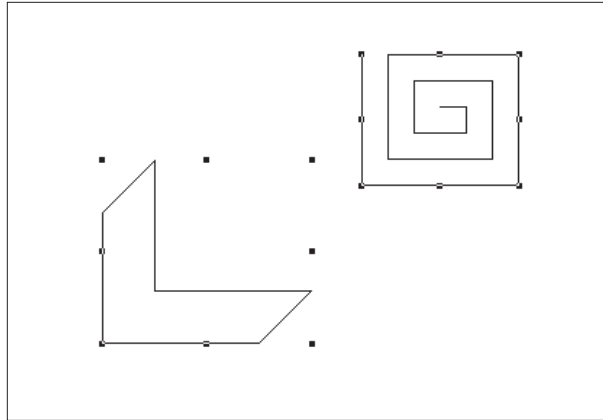
Here's an example:

3. Complete an open polygon by double-clicking the final point.  
or  
Complete a closed polygon by clicking back on the first point.

### **To edit a polygon**

1. Select the polygon that you want to modify.
2. Click the Polygon tool.  
MORE highlights the endpoints of the polygon sides.
3. Drag one or more points to change the shape of the polygon.

### **To add a point to a polygon**

1. Select the polygon that you want to modify.
2. Click the Polygon tool.
3. Option-click on the polygon border where you want to add a new point.  
MORE creates a new point at the specified location.

### **To delete a point from a polygon**

1. Select the polygon that you want to modify.
2. Click the Polygon tool.
3. Option-click the point on the polygon border that you want to delete.  
MORE removes the point and redraws the polygon.



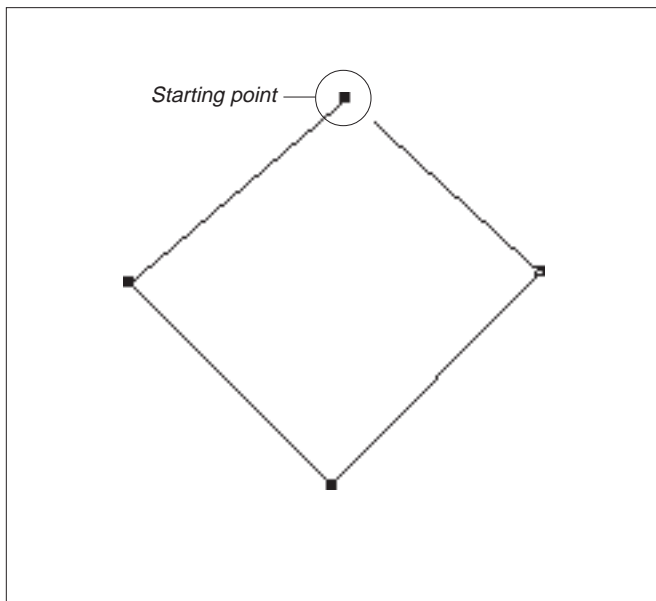
## Drawing Bezier Curves

In addition to standard lines, you can use the Bezier tool to create illustration-quality objects to your charts. When your chart contains Bezier curves, MORE generates PostScript code for printing the curves. This means that the printed output will resemble finely drawn curves instead of bit-map approximations. After you create a Bezier object, you can add fills, borders, and shadows to it as you would to rectangles, ovals, and polygons on the chart.

Generally, you will draw a rough curve with the Bezier tool, then refine the object by editing its points.

### To draw a Bezier curve

1. Click the Bezier Tool (shown in margin).
2. Click a series of points that approximates the final outline of the object.



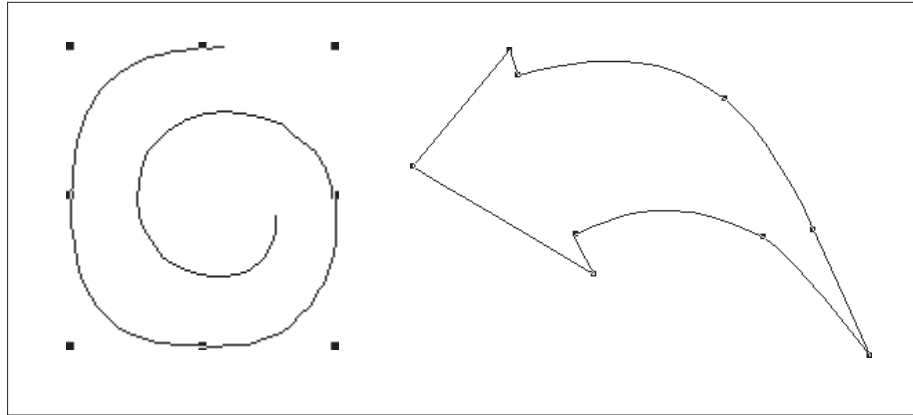
*To create a curving spiral object, click a series of points as shown here*

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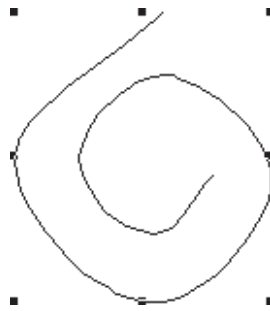
3. Complete an open curve by double-clicking the final point.

complete a closed object by clicking back on the first point.

Bezier objects*

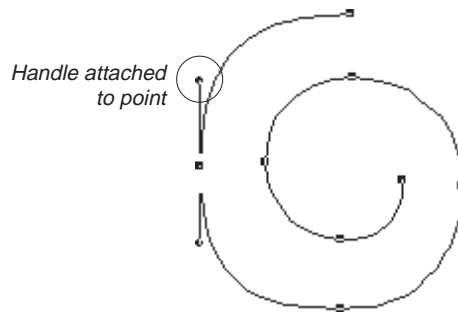


MORE redraws the curve, adding additional points (if necessary) to smooth out the curve. The initial drawing, when complete, will display bezier curves surrounded by a single set of handles, as illustrated here.

4. While the bezier object is selected, click on the Bezier tool in order to display the actual points.



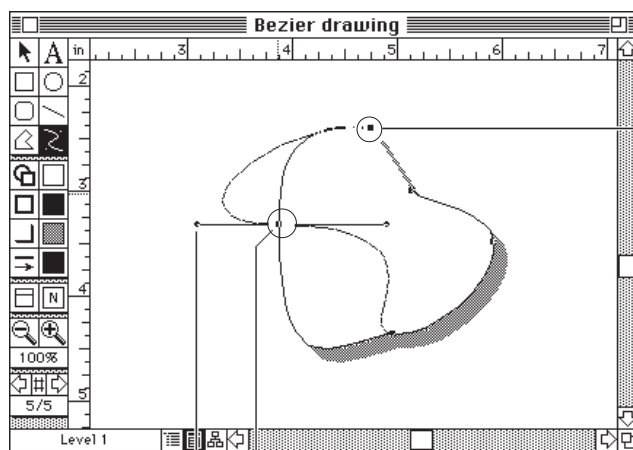
*The same object after clicking on a point with the Bezier tool*

**To edit a Bezier curve**

1. Select the Bezier object that you want to modify.
2. Click the Bezier tool.  
MORE highlights the points of the Bezier curve.

3. Click a point on the curve.

When you click a point on the curve, MORE displays two *direction points* on either end of an axis that runs through the selected point (also known as the *anchor point*).

An anchor point (no direction points)

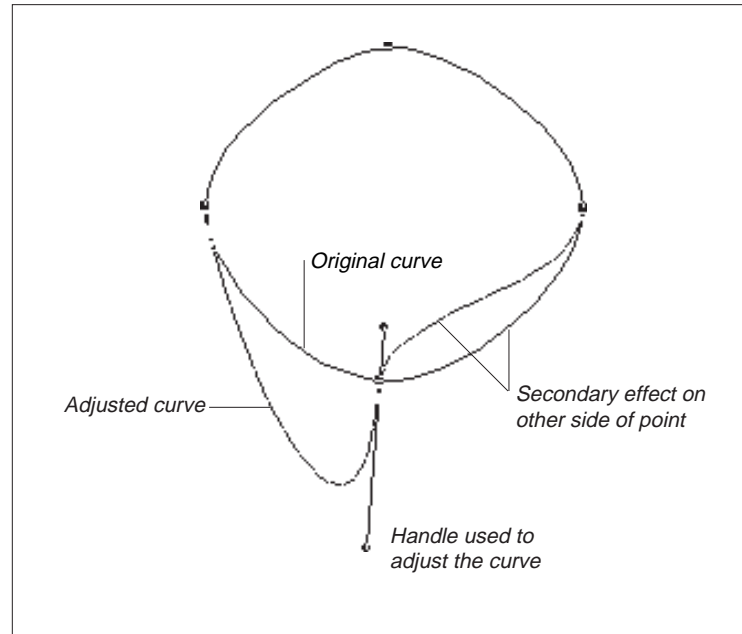
## USING BULLET CHARTS

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4. Drag an anchor point to change the general outline of the Bezier object.

You can freely drag one of the direction points to modify the shape of a line segment without changing the location of the anchor point on the curve.

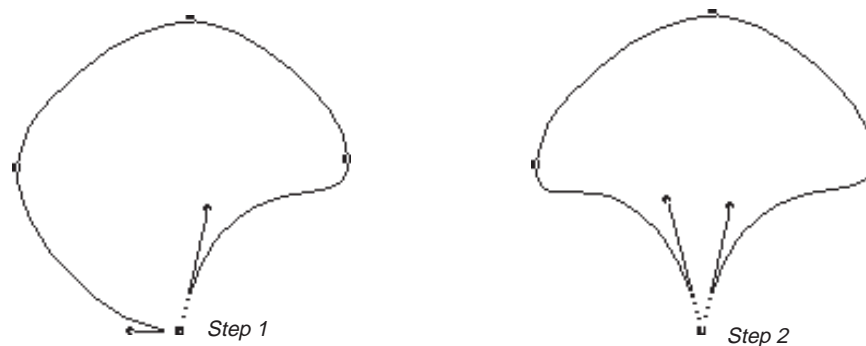
*Dragging a direction point increases the curving effect on a line*



**TIP** Shift-drag a direction point to move the companion direction point an equal distance in the opposite direction.

To create angles and corners at particular points, **W**-drag the handle on a point to move it independently of its companion handle.

**To add a point to a Bezier curve**

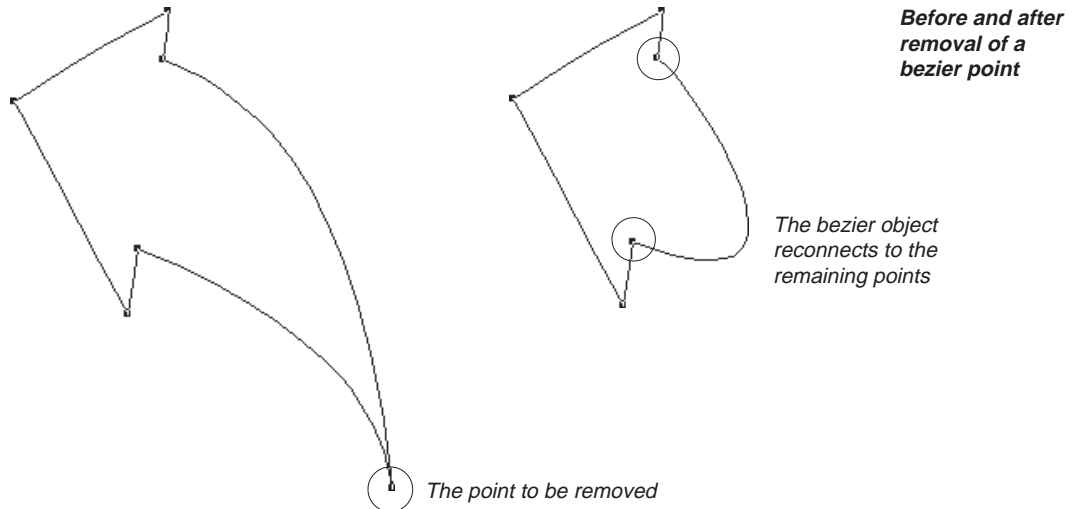
1. Select the Bezier object that you want to modify.
2. Click the Bezier tool.
3. Option-click the Bezier curve at the location where you want to add a new point.

MORE creates a new point at the specified location.

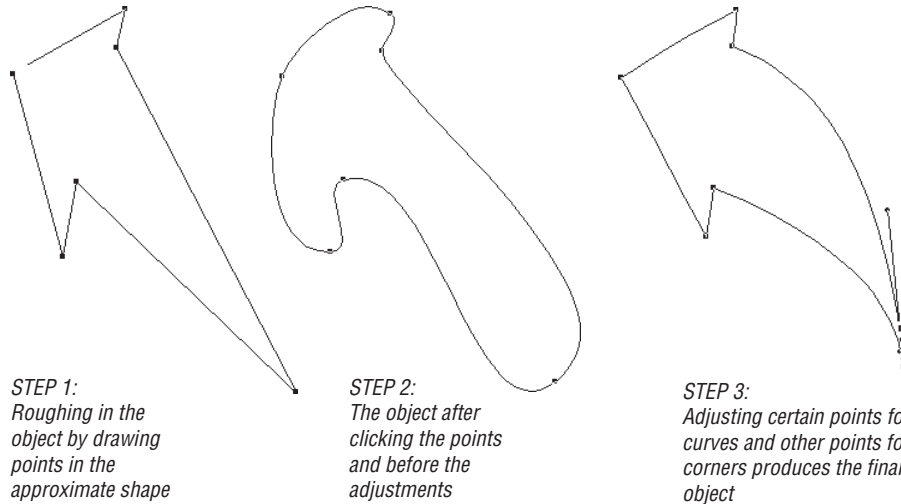
**To delete a point from a Bezier curve**

1. Select the Bezier object that you want to modify.
2. Click the Bezier tool.
3. Option-click the anchor point on the Bezier curve that you want to delete.

MORE removes the point and redraws the Bezier curve.

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## MORE ABOUT BULLET CHART OBJECTS

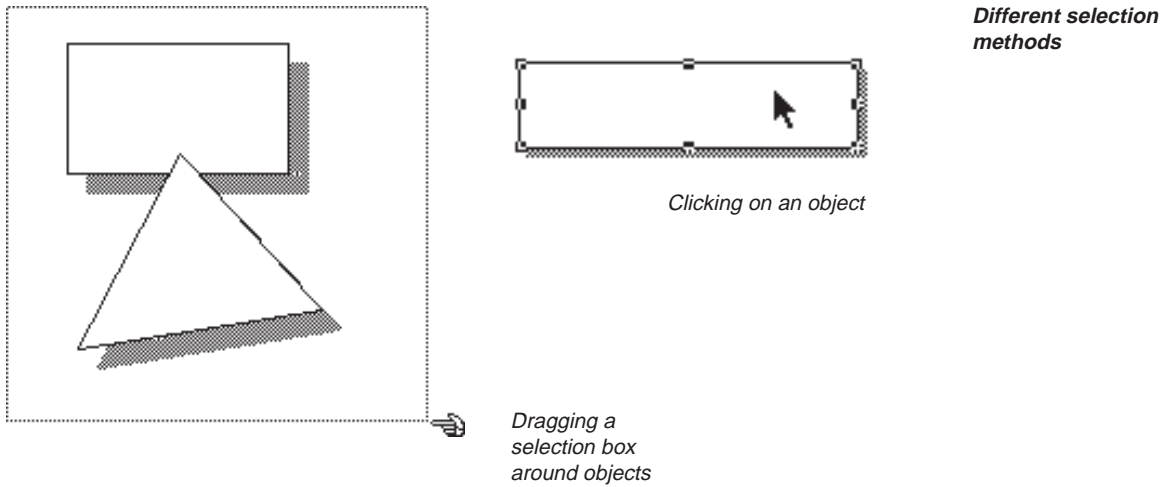
### Selecting Objects

Before you can perform an operation on an object in a bullet chart, you must first select that object. As with many Macintosh drawing applications, you click an object to select it. You can also drag a selection box around multiple objects to select them simultaneously (you must completely enclose an object to select it). Shift-dragging a selection box around selected objects deselects the objects.

You can also select objects from the keyboard by pressing the Tab key. Each time you press Tab, MORE selects a selectable object in the chart, starting with the frontmost object and cycling backward before beginning anew. (Press Shift-Tab to cycle in the opposite direction.)

**TIP** *Select text objects only by holding down the Option key when pressing Tab.*

If you want to select multiple objects but it's not convenient to drag a selection box, you can hold down the Shift key while you click each object in turn. To quickly select every object in the bullet chart, press **W-A**.



**NOTE:** *Master Chart items (text, art, layouts) may only be edited on the Master Chart.*

---

## Removing Objects

You can remove any object that can be selected in a bullet chart.

### To remove objects

- Select the objects you want to delete and choose Cut or Clear from the Edit menu (or press the Backspace key).

Cut places the object on the Clipboard, where it is available for pasting elsewhere. Clear performs the same operation as the Delete key—it removes the object completely. You can restore a deleted object by choosing Undo immediately after the deletion.

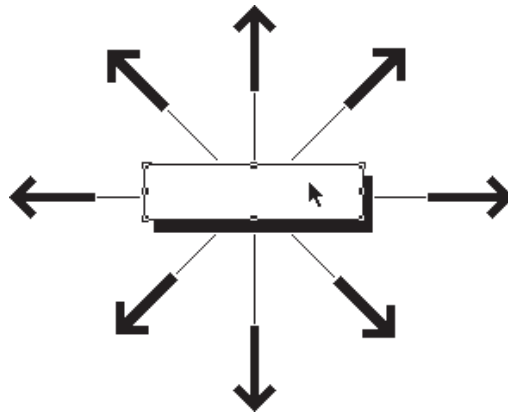
Deleting an outline object is equivalent to choosing a checked command from the Include submenu in the Bullet menu. You can restore the object to the chart by choosing the same command from the Include submenu. You can also use the Include submenu to suppress the display of Master Chart objects in individual charts.

### Moving Objects

You can move a selected object anywhere within the current drawing area by dragging it. If multiple objects are selected, you can move them as a group.

To move an object, click anywhere inside the object (don't click a handle) and drag it to the desired location. If you hold down the Shift key while dragging an object, MORE constrains its movement to one of four regular axes: horizontal, vertical, diagonal between upper left and lower right, and diagonal between upper right and lower left.

*Movement of an object along four regular axes*



If the Show Object Sizes option of the Program Options command is turned on, MORE displays the X-Y coordinates of the object as you move it. The first number is the horizontal position; the second number is the vertical position.

**NOTE:** *Hold down the Option key while dragging an object to temporarily toggle the current state of Auto Grid Snap. For example, if Auto Grid Snap is on, you can suspend it while moving an object to a new location.*

### Moving Objects in Frames

Some special considerations apply to moving objects within frames. If a frame displays a dividing line between title and subheads, you can only move the dividing line in a vertical direction within the frame. Also, a dividing line is linked to the gap between the outline objects it separates—when you move it, you also affect the position the outline object above it. Conversely, if you move an outline object, you may affect the position of the dividing line. When one outline object is moved so that it overlaps another outline object—eliminating the gap—the dividing line moves *below* the lower object.



When you move an outline object across the boundary of the frame that surrounds the object, MORE will automatically resize the frame to accommodate the new object dimensions.

## Duplicating Objects

MORE provides a Duplicate command that lets you create an exact copy of any chart object, other than a frame or a text object from the underlying outline. This operation is similar to copying an object and pasting it in the chart, except that the Clipboard is unaffected.

To duplicate an object, select it—you can also select multiple objects for duplication—and choose Duplicate from the Draw menu. MORE creates a duplicate of the object below and to the right of the original object and selects the duplicate object for further manipulation.

**NOTE:** *You can use the Copy and Paste commands in the Edit menu to create copies of frames or outline text objects. However, the pasted copies are pictures—graphics that no longer have any relation to the underlying outline. In the case of copied text objects from the underlying outline, the text is also uneditable. You can, however, use the resulting pictures to add some special effects to your charts.*

## Rotating Objects

MORE provides a submenu of Rotate/Flip commands that let you rotate or flip any object on the chart except for text objects and pictures. All rotation occurs around an object's center.

### To rotate or flip an object

- Choose a command from the Rotate/Flip submenu in the Draw menu.

<i>Rotate Right</i>	Rotates a selected object 90 degrees to its right.
<i>Rotate Left</i>	Rotates a selected object 90 degrees to its left.
<i>Rotate</i>	Displays a dialog box where you can enter a degree of rotation (between -360 to 360 ) for a selected object. Positive values rotate an object counter-clockwise. Free rotation is available only for lines, polygons, and Bezier curves.
<i>Flip Horizontal</i>	Flips a selected object about its horizontal axis.
<i>Flip Vertical</i>	Flips a selected object about its vertical axis.

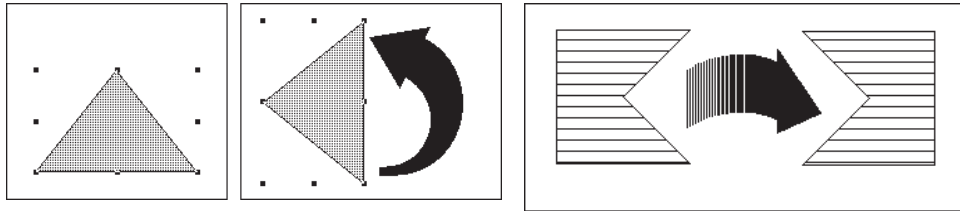

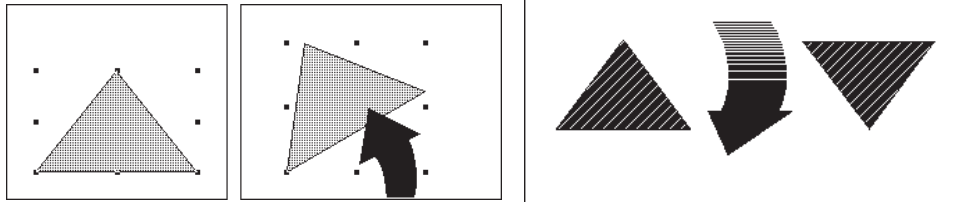
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### **Rotation and Flipping options**

## **Sizing Objects**

You resize an object in a bullet chart by dragging one of its handles in the direction that you want to resize.

### **To resize an object**

1. Select the object.
2. Position the pointer over a handle until it turns into a crosshair pointer.
3. Drag the crosshair in the direction that you want to resize the object. As you drag, a dotted outline of the object follows the crosshair.

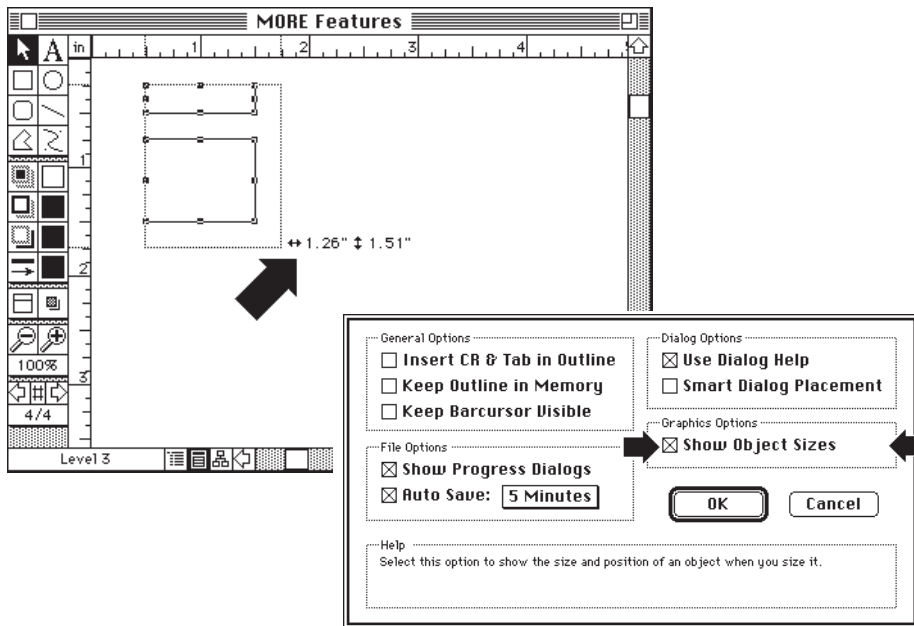
Dragging corner handles allows you to resize the object in both vertical and horizontal planes. Dragging midpoint handles limits resizing to one plane or the other.

You can also resize multiple objects by dragging a handle on one of the selected objects. Multiple selected objects resize in the same proportion.

**To render proportional resizing**

<i>Shift-drag a handle</i>	to retain the object's original proportions
<i>Option-drag a handle</i>	to resize the object symmetrically
<i>Option-Shift-drag a handle</i>	to resize the object from its center so that it also retains its original proportions.

If the Show Object Sizes option is turned on, MORE displays the dimensions of the object while you drag a handle. The first number displayed is the object's width; the second number is its height. (Dragging line handles displays the line's length and its angle.)



*Illustration of displaying object sizes*

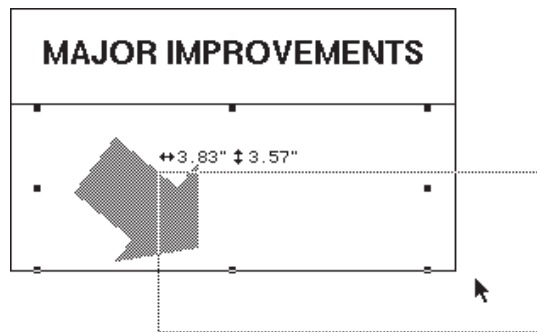
*A checkmark in the "Show Object Sizes" option of the Window dialog box results in the displaying of dimensions of Bullet Chart objects*

## Resizing Frames

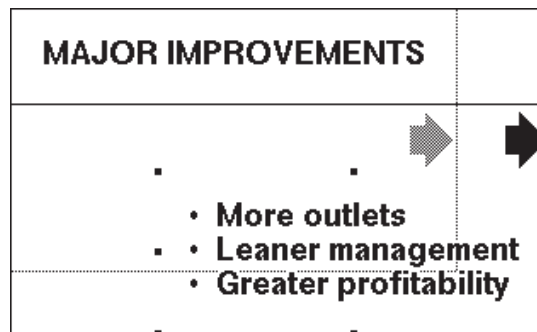
MORE also provides you with a degree of manual control over the frames that enclose outline objects. Resize a frame as you would any other chart object. (Resize the frame on the Master Chart to resize the frame on all of your charts.) After you resize a frame, you are free to move the outline objects around within the frame. However, if you move an outline object across the perimeter of a frame, MORE automatically resizes the frame to accommodate the new object position.

### Resizing a frame

*Before—  
moving the

the dotted line)*

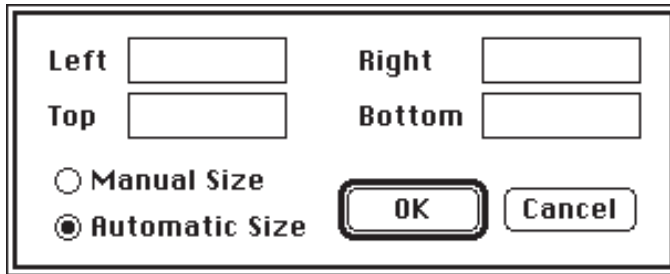


*After—

The frame will also adjust to accommodate the resizing of an outline object as the result of inserting or deleting text, however, the frame's size is not adjusted until you have completed entering text in the object.

You can also resize a frame by double-clicking inside the frame (but not on any outline object within the frame) to display the Frame Size dialog box where you can specify the distances between the frame sides and edges of the chart.

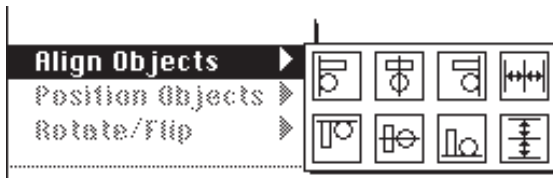


*Frame Size dialog box*

You can return a frame to automatic size by specifying automatic size in the Frame Size dialog box or by holding down the Option key and double-clicking within the frame.

## Aligning Objects

MORE provides a submenu of commands for aligning objects in a chart. These commands align objects relative to other objects in the current selection. You can align objects on any of their four edges or distribute the objects horizontally or vertically to make the space between them equal.



*Align Objects submenu*

### To align objects

1. Select the objects that you want to align.

You must select at least two objects to align them, and at least three objects to choose one of the spacing options.

2. Choose an alignment option from the Align Objects submenu in the Draw menu.

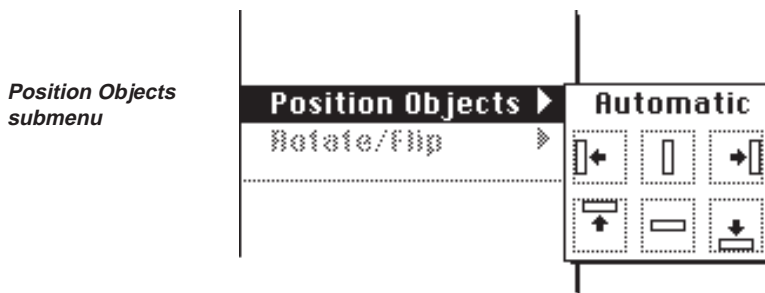
## Positioning Objects in the Chart

In addition to aligning chart objects with other objects, you can position objects relative to any of the four positioning guides within your available drawing area. (The locations of the positioning guides are identified by the dotted rectangle within the chart boundary.)

The locations of the positioning guides can be modified through the Chart Size dialog box. If you move a positioning guide on a chart after aligning objects to it, the aligned objects will follow the guide to its new position. For more information about moving the positioning guides, see “Setting Chart Size,” earlier in this chapter.

MORE provides a submenu of commands for aligning objects to positioning guides. You can position any object in the bullet chart (including frames around outline text.) The submenu also provides an option for automatically placing titles, subheads, or comments so that they will be centered horizontally or stacked and centered vertically.

**NOTE:** *When you align a frame in a bullet chart, MORE creates new rules for the outline text within the frames. For more information, see “Using Rules,” in Chapter 5.*



### To position objects

1. Select the objects that you want to align to a guide.
2. Choose an option from the Position Objects submenu in the Draw menu.

If a title, subhead, or comment is selected, you can choose Automatic from the Position Objects submenu to either stack or center the object along a plane with other automatically positioned objects. Objects positioned with the Automatic positioning maintain their positions if the chart size changes. (For best results, you should specify Automatic positioning for all outline objects.)

## Arranging Objects

MORE provides two commands in the Draw menu for layering objects in a chart. Use the Bring to Front command to bring selected objects to the front of objects displayed in the chart. Use the Send to Back command to move selected objects to the back of objects displayed in the chart. These commands are useful for creating layered effects or preventing important information from being obscured by opaque objects.

### To send objects to the back

1. Select the objects that you want to move behind all other chart objects.
2. Choose Send to Back from the Draw menu.  
MORE moves the selected objects behind all other objects in the chart.

### To bring objects to the front

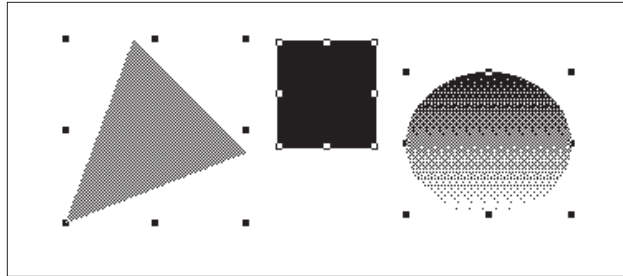
1. Select the objects that you want to move in front of all other chart objects.
2. Choose Bring to Front from the Draw menu.  
MORE moves the selected objects in front of all other objects in the chart.

## Grouping Objects

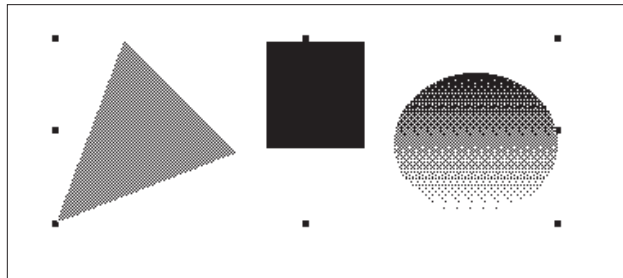
MORE lets you group multiple objects into a single object that can be manipulated. You can group any object that is not automatically generated by MORE. Grouping objects is useful for keeping individual objects together in a complex chart that contains a large number of graphic elements. MORE also allows you to ungroup objects that have been previously grouped.

### Grouped objects

Before (upper left)  
and After

### To group objects

1. Select the objects that you want to group.
2. Choose Group from the Draw menu.

MORE combines the selected objects into a single object. The object's handles now appear on the outside perimeter of the combined objects.

**NOTE:** You can group existing groups with other groups or individual objects to create higher-level groups.



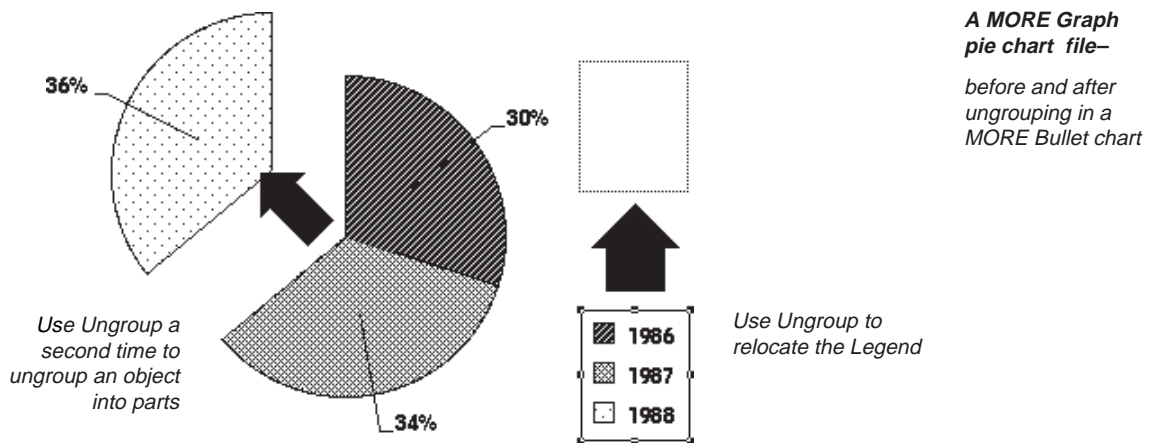
**To ungroup objects**

1. Select a grouped object that you want to break into its component objects.
2. Choose Ungroup from the Draw menu.

MORE ungroups the selected object into its individual objects. (You may need to choose Ungroup again if the object you ungrouped contained objects that were previously grouped.)

**Ungrouping Graphics From Other Sources**

You can also use the Ungroup command to ungroup graphics that were created in an object-oriented graphics application (such as Canvas, MacDraw II or SuperPaint) and pasted (or imported) into a bullet chart. Ungrouping a graphic allows you to modify it for the best presentation in a chart. This technique also works with tree charts that have been copied from Tree Chart view and charts created with the MORE Graph utility.



If a grouped object contains objects that were previously grouped, you may need to ungroup it more than once to break the object into all its discrete objects.

For more information on importing graphics created in other applications, see “Importing Graphics” later in this chapter.

**NOTE:** *Because different applications may store special information inside the pictures they create, ungrouped pictures may not appear exactly the same as the original.*

## STYLING OBJECTS

This section provides information on styling objects in a bullet chart. Basically, you apply a style by selecting objects and choosing a style from the pop-up menus that appear when you press a styling tool. Any style you apply with a styling tool becomes the default style for any new objects until you choose a different style.

In addition to the procedures next described, you can use the Object Formats tool to apply different kinds of styles simultaneously to selected objects.

### Applying Fills

You can apply a fill pattern (or color) to any object except lines.

#### To apply a fill

1. Select an object.
2. Hold down the Fill tool and choose a pattern or color from the pop-up menu.

MORE applies the fill.

Choose None from the pop-up menu to remove a pattern or color from the selected objects and make them transparent. You can also choose the None fill for imported graphics whose background you want to be the same as the background for the chart.

Choose Custom Pattern to apply a pattern that does not appear in the menu or to replace patterns on the pop-up menu with new patterns that you create. For more information, see also “Creating Custom Patterns” in Chapter 5.

## Changing Edge Styles

You can change the edge style of objects that appear in charts, including object borders, chart frames, and borders around imported graphics.

### To change an edge style

1. Select the object or objects that you want to change.
2. Hold down the Edge Style tool and choose an edge style.

MORE applies the new edge style.

**NOTE:** *Some edge styles displayed in the Edge Style menu are not available for all types of objects. For example, beveled edges are available only for rectangular shapes (including rounded rectangles).*

## Changing Edge Patterns

You can change the edge pattern (or color) of objects, including object borders, chart frames, and borders around imported graphics.

### To change an edge pattern

1. Select the object or objects that you want to change.
2. Hold down the Edge Pattern tool and choose a pattern or color.

MORE applies the new edge pattern.

Choose Custom Pattern to apply a pattern that does not appear in the menu or to replace patterns on the pop-up menu with new patterns that you create. For more information, see also “Creating Custom Patterns” in Chapter 5.

## Changing Line Styles

MORE offers a wide range of styles for lines, polygons, and Bezier curves, including various line widths and line endings, such as arrowheads and diamonds. A line can have both a line width style and line ending styles (one style for each end of the line). You choose a width or line ending style from the Line Style pop-up menu on the palette. A frame appears around the currently selected styles.

### To change a line style

1. Select the object or objects that you want to change.
2. Hold down the Line Style tool and choose either a line width or line ending style.

MORE applies the new width or style.

For polygons and Bezier curves, you can choose None to completely remove the object's border.

## Changing Line Patterns

You can change the line pattern (or color) of lines, polygons, and Bezier curves that appear in a chart.

To apply a line pattern, select the line, then press the Line Pattern tool and choose a pattern or color from the pop-up menu of patterns. When you apply a pattern, it remains the default pattern for newly drawn lines, until you choose a different pattern or color.

### To change a line pattern

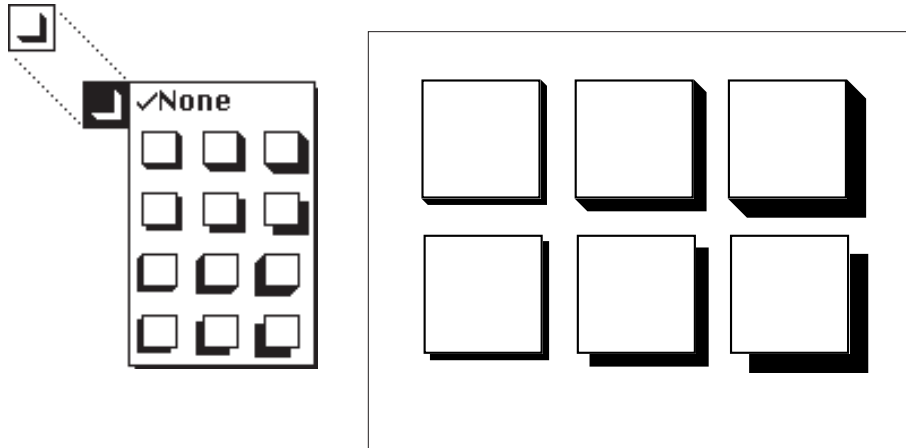
1. Select the line that you want to change.
2. Hold down the Line Pattern tool and choose a pattern or color.

MORE applies the new line pattern.

Choose Custom Pattern to replace patterns on the pop-up menu with new patterns that you create. For more information, see also "Creating Custom Patterns" in Chapter 5.

## Adding Shadows

MORE lets you add shadows to bullet chart objects. The palette provides twelve different shadow styles.



*The Shadow Style tool pop-up palette and some of the available shadow styles (as printed out)*

### To add a shadow

1. Select the object or objects that you want to provide with a shadow.
2. Hold down the Shadow Style tool and choose a shadow style.

MORE applies the shadow.

After you add a shadow to an object, you can change the pattern of the shadow with the Shadow Pattern tool.

**NOTE:** *If you add a shadow to a frame or rectangle that has a beveled edge style, MORE automatically adjusts the shading of the bevel planes to be consistent with the direction of light implied by the shadow.*

## Applying Shadow to Text

You can use the MORE Shadow tool to create a “3-D” effect for bullet chart text.

*An example of shadowed text created from an existing headline (before and after)*



### To create shadowed text

1. Choose a shadow style and shadow pattern for an object that contains text.
2. Choose a None fill for the object that contains the text.

When MORE removes the fill from the object, it retains the shadow effect for the text that remains.

**NOTE:** *Multicolored patterns are not available for shadowed text. If you apply a color pattern to a text shadow, MORE uses the predominant color in the pattern to create a solid color shadow.*

## Changing Shadow Patterns

You can change the shadow pattern (or color) of object shadows.

### To apply a shadow pattern

- Select a shadowed object, then hold down the Shadow Pattern tool and choose a pattern or color from the pop-up menu that appears.

When you apply a shadow pattern, it remains the default pattern for any new shadowed objects, until you choose a different pattern or color.

## **Adding Caption Text**

In addition to the text generated from the underlying outline, you can add additional caption text to bullet charts.

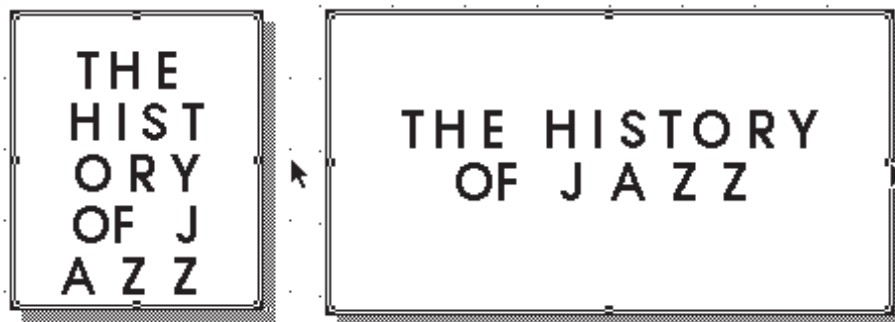
### **To add caption text**

1. Click the Text tool.
2. When the text tool is active, click anywhere on the bullet chart to make a caption text box of adjustable width.  
or  
Drag diagonally to create a caption box of a fixed width.
3. Type and edit text in the box just as you would in a headline.  
If the text ruler is active, a ruler appears at the top of the text object. Use the ruler to set tabs, line spacing, justification, or first line indents for the caption text.

## **Sizing Captions**

Resize a caption text object by dragging one of the handles on the right or left side of the object.

Because MORE automatically adjusts the height of the caption to accommodate the area of text, you have to adjust only the width of the caption. As you resize the caption box, MORE wraps the text to fit the new dimensions.

*After resizing*

*Illustrating the redistribution of text by resizing of a frame*

Move the caption box by dragging anywhere inside the object.

As with outline text, you can specify the dimensions of caption text in the Text Layout dialog box. Select an object and choose Text Layout from the Draw menu (or double-click a caption text object) to display the Text Layout dialog box where you can resize and rewrap the object to fill the maximum width of the chart area. (You can also display the Text Layout dialog box by holding down the Object Formats tool and choosing Text Layout from the pop-up menu.)

**NOTE:** *Because of the way text behaves within a text object, you may not achieve the desired effect by sizing a caption. The height and width of the text object will be restricted by the number of characters in the text and the presence of carriage returns.*

**EDITING TEXT**

MORE lets you edit any text displayed in a bullet chart, including caption text and text from the underlying outline. If you edit text in a chart title, subhead, or comment, MORE also applies the changes to the underlying outline. This feature lets you modify a bullet chart “on the fly,” without having to return to Outline view.

Edit text by selecting the Text Tool, and then clicking inside a text object to get an I-beam cursor. You can select text just as you would select text in a wrapped headline or in a comment window. If the text is white (or in a light color), MORE adjusts the backlighting of the selected text so that the characters are always visible and clearly displayed.

Specify styles for the selected text with the Font, Size, Style, Color, and Text Format commands. (Remember, selective character formatting of headline text also affects the text as it appears in the underlying outline.) If the text ruler is active, it also appears when text is selected within a text object.

**Outline text and caption text with different text styles and effects**







*Use the Enter key to quickly enter and exit the text editing mode. When the Selection tool is active, press Enter to select the Text tool. When the Text tool is active, press Enter to select the Selection tool.*

## **Using the Text Ruler in Bullet Charts**

Use the text ruler to quickly format the following text in bullet charts without using the Format menu commands:

- Caption text
- Titles
- Subheads
- Comments
- Headers and footers
- Notes

To display the text ruler in Bullet Chart view, choose Show Text Ruler from the Format menu. When active, the text ruler appears when you select the text tool on the palette and create a new caption, or select text in an existing text object. For more information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text” in Chapter 2.

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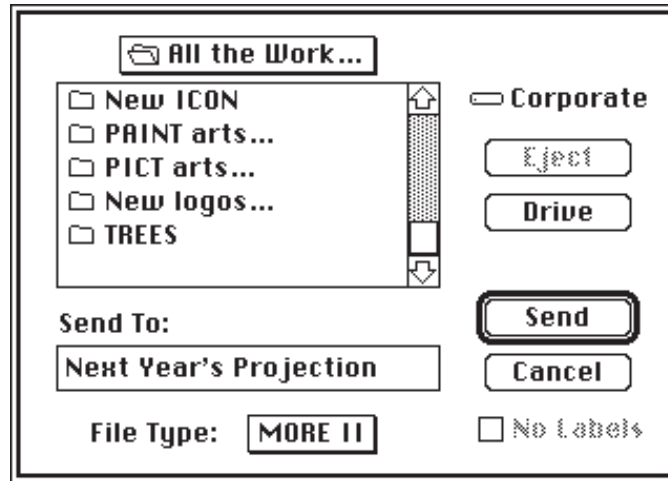
## **SAVING CHARTS AS GRAPHICS**

MORE provides a Send To command that lets you save charts to a disk file in one of several formats that can be opened in a Macintosh graphics application. Use this feature when you want to export a chart to a file that can be edited with another application (for example, MacDraw II).

MORE lets you send information to disk files in a variety of graphic file formats, provided the translation files for those formats are in your MORE files folder.

When you choose Send To from the File menu, MORE displays the Send To dialog box:

*Send To dialog box*



The Send To dialog box closely resembles the dialog box that appears when you save files from within most Macintosh applications. It displays a directory of the current folder or disk. The directory title (and a folder or disk icon) appears above the list of the directory's contents. The name of the current disk appears to the right of the list. Eject and Drive buttons are available for switching disks or drives.

---

*Send To*      Displays the text of the current chart's title as the default file name. You can use any characters in the file name except a colon, a tab, or Return. If you want to save the chart by another file name, just type in the desired name.

---

*File Type*      Displays a pop-up menu of graphic file formats that you can use to save the text

---

*Send*      Saves the chart under the specified file name and according to the chosen format.

---

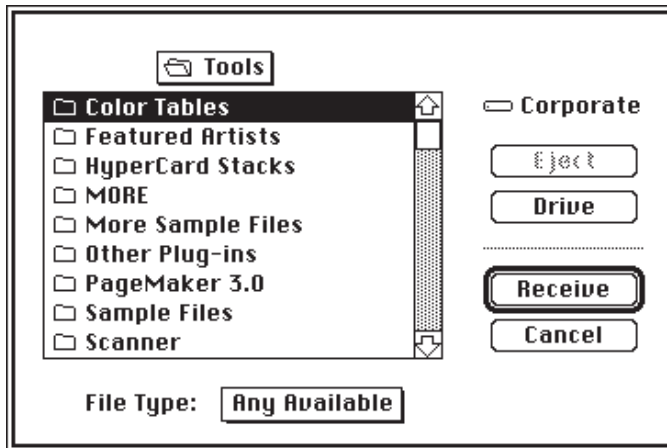
**To export a chart to a graphics file**

1. Display the chart that you want to save in a graphics file.
2. Choose Send To from the File menu.
3. When the Send To dialog box appears, use it to specify a destination, a file name and file format.
4. Click Send to export the current chart to the specified file.

**IMPORTING GRAPHICS**

MORE provides a Receive From command that lets you open a graphics disk file and insert its contents into the current chart. Use this feature when you want to incorporate graphics from other sources in the current chart (for example, a company logo created in Adobe Illustrator). You can import graphics saved in MacPaint, PICT, or EPSF (encapsulated PostScript) formats.

When you choose Receive From from the File menu, MORE displays the Receive From dialog box.



*Receive From dialog box*

The Receive From dialog box closely resembles the dialog box that appears when you open files from within most Macintosh applications. It displays a directory of the current folder or disk. The directory title (and a folder or disk icon) appears above the list of the directory's contents. The name of the current disk appears to the right of the list. Eject and Drive buttons are available for switching disks or drives.

*File Type* Displays a pop-up menu of graphic file formats that you can import into the chart. When you choose a file type from the pop-up menu, MORE only displays the names of files saved in the selected format.

---

*Receive* Inserts the contents of the selected file in the current chart.

---

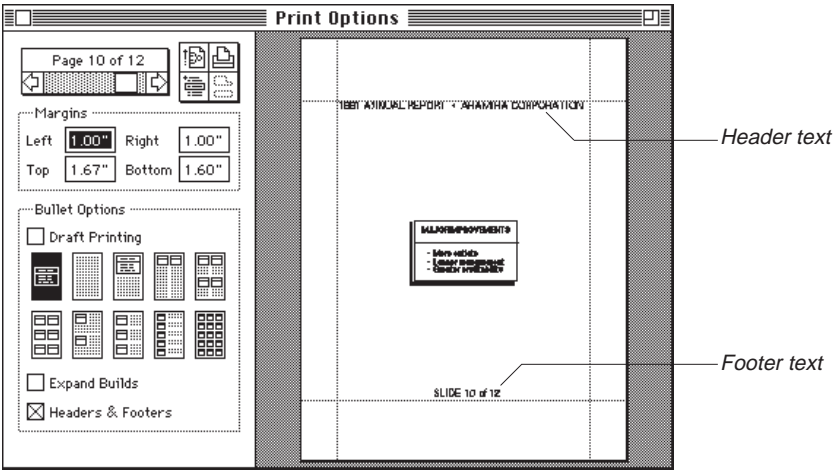
**To import a graphic file into a chart**

1. Display the chart where you want to insert the contents of a file.
2. Choose Receive From from the File menu.
3. When the Receive From dialog box appears, choose a file type, then choose the file you want to insert into the outline.
4. Click Receive to insert the contents of the selected file in the current chart.

.....

**ADDING HEADERS AND FOOTERS**

A header or footer contains text or graphics that you want to print at the top (header) or bottom (footer) of each bullet chart. Adding a header or footer in one MORE view adds it in all views. You can modify a header or footer from any view. You can specify whether to print headers or footers from the Print Options window. For more information on specifying print options, see “Printing Bullet Charts,” later in this chapter.

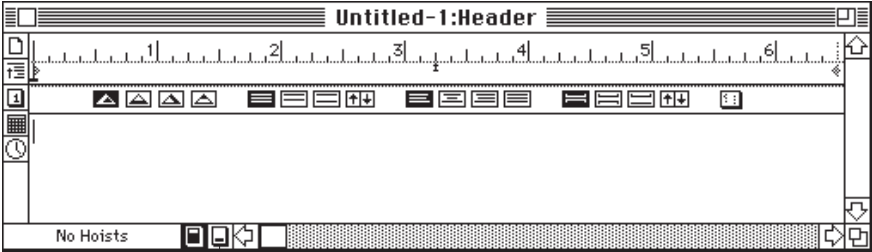


*A chart with a header and footer*

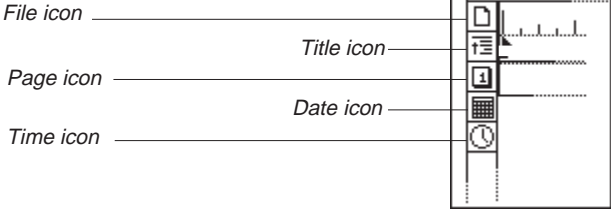
You enter header or footer information in the Header/Footer window. The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed. To change the display, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom edge of the dialog box, or choose View Header or View Footer from the Header or Footer menu.

**Header and footer "hot stamp" icons:**



The icons along the left side of the Header or Footer dialog box insert “hot stamps” at the insertion point in the header or footer window. Hot stamps are placeholders for data that will vary between pages or between printings—page numbers, headlines, date, time, and file or folder name. When you print, MORE automatically replaces the placeholder with the correct information. Pressing an icon displays a pop-up menu of available choices. For example, pressing Date icon allows you to choose whether you want to display the date the chart is printed or the date the chart was last modified. The Hot Stamp command in the Edit menu inserts the same data as the Header/Footer icons. See “Using Hot Stamps” in Chapter 2 for more information on Hot Stamps.

The following is a description of the Header/Footer icons:

<i>File icon</i>	Inserts the name of the MORE file, or the folder where it is located.
<i>Title icon</i>	Inserts the level-0 (zero) headline or level-1 headline from the beginning of the current page.
<i>Page icon</i>	Inserts either a page number or a page count. By default, MORE displays numbers in the Arabic format (1, 2, 3,...). Use the Hot Stamp command if you want to display page numbers or page count in Roman numerals.
<i>Date icon</i>	Inserts the date the outline or chart was printed or the date it was last modified.
<i>Time icon</i>	Inserts the time the outline or chart was printed or the time it was last modified.

---

The Header/Footer window has a text ruler that you can use to set tabs, change line spacing, and justification. For information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text” in Chapter 2.

When you add a header or footer, you can control whether it appears on the first page and specify a starting number for page numbering. For example, if you specify 4 as the starting page, the page numbering sequence will be 4, 5, 6, and so on.

**To add a header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu.  
The Header/Footer window appears. The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed.
2. To toggle between the Header and Footer views, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom of window.
3. Type the text you want to appear in the header or footer.
4. Use the icons to insert information such as the date or time.
5. Use the text ruler to set tabs, change line or paragraph spacing, or change text justification.  
For information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text” in Chapter 2.
6. To specify the page on which you want the header or footer to begin printing, choose Starting Page Number from the Header or Footer menu. Type the page number in the dialog box and click OK.
7. To specify that the header and footer not print on the first page, choose Skip First Page from the Header or Footer menu. A check mark appears next to this menu command when it is selected.
8. To close the Header/Footer window, click the close box.

**To view, change, or delete an existing header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu to display the Header/Footer window.
2. Display the header or footer by clicking the header or footer icon at the bottom of dialog box.
3. Edit or delete header or footer text as you would any other text.
4. When you have finished editing text, click the close box.

## PRINTING BULLET CHARTS

MORE prints your bullet charts according to the options you have set in the Print Options window and Page Setup dialog box. Print options control how bullet charts are printed. For example, you can print charts with or without speaker's notes or specify how many charts print per page. You also use the Print Options window to set page margins and preview how your printout will look. Page setup options control paper size, page orientation, and other settings specific to your printer (or other output device). MORE retains your options settings, so you don't have to set them each time you print.

### To print bullet charts

1. To change print options, set page margins, or preview your bullet chart printout before printing, choose Print Options from the File menu to display the Print Options window.

For more information, see "Setting Print Options and Previewing," which follows this section.

2. To change the page setup options, choose Page Setup from the File menu or click the Page Setup icon to display the Page Setup dialog box.

For more information see "Changing Page Setup," later in this chapter.

3. After setting the options, you can print by choosing Print from the file menu or by clicking the Printer icon in the Print Options window.

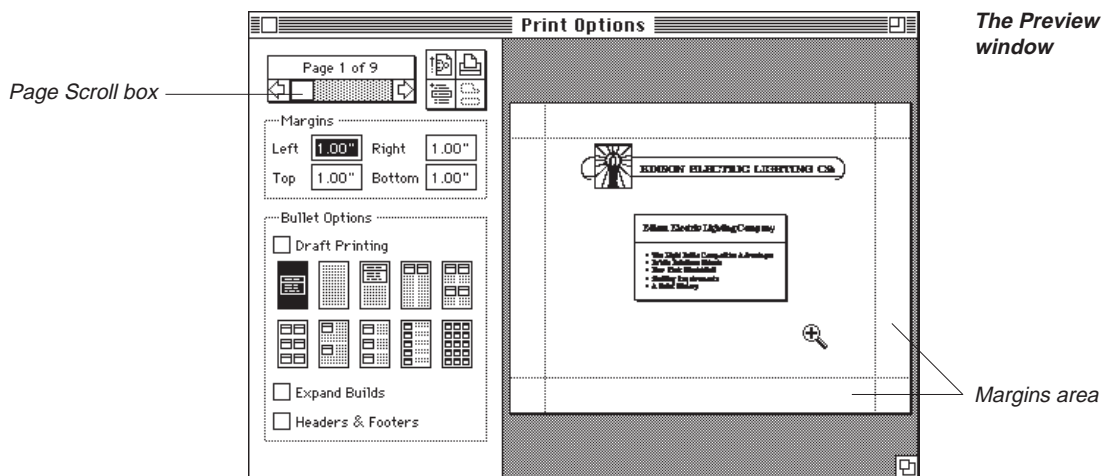
## Setting Print Options and Previewing

Use the Print Options window to set the page margins, preview how bullet charts will print, and set print options to

- print a draft copy
- specify how many charts print per page
- print each element of a build as a separate chart
- print headers and footers



When you choose Print Options from the File menu, a preview of your first chart appears in the Print Options window. When you move the pointer over the preview, it changes to a magnifying glass with a plus sign (shown in margin). To magnify a portion of the chart, position the magnifying glass over the section you want to enlarge, and click. To see a part of the chart that is out of view, hold down **W** to display the grabber hand, (shown in margin) then drag on a visible portion of the chart to scroll through the chart. Clicking anywhere on the preview returns you to the normal view.



**Page Scroll box** Indicates the page number currently displayed in the preview area and the total number of pages that will be printed. Use the scroll bar to scroll the pages in the preview area of the window.

**NOTE:** You may also use the right or left arrows keys to go to the next or previous page.



*Page Setup icon* Displays the Page Setup dialog box.

---



*Printer icon* Displays the Print dialog box.

---



*“Go to” Chart icon* Goes to a designated chart in the presentation.

---

*Margins* Use the entry boxes to specify the left, right, top, and bottom page margins for the chart. Type the values you want in the margin boxes. Margins can be specified in inches, pixels, or centimeters. You choose the unit of measurement in the Document Options dialog box (see “Setting Document Options” in Chapter 1).

---

The Print Options dialog box has the following options for printing bullet charts:

*Draft Printing* Prints bullet charts in black and white. When Draft Printing is selected, MORE prints object fills in white or the None style, object edges in black and shadows in gray.

---

*Layout Options* Represent arrangements of charts and speaker’s notes on the printed page.

---

*Expand Builds* Prints each element of a build as a separate chart. This option is available only when the first layout option (one chart per page) is selected.

---

*Headers & Footers* Prints headers and footers. Headers and footers print as specified in the Header/Footer window.

---

**To preview a bullet chart**

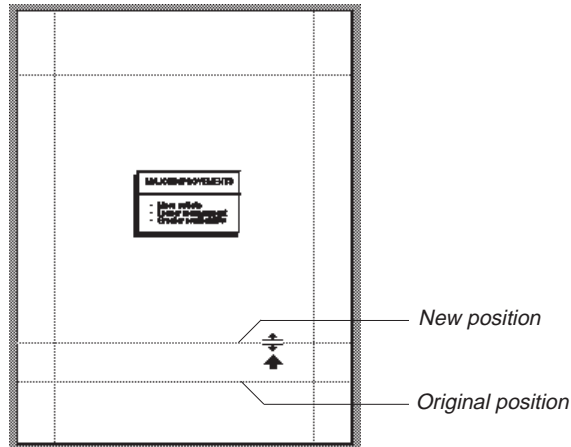
1. Choose Print Options from the File menu.  
The first chart appears in the Print Options window.
2. Set the page margins and print options you want.  
The Print Options window changes to show how the printed charts will appear with the options and margins you have set.
3. Change the page setup options, if necessary. For more information, see “Changing Page Setup,” the last section in this chapter.  
If you changed page setup options, the Print Options window shows how the printed charts will appear with the new settings.
4. When you are ready to print, click the Printer icon or choose the Print command from the File menu.  
A dialog box appears for the printer you are using.
5. Specify the options you want and click OK.

**To set page margins**

- Type the page margin settings in the Margins text boxes.  
or
- Drag the margin lines to the position you want, as shown in the following illustration. When you position the pointer over a margin line, it changes to the shape shown in the margin. To move the margin hold down the mouse button and drag. The new margin setting automatically appears in the appropriate Margins box.

### **To go to a chart**

1. Use the scroll bar to preview the chart you want to view.
2. Click the "Go To" Chart icon.  
The pointer changes to a horizontal arrow.
3. Click on the chart you want to go to.  
MORE displays the selected chart in the Bullet Chart window.

---

## **Changing Page Setup**

Before printing, you can specify the page setup options you want, such as paper size, orientation of your printed charts, and any special printer effects, such as smoothing or font substitution. The options that are available will vary depending on the printing device and System software version you are using.

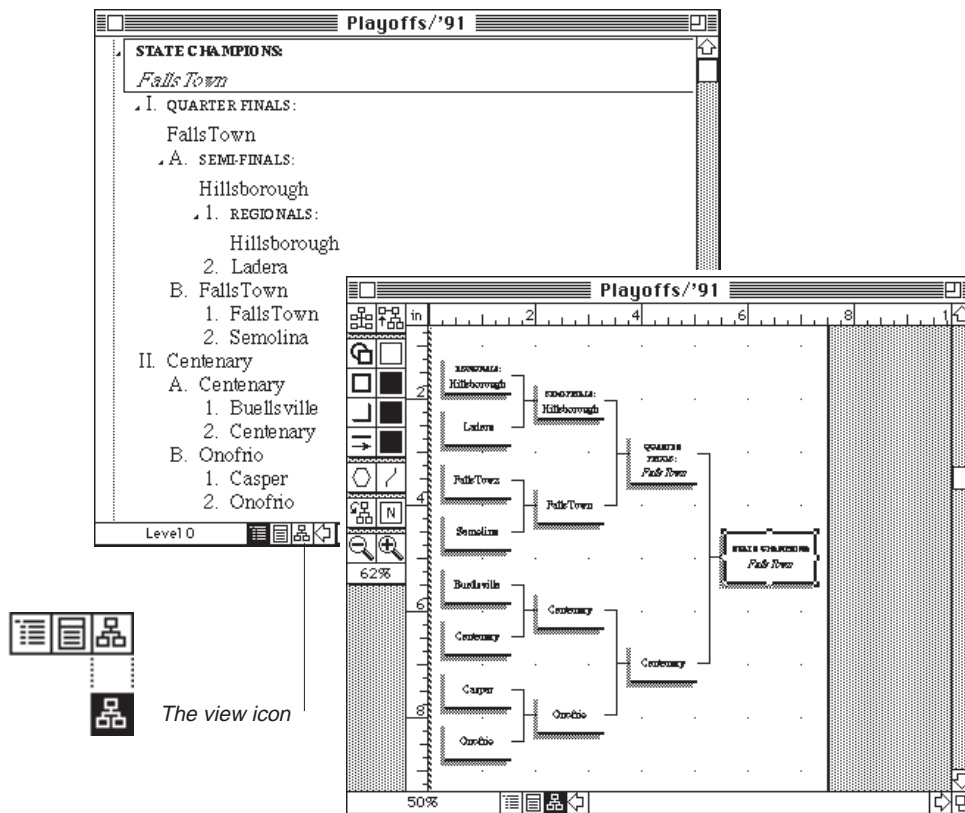
### **To change page setup options**

- Choose Page Setup from the File menu (or click the Page Setup icon in the Print Options window).  
MORE displays the Page Setup dialog box for your printing device. For more information about page setup options, refer to the user's guide that accompanies your printing device.

# CHAPTER 4

## USING TREE CHARTS

You can use MORE to create a variety of tree charts, such as organizational charts, flow charts, decision trees, genealogy trees, and block diagrams. MORE automatically generates a tree chart from your outline when you switch to Tree Chart view. You can then use the tree chart menus and tool palette to modify the initial version and create the type of tree chart you want.



With MORE, you can create tree charts up to 40 feet long and 40 feet wide. Large tree charts are printed in parts or tiles on separate sheets of paper which can then be assembled.

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## TREE CHART FEATURES

You can modify a tree chart in the following ways:

- Reorient the root node so that the chart “grows” from the bottom, left, or right side of the page—instead of from the top of the page.
- Arrange subnodes into different cluster styles.
- Assign a staff position to nodes.
- Change the shape of nodes.
- Specify different border and shadow styles for nodes.
- Change how text is formatted within nodes.
- Apply color, patterns, and gradients to the chart’s lines, nodes, and background.
- Use the Library to format a new tree chart with an existing set of tree rules.

.....

## CREATING A TREE CHART

To create a tree chart, first create an outline that contains all the headlines that you want to appear in the tree chart. If you want a headline to be subordinate to another headline in the tree chart, make it subordinate in the outline. For instructions on creating an outline, see “Using Outlines,” in Chapter 2.

After you have created the outline, switch to Tree Chart view to see this same information organized as a tree chart. Only expanded headlines from your outline will appear in the tree chart. You can use the tool palette and the Tree menu commands to format and style text and objects in a tree chart. Since tree chart text is based on the underlying outline, you must switch to Outline view to edit text. The editing changes you make in Outline view will appear in your tree chart when you switch back to Tree Chart view. Changing the format or style of text in Tree Chart view does not change the underlying outline.

## Switching to Tree Chart View

When you switch to Tree Chart view, you can view the entire outline or only a selected suboutline as a tree chart.

### To view the entire outline as a tree chart

- Choose Tree Chart from the Outline menu (in Outline view) or the Bullet menu (in Bullet Chart view), or press **W-J**.
- or
- Click the tree chart icon (see the margin) on the status line at the bottom of the MORE window.

The entire outline appears as a tree chart in the window.



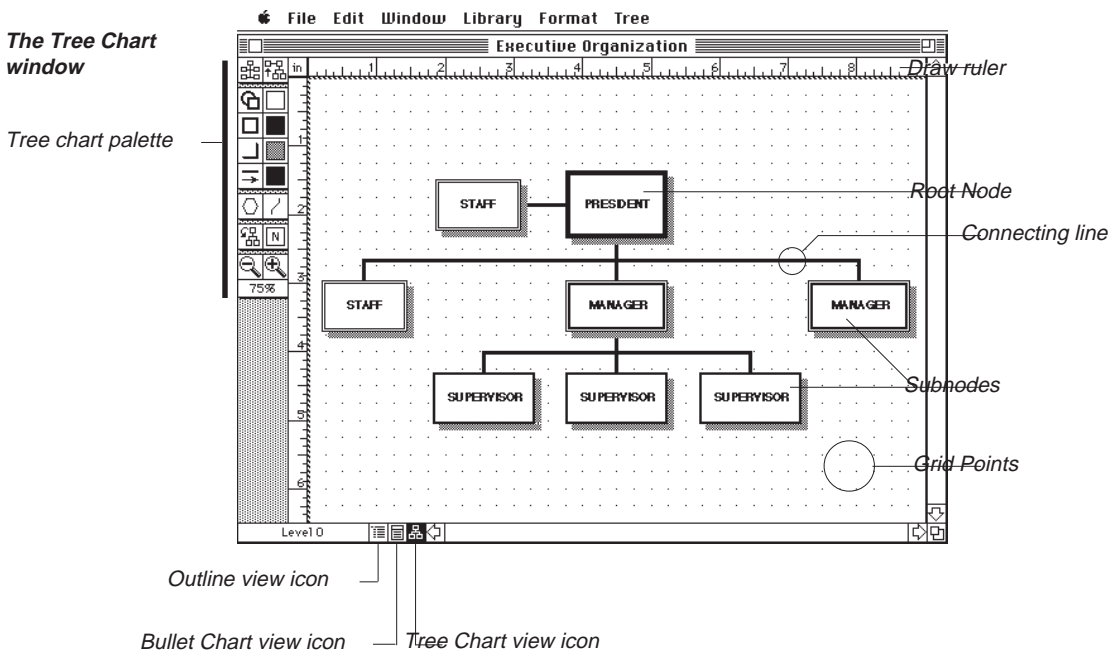
### To view a selected suboutline as a tree chart

1. Select the headline you want.
2. Hold down the Option key and click the Tree Chart icon to display Tree Chart view.

The selected headline and its subheads appear as a tree chart in the window.

## THE TREE CHART VIEW

When you switch to Tree Chart view, the current version of the tree chart appears in the Tree Chart window. Each expanded headline from the outline appears in its own box or node in the tree chart. The root node is the node that all other nodes branch from. MORE automatically places the root node at the top of the window and centers the tree chart in the window. The nodes and connecting lines are objects that can be selected and styled.



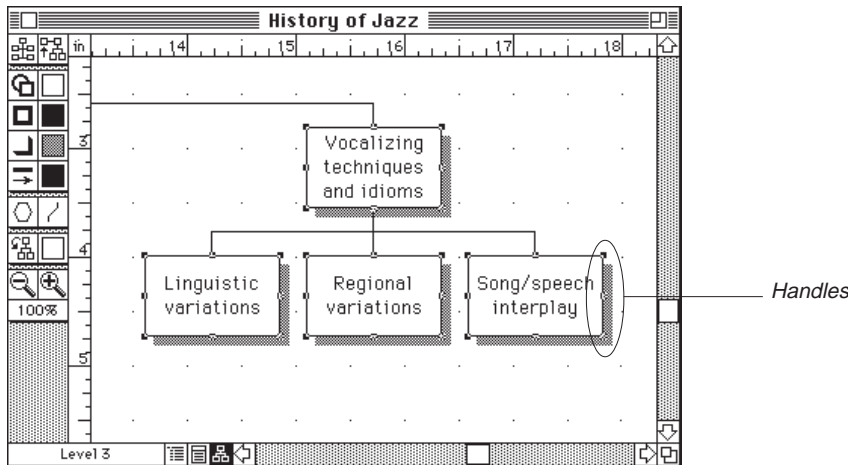
The Tree Chart window contains the following elements:

- A palette of tools for changing the chart orientation and the format and style of nodes and connecting lines.
- A grid and a pair of rulers for aligning nodes on the chart.
- View icons that you can use to switch between the MORE views. (Click an icon to switch the view.)



## Selecting Nodes and Lines

To modify a tree chart you select the nodes and lines you want to change, then use the palette tools or menu commands to change the selection. Each node and line on a tree chart is an object. You select nodes and lines by clicking or dragging a selection box around them. When you select a node or line, handles appear, as shown in the following illustration.



*A tree chart with nodes and lines selected*

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### To select an object

- Position the pointer over the node or line you want to select, and click. Handles appear on the object to indicate that it is selected.

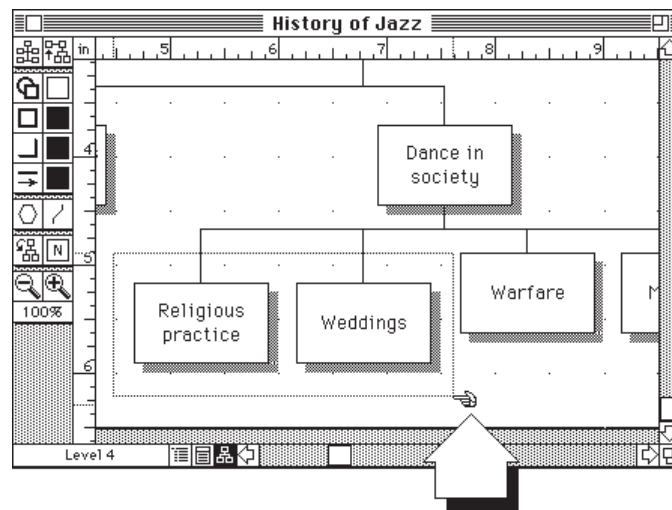
### To select multiple objects

- Select the first object. Then hold down the Shift key as you select the second object.  
or
- Drag the pointer diagonally across the objects to draw a selection box around them. As you drag, the pointer turns into a hand (see the following illustration). When you release the mouse button, all objects completely enclosed by the selection box are selected.

### To select all of the lines coming out of a node

- Click the point where they all intersect.

The selection box being drawn around two nodes in a tree chart



#### To select all objects

- Press W-A.
- or
- Choose Select All from the Edit menu.

**NOTE:** *If nothing is selected, formatting commands are applied to the entire tree. Therefore, clicking the chart background has the same effect as selecting all for most operations.*

#### To deselect objects

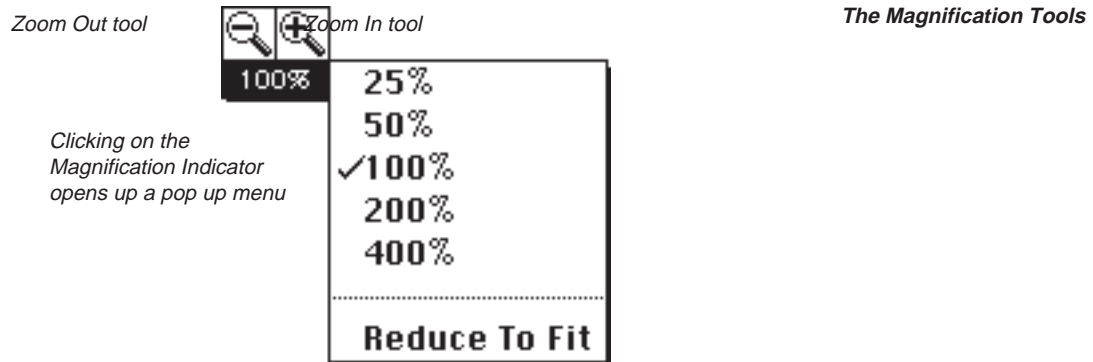
- Click the chart background to deselect all objects.
- To deselect an object and select another, select the second object. The first is automatically deselected.

#### To select a level or range of levels

1. Press Option and choose Select from the Edit menu. The Select dialog appears.
2. Enter the level or levels you want to select.
3. Click OK to select the levels you specified.

## Zooming In and Zooming Out

Zooming in or zooming out changes the magnification of the chart view in the window. Zoom in when you want to see the chart in greater detail; zoom out to get an overview of the chart. To zoom, you can use either the Zoom In and Zoom Out tools or the Magnification Indicator. Clicking a magnification tool enlarges or reduces the current view by one magnification level. Using the Magnification Indicator allows you to choose a specific magnification level. You can choose from six magnification levels—Reduce To Fit, 25, 50, 100, 200, or 400 percent. Reduce To Fit reduces the chart as much as necessary to fit the entire chart in the window. The current magnification level appears in the Magnification Indicator. The following illustration shows the Magnification tools and the Magnification Indicator.



.....

### To zoom in

- Click the Zoom In tool on the palette.  
Each time you click the Zoom In tool, the current view is enlarged to the next level of magnification.

or

- Click the Magnification Indicator and choose the magnification level you want from the pop-up menu.

**TIP** *To zoom in on one section of the chart, select a node in that section before zooming in. The selected node will remain in view when you zoom in.*

**To zoom out**

- Click the Zoom Out tool on the palette.

Each time you click the Zoom Out tool, the chart is displayed in a reduced level of magnification.

or

- Click the Magnification Indicator and choose the magnification level you want from the pop-up menu.

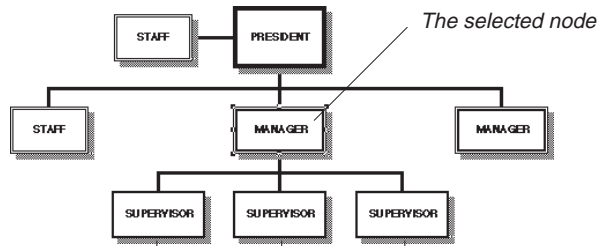


*To keep a specific section of the chart in view when you zoom out, select a node in that section before zooming out. The selected node will remain in view when you zoom out.*

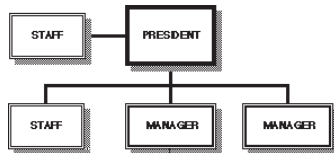
**Collapsing and Expanding Subnodes**

You can collapse the subnodes of any selected node. Collapsed subnodes are hidden from view and do not print. By collapsing subnodes you can control which branches of your tree chart are displayed and printed. The following illustration shows how a chart appears when you collapse subnodes.

*A tree chart*



*With subnodes expanded*



*The selected node with the subnodes collapsed*

*Note the “closing in” of the space between nodes at the same level*

**To collapse subnodes**

- Hold down the Option key and double-click the parent node of the subnodes you want to collapse.

or

- Select the parent node of the subnodes you want to collapse and choose Collapse Subnodes from the Tree menu or press **W-** (period).

The collapsed subnodes are hidden from view and the chart is redrawn.

**To expand collapsed subnodes**

- Hold down the Option key and double-click the parent node that has collapsed subnodes you want to view.

or

- Select the node that has collapsed subnodes you want to view and choose Expand Subnodes from the Tree menu, or press **W-** (period).

MORE redraws the chart, displaying the previously collapsed subnodes.



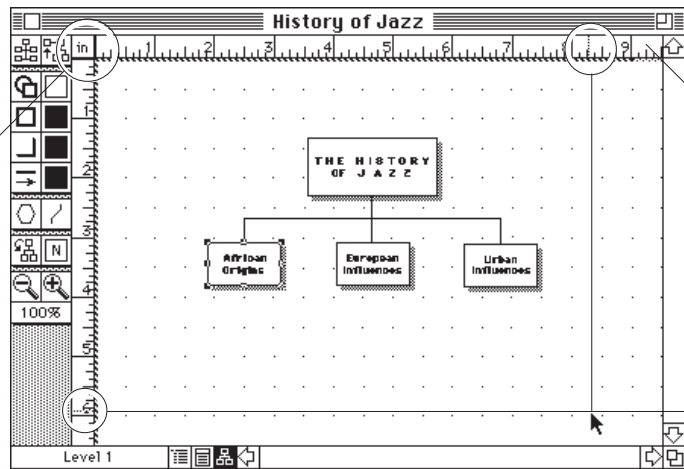
*To expand all collapsed subnodes in the chart, click the chart background or the summit node and choose Expand All from the Tree menu.*

## Using the Grid and Draw Rulers

The Tree Chart window provides a set of draw rulers and a grid to help you position and align nodes. There are two draw rulers: a horizontal ruler across the top of the window and a vertical ruler down the left edge. A dotted line in each draw ruler shows the current position of the pointer tool in the tree chart. The grid is displayed as points that represent the intersection of invisible grid lines. You can set the unit of measure used in the rulers and grid to inches, pixels, or centimeters. The rulers and grid can be hidden from view if you do not need them. Because MORE automatically repositions nodes and recenters the chart as required, Tree Chart view does not provide any grid snap options. MORE does provide an Align Objects command in Tree Chart view if you need to align nodes.

### To hide or show the draw rulers

- Choose Hide Draw Ruler or Show Draw Ruler from the Tree menu.

This command changes depending on whether the ruler is currently hidden or displayed.

### To hide or show the grid

- Choose Hide Grid or Show Grid from the Grid submenu in the Tree menu.

This command changes depending on whether the grid is currently hidden or displayed.

**To set the unit of measure**

1. Use one of the following methods to display the Document Options dialog box:

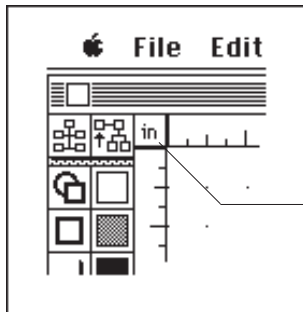
Choose Document Options from the Windows menu.

or

Double-click the Tree Chart view icon at the bottom of the window.

or

Double-click the intersection of the rulers.

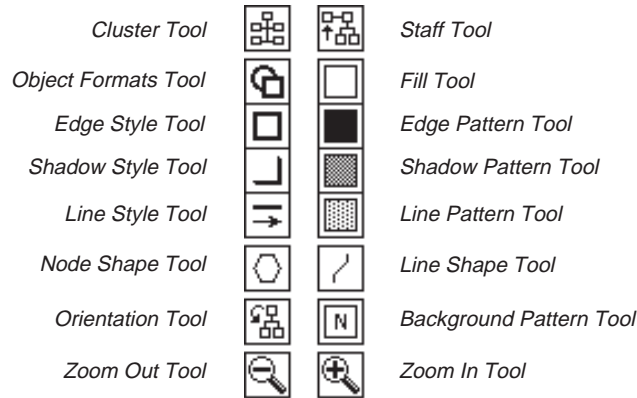

2. Select the unit of measure in the Document Options dialog box. Click OK.

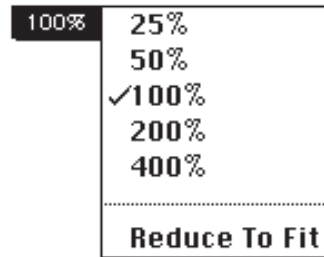
## THE TREE CHART PALETTE

The Tree Chart palette appears on the left side of the Tree Chart window. The palette contains tools for formatting and styling your tree chart. For detailed information about using a tool, refer to the appropriate section in this chapter.

Use the Cluster tool to change the arrangement of all nodes subordinate to the selected node. Pressing the Cluster tool displays a pop-up menu of available cluster styles. For more information, see “Applying a Cluster Style,” later in this chapter.

### Staff Position Tool



Use the Staff Position tool to change the relationship of a selected node to its parent node. Pressing the Staff Position tool displays a pop-up menu that lets you position the selected node to the left or right of its parent node. For more information about using this tool, see “Assigning a Staff Position to a Node,” later in this chapter.



**Object Formats Tool**

Use the Object Formats tool to apply multiple styles changes to nodes and lines without having to apply each style separately using various palette tools. You can also use this tool to change node size and gap in the chart. Pressing the Object Formats tool displays a pop-up menu from which you can choose to change object formats or the size and gap. For more information, see “Changing Size and Gap” and “Applying Multiple Styles,” later in this chapter.

---

**Fill Tool**

Use the Fill tool to fill a selected node with a color or pattern. Pressing the Fill tool displays a pop-up menu of available colors and patterns (which can also contain solid colors and gradients). For more information about using this tool, see “Applying Colors or Patterns,” later in this chapter.

---

**Edge Style Tool**

Use the Edge Style tool to change the style of a selected node’s edge. Pressing the Edge Style tool displays a pop-up menu of available widths and styles. For more information about using this tool, see “Changing Node Edge Style,” later in this chapter.

---

**Edge Pattern Tool**

Use the Edge Pattern tool to apply a color or pattern to the edge of a selected node. Pressing the Edge Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available colors and patterns. You can also create a custom pattern. For more information about using this tool, see “Applying Colors or Patterns,” later in this chapter.

---

**Shadow Style Tool**

Use the Shadow Style tool to add a drop shadow to a selected node. Pressing the Shadow Style tool displays a pop-up menu of available shadow styles. Choosing None removes the shadow from a selected node. For more information about using this tool, see “Changing Shadow Style,” later in this chapter.

---

**Shadow Pattern Tool**

Use the Shadow Pattern tool to apply a color or pattern to a node shadow. Pressing the Shadow Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available patterns. You can also create a custom pattern. For more information about using this tool, see “Applying Colors or Patterns,” later in this chapter.

*Line Style Tool*



Use the Line Style tool to change the width or line-ending style of selected connecting lines. Pressing the Line Style tool displays a pop-up menu of available widths and line-ending styles. For more information, see “Changing Line Style,” later in this chapter.

---

*Line Pattern Tool*



Use the Line Pattern tool to apply a color or pattern to selected connecting lines in the tree chart. Pressing the Line Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available colors and patterns. For more information, see “Applying Colors or Patterns,” later in this chapter.

---

*Node Shape Tool*



Use the Node Shape tool to change the shape of a selected node. Pressing the Node Shape tool displays a pop-up menu of available node shapes. For more information, see “Changing Node Shape,” later in this chapter.

---

*Line Shape Tool*



Use the Line Shape tool to change the shape of selected connecting lines in the tree chart. Clicking on the Line Shape tool displays a pop-up menu of available line shapes. For more information, see “Changing Line Shape,” later in this chapter.

---

*Orientation Tool*



Use the Orientation tool to change the location of the root node. Pressing the Orientation tool displays a pop-up menu with four orientation choices: top, left, right, and bottom. For more information, see “Changing Tree Orientation,” later in this chapter.

---

*Background Pattern Tool*



Use the Background Pattern tool to apply a color or pattern to the chart background. Pressing the Background Pattern tool displays a pop-up menu of available patterns and colors. For more information, see “Applying Colors or Patterns,” later in this chapter.

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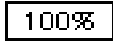
*Zoom Tools*



Use the Zoom In and Zoom Out tools to magnify or reduce the size of the tree chart in the window. For more information about how the zoom tools operate, see “Zooming In and Zooming Out,” earlier in this chapter.

---

*Magnification Indicator*



Use the Magnification Indicator to specify a magnification level or to see the current chart magnification. Pressing the Magnification Indicator displays a pop-up menu of available magnification levels. For more information, see “Zooming In and Zooming Out,” earlier in this chapter.

---

**MANAGING TREE CHARTS**

Before modifying individual nodes and lines in your chart, you’ll want to make the following organizational changes if they are necessary:

- Change the tree orientation.
- Change cluster styles.
- Assign staff positions to nodes where necessary.
- Adjust the tree size.

**Changing Tree Orientation**

MORE automatically orients a tree chart with the root node at the top of the window. All nodes branch from the root node. A frame appears around the currently selected orientation: You can change the orientation so that the root node is at the left, right, or bottom of the window. Pressing the Orientation tool on the palette displays the following orientation choices:



Orients the root node at the top of the chart.



Orients the root node at the left of the chart.



Orients the root node at the bottom of the chart.



Orients the root node at the right of the chart.

---

### To change chart orientation

- Press the Orientation tool on the palette and choose the orientation style you want from the pop-up menu that appears.

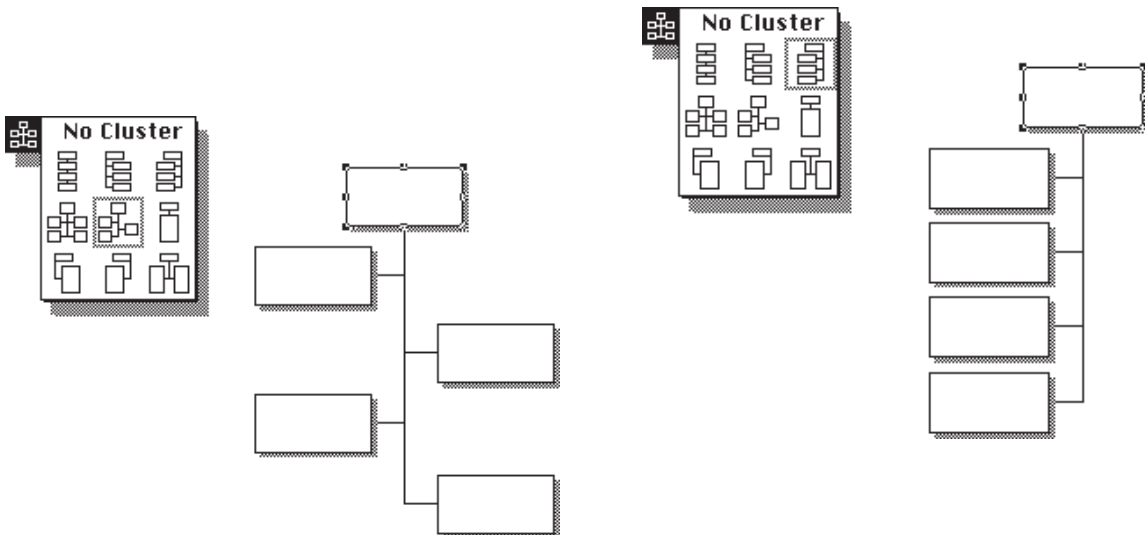
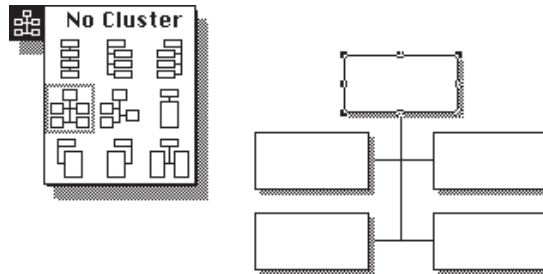
The tree chart is redisplayed in the new orientation.

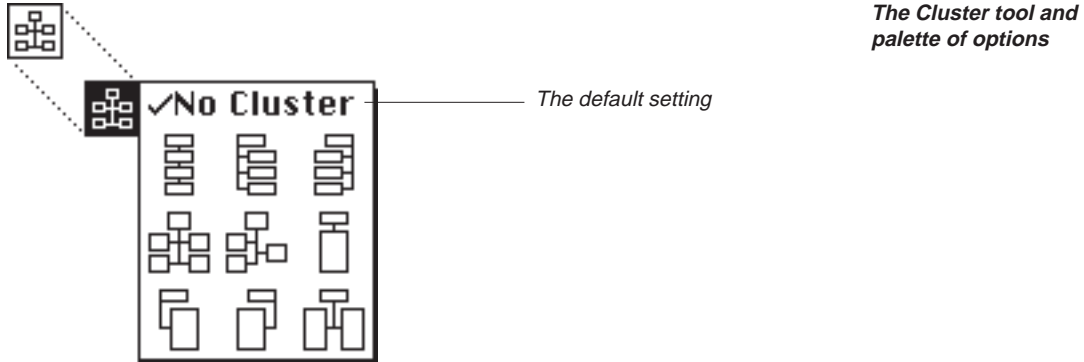
### Applying a Cluster Style

MORE automatically arranges subnodes side-by-side below the parent node. This placement can create a very wide chart. You can rearrange subnodes by applying different cluster styles to groups of subnodes. Since cluster styles arrange subnodes vertically, they reduce the width of your tree chart.

*Various node cluster styles*



You can apply the following cluster styles to nodes:



### To apply a cluster style

1. Select the parent node of the group of subnodes you want to rearrange.
2. Press the Cluster tool on the tool palette and choose the cluster style you want.

A frame appears around the currently selected style.

The tree chart is redrawn showing the nodes arranged according to the selected style, and according to the cluster option you specified in the Cluster Options dialog box. For more information on cluster options, see the next section, "Specifying a Cluster Option."

**NOTE:** *If your tree chart was created with an earlier version of MORE, not all cluster styles may be available to you.*

### Specifying a Cluster Option

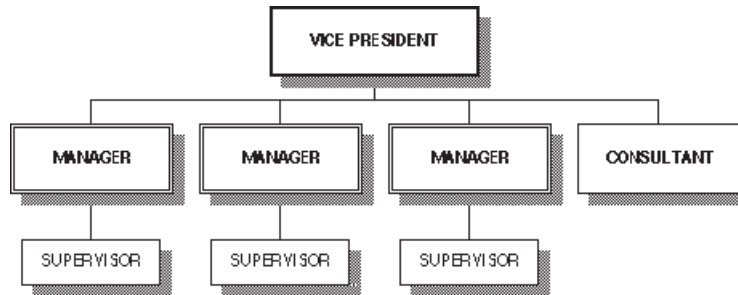
MORE provides a Cluster Options command that lets you specify how cluster options are applied to tree charts. You can either apply a cluster style anywhere in the tree, or specify that a selected cluster style be applied only to certain levels of a tree. To specify a cluster option, choose Cluster Options from the Tree menu and click the option you want.

### Assigning a Staff Position to a Node

You can use the Staff Position tool to move a subordinate node to a staff position on the left or right side of its parent node. This tool is especially useful when you want to illustrate a special reporting relationship between staff members in an organizational chart. For example, say that a research consultant and three managers report to the same vice president. This reporting relationship could be represented as shown in the following illustration :

**A simple tree:**

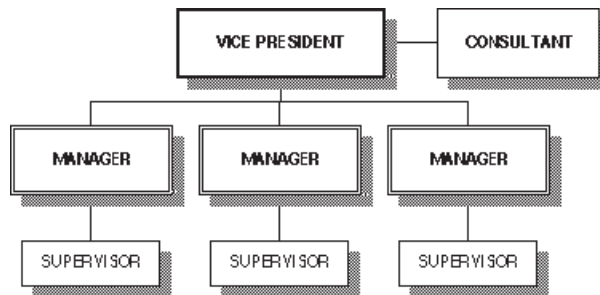
*Vice President at the top, three managers, and a research consultant below the vice president*



.....

However, if the research consultant has a reporting relationship to the vice president that is different from that of the managers, you can represent this relationship by using the Staff Position tool to assign a staff position to the consultant, as shown in the following illustration

*The same chart as that shown above, but the consultant has been assigned to a new staff position— to the right of the Vice President.*



You can assign a staff position to any node except the root. When you assign a staff position to a node, all its subnodes move accordingly.

**NOTE:** *Two subnodes cannot be set as a staff position on the same side of their parent.*

You choose from the following staff positions from the Staff Position tool pop-up menu (a frame appears around the currently selected staff position):



Moves the selected node or branch to the left side of the parent node.



Moves the selected node or branch to the right side of the parent node.



Moves the selected node or branch to its original position below the parent node.

---

### **To change the staff position of a node**

1. Select the node you want to assign to a staff position.
2. Press the Staff Position tool on the palette and choose the icon representing the staff position you want from the pop-up menu that appears.

## MANAGING NODES AND LINES

Your chart's professional appearance will depend on how you arrange and style nodes and lines. The procedures in this section describe how to

- move nodes to adjust the space between them
- change the size and shape of nodes
- change node edge and shadow styles
- change the style and shape of connecting lines

### Moving Nodes

You can drag a node to adjust the space between it and surrounding nodes in the tree chart. MORE automatically repositions the subnodes and connecting lines accordingly and recenters the tree chart in the window. You cannot move a node from its logical place in the overall tree. For example, you cannot move a node vertically from the third level to the second level of the tree—or move a node horizontally to a position under another node to which it is not connected. If you want to rearrange a node relative to its position in the tree hierarchy, you can move the node to a staff position (if this is appropriate) or switch to Outline view and reorganize your headlines. For more information about moving a node to a staff position, see “Assigning a Staff Position to a Node,” earlier in this chapter.

**NOTE:** *You can also use the **Size and Gap** command on the **Tree** menu to change the space between nodes. For more information, see “Changing the Size and Gap,” later in this chapter.*

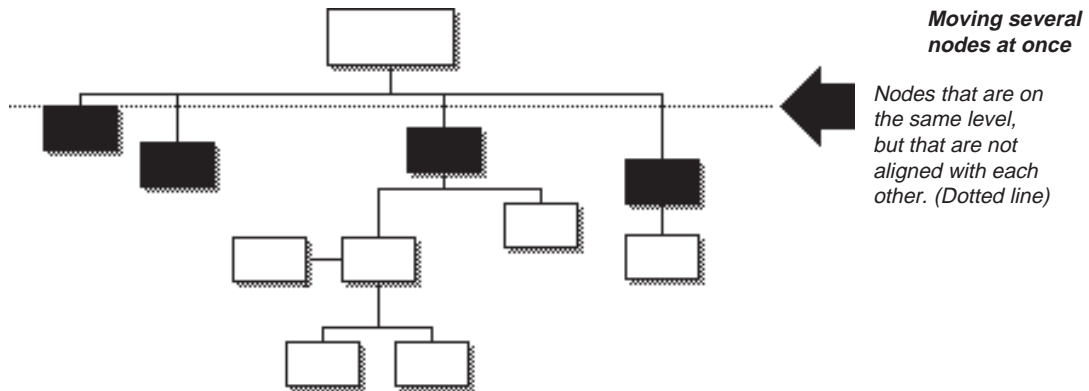
After you have dragged nodes to the general location where you want them, you can use the **Align Objects** command to precisely align one or more nodes that are on the same level. For more information, see “Aligning Nodes,” later in this chapter.

When you drag a node, you are not specifying an *absolute* position, but a distance from its adjacent nodes.



**To move a node**

1. Select one or more nodes, as shown in the following illustration.



2. Drag the selected nodes to the desired position. Be careful to not drag any node handles, or you may accidentally resize nodes.

MORE repositions each selected node so that there is an equal distance from its adjacent nodes.



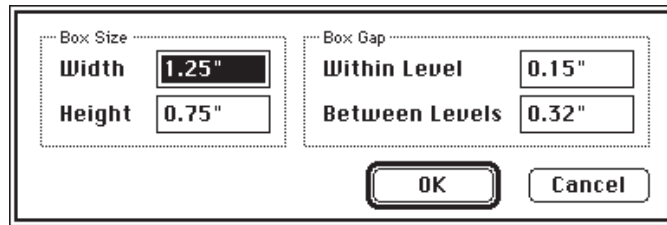
*To constrain the movement of nodes to a vertical or horizontal direction, hold down the Shift key when you drag.*

## Changing Size and Gap

The size of a tree chart is determined by the height and width of the nodes and the horizontal and vertical distance or gap between the nodes. MORE provides a Size and Gap dialog box where you can change the size of nodes or the gaps between selected nodes.

In addition to using the Size and Gap dialog box, you can also change node size and gap by resizing or dragging nodes. For more information about these techniques, see “Sizing Nodes” and “Moving Nodes,” in this chapter.

*The Size and Gap dialog box*



---

*Width box*      Enter a width for the selected node or nodes.

---

*Height box*      Enter a height for the selected node or nodes.

---

*Within Level*      Enter a value for the gap between selected nodes on the same level.

---

*Between Levels*      Enter a value for the gap between the selected node and the parent nodes (the nodes one level above the selected node).

---

**To change tree size**

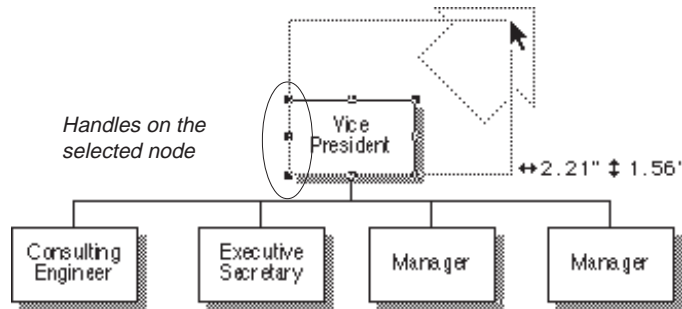
1. Select the nodes you want to modify.  
Choose Select All from the Edit menu or press **W-A** to select all nodes.
2. Choose the Size and Gap command from the Tree menu.  
or  
Press the Object Formats tool on the palette and choose Size and Gap from the pop-up menu.  
or  
Double-click one of the selected nodes.  
The Size and Gap dialog box appears.
3. To change the node height, node width, gap between levels, or gap within levels, select the appropriate box and type the value you want. Then click **OK**.  
MORE redraws the tree chart to show the changes you specified.

## Sizing Nodes

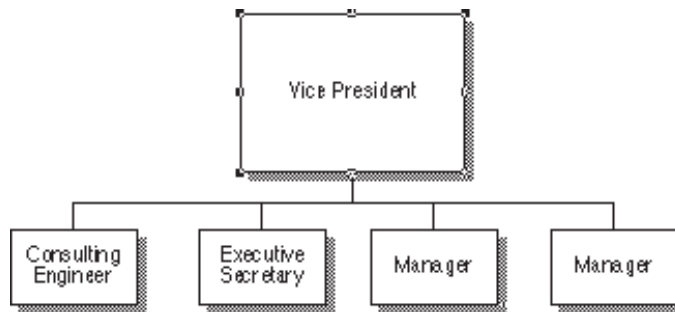
You can change the size of a node by dragging one of its handles. If several nodes are selected, dragging a handle of one node changes the size of all the selected nodes. When you position the pointer directly over a handle, the pointer changes to a crosshair. As you drag a handle, a dotted outline indicates the size you are selecting. If the Show Sizes option in the Program Options dialog box is turned on, MORE also displays the height and width of the node as you drag. By holding down the Shift key as you drag, you can retain the node's original proportions (the ratio between its height and width remains the same.) MORE automatically wraps text to fit into the resized node. The size of text and graphics do not change when you change the size of a node.

**NOTE:** To turn on the Show Sizes option, choose Program Options from the File menu. Select Show Sizes and click OK.

*Resizing an individual node in a tree chart*



*The end result*



**NOTE:** You can also use the Size and Gap command on the Tree menu to change the size of nodes. For more information, see "Changing Size and Gap," earlier in this chapter.

**To size one or more nodes**

1. Select the node or nodes to be sized.
2. Position the arrow over one of the handles and drag.  
If you selected multiple nodes, dragging a handle of one node changes the size of all selected nodes.
3. Release the mouse button when you have dragged to the desired size.

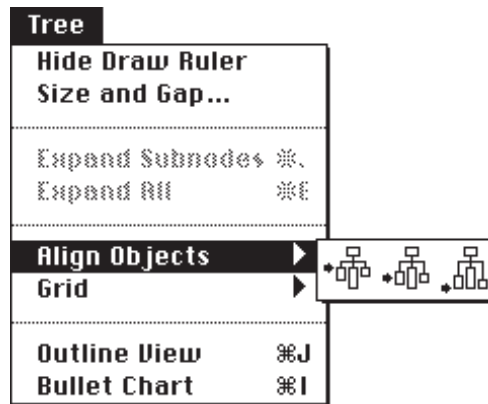
**To proportionately size one or more nodes**

1. Select the node or nodes to be sized.
2. Hold down the Shift key, then position the arrow over one of the handles and drag.  
If you selected multiple nodes, dragging a handle of one node changes the size of all selected nodes.
3. Release the mouse button when you have dragged to the desired size.

## Aligning Nodes

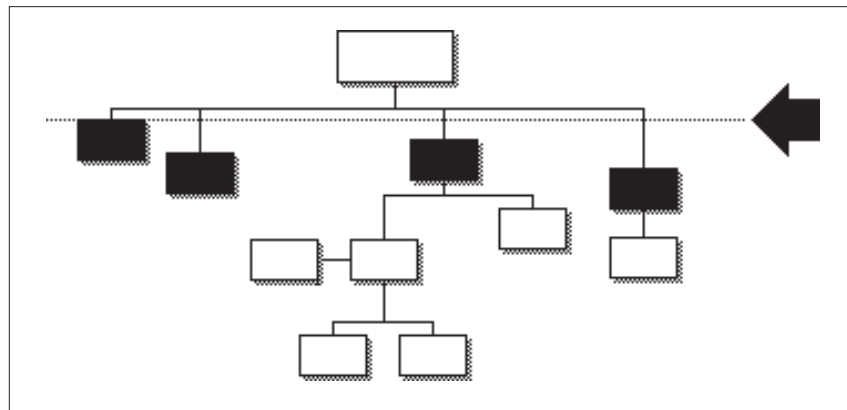
MORE provides an Align Objects command that lets you precisely align nodes along their top borders, center lines, or bottom borders. Aligning nodes gives your chart a neat appearance. The selected nodes should be located on the same level in the tree chart. You select the alignment you want from the pop-up menu that appears when you choose the Align Objects command from the Tree menu. The following illustration shows the alignment position associated with each icon in the pop-up menu.

*Align Objects command is selected and the pop-up menu displayed*



### To align nodes

1. Select the nodes you want to align. The nodes should be in the same level of the tree chart, as shown below.

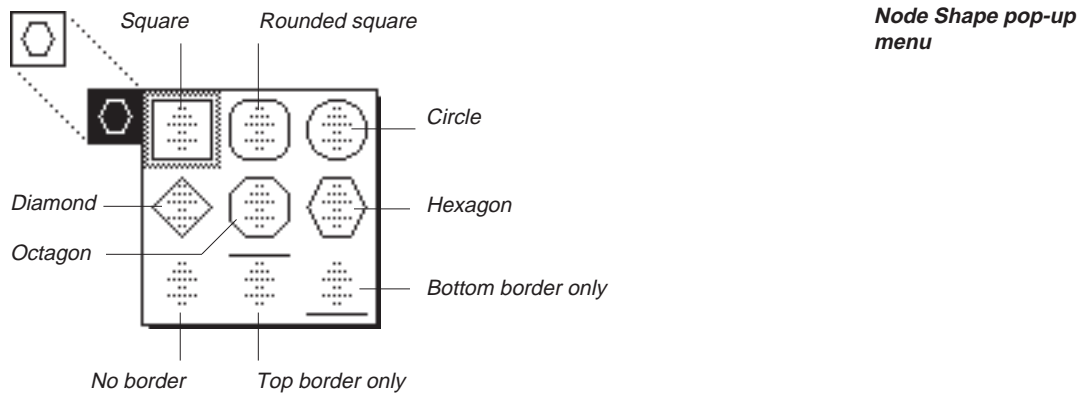


2. Choose Align Objects from the Tree menu.
3. Choose the alignment position you want from the pop-up menu that appears.  
The selected nodes are aligned according to the position you have selected.

.....

### Changing Node Shape

Using different node shapes is a visual way of showing different levels of a hierarchy. You can change the shape of a node to any of the following styles:

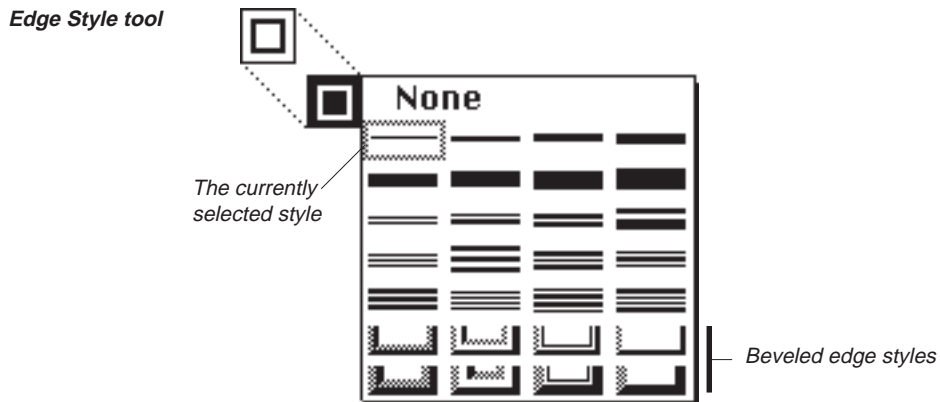


#### To change node shape

1. Select the node or nodes that you want to change.
2. Press the Shape tool on the palette and select the shape you want from the pop-up menu that appears.

## Changing Node Edge Style

MORE offers 28 node edge styles. You can also choose to have no edge around a node. You select an edge style from the pop-up menu that appears when you press the Edge Style tool on the palette. A gray box appears around the currently selected style.



### To change the edge of one or more nodes

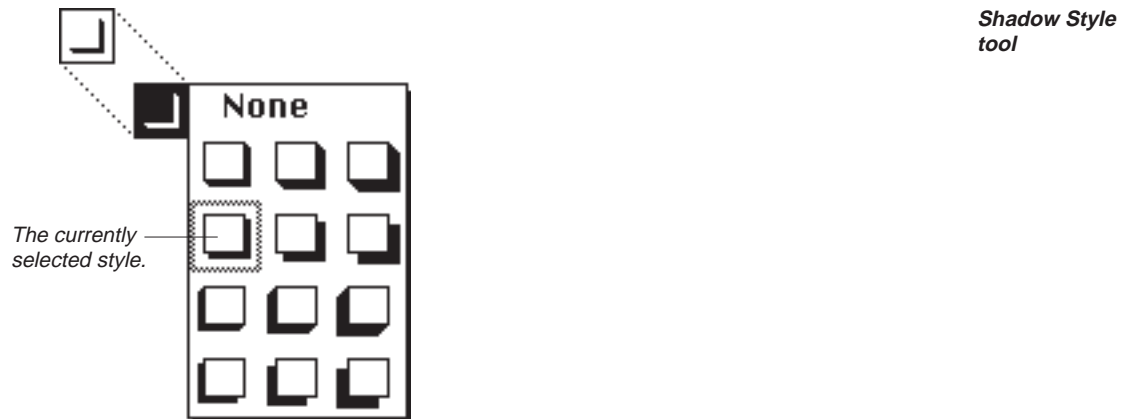
1. Select the node or nodes that you want to change.
2. Press the Edge Style tool on the palette and select the style you want from the pop-up menu.

**NOTE:** The eight "beveled" styles are not available for all node shapes.



## Changing Shadow Style

You can add a drop shadow to nodes to give your chart a three-dimensional appearance. MORE offers 12 shadow styles. You select a shadow style from the pop-up menu that appears when you press the Shadow Style tool on the palette. A frame appears around the currently selected style.

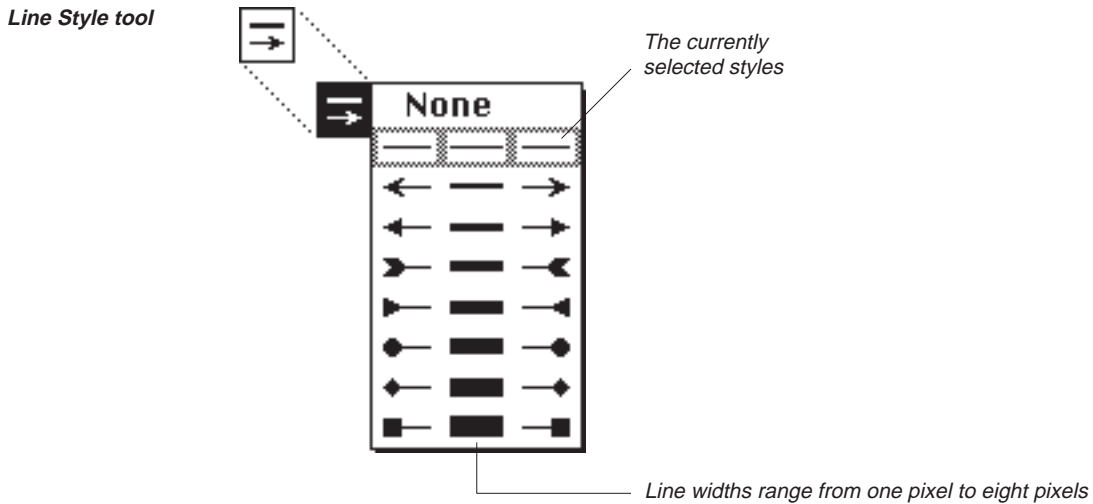


### To change the shadow style for one or more nodes

1. Select the node or nodes that you want to change.
2. Press the Shadow Style tool on the palette and choose the style you want from the pop-up menu.

## Changing Line Style

MORE offers a wide range of styles for connecting lines, including various line widths and line endings, such as arrowheads and diamonds. A connecting line can have both a line width style and two different line ending styles (one style for each end of the line). You choose a width or line ending style from the Line Style pop-up menu on the palette. A frame appears around the currently selected styles.



### To change line style

1. Select the connecting lines you want to change.  
To select all lines connected to a node, click the point where the lines intersect.
2. Press the Line Style tool on the palette and select the style you want from the pop-up menu.  
Choose None from the pop-up menu to hide the selected connecting lines.

## Changing Line Shape

MORE offers three line shapes—you can use any combination of line shapes in your chart. You choose a shape from the Line Shape pop-up menu on the palette. In the pop-up menu, a frame appears around the currently selected shape.



1. Select the connecting lines that you want to change.

To select all lines, click the point where the lines intersect. To change the shape of all connecting lines, press **W-A** to select all.

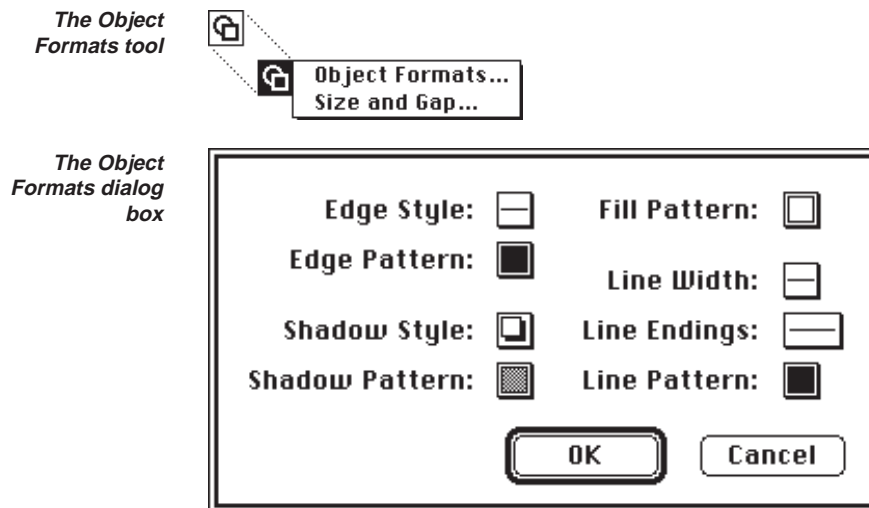
2. Press the Line Shape tool on the palette and select the shape you want from the pop-up menu.

## Applying Multiple Styles

Use the Object Formats tool to apply several styling changes at once instead of visiting the tool palette several times to make styling changes to your tree chart.

### To apply multiple style changes

1. Select the tree chart objects you want to style.
2. Select the Object Formats tool and select Object Formats.  
The Object Formats dialog box appears.



3. Use the various pop-up menus to make your styling changes. Click OK to apply your changes.



## Applying Text and Character Formats

You can use the Format menu commands to format text or characters in a selected node. Changing text formats in Tree Chart view will not change their format in Outline view.

### To apply text formats to node text

1. Select the node or nodes you want to change.
2. Choose Text Format from the Format menu and select the format you want from the pop-up menu that appears.

### To apply character formats to node text

1. Select the node or nodes you want to change.
2. Choose Font, Size, Style, Color or Text Format from the Format menu and select the format you want from the pop-up menu that appears.

or

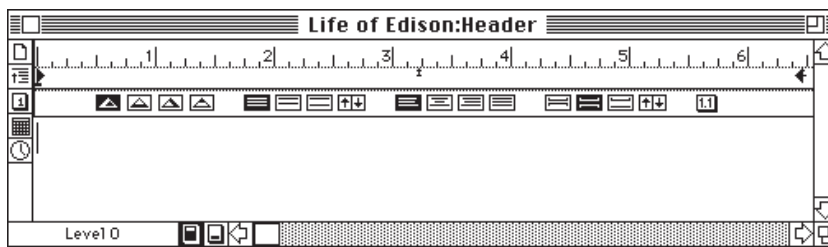
Choose Character from the format menu to make multiple changes. For detailed information, see “Applying Character Formats to Text,” in Chapter 2.

**NOTE:** *If you change the font, size, or style of text and find that the text no longer fits within node borders, resize the node to accommodate the text (see “Sizing Nodes” earlier in this chapter).*

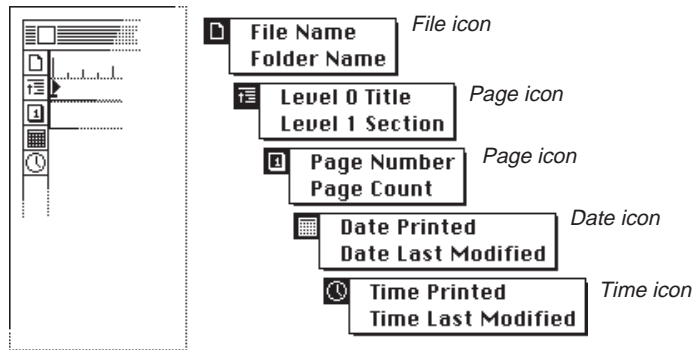
## Adding Headers and Footers

Headers and footers contain information that you want to print at the top or bottom of your tree chart pages. If a tree chart is larger than one page, MORE prints one header and one footer per chart, regardless of the number of pages required to print the tree chart. Adding a header or footer in one MORE view adds it in all views. You can modify a header or footer from any view.

You enter header or footer information in the Header and Footer window. The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed. To change the display, click the Header or Footer icon.



*A header window*



*The header and footer hot stamps*

The icons along the left side of the Header or Footer dialog box are “hot stamps” you can use to insert information such as page numbers, date, time, and file or folder names in a header or footer. When you use the “hot stamps,” MORE automatically replaces a placeholder with the correct information when you print. These stamps are especially useful when you revise a tree chart and you want to keep track of when you made revisions. Pressing an icon displays a pop-up menu of available choices. For example, pressing on the Date icon allows you to choose whether you want to display the date the chart is printed or the date the chart was last modified. The Hot Stamp command in the Edit menu inserts the same data as the Header and Footer icons. For more information on Hot Stamps see “Using Hot Stamps,” in Chapter 2.

The following is a description of the Header and Footer hot stamps:

*File icon* Inserts the name of the MORE file or the folder where it is located.

---

*Title icon* Inserts the level 0 (zero) headline or level 1 headline from the current page.

---

*Page Number icon* Inserts either a page number or a page count. By default, MORE displays numbers in the Arabic format (1, 2, 3,...). Use the Hot Stamp command, in the Edit menu, if you want to display page numbers or page count in Roman numerals.

---

*Date icon* Inserts the date the tree chart was printed or the date it was last modified.

---

*Time icon* Inserts the time the tree chart was printed or the time it was last modified.

---

The Header/Footer window has a text ruler you can use to set tabs, change text spacing and justification. For information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text” in Chapter 2.

**NOTE:** *If you change the format of a header or footer in any view, the change is reflected in all views.*



**To add a header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu.  
The Header and Footer dialog box appears. The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed.
2. To change the current display, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom of window.
3. Type the text you want to appear in the header or footer.
4. Use the hot stamp icons to insert data such as the date or time.
5. Use the text ruler to set tabs, change text or outline spacing, or change text justification.

For more information about using the text ruler, see “Using the Text Ruler to Format Text” in Chapter 2.

**To close the Header/Footer window**

- Click the close box.



*To precisely control the space between the header and the body of your tree chart, choose Custom Space from the Outline Layout submenu in the Format menu to display the Paragraph Spacing dialog box, then enter an appropriate Space After value for the Header window.*

**To view, change, or delete an existing header or footer**

1. Choose Headers & Footers from the Format menu.  
The title bar indicates whether the header or footer is currently displayed. To change the current display, click the Header or Footer icon at the bottom of window.
2. Edit or delete header or footer text as you would any other text.
3. Click the close box to close the Header and Footer window.

## USING A LIBRARY IN TREE CHARTS

When you are working in Tree Chart view, you can use the Rule Sets and Color Sets categories of a library. Use the Rules Set category to store the format and style rules for the current chart or apply a set of rules from the Library to the current chart. For more information about using rules, see “Using Rules” in Chapter 5. Use the Color Set category to install the current color set (used in the tool palette pop-up menus) into the Library or apply a color set from the Library to the current document. For more information about using a library in tree charts, see “Using Libraries” in Chapter 5.

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## INCLUDING GRAPHICS IN A TREE CHART

Graphics cannot be inserted directly into a tree chart in Tree Chart view. To add a graphic to a tree chart node, you must switch to Outline view and insert the graphic in the headline. When you switch back to Tree Chart view, the graphic appears in the node. If the graphic is too large for the node you will need to enlarge the node by selecting it and dragging one of its handles. For information about adding a graphic in Outline view, see “Including Graphics” in Chapter 2. Graphics can also be added to the header or footer of a tree chart.

.....

## COPYING A TREE CHART TO THE CLIPBOARD

You can copy all or part of a tree chart to the Clipboard and paste it into another MORE view or another application. For example, you may want a tree chart to become part of a bullet chart presentation or be included in a report you are writing in Outline view. When you copy a tree chart to the Clipboard and paste it in another view, the chart becomes a graphic object. In Bullet Chart view, you can ungroup the tree chart and manipulate the nodes and lines as separate objects. You can also ungroup individual nodes to move or edit the text within the node.

 *If you want a transparent copy of the tree chart, set the Fill to None before copying the tree chart to the Clipboard.*

**To copy a tree chart selection to the Clipboard**

1. To copy the entire tree, including the background, click the chart background.  
To copy a portion of the tree, select the nodes and lines you want to copy.
2. Choose Copy from the Edit menu, or press **W-C**.  
MORE copies the selection to the Clipboard.

**To paste a tree chart selection into an outline**

1. Follow the preceding steps to copy the tree chart selection to the Clipboard.
2. Change to the Outline view by clicking the Outline icon on the status line or by pressing **W-J**.
3. Select the headline or comment window that you want to contain the tree chart selection. Then press **W-V**.  
MORE pastes the tree chart selection into the headline or comment window.

**To paste a tree chart selection into a bullet chart**

1. Follow the preceding steps to copy the tree chart selection to the Clipboard.
2. Change to the Bullet Chart view by clicking the Bullet Chart view icon on the status line or by pressing **W-I**.
3. Use the arrow keys to display the bullet chart that you want.
4. Press **W-V** to paste the tree chart selection.  
MORE pastes the tree chart selection into the displayed chart.
5. You can move or size the tree chart as you would any other object in a bullet chart. You can also ungroup the tree chart and manipulate the nodes and lines as separate objects.

## PRINTING TREE CHARTS

MORE prints your tree chart according to the options you have set in the Print Options window and Page Setup dialog box. Print options control how your tree chart is printed. For example, you can scale the chart to print on one page. You also use the Print Options window to set page margins and preview how your printout will look. Use the Page Setup icon to go to the Page Setup dialog to specify paper size, page orientation, and other similar settings. MORE remembers the options you set, so you don't have to set them each time you print.

When you print a chart that spans more than one page, the chart is printed in tiles. If a tree chart is larger than one page, MORE prints one header and one footer per tree chart, regardless of the number of pages required to print the chart.



*By changing the page orientation in the Page Setup dialog, you may find that a multiple-page chart fits on a single page without reducing the chart size.*

### To print tree charts

1. To change print options, set page margins, or preview your tree chart before printing, choose Print Options from the File menu to display the Print Options window.

For more information, see “Setting Print Options and Previewing,” the next section in this chapter.

2. To change the page setup options, choose Page Setup from the File menu (or click the Page Setup icon in the Print Options window). For more information see “Changing Page Setup,” later in this chapter.
3. After the options are set as you want, you can print by choosing Print from the file menu or by clicking the Printer icon in the Print Options window.



*Page Scroll box* Indicates the page number currently displayed in the Preview area and the total number of pages that will be printed. Use the scroll bar to scroll the pages in the Preview area of the window.

---

*Page Setup icon* Displays the Page Setup dialog box.

---

*Printer icon* Displays the Print dialog box.

---

*Margins* Specifies the left, right, top, and bottom page margins for the chart. Type the values you want in the margin entry boxes. Margins can be specified in inches, pixels, or centimeters. You choose the unit of measurement in the Document Options dialog box (see “Setting Document Options” in Chapter 1).

---

The Print Options window has the following options for printing tree charts:

*Draft Printing* When Draft Printing is selected, MORE prints node edges in black, shadows in gray, and turns off all backgrounds and fill patterns.

---

*Scale to Fit Page* Reduces the chart size proportionally so that it prints on one page.

---

*Headers & Footers* Prints headers and footers. Headers and footers print as specified in the Header/Footer window.

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### **To preview a tree chart**

1. Choose Print Options from the File menu.

The entire tree appears in the Print Options window.

2. Set the page margins and print options you want.

The Print Options window changes to show how the printed chart will appear with the options and margins you have set.



## Changing Page Setup

Before printing, you can specify the page setup options you want, such as paper size, orientation of your printed chart, and any special printer effects, such as smoothing or font substitution. The available options will vary depending on the printing device and system software version you are using.



*If you are using an ImageWriter and you have a wide chart that spans several pages you may be able to print a continuous image of the chart by choosing the Horizontal page orientation and the No Gaps Between Pages option.*

### To change page setup options

- Choose Page Setup from the File Menu (or click the Page Setup icon in the Print Options window).

MORE displays the Page Setup dialog box for your printing device. For more information about page setup options, refer to the user's guide that accompanies your printing device.

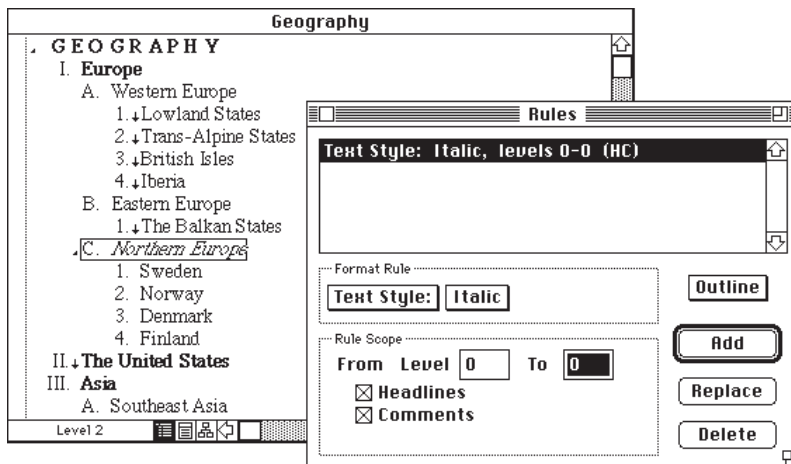
## ADVANCED FEATURES

This chapter describes how to use MORE's advanced features. It includes information about

- using rules
- using libraries
- customizing colors, patterns, and gradients
- giving on-screen presentations

### USING RULES

Rules define the format and style of your document. They are created and changed automatically as you use the menu commands and palette tools to specify formats and styles. You can see the set of rules attached to a selected headline by displaying the Rules window, as shown below.

Rules are a powerful formatting tool that can greatly increase productivity. For example, you can copy and paste rules to copy formats and styles to other headlines or documents. You can also install rules in a MORE library so that you can use the same formats and styles in multiple documents. A library file containing rules can be distributed to all employees so that company documents are produced with the same format and style. For information about installing rules in a library, see “Using Libraries,” later in this chapter.

### How Rules are Created as You Work

Rules are created and changed automatically as you format and style your document. Depending on your selection, MORE creates or changes either global or local rules.

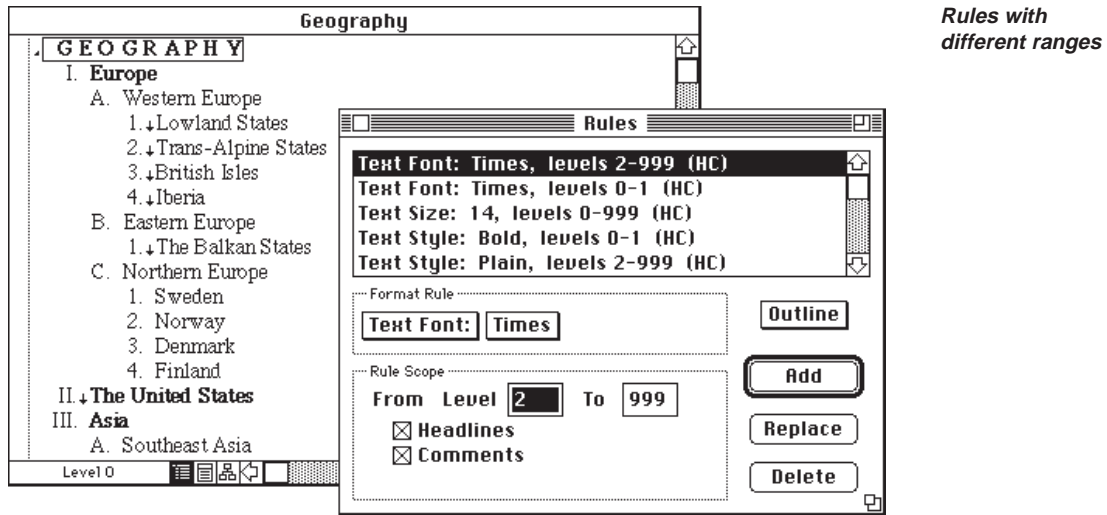
Global rules are created or changed when you apply formats or styles throughout your entire document by selecting

- all headlines in the outline or all headlines of the same level in Outline view
- the Master Chart in Bullet Chart view
- all nodes in the tree chart or all nodes of the same level in Tree Chart view

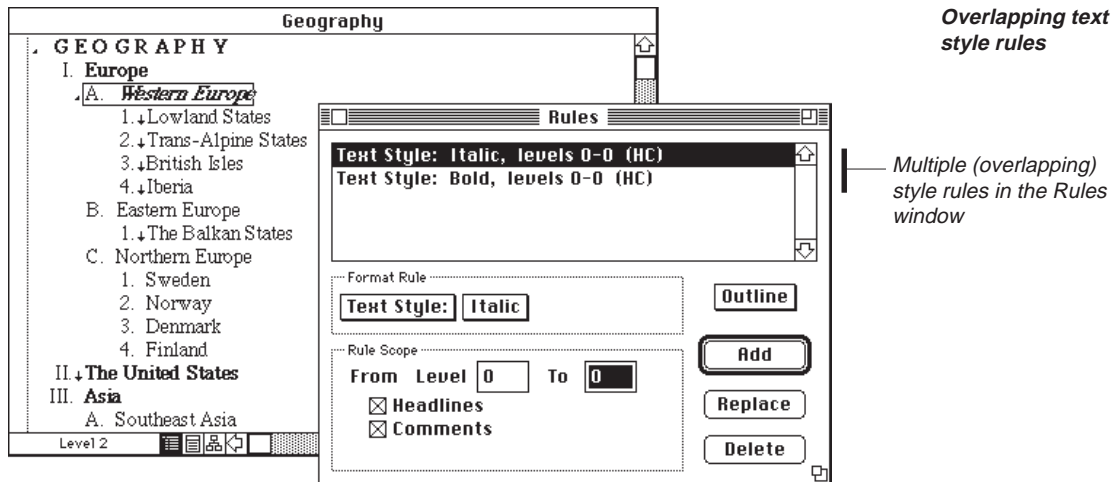
For example, if you select all level-1 headlines in your document and change the format or style, you have created a global rule which will affect all level-1 headlines as you expand and reorganize your outline. Selective styling does not affect rules. Rules for text formats and styles are created or changed only when you select an entire headline and apply a format or style.

**NOTE:** *When you open a new document, MORE assigns default global rules for each view. To change the default rules that are automatically assigned, see “Saving Preferences” in Chapter 1.*

Global rules are attached to the Home headline in Outline and Tree Chart views and to the Master Chart in Bullet Chart view. To view global rules, you must select the Home headline or the Master Chart when you display the Rules window (see “Displaying the Rules Window,” later in this chapter). The following illustration shows global rules for an outline. Notice that each rule in the Rules window applies to a specific scope or range of subhead levels. The selected headline (in this case, the Home headline) is always level 0.



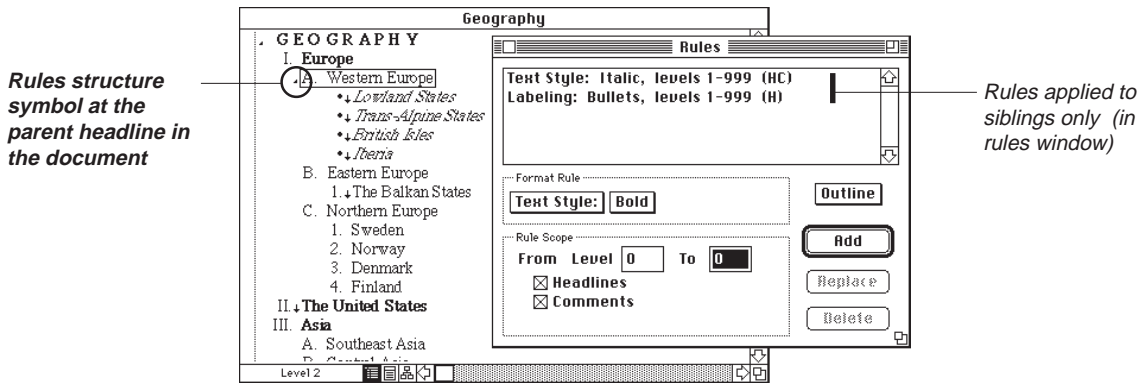
When rules of the same type and at the same level have overlapping scopes, the rule that was added more recently overrides rules lower in the list for those levels that overlap. For text styles, however, rules are additive because more than one style rule can be applied to the same headline. For example, a headline can have both bold styling and italic styling, as shown in the following illustration. Plain text and styles such as None always override other styles. Selective text styling—styling embedded within a headline—overrides all rules governing text style.



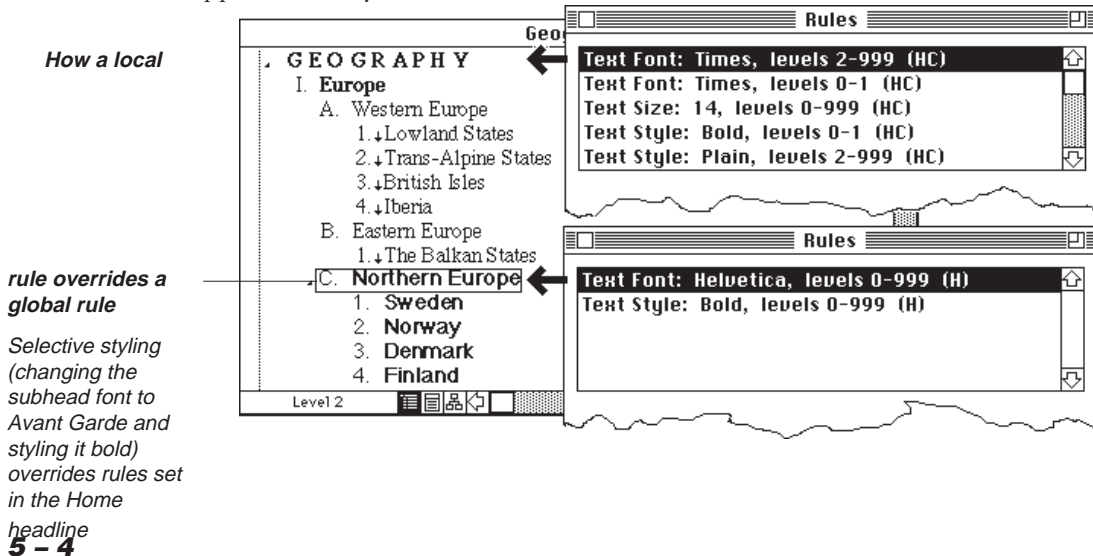
**Overlapping text style rules**

Local rules are created when you format or style individual headlines, nodes, or charts. In your outline, a symbol appears next to headlines that have local rules attached to them in any view. You can see the local rules attached to a headline by selecting the headline and displaying the Rules window (or by double-clicking the rules structure symbol). A local rule may not always be attached to the same headline to which its rules apply. For example, when you apply a format or style to all siblings, the local rule is attached to the parent headline—not to the siblings, as shown below.



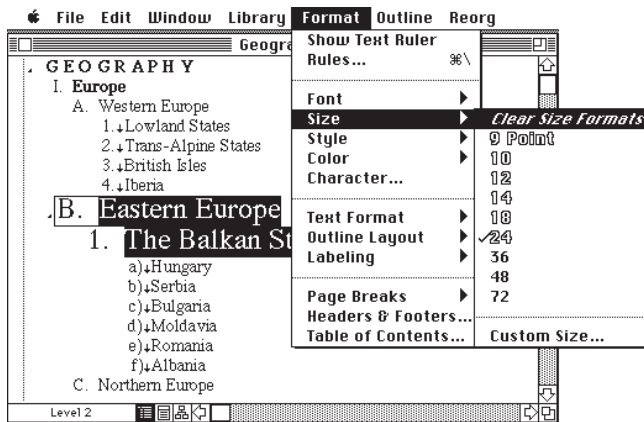
Where a local and a global rule apply to the same headline, the local rule overrides the global rule except for rules defining text style, which are additive. The following illustration shows how global and local rules together determine the appearance of your document.



## Clearing Text Format and Style Rules

When you clear a text format or style from a headline with all of its text selected, MORE automatically deletes the appropriate rule. The headline takes on the format or style defined by a local rule at a higher level or by a global rule if there are no higher-level local rules (see the following illustration). If you clear a format or style from the Home headline, the default format or style is used.

You clear text formats and styles by selecting headlines and choosing the Clear Formats command from the appropriate submenu on the Formats menu. (The command is available only if such rules are present.) For example, to clear text size formats, you would select the headlines that have the text size rule attached to them, then choose the Clear Size Formats command from the Size submenu, as shown here:

Formats and styles can be cleared from a single headline, a suboutline, or the entire document. You can clear the following formats and styles by using the Format menu: Font, Size, Style, Color, Text Format, Outline Format, Labels, Page Breaks.

### To clear a text format or style from headlines

1. Use the selection bar to select the headline or headlines you want to modify.
2. Choose the Clear Formats command from the appropriate submenu on the Formats menu.

You can clear a text format or style from a suboutline by selecting the parent headline before choosing the appropriate Clear Formats command.

## USING THE RULES WINDOW

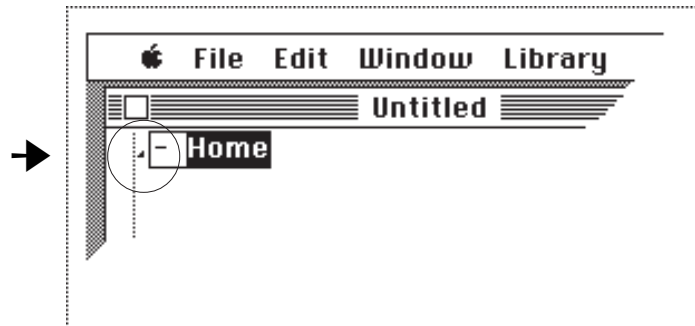
You can also define formats and styles in your document by adding, replacing, or deleting rules in the Rules window. The Rules window offers you additional control over formatting and styling. For example, use the Rules window when you want to

- view the list of rules attached to a selected headline
- define the formats and styles for all headline levels before you begin typing your document
- copy or delete selected rules from a headline (instead of the entire rule set)
- change the existing scope options for a rule
- create a template containing specific rules

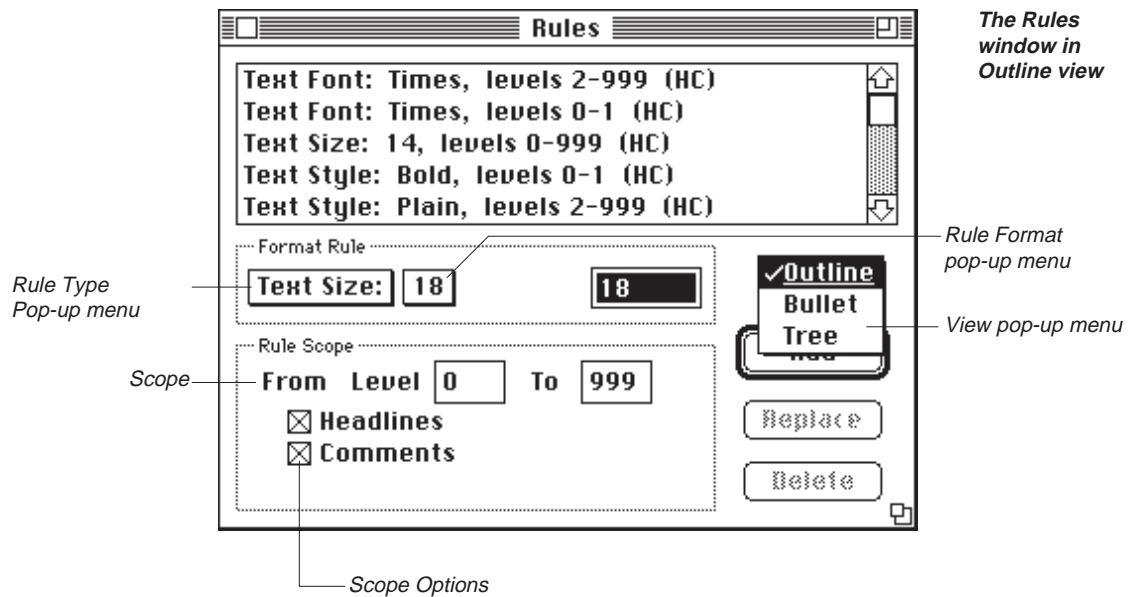
## Displaying the Rules Window

The Rules window shows all the rules attached to the headline selected in your document. A headline can have three sets of rules attached to it—a different set for Outline, Bullet Chart, and Tree Chart views. In your outline, a (•) symbol appears next to a headline when there are local rules attached to it in any view.

*The Rules symbol next to the Home headline*



When you display the Rules window, the rule set for the current view automatically appears. For example, if your screen displays the Tree Chart view, the Rules window shows the tree chart rule set for the selected headline. If the Rules window is empty, there are no rules attached to the selected headline for the current view. You can use the View pop-up menu to display the rule set for another view.



**View pop-up menu** Indicates whether outline, bullet chart, or tree chart rules are currently displayed and allows you to display rules for another view. In the pop-up menu, each view that has rules is underlined.

**Rule Type pop-up menu** Displays a pop-up menu of available rule types for the correct view.

**Rule Format pop-up menu** Displays a pop-up menu of available formats for the rule type currently selected in the Rule Type pop-up menu if applicable. For some rules, this pop-up menu is replaced by one or more type-in boxes.

**Rule Scope box** Allows you to specify the range of subhead levels to which the rule applies. It also lets you specify which elements the rule applies to.

*Add* Adds the rule you have just defined to the list box and applies it.

---

*Replace* Replaces the settings of the currently selected rule with the new settings you have specified and applies it.

---

*Delete* Removes selected rules.

---

### To display rules for a selected headline

1. Select the headline (in Outline view), bullet chart title (in Bullet Chart view), or node (in Tree Chart view) for which you want to display rules.
2. Choose Rules from the Format menu, or press Command-\.

The Rules window appears. The list box displays the rules for the selected headline and current view.



*You can also display the Rules window from Outline view by double-clicking on a structure symbol that indicates attached rules. For more information, see “Structure Symbols” in Chapter 2.*

### To display the rules for another view

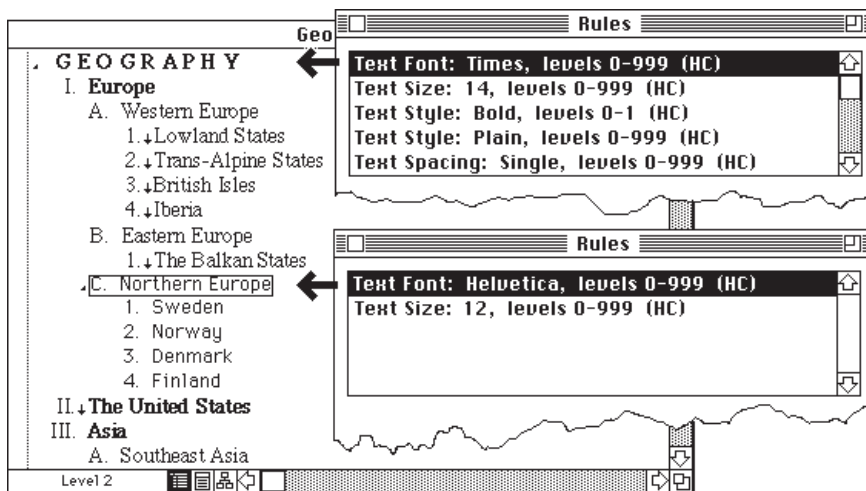
- Press the View pop-up menu and select the view you want.

The list box changes to show the rules for the view you selected. The options in the Rule Scope box also change according to the selected view.



## Understanding Rule Scope

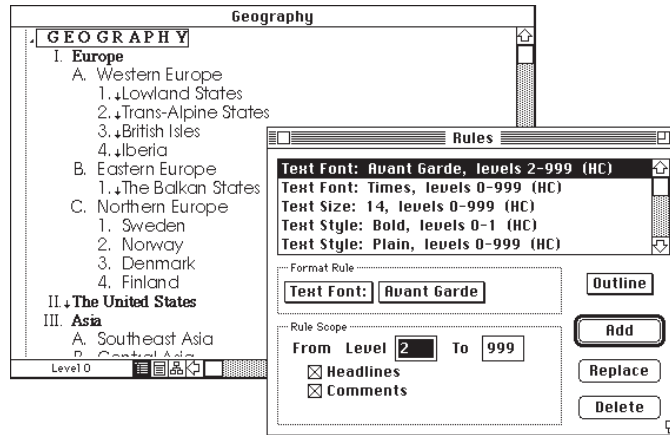
Rule scope specifies the range of subhead levels (below the selected headline) to which a rule applies. You specify rule scope when you create a new rule. Rule scope is always relative to the selected headline, which is considered level 0. For example, if a rule's scope is 0-999 (that is, level 0 to 999) and the selected headline is the Home headline, then the rule applies to all headlines in the document. If another headline is selected, a rule with the same scope applies to that headline and all headlines in its suboutline. The following illustration shows how rule scope is relative to the headline to which the rule is attached.



*Two different headlines with similar rules scopes attached to each of them*

When rules of the same type have overlapping scopes, the rule that is higher in the list (added more recently) overrides rules lower in the list for those levels that overlap. Style rules are the exception, since more than one style can be applied to the same level (a headline can be both bold and italic). Plain text and styles such as None always override other styles. The following illustration shows how overlapping rules determine the final document format.

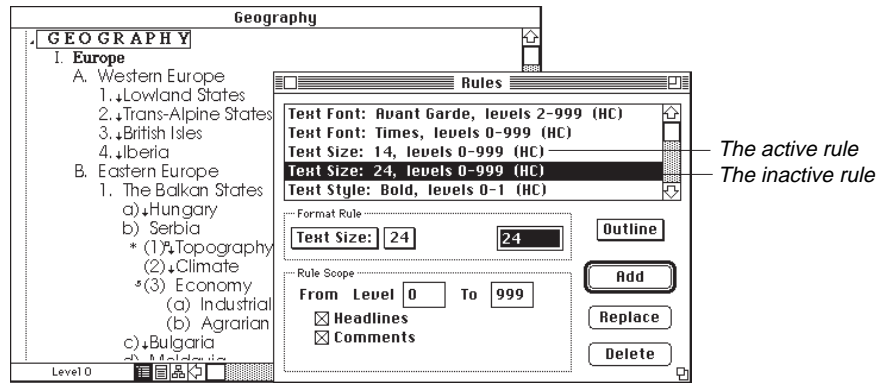
**Rules window with overlapping rules**



**Inactive Rules**

A rule becomes inactive when it is entirely overridden by one or more rules higher in the list box (see the following illustration). An inactive rule does not affect the format of your document.

**An inactive rule in the Rules window**



You may want to delete an inactive rule from the list box if you no longer need it. However, you may also purposely create inactive rules by temporarily adding a rule that you intend to later remove. For example, you may want to add a rule for a larger text size so that a part of your outline can be viewed more easily on the screen. Later you can remove this rule and return to the formats defined by the other Text Size rules in the list box.

## Understanding Scope Options

Scope options control what elements in your document will be affected by a rule. The scope options are different for each view:

- For outlines, you can choose to apply a rule to headlines and comment windows.
- For bullet charts, you can apply a rule to chart titles, subheads or comments.
- For tree charts, you can apply a rule to normal nodes and clusters. Normal nodes are nodes to which no special cluster style has been applied. Choosing Clusters applies the rule to nodes that have a cluster style. In the Rules window, the letters in parentheses indicate the scope options selected for each rule.

## Selecting Rules

You can select single or multiple rules in the Rules window:

- To select one rule, click the rule.
- To select multiple rules that are contiguous, press Shift and drag or click to define a selection range.
- To select multiple rules that are not contiguous, press **W** and click the individual rules.

## Adding, Replacing, and Deleting Rules

You can create new rules by adding them to the Rules window and change existing rules by changing the format or scope. Deleting rules from the Rules window clears the format or style from relevant elements of the document.

When you add a new rule, it is inserted at the top of its category in the Rules window. For example, if there is an existing rule for Font Size and you add another, the new rule is inserted above the existing Font Size rule. Rule order determines the final appearance of your document when rules of the same type have conflicting or overlapping scopes. You may find that adding a new rule makes an existing rule inactive due to its position below the new rule. After you have added a new rule, you may need to change rule order to achieve the result you want in your document. See “Changing Rule Order in the Rules Window,” later in this chapter.

**NOTE:**

*Whenever possible, change an existing rule rather than add a new rule. Add new rules only when necessary to achieve the formatting results you want.*

### **To add a rule**

1. Select the headline to which you want to attach a rule. Then choose Rules from the Format menu to display the Rules window.
2. If the list box contains a rule of the type you want to add, click the rule to select it. (If you select a rule from the menu, and there is a rule of that type in the list, it is automatically selected.)

If the list box contains no rule of the type you want to add, press the Rule Type pop-up menu to display a menu of all rules. Choose the rule type you want from the list.

The rule now appears as the title of the Rule Type pop-up menu.

3. Press the Rule Format pop-up menu and choose the format or style you want.

If a format requires a value, MORE displays an entry box next to the Rule Format pop-up menu. For example, if you are creating a rule for the Right Inset, you will also need to supply a value for the inset distance.

4. In the Rule Scope box, type the scope range in the text boxes, or press to the left of each box and choose a level from the pop-up menu.
5. Click the appropriate scope options in the Rule Scope box.

6. Click Add.

The new rule appears in the Rules window and the formatting or styling is applied to the document.

### **To replace a rule**

1. Select the headline to which the rule you want to change is attached. Then choose Rules from the Format menu to display the Rules window.
2. Select the rule you want to replace in the list box.

The rule appears in the Format Rule box.

3. To change the format or style, use the Rule Format pop-up menu to select a format or style (or type the appropriate value in the text box).

To change the rule scope, type the scope range in the text boxes or press to the left of each box and choose the scope from the pop-up menu. Click the scope options you want in the Rule Scope box.

4. Click Replace.

The new definition of the rule replaces the rule selected in the Rules window and the formatting or styling change is updated in the document.

#### **To delete a rule**

1. Select the headline to which the rule you want to delete is attached. Then choose Rules from the Format menu to display the Rules window.

2. Select the rule or rules you want to delete in the list box.

Use any of the selection techniques described in “Selecting Rules,” earlier in this section.

3. Click Delete.

The rules are removed from the Rules window and the formats and styles are cleared from relevant headlines in the document.

### **Changing Rule Order in the Rules Window**

You can change the order of rules in the Rules window list box by using the Cut, Copy, and Paste commands on the Edit menu. When you paste a rule, it is inserted above other rules of that type in the list box.

#### **To change rule order**

1. Select the rule you want to move above all other rules of the same type.

2. To cut the rule, choose Cut or press **W-X**.

To copy, choose Copy from the Edit menu or press **W-C**.

3. Choose Paste from the Edit menu or press **W-V**.

MORE inserts the rule on top of all other rules of the same type. If you pasted a copy of the rule, you may want to delete the original rule definition.

## **Cutting, Copying, Pasting, and Clearing Rules**

You can cut, copy, paste or clear rules attached to a headline without using the Rules window. Rules can then be pasted to another headline in the same document or to a headline in a different document. Pasting rules to a headline instantly applies the formats and styles. If you paste rules to the Home headline, the formats and styles are applied to the entire document. You can also clear all rules attached to a headline.

When you cut, copy, paste, or clear rules attached to a headline, all rules are cut, copied, or removed. If you want to cut, copy, paste, or clear selected rules attached to a headline, you must use the Rules window.

### **To cut, copy, or clear all the rules attached to a headline**

1. Display the view you want, then select the headline, bullet chart, or tree node whose rules you want to cut, copy or clear.
2. To cut rules, hold down the Option key and choose Cut Rules from the Edit menu or press Option-W-X.

To copy rules, hold down the Option key and choose Copy Rules from the Edit menu, or press Option-W-C.

To clear rules, hold down the Option key and choose Clear Rules from the Edit menu, or press Option-W-B.

### **To cut, copy, or clear selected rules attached to a headline**

1. Select the headline, bullet chart or tree chart whose rule you want to cut, copy or clear.
2. Choose Rules from the Format menu to display the Rules window.
3. Select the rules you want to cut, copy, or clear.

Use any of the selection techniques described in “Selecting Rules,” earlier in this section.

4. To cut, choose Cut from the Edit menu, or press W-X.  
To copy, choose Copy from the Edit menu, or press W-C.  
To clear, choose Clear from the Edit menu, or press W-B.

**To paste rules**

1. Display the document and select the headline to which you want to paste the rules.
2. Choose Paste from the Edit menu, or press **W-V**.

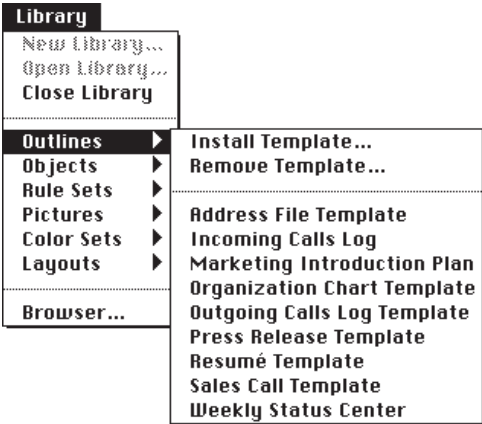

**USING LIBRARIES**

You can create a library to store information or objects that you frequently use. For example, you may create a library to store standard outline templates, color sets, and logos used by your department. You can store the following kinds of information as library items:

- outlines or selected headlines
- sets of objects from bullet charts
- rules for outlines, bullet charts, or tree charts
- pictures
- sets of colors and patterns
- layouts for bullet charts

Once an item is installed in a library, the name you assigned it appears in the appropriate Library category submenu, as shown in the following illustration. You can easily place the item in another MORE file by selecting the item from the submenu. Using a library item does not remove it from the library.



*The Outlines submenu in the Library menu*

You can create as many libraries as you want. Each library is a separate file that contains the items you have installed in the library. You can share a library with other users by giving them a copy of the library file.

Use the Browser to look through existing libraries and display the items in each library. Several libraries containing samples (including clip art) are provided with the MORE application. You may want to browse these libraries before you create your own (see “Browsing Libraries,” later in this section).

Additionally, MORE provides the Library Mover, a utility program that you can use to move and copy libraries items between different files, and even create new library files to store items. For more information about the Library Mover, see “Using the Library Mover,” later in this chapter.

## **Creating a New Library**

When you create a new library, MORE opens a new file into which you can install library items. If another library is currently open, MORE will close it when you click New or Open.

### **To create a new library**

1. Choose New from the Library menu.  
A dialog box appears.
2. Type a name for the new library.
3. Select the folder and disk in which you want to store the new library file, then click OK.

The new library is open and ready for you to install items in it. See “Installing Items in a Library,” later in this chapter.



## Opening an Existing Library

To use the items in a library, you must open the library. You can only have one library open at a time. When a library is open, its items are displayed in the corresponding library submenu.

If you leave a library open when you quit, MORE remembers which library you were using and automatically reopens this library when you start up.

### To open a library

1. Choose Open Library from the Library menu.  
A dialog box appears.
2. Select a library from the list box.  
Use the Eject and Drive buttons to locate a library that is stored on another disk.

## Closing a Library

You must close the library that is currently open in order to delete it, change it with the Library Mover, or allow another user on a network to add items to it.

### To close a library

- Click Close Library from the Library menu.

## Installing Items in a Library

This section describes how to install items in a library so that you can reuse them in other MORE files. A library has six different categories: outlines, pictures, rule sets, objects, color sets, and layouts. When you install an item, you choose the appropriate library category for that item. A category can contain up to 28 items. When a category is full, the Install command on the category submenu is dimmed. To install an item in a library, the library must be open.

**NOTE:** *In general, the Install commands will add information to the library in the same way that the Copy command adds information to the Clipboard, except in the case of layouts and color sets.*

## Installing Outlines

You use the Outlines category of the library to store an outline, suboutline, or selected text from within your outline. Installing an outline in the library stores outline text as well as graphics and rules contained in the outline.

### To install an outline in a library

1. Open the library you want.
2. To install an entire outline, select the Home headline. To install a suboutline, click the headline whose suboutline you want to install. Do not use the selection bar to select the headline, as this action will select the headline text and not the suboutline.

To install selected text from within a headline or comment, drag to select the text.

3. Choose Outlines from the Library menu and choose Install Template from the submenu that appears.

A dialog box asks you to name the item you are installing.

4. Type a name, and click Install.

A copy of the suboutline (or selected text) is installed in the library. The name you gave this item will appear in the Outlines submenu.

## Installing Rules

You use the Rules category in a library to store rules for outlines, bullet charts, or tree charts. When you install rules in a library, only rules attached to the selected headline are installed. You can install the rules for one view or all views for the selected headline. When you install rules for one view, you can select which individual rules you want to install.

**NOTE:** For information about setting up rules, see “Using Rules,” earlier in this chapter.

### To install rules for all views

1. Open the library you want.

2. Display the view you want, then select the headline, bullet chart, or tree node whose rules you want to install.

**NOTE:** *To install global rules, select the Home headline (in Outline view), the Master Chart (in Bullet Chart view), or the root node (in Tree Chart view).*

3. Choose Rule Sets from the Library menu and choose Install Rule Set from the submenu that appears.

A dialog box asks you to name the rules you are installing.

4. Type a name, then click Install.

A copy of the rules is installed in the library. The name you gave this item will appear in the Rules submenu.

#### **To install rules for one view**

1. Open the library you want.

2. Display the view you want, then select the headline, bullet chart, or tree node whose rules you want to install.

**NOTE:** *To install global rules, select the Home headline (in Outline view), the Master Chart (in Bullet Chart view), or the root node (in Tree Chart view).*

3. Choose Rules from the Format menu to display the Rules window.

The rules for the selected headline and current view appear in the Rules window.

4. If you want to install specific rules, select the rules you want from the list box in the Rules window.

You can drag to select multiple rules, or press **W** and click to select multiple rules from different locations in a list.

5. Choose Rule Sets from the Library menu and choose Install Rule Set from the submenu that appears.

A dialog box asks you to name the rule set you are installing.

6. Type the name, then click Install.

A copy of the rules is installed in the library. The name you gave this item will appear in the Rules submenu.

## Installing Pictures

You use the Pictures category in a library to store a pictorial representation of any bullet chart objects. You can store multiple graphic objects as a single library entry. Multiple objects are grouped as one picture object when you install them in the Pictures category. To install multiple objects as independent objects, use the Objects category.

### To install a picture in the library

1. Display the graphic or graphics in Bullet Chart view, the nodes and lines in Tree Chart view (or select nothing to install the entire tree with its background), or choose a picture in Outline view.
2. Choose Pictures from the Library menu and choose Install Picture from the submenu that appears.

A dialog box asks you to name the picture item you are installing.

3. Type the name and click Install.

A copy of the picture is installed in the library. The name you gave this item will appear in the Pictures submenu.

## Installing Objects

You use the Objects category of the library to store chart text and graphic objects. You can store multiple objects as a single library entry. Multiple objects are not grouped when you install them in the Objects category, so you can edit and position the objects individually after you place them in another file.

### To install an object in the library

1. Select the object or objects from your bullet chart.
2. Choose Objects from the Library menu and choose Install Object from the submenu that appears.

A dialog box asks you to name the object item you are installing.

3. Type the name and click Install.

A copy of the object is installed in the library. The name you gave the item will appear in the Objects submenu.

## Installing Color Sets

You can save colors and patterns you have added to your menus by installing them in the Colors category in a library. Placing a color set in another MORE file makes these patterns and colors available in the various pop-up menus on the bullet and tree chart palettes and text color menus.

### To install a color set in the library

1. Open the library.
2. Choose Color Sets from the Library menu and choose Install Color Set from the submenu that appears.
3. Type a name for the color set you are installing and click Install.

A copy of the color set is installed in the library. The name you gave the item will appear in the Colors submenu.

## Installing Bullet Chart Layouts

You use the Layouts category to store a bullet chart layout that you want to use as a template for other charts. Installing a chart layout stores the following information in the library:

- the page layout
- all draw objects contained on the current chart
- the rule set affecting the chart

**NOTE:** *Unlike the installation of a rule set, the rule set affecting the chart doesn't have to be attached to the chart itself.*

### To install a chart layout in a library

1. Open the library.
2. Display the chart that you want to use as a library template.
3. Choose Layouts from the Library menu and choose Install Chart Layout from the submenu.
4. Type a name for the layout you are installing and click Install.  
A copy of the chart layout is installed in the library. The name you gave the item will appear in the Layouts submenu.

.....

### Placing Library Items Into a Document

This section tells how to use a library item in another MORE document. Placing a library item into a document does not remove the item from the library. The following list describes the effects of placing library items into a document.

- Placing an outline item inserts a copy of the outline at the insertion point.
- Placing a rule item attaches the rules to the selected headline, node, or chart.
- Placing a graphic or an object inserts a copy of the item at the insertion point or in the currently displayed chart.
- Placing a color set makes the colors and patterns available on the text color menus and the various pop-up menus on the bullet and tree chart palettes.
- Placing a layout applies the layout to the current chart or to all charts if the Master Chart is displayed.

**NOTE:** *Placing library items in a document is the same as pasting the information from the Clipboard.*

### To place an outline

1. Select the headline above where you want to insert the outline template.
2. Choose the item you want from the Outlines submenu on the Library menu.  
A copy of the selected outline is inserted below the selected headline.

**NOTE:** *If you place an outline in a new outline that only displays the Home headline (or paste an outline from the Clipboard), the pasted outline completely replaces the existing outline. However, if you place an outline in another outline that contains any headlines other than Home, the placed outline is inserted below the selected headline.*

**To place rules**

1. Select the headline, node, or chart to which you want to attach the rule set.
2. Choose the rules you want from the Rule Sets submenu on the Library menu.  
The rules are attached to the selected headline.

**To place a graphic**

1. To place a graphic in an outline, position the insertion point where you want the graphic to be inserted in the headline.  
To place a graphic in a bullet chart, display the chart.
2. Choose the graphic item you want from the Pictures submenu on the Library menu.  
A copy of the selected graphic is placed in the headline or bullet chart.

**To place an object**

1. To place an object in a bullet chart, display the chart.
2. Choose the object item you want from the Objects submenu on the Library menu.  
A copy of the selected object is placed in the headline or bullet chart.

**To place a color set**

1. Choose the color set you want from the Color Sets submenu on the Library menu.  
The colors and patterns in the color set are now available on the text color menus and the various pop-up menus on the bullet and tree chart palettes.  
Placing a color set has no effect on the colors currently being used in your document.

### **To place a chart layout**

1. Display the bullet chart to which you want to apply the layout. (Display the Master Chart if you want to apply the layout to all charts.)
2. Choose the layout you want from the Layouts submenu on the Library menu. Your chart is then displayed in the layout you have selected.

### **Deleting Items from a Library**

Deleting an item from a library removes it from the library file and Library menu.

#### **To delete items from a library**

1. Open the library.
2. Choose the category containing the item from the Library menu and choose Remove Template from the submenu that appears.  
A dialog box lists the items contained in the category you selected.
3. Select the items you want to remove.  
You can drag to select multiple items or press **W** and click to select multiple items from different locations in list.
4. Click Remove to remove the selected items from the library.

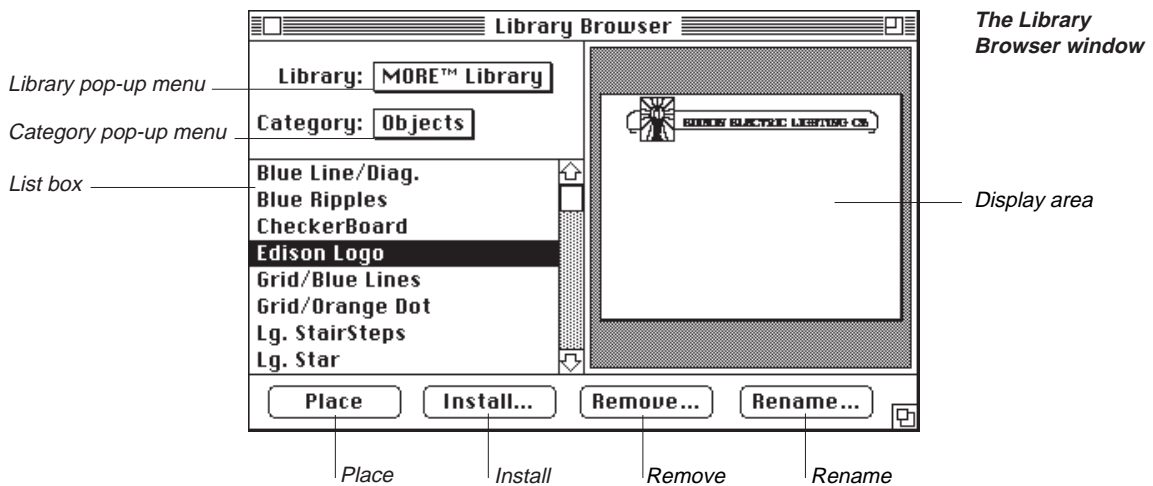


## Browsing Libraries

Use the Browser command on the Library menu to display and review the items in an existing library before placing them in your outline, bullet chart, or tree chart. You can also use the Browser to install, place, remove, or rename library items.

**NOTE:** You can also install, place, or remove a library item by using the Library menu commands. For more information, see “Installing Items in a Library,” “Placing Library Items Into a Document” and “Deleting Items from a Library,” earlier in this section.

Choosing Browser from the Library menu displays the following window:



The Library Browser window contains the following elements:

**Library pop-up menu** Lets you open or close an existing library or create a new library directly from the Library Browser. Choosing commands from this pop-up menu is the same as choosing them from the Library menu.

**Category pop-up menu** Lets you select which category of library items you want to view: Outlines, Objects, Rule Sets, Pictures, Color Sets, or Layouts. A category is underlined if it currently contains items. Selecting an underlined category displays the items in the list box.

<i>List box</i>	Shows the items in the category you selected in the Category pop-up menu. Selecting an item in the list box displays the item in the display area on the right.
<i>Place</i>	Places the item selected in the list box in your outline, bullet chart, or tree chart.
<i>Install</i>	Installs a new item in the library from the active document.
<i>Remove</i>	Removes a selected item (or items) from a library.
<i>Rename</i>	Allows you to rename the currently selected item (or items). Clicking Rename displays a dialog box in which you can enter the new name. The new name replaces the old one in the list box.
<i>Template Display box</i>	Shows the item selected in the list box. <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Outline items appear as they would on the page.</li><li>• Objects appear as they would if placed on the current chart.</li><li>• Rules appear applied to a default template. To display the list of rules, hold down the Option key and click an item in the list box.</li><li>• Graphic items are scaled to fit in the display box.</li><li>• Color items are displayed as the matrix of colors, patterns, and gradients</li><li>• Layouts are shown as they would appear if applied to a chart.</li></ul>

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You can magnify outlines, objects, rule sets, and layouts in the display area by positioning the pointer over the area you want to magnify (the pointer changes to a magnifying glass) and then clicking. To move the item in the display area, hold down the **W** key and drag (the grabber hand appears). Clicking again returns to the normal view.

**To display the browser window**

- Choose Browser from the Library menu.

The Browser window appears. If a library is currently open, the items for the category associated with the current view appear in the list box and the display area shows the first item in the list box. If no library is currently open, the list box and display area are empty.

**To open a library**

1. Press the Library pop-up menu and choose Open Library.  
A dialog box appears.
2. Locate and select the library you want and then click Open.

**To close a library**

- Press the Library pop-up menu and choose Close Library.

**To display items in a different category**

- Press the Category pop-up menu and choose the category you want (a category is underlined if it contains items).

The items are displayed in the list box and the first item appears in the display area.

**To install an item in the library**

1. In your document, select the item you want to install.  
For detailed instructions on how to select outlines, objects, rule sets, pictures, color sets, and layouts for installation in a library, see “Installing Items in a Library” earlier in this section.
2. Display the Browser window.
3. Open the library and display the appropriate category for the item you have selected.
4. Click Install.  
A dialog box appears asking you to name the item.

**NOTE:**

*If the Install button is dimmed, the selected item cannot be installed in this library category. You must display the appropriate category in order to install the item.*

5. Type a name and click Install.

The Browser window is redisplayed. The newly installed item appears in the list box.

**To place an item into the current document**

1. To place an outline, select the headline above the location where you want to insert the outline.

To place an object, display the bullet chart in which you want to insert the object.

To place a graphic, position the insertion point in the outline or display the bullet chart where you want to insert the graphic.

To place rules, select the headline (in Outline view), bullet chart (in Bullet Chart view), or node (in Tree Chart view) to which you want to attach the rules.

To place a layout, display the bullet chart to which you want to apply the layout.

To place a color set, you can display any view.

2. Display the Browser window.
3. Open the library and display the category that contains the item you want to place.
4. Click Place.  
A copy of the item is placed in your document.

**To rename an item**

1. Select the item in the list box and click Rename.  
A dialog box asks you to enter the new name.
2. Type the new name and click Rename.

**To remove an item**

1. Select the item in the list box and click Remove.  
A dialog box asks you for confirmation.
2. Click OK to remove the item.  
If you decide not to remove the item, click Cancel.

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**Using the Library Mover**

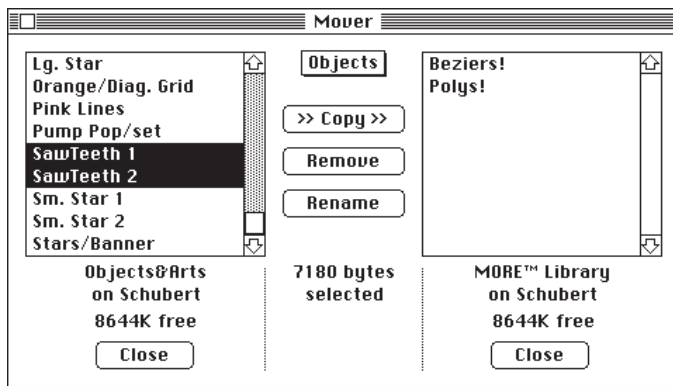
MORE provides a utility program called the Library Mover that you can use to move and copy items between different files, delete library items, and even create new library files in which to store items. The Library Mover provides a way of creating custom library files for transfer to other users.

**To move library items**

1. Open the MORE 3.0 folder, then select the Library Mover icon (see margin) and choose Open from the File menu, or just double-click the icon.

2. Use the Open buttons to the libraries you want to work with.  
If necessary, first click Close to close the library currently displayed.  
Whenever you click an Open button, a dialog box appears with a directory of folders and library files on the current disk or in the current folder. Use that dialog box to switch disks or move around in the file hierarchy.

3. Open the library you want to view by selecting its name and then clicking Open, or by double-clicking its name.

You can create a new library for storing items by clicking New, naming the library file, and clicking Create. When a library is open, its name, the name of the disk it's on, and the amount of free space on the disk are shown below the list.

4. Use the pop-up menu at the top of the dialog to choose the category of library items you want to display.

5. Select the library items you want to copy or delete.

You can select from either list. Hold down the Shift key while clicking to select multiple items (or drag across the items you want to select). When library items are selected, the size of the selected items is displayed.

6. Click Copy to copy the selected library items in the direction the arrows point, or click Remove to delete the selected items.

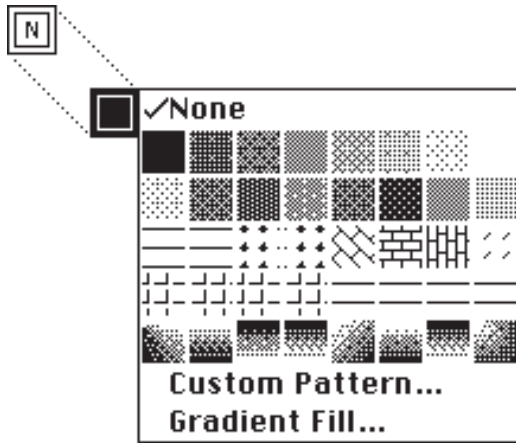
Click Rename to display a dialog box where you will be prompted for new names for the selected library items.

7. Click Quit to leave the Library Mover.

After you quit the Library Mover and restart MORE, the modified library files are now available for use.

## **CUSTOMIZING COLORS, PATTERNS AND GRADIENTS**

MORE provides extensive support for applying patterns and colors in your outlines, bullet charts, and tree charts. All the MORE color commands use a similar pop-up menu that displays a palette of 32 available colors. In Bullet Chart and Tree Chart views the pop-up menus display colors or monochrome patterns.

Pattern tool)*

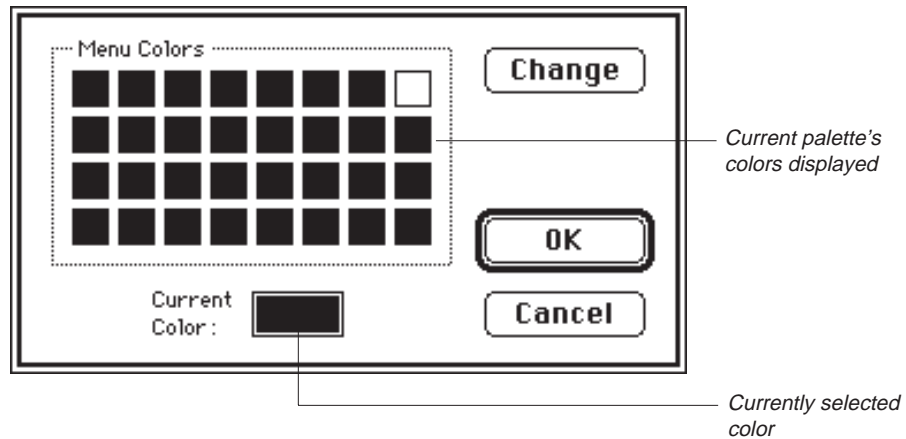
MORE allows you to access the Apple Color Picker where you can select new colors for your color palette or apply colors that do not currently appear in the palette. (For more information on the Color Picker, see your Macintosh manual.) You can also use MORE's sophisticated Pattern editor and the Custom Gradient dialog box to create patterns of your own design. The following sections describe the color and pattern editing capabilities that are available to you.

### **Choosing Custom Colors for Text**

While your color palette can include 32 entries, MORE allows you to access the Apple Color Picker where you can choose additional colors to apply to text or text objects or define new colors for your color palette. The number of colors you can choose depends on your monitor and the current display mode you've specified in the Control Panel.

To bring up the Custom Color dialog box, select Custom Color in the Color submenu of the Format menu.

*Custom Color dialog box*



The current palette is displayed in the Menu Colors area. The Current Color box displays the color of the current selection.

**To apply a custom color to a text selection**

1. Select the text or text object you want to color.
2. Choose Custom Color from the Color pop-up menu in the Format menu.
3. Click Change.  
MORE displays the Apple Color Picker.
4. Select a new color in the Apple Color Picker and click OK. (Click Cancel to discard any changes.)  
MORE returns to the Custom Color dialog box, which displays the newly defined color in the Current Color box.
5. Click OK to apply the custom color to the selected text and close the Custom Color dialog box.

When selected text displays custom color, a check will appear next to Custom Color in the Color pop-up menu to indicate that the color was not selected from the existing color palette.

**TIP** *You can also apply an existing palette color to the current selection by dragging the color from the palette to the Current Color box. It can then be modified before clicking OK.*



## **Modifying the Text Color Menu**

In addition to choosing custom colors for MORE text, you can also add custom colors to the current palette. MORE provides several mouse operations in the Custom Color dialog box for rearranging or modifying the color palette. (The modifications you make to the palette are stored in each file.) These mouse operations are also available in the Custom Gradient dialog box and both of the Pattern editors described later in this chapter.

### **To apply a variation of a menu color to a text selection**

1. Select the text or text object you want to color.
2. Choose Custom Color from the Color pop-up menu in the Format menu.
3. Drag the menu color to the Current Color, then click Change.  
MORE displays the Apple Color Picker.
4. Edit the color, then click OK.
5. Click OK to apply the color to your text or text object.

### **To change the colors available in the color menu**

1. Choose Custom Color from the Color pop-up menu in the Format menu.
2. Click on the menu entry you want to change, then click Change.
3. Edit the color, then click OK.
4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 as desired.
5. Click OK to save the changes you made to the palette.

**To change a menu color and apply the new color to a text selection**

1. Select the text or text object you want to color.
2. Choose Custom Color from the Color pop-up menu in the Format menu.
3. Click on the menu entry you want to change, then click Change.
4. Edit the color, then click OK.
5. Drag the new color to the Current Color.
6. Click OK to change the menu color and apply the new color to a text selection.

**To replace one palette color with another palette color**

- Drag one color into another to replace the destination color with the source color.

**To exchange the positions of colors on the palette**

- Option-drag one color into another to exchange their positions on the palette.

**To extract a color visible anywhere on the screen outside the dialog box**

- Hold down the Option key and click the desired color. (The pointer becomes an eye dropper (shown in margin) during this operation.)



## Creating Custom Patterns

MORE provides a Pattern editor that allows you to create and modify patterns for objects that appear in bullet charts or tree charts. Depending on the current display mode of the monitor you are using, MORE provides two variations on the pattern editor; a Monochrome Pattern editor for black and white displays and a Color Pattern editor for color and gray-scale displays. To open the Pattern editor, choose Custom Pattern from any of the pop-up menus that appear in the Tree Chart palette or the Bullet Chart palette.

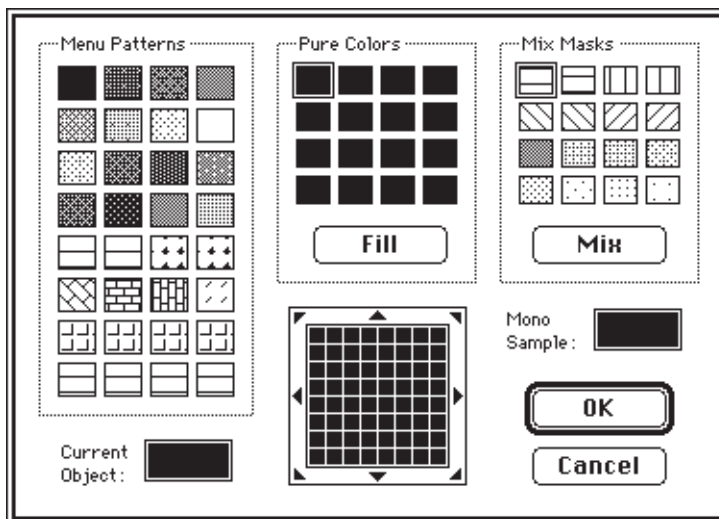
If you are using MORE with a color monitor, the Color Pattern editor lets you create your own custom color patterns. You can invent and combine different patterns and colors. If black and white are your only available colors, you can use the Monochrome Pattern editor, described later in this chapter, to modify patterns.

Creating a pattern with either one of the pattern editors automatically creates a counterpart for the other display—for example, if you create a color pattern, MORE creates an approximation of that pattern for display on monochrome monitors.

## The Color Pattern editor

The Color Pattern editor provides direct access to the Apple Color Picker, and automatically creates a black and white pattern that approximates the shading of a single-color pattern.

You can use the pattern editor to modify the pattern of a currently selected object in a tree chart or bullet chart or to edit patterns that appear in the current color set.



*The Pattern editor (color monitor).*

<i>Menu Patterns area</i>	Displays the color patterns currently available in the pop-up menus on tree chart and bullet chart palettes.
<i>Current Object box</i>	Displays the pattern (and color) of the currently selected object. All the methods that you can use to drag colors in the Custom Color dialog box also work in the Pattern editor.
<i>Pure Colors area</i>	Displays the current selection of pure colors available for creating and editing a pattern. Click a pure color to change the current color available for applying masks and coloring pixels in the Fat Bits area. To modify a pure color, double-click it to open the Apple Color Picker, where you can replace the selected color with another pure color. All the ways to drag patterns also work with pure colors.
<i>Mix Masks area</i>	Displays a collection of masks that you can use to build a pattern. The masks appear in the color currently selected in the Pure Colors area.
<i>Fill</i>	Fills Fat Bits area with the currently selected pure color. Filling the Fat Bits area replaces any pattern currently displayed there.
<i>Mix</i>	Applies the selected mask (in the current pure color) to the pattern, overlaying the current contents of the pattern. You can overlay successive masks on a pattern to create special pattern effects.
<i>Fat Bits area</i>	Provides a magnified view of the pattern you are modifying and serves as an easel for refining your patterns. Click or drag through the Fat Bits box to change the bits to the selected pure color. Click or drag again through the Fat Bits to revert to the previously applied pure color. The arrows that surround the Fat Bits view lets you offset the pattern in any of eight directions. By alternatively offsetting and masking a pattern, you can create a wide variety of custom patterns.
<i>Mono Sample box</i>	Shows how the current pattern will print on an Imagewriter II fitted with a color ribbon and how it will be interpreted in a monochrome display.

---

**To select a pattern for editing**

1. Choose Custom Pattern from a pop-up menu to display the Pattern editor.  
Or  
Select an object that contains a pattern you want to edit, then choose Custom Pattern from a pop-up menu to display the Pattern editor.
2. Click an existing menu pattern in the Menu Pattern area if you want to edit that pattern.  
Or  
Leave the Current Object box selected if you want to edit the pattern displayed in the selected object or objects. (This technique will not modify the pattern menu.)  
MORE displays the selected pattern in the Fat Bits area.

**To set a new base color**

- Click a color in the Pure Colors area, then click Fill to apply the base color to the selected pattern. MORE also displays the base color in the Fat Bits area.



*Option-click outside the dialog box to pick up the color of the pixel immediately below the eye-dropper cursor and drop it into the selected cell in the Pure Colors area. (This technique is useful for matching or slightly adjusting an existing color.) The eye dropper continues to pick up color as long as the Option key is depressed.*

*Option-click on a magnified pixel in the Fat Bits area to select its pure color in the Pure Colors area.*

**To apply a mask**

1. Click the pure color you want to use for the mask.
2. Click the mask style you want to apply, then click Mix to overlay the base color in Fat Bits with the mask.

**To edit individual pixels**

- Click a pure color, then click individual Fat Bits to apply the color to individual pixels. As you make changes, the Menu Patterns area reflects the modifications.

**To apply the pattern**

- When you are finished editing, click OK. If you've changed the current pattern, the new pattern is applied to the selected objects. If you've changed any of the menu patterns, they will now appear in the pop-up menu.

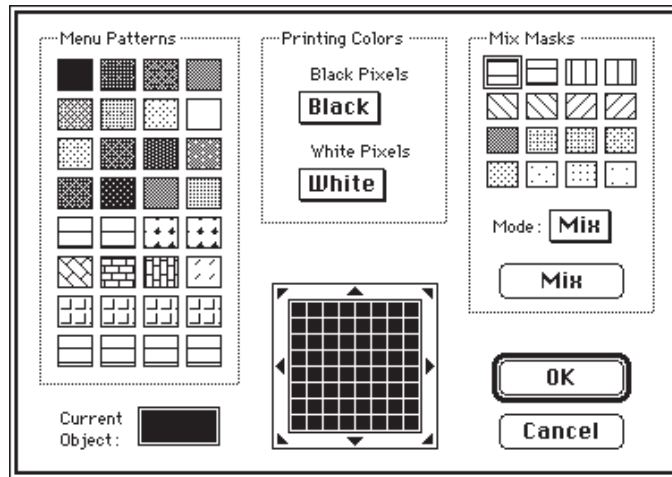
**NOTE:** *As in the Custom Color dialog box, you can rearrange or modify the pattern menu displayed in Bullet Chart view or Tree Chart view by dragging or Option-dragging patterns within the Menu Patterns area.*

*If you have modified a menu pattern and want to apply it to the selection as well, you must drag it to the Current Object area.*

**The Monochrome Pattern Editor**

You can use the Monochrome Pattern editor to modify the pattern of a currently selected object in a tree chart or bullet chart, or to edit a pattern that appears in the pop-up menu on the Tree Chart and Bullet Chart palettes.

**Monochrome Pattern Editor**



*Menu Patterns area* Displays the patterns currently available in the pop-up menus on Tree Chart and Bullet Chart palettes.

*Current Object box* Displays the pattern of the currently selected object (or objects).

*Printing Colors area* Provides pop-up menus that you can use to specify colors for printing or displaying charts on color output devices. The Black Pixels pop-up menu governs the colors that will print in place of black pixels. The White Pixels pop-up menu governs the colors that will print in place of white pixels.

---

*Mix Masks area* Displays a collection of masks that you can use to build a pattern. The masks are accompanied by a pop-up Mode menu of masking options.

---

*Mix* Applies the selected mask (in a selected Mask mode) to the pattern, overlaying the pattern currently displayed in the Fat Bits area. You can overlay successive masks on a pattern to create special effects.

---

*Fat Bits area* Provides a magnified view of the pattern you are modifying and serves as an easel for refining your patterns. Click or drag through the Fat Bits box to change the pixels to black or white. Click or drag again through the Fat Bits to revert to the previous pixel shade. The arrows that surround the Fat Bits view let you offset the pattern in any of eight directions. By alternatively offsetting and masking a pattern, you can create a wide variety of custom patterns.

---

### **To edit a pattern**

1. Choose Custom Pattern from a pop-up menu to display the Pattern editor.
2. Click an existing menu pattern in the Menu Patterns area.

Or

Leave the Current Object box selected to directly modify the pattern displayed in the selected object or objects. (This technique will not modify the pattern menu.)

MORE displays the selected pattern in the Fat Bits area.

### **To apply a mask**

1. Choose the mask option you want to use from the Mode pop-up menu.

2. Click the mask style you want to apply, then click Mix to apply the mask to the pattern.

Click the offset arrows in the Fat Bits area to shift the pattern a pixel width at a time, then reapply a mask to create special effects.

### To edit individual pixels

- Click individual fat bits to switch pixels between black and white.

### To apply the pattern

- When you are finished editing, click OK. If you've changed the current pattern, the new pattern is applied to the selected object. If you've changed any of the menu patterns, they will now appear in the pop-up menu.

**NOTE:** As in the Custom Color dialog box, you can rearrange the pattern menu displayed in Bullet Chart view or Tree Chart view by dragging or Option-dragging patterns within the Menu Patterns area.

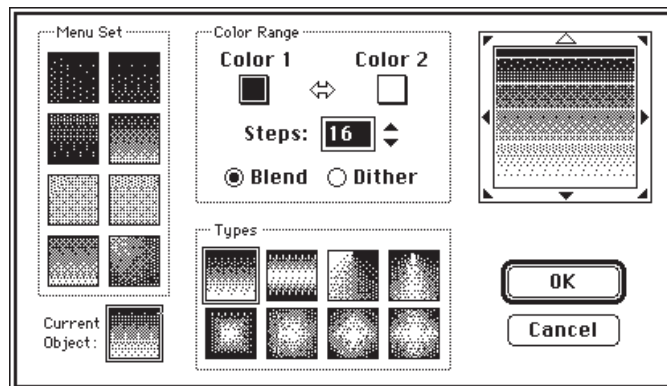
*If you have modified a menu pattern and want to apply it to the selection as well, you must drag it to the Current Object area.*

## Creating Custom Gradients

In either Tree or Bullet Chart view, you can create gradient fills that can then be applied to tree chart or bullet chart objects. Any object that can be filled with a pattern can also be filled with a gradient. On color monitors, you can specify two colors for blending in a variety of styles.

MORE provides a Custom Gradient dialog box where you can create and modify gradients.

Custom Gradient dialog box





*Menu Set area* Displays the gradients available in the current color set.

---

*Current Object* Displays the shading of the currently selected object.

---

*Color Range area* Contains a pair of pop-up menus (Color 1 and Color 2) for specifying the control colors—the starting and ending colors of the graduated shade. On monochrome monitors, MORE displays the selected pure colors as black or white.

The Color Range area also provides a set of radio buttons for specifying how colors are blended in the gradient shade.

---

- Click *Blend* to specify that each band contain a single pure color—the hue of which is determined by its relative distance from the control colors.
  - Click *Dither* to specify that each band in the gradient shade contains pixels of both control colors—the number of pixels in each band is determined by the band's distance from the control colors.
- 

**NOTE:** *While blending provides a smoother display, it also requires the availability of many more colors. Dithering requires only two colors to render the gradient. On an 8-bit display, dithering objects may yield better results on a blended background.*

---

*Steps field* Provides a place for you to enter the number of gradient bands between the starting and ending colors in the shade (3 is the minimum entry). The higher the number of steps, the smoother the transition between each color in the gradient. Type a number in the field or click the arrows to the right of the field to specify steps.

**NOTE:** *If you are using a 24-bit color monitor and a gradient has 32 or more steps, MORE will automatically calculate the optimum number of steps to make the gradient appear as smooth as possible. The same process applies to printing and exporting files.*

---

*Types area* Provides eight different variations for a gradient shade. Click a gradient type to display the control colors in that style in the gradient sample that appears in the top right of the dialog box. The gradient sample is encircled with directional arrows that you can use to rotate a selected gradient shade for a variable effect. If any of the four concentric types (on the bottom row of the Types area) are displayed in the View area, you can modify them further by clicking and dragging the center point of the shade.

---

### To edit a gradient

1. Choose Gradient Fill from the pop-up menu that appears when you click the Fill tool in either the Tree Chart or Bullet Chart palette.  
MORE displays the Custom Gradient dialog box.
2. Click an existing gradient in the Menu Set area.  
Or  
Leave the Current box selected to directly modify the gradient displayed in the selected object or objects. (This technique will not modify the gradient menu.)  
MORE displays the selected pattern in the Fat Bits area.
3. If necessary, click on the shading types from the Types area to display that type in the View area.
4. Choose new control colors from the pop-up menus that appear in the Color Range menu.
5. Enter a number in the Steps field to specify the number of bands in the gradient.
6. Choose either the blending or dithering method of coloring the gradient bands.
7. Click the rotation arrows surrounding the Gradient view to rotate the gradient to the desired direction.
8. When finished, click OK. If you've changed the current object, the new pattern will be applied to the selected object. If you've changed any of the menu patterns, they will now appear in the pop-up menu.

**NOTE:** *As in the Custom Color dialog box and the pattern editors, you can rearrange or modify the gradient menu displayed in Bullet Chart view or Tree Chart view by dragging or Option-dragging gradients within the Menu Set area.*

---

*If you have modified a menu gradient and you want to apply it to the selection, you must drag it to the Current Object area.*

## **PRESENTING SLIDE SHOWS**

This section provides information about MORE's ability to turn your charts into an impressive slide show with only a minimum of effort. To guide you through the process of creating an effective presentation, you can use Chart Tutor.

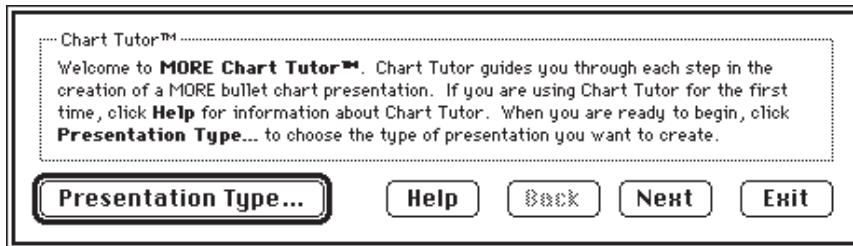
### **Using Chart Tutor**

To aid you in the creation of effective presentations, MORE also provides Chart Tutor, an on-screen, step-by-step guide to creating foolproof presentations. Chart Tutor takes you through the entire process of creating presentations, opening any dialog boxes or windows that are required for slide show creation. Chart Tutor is interactive—as you follow the instructions, you are free to move backwards or forwards through the entire sequence of Chart Tutor dialogs, skip those steps that aren't required, or that you've already performed, or exit Chart Tutor. Each Chart Tutor dialog box also provides on-screen help for the specific step you are on.

#### **To use Chart Tutor**

1. Choose Chart Tutor from the Bullet menu.

The first Chart Tutor dialog box appears, prompting you to select the type of presentation you want to make.

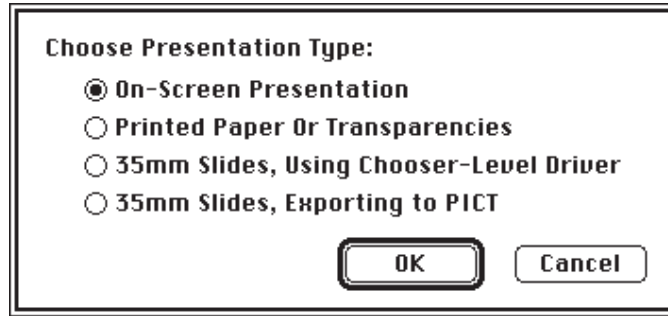


*The initial Chart Tutor dialog box*

2. If you need to select the presentation, Click Presentation Type to display the Presentation Type dialog box.

3. Click a presentation type, then click OK to display the next Chart Tutor dialog box.

**The Presentation Type dialog box**



If the presentation type you selected requires printing, Chart Tutor prompts you to display the Apple Chooser so that you can select the appropriate device.

Chart Tutor prompts you to display the Chart Size dialog box, where you can specify a size for the bullet charts.

4. If you need to specify a chart size, click Set Chart Size to display the Chart Size dialog box. For more information, see "Setting Chart Size" in Chapter 3.

Chart Tutor prompts you to display the Master Chart, where you can make global changes that affect all your bullet charts.

5. If you need to apply a layout to the charts through the Master Chart, Click Go To Master Chart to display the master chart. For more information, see "Using Master Chart" in Chapter 3.

In the next dialog, Chart Tutor prompts you to choose a library that contains a layout template that you can apply to the Master Chart.

6. If you need to open a library, click Choose Library and select a library file from a standard file dialog. Click Next to continue using your current library. For more information, see "Opening an Existing Library" earlier in this chapter.

Chart Tutor then asks if you want to choose a template. If so, the Browser will appear, so you can select a layout template to apply to the Master Chart or individual chart.

7. If you need to select a layout template, click Choose Template and select a template from the Browser window. For more information, see “Browsing Libraries” in this chapter.

In the next dialog, Chart Tutor invites you to leave the Master Chart. (The option is only available if the Master Chart is displayed.)

8. Click Leave Master Chart, or click Next if the Master Chart is not displayed.

Chart Tutor asks if you now want to examine your modified charts before continuing with the presentation.

9. If you want to review your charts, click Examine Charts to suspend Chart Tutor, then use the Navigation tools (or arrow keys) to review your charts.

10. After your review is complete, choose Resume Chart Tutor from the Bullet menu to continue.

Depending on your presentation type, Chart Tutor informs you that you are now ready to start, print, or export the presentation.

11. Click Enter Slide Show to begin. If you have selected a different presentation type, click either Print or Save As. The appropriate dialog box appears.

12. Select the appropriate options and click OK.

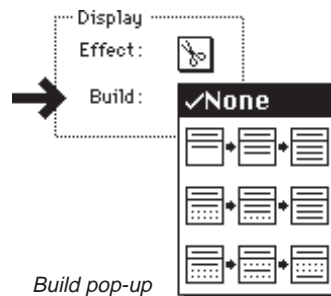
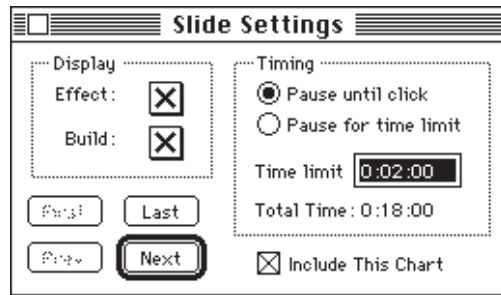
When the presentation is complete, the final Chart Tutor dialog appears.

13. Click Done to end the Chart Tutor session.

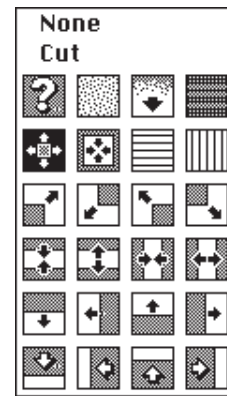
## Creating Special Effects

The Slide Settings commands on the Bullet menu lets you assign special transition effects to your slides if you're making a presentation on your Macintosh. When you choose Slide Settings, MORE displays the Slide Settings dialog box, which you can use to create special effects for your presentations and set time limits for each chart in the presentation.

*Build pop-up*



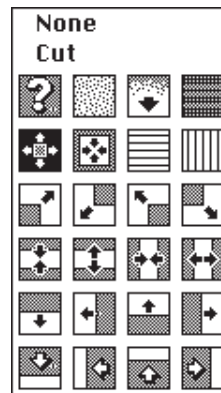
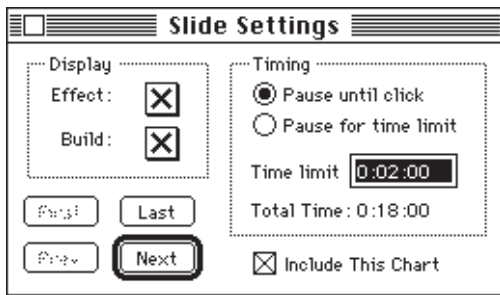
*Effect pop-up*

The Display area provides pop-up menus of special effects and text build types that you can use to enhance your presentation.

Use the Builds pop-up menu to choose a special effect for displaying subheads. You can use builds to create a dynamic presentation where individual subheads are highlighted in sequence. The menu provides choices for accentuating subheads in a chart. You can choose to display each subhead individually, or highlight each subhead as it is presented. Each time you advance to the next chart in the series in Slide Show view, the next subhead is revealed or highlighted. Selecting the Expand Builds setting from the Print Options dialog box prints each step in a build as an individual chart.

- Choosing the None build turns off the Build effect. MORE displays the charts in the normal fashion.
- The second build displays one subhead after another in full intensity.
- The third build displays all the subheads simultaneously, but as faded text. Each time you advance, MORE displays the next subhead in full intensity.
- The fourth build displays all the subheads at once, but as faded text. Each time you advance to another subhead, MORE displays the selected subhead in full intensity, but switches the previous subhead back to faded text.

Use the Effects pop-up menu to control the transition between slides during a presentation. Use this menu to create dynamic slide presentations that capture an audience's attention. For example, you could choose a special effect where the chart dramatically transforms into the next chart in the series. A variety of effects are pictured in the pop-up menu. (The None option removes an effect.) To experiment with effects, choose the Slide Settings command while in Slide Show view and choose different effects from the pop-up.



*Effect pop-up with icons*

*Pause until click* Advances to the next slide when you click the mouse during your presentation, or when you use the keyboard. Even when this setting is on, you can still set timing limits for each slide. The Control Panel has prompts and timing clocks for scheduling the presentation based on the time allotments you specify. For more details, see “Multiple Monitor Presentations” later in this chapter.

*Pause for time limit* Automatically advances to the next chart, according to the time limits that you set. When this setting and the Continuously Repeat Show setting (in the Slide Show dialog box) are both turned on, your presentation is totally automatic. MORE advances through each chart and then loops back to the beginning of the presentation to start it again. Setting the time to zero will display the slides as fast as they can be drawn, which will vary.

---

*Include This Chart* Includes the current chart in a slide show presentation. If the option is unchecked, MORE won't include the current chart in the slide show or in printing or exporting.

---

*Time Limit* When you type a single number with no suffix, MORE assumes the number is for minutes. When you type a number with the format mm:ss, MORE assumes that mm represents minutes and ss represents seconds.

The dialog box also provides navigation buttons for moving between charts so that you can apply different slide settings.

---

## Timing Your Presentation

Timing is an important attribute of a polished presentation. After applying slide settings and creating speaker's notes, you should measure the amount of time that each chart is displayed (and the total time of the presentation) before making your first "live" presentation. The Slide Settings command on the Bullet menu provides several ways to time your presentation.

When timing your charts, you'll want to drag the Slide Settings dialog box and the Control Panel in front of the Bullet window. You may also want to bring the Notes window to the front of the window while fine-tuning your presentation. Each chart can have a different time limit; however, all charts in a series of continuation charts will have the same time limit. Use the First, Last, Prev and Next buttons to move through your presentation as you set time limits.

Use the Control Panel to time each chart as you practice your presentation. In a multiple-monitor presentation, display the Control Panel on the speaker's monitor. Then use the timing clocks as prompts to keep you on schedule.



*Use the Slide Settings dialog box with the Master Chart to apply chart settings to all the charts.*



## Using Speaker's Notes

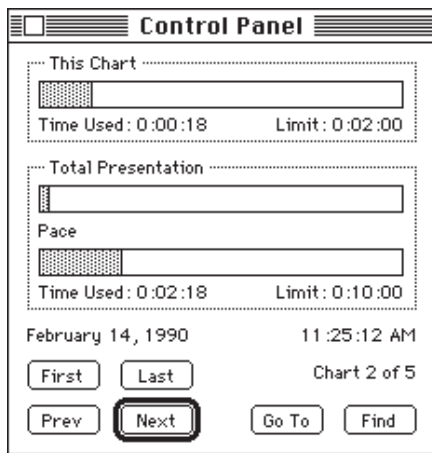
The Speaker's Notes command on the Window menu allows you to write speaker's notes and attach them to as many slides as you like. (Speaker's notes are attached to the title of a chart.) You can print the contents of notes in a variety of formats displayed in the Print Options window and give them to your audience as handouts. (For more information printing speaker's notes, see "Printing Bullet Charts" in Chapter 3.) If you're going to do a multiple-monitor slide-show presentation, you can display the speaker's notes as prompts on the speaker's monitor. Notes will be unseen by the audience. For more information, see "Attaching Speaker's Notes to Charts" in Chapter 3.

**NOTE:** You can also use MORE's Save As command while in Bullet Chart view to export the contents of speaker's notes to a word processor.

---

## USING THE CONTROL PANEL

The Control Panel is a special window that lets you display each chart in your slide show and monitor your time usage when giving a live presentation with multiple monitors. Use Slide Settings to set the time of each chart. When you're giving a live presentation, display the Control Panel on the speaker's monitor.



*Control Panel*

The control panel measures time in several ways:

<i>This Chart</i>	Shows a bar chart representing your current location within the presentation. When the chart has displayed longer than its allotted time, all the timing bars turn red on a color monitor or change pattern on a monochrome monitor.
<i>Pace</i>	Shows a bar chart representing the time it will take to finish according to your schedule. Midpoint on the bar is about half way through your presentation. Ideally, pace and time used should be of equal length.
<i>Time Used</i>	Shows a bar chart indicating the time elapsed in the entire presentation. During the slide show, when the chart has displayed longer than its allotted time, all the timing bars turn red on a color monitor or change pattern on a monochrome monitor.
<i>First</i>	Displays the first chart in the series. Pressing Home, <b>W-Shift-Return</b> , <b>W-U</b> , or <b>W-&lt;</b> does the same thing.
<i>Last</i>	Displays the last chart in the series. Pressing End, <b>W-Return</b> , <b>W-d</b> , or <b>W-&gt;</b> does the same thing.
<i>Prev</i>	Displays the previous chart. Pressing Shift-Return or <b>&lt;</b> does the same thing.
<i>Next</i>	Displays the next chart. Pressing Return or <b>&gt;</b> does the same thing. (Clicking the mouse button also advances to the next chart in the series.)
<i>Go To</i>	Displays a dialog for typing in the number of the slide that you want to display.

*Find*                      Displays an edit text box for finding any word on your charts. You can then find and display a chart by specifying a text pattern. MORE will search through text displayed on the bullet chart unless the Speaker's Notes window is in the front, in which case only speaker's notes will be searched. The search scope and other options will be according to what is currently chosen in the Search window.

---

### **Smart Navigation**

MORE provides some additional "smart" navigation techniques for the mouse. If you double-click a subhead, MORE advances directly to its corresponding chart, if there is one. When a subchart is displayed, double-clicking on the title displays the subhead's corresponding parent chart. This is particularly useful in an interactive setting where you want to quickly respond to an audience. Of course, during a slide-show presentation, you still can use the keyboard equivalents of the First, Last, Next, and Previous buttons on the control panel to navigate through charts. The following is a table of mouse navigation tips.

In the Slide Show dialog box, if the Smart Mouse Navigation option is OFF-

<i>Single-clicking anywhere on the chart</i>	Goes to the next chart.

<i>Double-clicking anywhere on the chart</i>	Goes to previous chart.

If Smart Mouse Navigation option is ON-

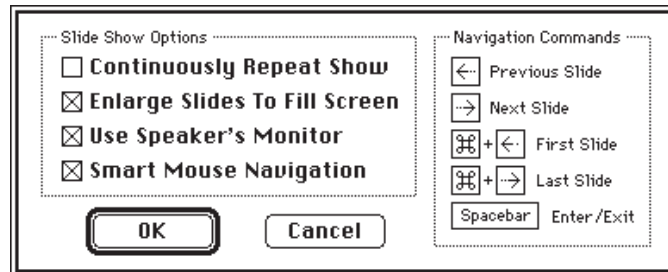
<i>Single-clicking on Title</i>	No action.

## Delivering the Presentation

When your charts are ready for display, you can go to Slide Show view by choosing Slide Show from the Bullet menu. When you choose Slide Show, MORE displays a dialog box where you can select options for presenting the slide show.

**Slide Show dialog box**



*Continually Repeat Show* Restarts the presentation from the beginning when it reaches the last slide. This feature is handy for self-running presentations in point-of-sale areas, convention booths, and so on.

*Enlarge Slides to Fill Screen* Automatically enlarges slides to fit the monitor you are using. This has no effect if your chart size matches the monitor in use.

---

*Use Speaker's Monitor* Reserves the monitor displaying the document window as the speaker's monitor (if more than one monitor is available).

---

*Smart Mouse Navigation* Allows you to display another slide by clicking subheads and titles. If neither a title nor a subhead is clicked, the default is that a single click moves one slide forward; a double-click moves one slide backward.

---

During a slide show, MORE hides everything on the screen except the bullet chart, which is centered. You can also switch between a Slide Show view and regular Bullet Chart view by pressing the Spacebar.

If you're doing a multiple-monitor presentation, all the audience monitors will switch to a slide show when you choose this command. However, the speaker's monitor will remain in a regular Bullet Chart view. See also "Multiple Monitor Presentations," later in this chapter.

You can stop a presentation by pressing W-. (period) or by pressing the Spacebar. On an extended keyboard, you can also press the Esc key to exit the Slide Show view.

Once your screen displays Slide Show view, clicking the mouse button anywhere on screen (except on the title or subheads), advances to the next slide. Otherwise MORE waits for the specified time limit before advancing to the next slide. If you double-click a subhead, MORE advances directly to its corresponding chart, if there is one. When a subchart is displayed, double-clicking its title displays that title's corresponding chart. You can still use the keyboard equivalents of the First, Last, Next, and Previous buttons on the control panel to navigate through charts.

## **Accessing Menus in Slide Show**

You won't be able to see the menu bar if you are using a single monitor, or if the speaker's monitor does not contain the menu bar. However, pointing at the very top of the screen where the menu bar normally appears and then pressing the mouse button will pull down a menu. So you can access the menu commands, just as you would in a regular Bullet Chart view.

## Starting Presentations in Slide Show View

You can set up a MORE file so that it starts directly in Slide Show view. While in Slide Show view, close (after saving changes to) the MORE document. Afterwards, when you open the file it will automatically start in Slide Show view. (MORE specifies the monitor that contains the document window as the speaker's monitor.)

## Multiple Monitor Presentations

If you are using a Macintosh that supports multiple monitors, you can create a multiple monitor presentation by connecting more than one video device. See your Macintosh owner's guide for information on how to connect multiple monitors to your Macintosh.

During a slide show presentation, you can use any monitor as the speaker's monitor, or not use a speaker's monitor at all. Before switching to a Slide Show view, however, you may want to display the MORE Control Panel and the Speaker's Notes window on the speaker's monitor.

Once you're in Slide Show view, the menu bar will only be available on the main monitor—which makes it the best choice for the speaker's monitor (although color availability on monitors may dictate otherwise).

While the audience does not have to see anything but the information on each bullet chart, you can drag any other windows onto the audience monitor. You can also click on the Speaker's Notes window to make it active, enter some notes, then click on the Bullet Chart window to resume your presentation.

For more information on creating effective presentations, see *"Making the Most of MORE,"* included in your MORE package.

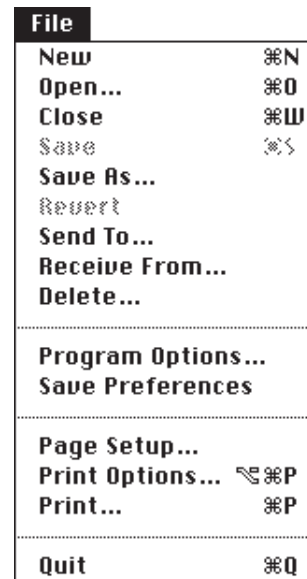
## APPENDIX A:

# MORE 3.0 Menus and Commands

This chapter provides descriptions of each command that appears in MORE menus. If the words “Option Key” appear after a command description, it means that the Option key must be held down in order to view the menu item.

### FILE MENU COMMANDS

<b><i>New</i></b>	The New command creates a new MORE document. When you choose New, MORE creates a new document and opens a new, untitled window on the desktop. (MORE places a number after “Untitled-” in the title bar to differentiate between multiple new documents.)
<b><i>Open</i></b>	The Open command opens an existing MORE document. When you choose Open, the standard dialog box for specifying documents appears.
<b><i>Close</i></b>	The Close command closes the active window, removing it from the desktop. If the active window is a document window that contains changes that have not yet been saved, a dialog box appears, asking if you want to save the changes before closing the file.
<b><i>Close All</i></b>	The Close All command closes all windows, removing them from the desktop. If any window is a document window that contains changes that have not yet been saved, a dialog box appears, asking if you want to save the changes before closing the file. <i>(Option key)</i>
<b><i>Save</i></b>	The Save command saves the current document to the disk, replacing the most recent version of the document saved under the same name, and allows you to continue editing the document. If the document is untitled, MORE presents the standard dialog box for naming a document.

<b>Save All</b>	The Save All command saves the contents of all documents currently displayed on the desktop, replacing the most recent version of each document. If any of the saved documents are untitled, MORE presents the standard dialog box for naming a document. <i>(Option key)</i>
<b>Save As</b>	The Save As command saves the current document under a new name (or in a different location or a different file format) and allows you to continue editing the renamed document. Any unsaved changes you made to the original document are saved only in the renamed document. When you choose Save As, MORE presents the standard dialog box for naming a document.
<b>Revert</b>	The Revert command lets you return to the state of the current document the last time you saved it to the disk. When you choose Revert, MORE discards any changes you've made to the document since the last time it was saved.
<b>Send To</b>	The Send To command lets you export selected headlines (and their subheads) to a disk file. When you choose Send To, MORE presents a dialog box where you type a file name and select options for exporting the headlines.
<b>Receive From</b>	The Receive From command lets you import text from other files into the current document. When you choose Receive From, MORE presents a dialog box where you select a file and select options for importing the file's contents.
<b>Delete</b>	The Delete command lets you remove MORE files without having to return to the Finder and dragging icons into the Trash Can. When you choose Delete, MORE presents the standard dialog box for selecting a document. You can't use the Delete command to remove a document currently displayed on the desktop.
<b>Program Options</b>	The Program Options command lets you specify preferences for using MORE. When you choose Program Options, MORE presents a dialog box where you select such options as displaying dialog help, using carriage returns and tabs in headlines, and using Auto Save.
<b>Save Preferences</b>	The Save Preferences command lets you save the format settings, rule sets, printing options, and document options of the current document as default values for any new MORE document you create.
<b>Page Setup</b>	The Page Setup command presents a dialog box where you specify options for document pages, including paper size, margins, and page orientation. Some page setup options are dependent on your output device—the exact appearance of the dialog box depends on which output device you selected in the Chooser.
<b>Print Options</b>	The Print Options command displays the Print Options window where you specify options for printing the document and preview the document as it will appear on the printed page. The exact appearance of the window depends on which view is active when you choose Print Options.



**Print** The Print command prints a copy of the current document on the currently selected output device after presenting a standard dialog box where you specify some printing options, including paper sources and the number of copies to print. When you print a document with the Print command, MORE uses the settings currently specified in the Print Options window.

**Quit** The Quit command closes any MORE windows on the desktop and exits the application. If the command closes a window that contains unsaved information, a dialog box appears, asking if you want to save the changes.

**EDIT MENU COMMANDS**

**Undo** The Undo command reverses the effect of the last action that modified the document. The appearance of the Undo command changes to indicate the specific action that can be undone—for example, Undo Typing or Undo Fill Change. Immediately after you choose Undo, the command changes to Redo so that you can reverse the Undo command.

If you choose a command or perform an action that can't be undone, MORE changes the command to Can't Undo and the command is dimmed in the menu.

**Cut, Copy, Paste** The Cut command deletes the current selection (or selections) from the active window and puts it on the Clipboard, replacing the previous contents of the Clipboard. The Copy command puts a copy of the current selection (or currently selected objects) on the Clipboard, also replacing its previous contents. The Paste command pastes the contents of the Clipboard at the insertion point or in a bullet chart.

**Cut, Copy Rules** The Cut Rules command deletes any rules from the selected headline or object and places them on the Clipboard. The Copy command puts a copy of the selected headline's or object's rules on the Clipboard. *(Option key)*

**Clear** The Clear command removes the current selection (or selections) from the active window without putting it on the Clipboard. Pressing the Clear key on the numeric keypad has the same effect.

**Clear Rules** The Clear Rules command removes any rules from the selected headline or object without putting them on the Clipboard. *(Option key)*

<b>Select All</b>	The Select All command lets you quickly select all the headlines in an outline, all the text within a text object, or all the objects displayed in Bullet Chart view or Tree Chart view. The precise effect of Select All depends on which view is active and whether the text insertion cursor appears within a text object.
<b>Select</b>	Available only in Outline view, the Select command displays the Select Levels dialog box, which you can use to specify a range of levels to be selected in the outline. (Option key)
<b>Search</b>	The Search command lets you search for specific text that appears in outlines or bullet charts. When you choose Search, MORE presents the Search window where you specify a search pattern and select search options including repeat searches and replacement of text.
<b>Quick Find</b>	The Quick Find command lets you quickly search for specific text that appears in outlines or bullet charts. When you choose Quick Find, MORE bypasses the Search window and presents a dialog box where you specify the search string. (Option key)
<b>Find Next</b>	The Find Next command searches for the last string of text that was specified in a search—the string itself is displayed in quotes next to the Find Next command in the Edit menu.
<b>Check Spelling</b>	The Check Spelling command lets you search for and correct misspellings in outlines, bullet charts, speaker's notes, and headers/footers. When you choose the Check Spelling command, MORE presents the Spelling window where you can correct misspellings, select options for spelling searches and customize a spelling dictionary by adding or deleting words.
<b>Change Case</b>	The Change Case command lets you change the case of selected text in outlines. When you choose the Change Case command, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select a case option.
<b>Change Case Again</b>	The Change Case Again command bypasses the Change Case dialog box and uses the change case option last specified in that dialog box to change the case of selected text in outlines. (Option key)
<b>Time Stamp</b>	The Time Stamp command lets you stamp the current time at the insertion point in an outline or bullet chart. When you choose the Time Stamp command, MORE presents a dialog box where you can set a format for time display and stamp the current time.
<b>Time Stamp Again</b>	The Time Stamp Again command bypasses the Time Stamp dialog box and stamps the current time at the insertion point in an outline or bullet chart. When you choose Time Stamp Again, MORE uses the time format settings last specified in the Time Stamp dialog box. (Option key)

- Date Stamp** The Date Stamp command lets you stamp the current date at the insertion point in an outline or bullet chart. When you choose the Date Stamp command, MORE presents a dialog box where you can set a format for date display and stamp the current date.
- Date Stamp Again** The Date Stamp Again command bypasses the Date Stamp dialog box and stamps the current date at the insertion point in an outline or bullet chart. When you choose Date Stamp Again, MORE uses the date format settings last specified in the Date Stamp dialog box.  
(Option key)
- Hot Stamp** The Hot Stamps command lets you stamp placeholders for data that will vary between pages or between printings. When you print, MORE automatically replaces the placeholder with the correct information. The following information can be stamped: date printed, date last modified, time printed, time last modified, file name, folder name, chart number (in Bullet Chart view), and total charts (in Bullet Chart view).
- Hot Stamp Again** The Hot Stamp Again command bypasses the Hot Stamp dialog box and places a hot stamp at the insertion point in an outline or bullet chart. When you choose Hot Stamp Again, MORE uses the hot stamp last specified in the Hot Stamp dialog box.  
(Option key)
- Short Menus** The Short Menus command changes the MORE menus to a reduced set that displays only the basic commands required to perform simple tasks in each MORE view. When the reduced set of menus is active, the menu command changes to Full Menus.
- Full Menus** The Full Menus command changes the MORE menus to an extended set that displays all of MORE's advanced features. When the extended set of menus is active, the menu command changes to Short Menus.

**WINDOW MENU COMMANDS**

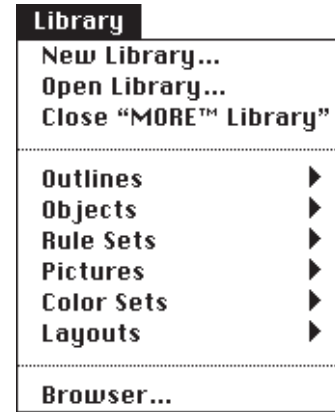
- Zoom In** The Zoom In command enlarges the current window to fill the display screen it appears in. When the window is full-sized, the menu command changes to Zoom Out.
- Zoom Out** The Zoom Out command reduces the current window to its original size. When the window is displayed in its original size, the menu command changes to Zoom In.
- Arrange** The Arrange command lets you arrange multiple document windows. When you choose Arrange, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select an arrangement option.



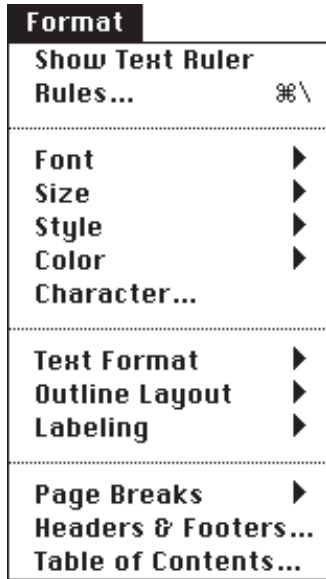
- Arrange Again** The Arrange Again command bypasses the Arrange dialog box and uses the window arrangement last specified in that dialog box.  
(Option key)
- Document Options** The Document Options command lets you specify options for working in the current document and set default options for any new documents. When you choose Document Options, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select different options, including the display of invisible characters, text wrap, and a unit of measurement for rulers.
- Show Invisibles** The Show Invisibles command displays characters marking the location of tabs, paragraphs and spaces, and outlines pictures and hot stamps. When you choose Show Invisibles, the menu command changes to Hide Invisibles.  
(Option key)
- Hide Invisibles** The Hide Invisibles command hides characters marking the location of tabs, paragraphs and spaces, and removes outlines from pictures and hot stamps. When you choose Hide Invisibles, the menu command changes to Show Invisibles.  
(Option key)
- Window Color** The Window Color command lets you specify colors for the different parts of the current window. When you choose Window Color, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select different components of a window and apply colors from a pop-up menu.
- Speaker's Notes** The Speaker's Notes command lets you attach a Speaker's Note to the currently displayed chart in Bullet Chart view. When you choose Speaker's Notes, MORE presents a Speaker's Notes window where you can enter and modify text.
- Show Clipboard** The Show Clipboard command displays the Clipboard window, which contains the most recently cut or copied information. When the Clipboard is showing, the menu item changes to Hide Clipboard.
- Window to Back** The Window to Back command sends the topmost window to the rear of the displayed windows cycling the next window to the front.
- Cycle Windows** The Cycle Window command sends the topmost document window to the rear of the displayed windows. Any other open windows, other than document windows (including Speaker's Notes windows, Search windows, and Spelling windows) cycle to the front and remain there.  
(Option key)

**LIBRARY MENU COMMANDS**

- New Library***      The New Library command lets you create a new library in which to store items. When you choose New Library, MORE presents a dialog box where you name the library and specify a folder in which it will reside.
  
- Open Library***      The Open Library command opens an existing library. When you choose Open, the standard dialog box for specifying files appears.
  
- Close Library***      The Close command closes the library that is currently open, preventing access to the library's items.
  
- Outlines***              The Outlines command displays a submenu of outline templates available in the open library.
  
- Objects***                The Objects command displays a submenu of objects available in the open library.
  
- Rule Sets***             The Rules Sets command displays a submenu of rules available in the open library.
  
- Pictures***             The Pictures command displays a submenu of graphics available in the open library.
  
- Color Sets***         The Color Sets command displays a submenu of color sets available in the open library.
  
- Layouts***             The Layouts command displays a submenu of layouts available in the open library.
  
- Browser***             The Browser command lets you display and review library items before placing them. When you choose Browser, MORE presents the Library Browser window, which you can also use to install, place, remove, or rename library items.



## FORMAT MENU COMMAND



**Show Text Ruler** The Show Text Ruler command activates the display of the text ruler for any current text object, including headlines, comment windows, headers or footers, speaker's notes, or caption text. When the text ruler is displayed, the menu command changes to Hide Text Ruler.

**Rules** The Rules command displays the Rules window for the current view.

**Fonts** The Font command displays a submenu of fonts that you can apply to currently selected text, or specify for text that you will type at the insertion point.

**Size** The Size command displays a submenu of font sizes that you can apply to currently selected text, or specify for text that you will type at the insertion point.

**Style** The Style command displays a submenu of font styles that you can apply to currently selected text, or specify for text that you will type at the insertion point.

**Color** The Color command displays a submenu of colors that you can apply to currently selected text, or specify for text that you will type at the insertion point.

**Character** The Character command lets you apply multiple attributes (font, font size, style, and color) to currently selected text, or specify for text that you will type at the insertion point. When you choose Character, MORE presents a dialog box where you can enter and choose attributes.

**Text Format** The Text Format command displays a submenu of text spacing, tab stops, and justification that you can apply to text objects, headlines, comment windows, headers or footers, speaker's notes, or caption text.

**Outline Layout** The Outline Layout command displays a submenu of outline spacing and indentation formats that you can apply to headlines or comment windows.

**Labeling** The Labeling command displays a submenu of label styles the you can choose for selected headlines. When you choose Custom Labels from the submenu, MORE presents a dialog box where you can specify labels other than the pre-set label styles.

**Page Breaks** The Page Breaks command displays a submenu of page break commands that you can use to specify (or remove) page breaks in the printed outline.

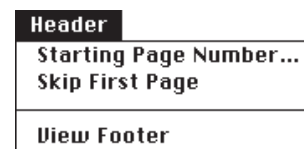
**Headers & Footers** The Headers & Footers command lets you incorporate text or graphics at the top or bottom of printed outline pages. When you choose Headers & Footers, MORE presents the Header/Footer window where you can enter text or insert graphics. When the Header/Footer window is active, you can switch between views of the header area or footer area by clicking one of the icons on the bottom of the window, or by choosing the appropriate command from the Header menu or Footer menu.

**Table of Contents** The Table of Contents command lets you generate a table of contents from the current outline. When you choose Table of Contents, MORE presents a dialog box where you choose character formats for table of contents text, select format for displaying page numbers, and specify the range of headline levels that will appear in the table of contents.

## HEADER/FOOTER MENU COMMANDS

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**Starting Page Number** The Starting Page Number command lets you specify a starting number to appear in the header or footer of printed outline pages. When you choose Starting Page Number, MORE presents a dialog box where you can type the page number that begins the numbering sequence.



**Skip First Page** The Skip First Page command specifies the inclusion of the header or footer on the first printed page of the outline. A check next to the command means that the header or footer is not printed on the first page.

**View Footer** The View Footer command displays the footer in the Header/Footer window. When the footer is displayed, the menu command changes to View Header.

**View Header** The View Header command displays the header in the Header/Footer window. When the header is displayed, the menu command changes to View Footer.

**Expand Subheads** The Expand Subheads command expands the first level of subheads below the selected headline.

**Collapse Subheads** The Collapse Subheads command collapses all the subheads that appear below the selected headline.

**Collapse to Parent** The Collapse to Parent command collapses both the subheads that appear below the selected headline and the selected headline itself (as well as any of its siblings).  
(Option key)

**Expand All Subheads** The Expand All Subheads command expands all levels of subheads below the selected headline.

**Expand To** The Expand To command lets you specify the level of subheads to expand to beneath the selected headline. When you choose Expand To, MORE presents a dialog box where you can specify a level.

**Expand to Level** The Expand to Level command bypasses the Expand To dialog box and expands the subheads of the selected headline to the level last specified in the Expand To dialog box.  
(Option key)

**Expand Comment** The Expand Comment command expands a comment window beneath the selected headline. When a Comment window is expanded, the menu item changes to Collapse Comment.

**Expand All Comments** The Expand All Comments command expands all comment windows associated with subheads of the selected headline.

**Fold Text** The Fold Text command folds the selected headline so that it only displays one line of text.

**Unfold Text** The Unfold Text command restores a folded headline to its original size.

**Fold All** The Fold All command folds the selected headline and all of its subheads so that they only display one line of text.

**Unfold All** The Unfold All command restores the folded headline and all of its subheads to their original size.



- Hoist**                    The Hoist command brings the selected headline up to the level of the Home headline and isolates the suboutline from the rest of the outline. When a comment window is selected, Hoist expands the comment window into a full view that fills the display and excludes the rest of the outline.
  
- De-Hoist**                The De-Hoist command restores a hoisted headline to its original position in the outline. When a comment window is hoisted, De-Hoist reduces the comment window to its original expanded size within the outline.
  
- De-Hoist All**            The De-Hoist All command reverse all previous hoists and returns the hoisted headlines to their original positions in the outline.  
*(Option key)*
  
- Tree Chart**             The Tree Chart command switches to Tree Chart view.
  
- Bullet Chart**            The Bullet Chart command switches to Bullet Chart view.

**REORG MENU COMMANDS**

- Move Left**              The Move Left command moves the selected headline one level to the left (and one level up in the outline hierarchy).
  
- Move Right**            The Move Right command moves the selected headline one level to the right (and one level down in the outline hierarchy).

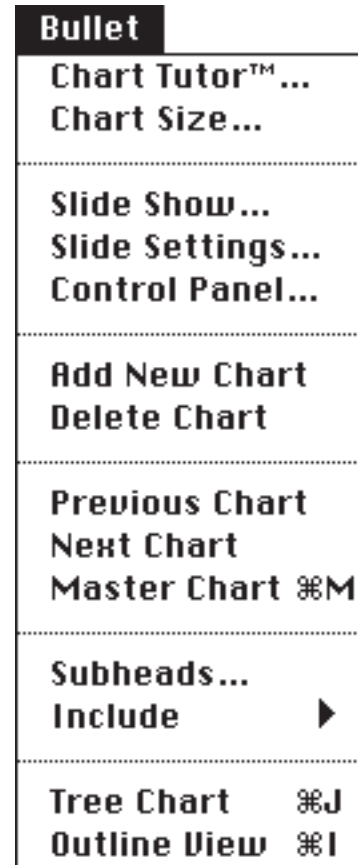

<b>Mark Subheads</b>	The Mark Subheads command tags the first level of subheads beneath a selected headline for gathering at a new location.
<b>Unmark All</b>	The Unmark All commands unmarks any marked subheads of the selected headline.
<b>Gather</b>	The Gather command lets you gather marked headlines for insertion elsewhere in the outline. When you choose Gather, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select the type of gathering operation (duplicate, move, or clone) and specify the level at which the gathered headlines will be inserted.
<b>Gather Again</b>	The Gather Again command bypasses the Gather dialog box and gathers the marked headlines, using the settings currently defined in the Gather dialog box. (Option key)
<b>Clone</b>	The Clone command creates a clone of a selected headline—an exact duplicate that is automatically updated to incorporate any changes made to its counterpart clone.
<b>Go To Clone</b>	The Go To Clone command selects the next occurrence of a clone counterpart to the selected headline. (Option key)
<b>Sort</b>	The Sort command lets you order the subheads of a selected headline—either alphabetically or according to values contained within the subheads. When you choose Sort, MORE presents a dialog box where you can specify a format for the sort.
<b>Sort Again</b>	The Sort Again command bypasses the Sort dialog box and sorts the subheads of the selected headline, using the settings currently defined in the dialog box. (Option key)
<b>Calculate</b>	The Calculate command lets you sum numbers contained within subheads of a selected headline. When you choose Calculate, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select the type of numbers you want to sum.
<b>Calculate Again</b>	The Calculate Again command bypasses the Calculate dialog box and sums the type of numbers currently specified in the dialog box. (Option key)
<b>Dial Phone</b>	If you have a modem connected to your Macintosh, the Dial Phone command lets you quickly dial numbers contained within a selected headline or text. When you choose Dial Phone, MORE presents a dialog box where you can modify a phone number and select a dialing option.
<b>Calendar</b>	The Calendar command lets you insert a calendar beneath the currently selected headline. When you choose Calendar, MORE presents the Calendar window where you can specify the appearance and structure of the calendar you are placing in the outline.

## Bullet Chart View-Specific Menus

### BULLET MENU COMMANDS

<b>Chart Tutor</b>	The Chart Tutor command initiates the Chart Tutor, a step-by-step guide to preparing and presenting slide shows. When you leave Chart Tutor to examine your charts, the menu items changes to Resume Chart Tutor.
<b>Chart Size</b>	The Chart Size command lets you specify the boundaries of the chart and set positioning guides for aligning objects in the drawing area. When you choose Chart Size, MORE presents a dialog box where you can specify chart size and adjust the positioning guides.
<b>Slide Show</b>	The Slide Show command lets you display your charts in a slide show format. When you choose Slide Show, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select options for the presentation.
<b>Slide Show Again</b>	The Slide Show Again command bypasses the Slide Show dialog box and begins the slide show presentation. When you choose Slide Show Again, MORE uses the presentation options last specified in the Slide Show dialog box. <i>(Option key)</i>
<b>Exit Slide Show</b>	When a slide show is running, the Exit Slide Show command is available on the hidden menu bar.
<b>Slide Settings</b>	The Slide Settings command lets you assign special effects to your slides. When you choose Slide Settings, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select options for special effects and text builds.
<b>Control Panel</b>	The Control Panel command lets you manage the display of charts in your slide show and monitor the use of time. When you choose Control Panel, MORE presents a dialog box where you can allot time for slide display and check the pace and elapsed time of your presentation.
<b>Add New Chart</b>	The Add New Chart command adds an empty chart to a series of bullet charts.
<b>Delete Chart</b>	The Delete Chart command removes the currently displayed bullet chart. If the deleted chart displayed information from the outline, that information is also deleted.
<b>Previous Chart</b>	The Previous Chart command displays the previous chart in the current series of charts.



<b>First Chart</b>	The First Chart command displays the first chart in the current series of charts. (Option key)
<b>Next Chart</b>	The Next Chart command displays the next chart in the current series of charts.
<b>Last Chart</b>	The Last Chart command displays the last chart in the current series of charts. (Option key)
<b>Master Chart</b>	The Master Chart command displays the Master Chart, where you can apply global formats for your charts or add graphic elements to be displayed on every chart.
<b>Subheads</b>	The Subheads command lets you specify the number of subheads (and number of subhead levels) that can appear in a chart. When you choose Subheads, MORE presents a dialog box where you can specify the display of subheads and enter title tags for continuation charts.
<b>Multiple Levels</b>	The Multiple Levels command bypasses the Subheads dialog box and specifies the display of multiple levels of subheads in charts. (Option key)
<b>Include</b>	The Includes command displays a submenu that you can use to control the display of elements in bullet charts. A check next to a menu item means that element is displayed in the current chart.
<b>Tree Chart</b>	The Tree Chart command switches to Tree Chart view.
<b>Outline View</b>	The Outline View command switches to Outline view.

## DRAW MENU COMMANDS

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<b>Hide Draw Ruler</b>	Choose the Hide Draw Ruler command to conceal the draw ruler. When the ruler is hidden, the menu command changes to Show Draw Ruler.
<b>Show Draw Ruler</b>	Choose the Show Draw Ruler command to display the draw ruler. When the ruler is visible, the menu command changes to Hide Draw Ruler.
<b>Text Layout</b>	The Text Layout command lets you specify the dimension of text objects in the chart. When you choose Text Layout, MORE presents a dialog box where you can select automatic sizing, or specify object dimensions and the standoff distance for the text object.
<b>Auto Text Layout</b>	The Auto Text Layout command lets you bypass the Text Layout dialog box and specify automatic sizing for text objects selected in the chart. (Option key)
<b>Group</b>	The Group command lets you combine selected objects into a single object.

- Ungroup** The Ungroup command ungroups a selected object into its component objects.
- Bring to Front** The Bring to Front command moves selected objects in front of all other chart objects.
- Send to Back** The Send to Back command moves selected objects in back of all other chart objects.
- Align Objects** The Align Objects command lets you align selected objects in the chart. When you choose Align Objects, a submenu of alignment options is displayed.
- Position Objects** The Position Objects command lets you position selected objects in relation to any of the four positioning guides displayed in the drawing area. When you choose Position Objects, a submenu of positioning options is displayed.
- Rotate/Flip** The Rotate/Flip command displays a submenu of commands that let you rotate or flip any selected objects on the chart, except for text objects and pictures.
- Duplicate** The Duplicate command creates an exact copy of any selected chart object other than a frame or outline objects.
- Grid** The Grid command displays a submenu of commands for setting grid spacing and specifying the display of the grid. When you choose Hide Grid from the submenu, the command changes to Show Grid.
- Snap to Grid** The Snap to Grid aligns the currently selected object to the grid.
- Auto Grid Snap** The Auto Grid Snap command specifies whether the automatic grid alignment feature is active for newly drawn or placed objects. A check next to the command means that the Auto Grid Snap feature is active.

- Hide Draw Ruler** Choose the Hide Draw Ruler command to conceal the draw ruler. When the ruler is hidden, the menu command changes to Show Draw Ruler.
- Show Draw Ruler** Choose the Show Draw Ruler command to display the draw ruler. When the ruler is visible, the menu command changes to Hide Draw Ruler.
- Size and Gap** The Size and Gap command lets you specify the size of selected nodes and adjust the gap between nodes or levels of nodes. When you choose Size and Gap, MORE presents a dialog box where you can enter values for node height and width, and gaps between or within node levels
- Cluster Options** The Cluster Options command lets you specify how cluster styles will be applied to the tree charts. When you choose Cluster Options, MORE presents a dialog box where can specify that cluster styles be applied anywhere in the tree, or only on the last level of the tree.

- Collapse Subnodes** The Collapse Subnodes command collapses the subnodes of the selected node in the tree. When a node that has collapsed subnodes is selected, the menu command changes to Expand Subnodes.
- Expand Subnodes** The Expand Subnodes command expands the subnodes of the selected node in the tree. When a node that has expanded subnodes is selected, the menu command changes to Collapse Subnodes.
- Expand All** The Expand All command expands all collapsed nodes beneath the selected node. If no nodes are selected in the chart, Expand All expands all collapsed nodes in the tree.
- Align Objects** The Align Objects command displays a submenu of commands for precisely aligning selected nodes. You can use the submenu commands to align nodes along their top edges, center lines, or bottom edges.
- Grid** The Grid command displays a submenu of commands for setting grid spacing and specifying the display of the grid. When you choose Hide Grid from the submenu, the command changes to Show Grid.
- Outline View** The Outline View command switches to Outline view.
- Bullet Chart** The Bullet Chart command switches to Bullet Chart view.

## APPENDIX B:

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### MORE's Translator Files

This appendix describes MORE's translator files and how to install them. The translator files make it possible for you to export information created in MORE to other file formats (using the Save As or Send To commands), and import information into a MORE file from other applications (using the Open or Receive From commands).

**NOTE:** *For detailed instructions on how to import files into MORE, see "Opening Existing Documents" and "Importing Text or Graphics" in Chapter 1. For instructions on exporting to another file format, see "Saving a Document" and "Exporting a Chart or Suboutline" in Chapter 1.*

#### Installing Translator Files

The MORE 3.0 Utilities disk provides translator files for the following applications and format types:

- MORE 1.x
- MORE II
- Plain text (ASCII)
- EPSF
- GrandView
- MacWrite and MacWrite II
- Microsoft Word 3.x and 4.x
- MacPaint
- MORE Graph
- PICT
- READY!
- ThinkTank 512
- ThinkTank 2.0 IBM PC
- TeachText
- WordPerfect
- WriteNow

When you install MORE, the translator files are placed in the folder “MORE Files” within the folder that contains the MORE application. This is where MORE first searches for the appropriate translator file. If the translator file does not appear where MORE expects it to be, the program then searches the System Folder for “MORE Files.” If “MORE Files” does not reside in the System Folder, MORE then searches for the translator file itself on the top level the System Folder. If MORE cannot locate the translator file in any of these locations, it will be unable to read or write information in the required file format.

**NOTE:** *If the MORE Files folder is located in a higher priority position than the translators (i.e. the MORE Files folder is in the application folder and the translators are at the root level of the System Folder), MORE will not be able to find them.*

When a translator file has been properly installed, its file format appears in the File Type pop-up menu within the Open, Receive From, Save As, and Send To dialog boxes.

.....

## **Text File Types**

MORE provides translators for five types of text file formats:

**Plain text** Translates a MORE file into ASCII format (when exporting) or an ASCII file into MORE format (when importing). When you use the Save As or Send To commands to export a MORE outline to Plain text format, each level of headline indentation is represented by one tab character unless the indent has been set to zero in MORE. The distance between tab stops is not specified by MORE, but instead depends on how tab characters are interpreted by the importing application. Comment windows are indented one tab stop below the headline to which they are subordinate. A carriage return is inserted at the end of every headline and comment window. Font information and graphics are not included when you export to the Plain text format. The Plain Text format can be read by most Macintosh word and text processing applications, and by spreadsheets, such as Microsoft Excel. You can also use the Plain Text format when you want to transfer a file to the IBM PC for use with a DOS word processor, such as WordStar or WordPerfect.



**Word Processors** For each word processing application supported by MORE, the program translates the text as faithfully as possible, attempting to preserve as much character and paragraph formatting as it can. Headers, footers and the table of contents are not exported.

If you are exporting to word processor file formats, you should select the No Labels option if you are planning to re-import the file into MORE. Otherwise, imported labels will appear as part of headline text.

**NOTE:** *You can also use one of the word processor formats when you want to export a MORE file to page layout programs that read text created with one of the supported word processors.*

.....

## **Graphic File Types**

MORE provides translators for three types of graphic file formats:

**EPSF** Translates a MORE tree chart or bullet chart into an Encapsulated PostScript format (when exporting) or translates a file from this format into MORE (when importing). The EPSF format can be read by applications such as Adobe Illustrator '88.

**MacPaint** Translates a MORE tree chart or bullet chart into PNTG or *bit mapped image* (when exporting) or translates a file from this format into MORE (when importing).

**PICT** Translates a MORE tree chart or bullet chart into PICT images (when exporting) or translates a file from this format into MORE (when importing). The PICT format can be read by applications such as MacDraw II, and Cricket Draw. You can use the Receive From command (on the File menu) to import PICT images into bullet charts. When you import a PICT image into a bullet chart, the object is inserted as an editable object.

**NOTE:** *Regardless of the graphic format you use to export a bullet chart, each bullet chart is exported to a separate file. If you use the Save As command to export a bullet chart, the entire bullet chart presentation is exported to a file. MORE creates a folder and inserts the graphic files into this folder. These files are numbered in the sequence in which they appear in the slide show. If you use the Send To command, MORE exports only the current chart. When you export a bullet chart in a text format, any Speaker's Notes are exported as text and the bullet chart images are exported as pictures embedded in the text.*

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## APPENDIX C:

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### Error Messages

This appendix provides information about various error messages you may encounter when working with MORE.

#### File and Disk Messages

---

***MORE requires System 4.1 or newer*** MORE does not run on system software earlier than version 4.1. Install the most recent recommended version of system software on your Macintosh before running MORE. See your “Macintosh System Software User’s Guide” for more information on installing system software.

---

***Directory is full*** You will receive this message if you try to export, save, or send an outline file to a disk with a full directory. Use the Save As command to eject the full disk and insert a disk with more space. You can also quit MORE and delete any files you no longer need from the full disk.

---

***Disk is full*** You will receive this message if you try to export, save, or send an outline file to a full disk. Use the Save As command to eject the full disk and insert a disk with more space. You can also quit MORE and delete any files you no longer need from the full disk.

---

***Disk is write-protected*** You will receive a this message if you try to export, save, or send an outline file to a disk that is locked. Use the Save As command to eject the diskette, slide the small tab on the corner of the diskette until the hole is CLOSED, and reinsert the diskette. Alternatively, use the Save As command to eject the locked disk, and then insert a disk that is not locked.

---

**Error accessing file. ID=nnn** You will receive an “Error accessing file” message if MORE cannot write to, or read from the disk with which you are working. These messages will usually occur when the diskette is defective in some way.

If you have backed up the MORE file, try opening the backup copy instead. If you do not have a backup copy, quit MORE and return to the Finder. Choose the Duplicate command from the File menu to copy the file onto a new disk, and then try again to open the outline.

If you were trying to save the file when you got this error message, Choose the Save As command, then eject the damaged disk and save the file on another disk.

If you are using a hard disk and get this message, part of your hard disk may be damaged. Return to the Finder and try to make a copy of the file by choosing the Duplicate command from the File menu.

---

**“File name” is already open** This message serves as a safeguard when you try to open more than one copy of the same file.

---

**That file is in use** You will get this message if you try to export, open, receive, save, or send to a file that is currently in use, either by MORE itself, or by another program running concurrently with MORE under the Multifinder, or by someone else on a network. Close the other file before continuing.

---

**That file is locked** When you receive a message telling you that a file is locked, you will have to either unlock that file before opening it, or export, save, or send to another file. If a file is locked in the Finder, you can return to the Finder and then unlock the outline file. To do so, click on the file’s icon once to highlight it, then choose the Get Info command from the File menu, and click the Locked box in the dialog box to unlock the file.

---

**Too many files open** You do not have enough RAM to open more files or you have exceeded the number of files (16 is the maximum) that can be opened at the same time. Close some of the files and try to open the file again.

---

**File is open read-only** The file you have opened is a read-only version. Close the file and reopen it making sure that the “Read-Only” check box is not checked in the Open dialog box.

## **Clone and Gather Messages**

***Infinite loop detected***

You will receive this message if you try to move a clone of a headline to a position subordinate to another clone of the same headline. This action would create an infinite loop of clones within clones.

You will also receive this message if you try to gather and clone headlines into a location that would place a clone of one headline subordinate to a clone of the same headline.

---

***There are no marked headlines***

You will receive this message if there are no marked headlines in the entire outline. Go back and mark the headlines you want to gather, and then choose the Gather command again.

---

***There are no marked headlines in the hoisted outline to gather***

You will receive this message if you have hoisted part of the outline and there are no marked headlines in the hoisted portion. Go back and mark the headlines you want to gather, and then choose the Gather command again.

---

***There are no marked headlines that can be gathered here***

You will receive this message if you select a headline that is a subhead of a marked headline and then try to use the Gather command. Select a headline that is not a subhead of a marked headline and choose the Gather command again.

---

## Check Spelling Messages

---

***The user dictionary is full***      There is no more space for additional entries in the selected user dictionary. Create a new dictionary or remove some entries from the current dictionary.

---

***Bad or old format dictionary file***      You have a corrupted Main Dictionary file or you are using a main dictionary in an old file format. Reinstall the Main Dictionary file from your MORE 3.0 master disks.

---

## Tree Chart Messages

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***The tree is too big, cannot display tree***      You will receive this messages if you try to display or print a tree chart that is more than about 35 feet square. You can collapse some headlines, use a smaller font size, or reduce the size of the nodes or the space between them. You can also try modifying the settings on the Page Setup dialog box.

---

## Memory Messages

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***Out of Memory***      There are a number of messages in MORE that begin with the words “Out of memory.” This phrase is usually followed by a description of the problem. These messages can occur in a variety of situations when there is not enough memory available for MORE to perform the function you just requested. When you receive an “Out of memory” message, you should click OK and IMMEDIATELY save the outline you are working on. This ensures that you will not lose any valuable data.

---

If you get an “Out of memory” message when you try to save an outline file, first free up some memory (see below) and then try to save the file again.

After having successfully saved the file, you should attempt to free up some memory for MORE to use before you proceed with your work. Choose the About MORE command from the Apple menu to view the amount of additional memory available for MORE.

To reduce memory usage while running MORE, you can follow one or more of the procedures below. After each one you try, you can choose About MORE to find out how much memory you have freed up.

- Close all open modeless dialog boxes. (Print Options, Headers/Footers, etc)
- Close any outline windows you are no longer using.
- If there is a large Clipboard in memory, reduce the size of the Clipboard by copying a single character onto it. To do this, select any character and choose the Copy command from the Edit menu.
- Close all open desk accessories.
- Collapse all expanded comment and graphics windows.
- Display any open outlines in a smaller font size.
- Collapse any expanded clones.

If you frequently run out of memory while running MORE, you can make more memory available before you start up MORE. To do so, try one of these methods:

- If you are using Multifinder, allocate a greater amount of memory to MORE with the Get Info command in the File menu. You should allocate a minimum of 1024K to MORE.
- If you have set up a RAM cache, reduce it or turn it off completely through the Control Panel. For more information on the RAM cache, refer to the user’s guide supplied with your Macintosh.
- If applicable, reduce or omit memory dedicated to any of the following: RAM disks, software-based print buffers, resident spelling checkers, or resident macro utility programs.

## Printing Messages

---

***No print resources available*** You will receive this message if you try to print a file when there are no printer-drivers in your System folder. Quit MORE and return to the Finder. Copy the ImageWriter, LaserWriter, and Laser Prep files into your System folder, as appropriate.

---

## Modem Messages

---

***Error accessing modem*** This message appears when there is a problem with your modem connection. Check that the connections between the Macintosh, the modem, and the telephone jack are secure. Also, verify that you've specified the correct port and phone system in the Dial Phone dialog box.

---



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
